

# **NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS**

Sacco and Vanzetti Execution Marked by Many Riots by Radicals.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

E VERY means of saving their lives having failed. Sacco and Vanzetti, the Massachusetts anarchists convicted of murder, were executed in the state prison at Charlestown, Madelros, the Portuguese murderer, went to his death in the electric chair at the same time. Thus, so far as the agencies of justice are concerned, ends this sevenyear incident that has caused such a rumpus in America and throughout the world. But the radicals and sentimentalists who assert that the execution was a judicial murder propose to keep the case alive indefinitely. They announce plans for raising a fund to create a memorial to the two men and to endow Mrs. Sacco and her children, and an organization that will undertake to establish the innocence of the "victims" and to expose the alleged conspiracy that sent them to their death. The bodies of the men were cremated, and the ashes of Vanzetti, it is planned, will be exhibited in various European cities. Immediately before and after the

execution there were violent demonstrations in many cities here and abroad, though those in the United States were efficiently handled by the police. The radicals in Paris were in which they fought the police and troops, barricaded streets and looted shops. Scores were injured and the property damage was large. The mob besieged the American embassy but it was adequately guarded. Leaders of the French Reds loudly proclaimed that the meeting of the American Legion in Paris would be ruined, but these threats are in the main disregarded. Other riots, carefully prepared in advance, were put on in London. Leipzig, Amsterdam, Lisbon, Warsaw, Brussels, and Geneva. In Johannesburg, South Africa, an American flag was burned on the steps of the town hall. Peaceful demonstrations were made in Berlin and Sydney.

It is probable that a vast majority of Americans, convinced that justice. long delayed, was done in the Sacco-Vanzetti case, are tired of reading about it.

H OPE of finding the five lost transpacific aviators and their two would-be rescuers, Captain Erwin and A. H. Eichwaldt, who went out in the plane Dallas Spirit to aid in the search, was virtually abandoned. though the vessels of the navy may keep up the hunt for some time yet. The sea between San Francisco and Hawaii was scoured for any sign of the missing flyers but no trace was found. During the week there was a report that a flare had been seen on the slopes of Mauna Kea and it was considered possible that either the plane carrying Pedlar, Knope and Miss Doran or that carrying Frost and Scott had swung south of its course and crashed on the mountain. Therefore, searching parties were started ont, but at this writing no word of their success has come. As for Erwin and Eichwaldt, their location at the time they sent their SOS as they went into a tailspin is known approximately, and boats that were hurried there found not even an oil spot.

His friends denied that he had authorized anyone to form an organization to campaign for delegates to the Republican national convention. It was specifically denied that W. Ward Smith, former secretary to Nathan L. Miller, former governor of New York and now counsel for the United States Steel corporation, was authorized to do anything in Mr. Hoover's behalf. Mr. Smith and Mr. Miller were both active in promoting a boom for Mr. Hoover for President at the time of the 1920 Republican

Minneapolis has notified the Republican national committee that it is a contender for the 1928 convention, and that it has a fine new auditorium and ample hotel accommodations. Whether or not Minneapolis is ready to make a financial guarantee was not indicated. San Francisco thus far is the only city which has come forward with the necessary \$250,000 guarantee.

D URING Japanese naval maneuvers off the port of Maizura the cruisespecially active, staging several riots er Jintzo collided with and sank the lestrover Warahi in the night. Ninety men and petty officers and 12 officers of the destroyer's company were drowned. About the same time the cruiser Naka collided with the destroyer Ashi, cutting through her afterpart, which resulted in the loss of 27 other men. The Naka was not seriously damaged and proceeded to port after temporary repairs, but the Ashi was towed in.

This was the second disaster in the Japanese navy in August. On the first day of the month 38 men were killed and 47 wounded when a mine exploded on the deck of the minelayer Tokiwa. The explosion occurred while the vessel was engaged in maneuvers off Klushin Island.

CCORDING to the Washington A Post, the State department has learned from trustworthy sources that Great Britain and Japan came to a mutually satisfactory secret understanding regarding future naval supremacy when it finally became apparent the United States would not accept the British program at the recent Geneva conference. The gist of the secret understanding has not been divulged, the newspaper adds, declaring that it is doubtful if much definite information on its contents is available to the officials of the American government.

AYOR "JIMMY" WALKER of MAYOR JIMMI New York, touring European countries, was something of a joke in Great Britain, but when he reached Germany there were complications. These developed from the refusal of the hotel where he was stopping in Berlin to fly the German republic flag alongside the American flag when a banquet was given him, as he had requested. The owners and managers of all the big hotels had promised the American club that they would show the flag of the German republic and then reneged because they feared their established clientele, made up largely of monarchists, would object. The city administration immediately declared that all officials must boycett those hotels, and republicans throughout the country took up the issue.

CHARLIE CHAPLIN'S divorce case is ended, so far as the film comemonths of bickering and recrimina tion, an agreement was reached and Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge tried the four of his attorneys addressed the court in his behalf, for the apparent purpose of winning public sympathy. Chaplin agreed to pay to his wife \$625,000, and to establish a trust fund of \$200,000 for the children, the principal to go to them when the youngest is thirty-five years old. W. I. Gilbert and Herman Spitzel, receivers, who handled the property of Chaplin and defendant movie corporations during the divorce negotiations presented a bill for services to the court and were awarded \$45,000. Counsel for both Chaplins protested and Lita's lawyers obtained a 15-day stay on the order for payment of fees.

R EUNIFICATION of the Hankow and Nanking factions of the Chinese Nationalists was announced by the bureau of foreign affairs in Shangthe details have not been worked out the unification of the two factions is now a certainty." It was also announced that T. V. Soong, considered one of the best financiers in China, probably would be finance minister of the Nationalist government, That gentle man told the press it was likely the Nationalist tariff autonomy would be modified in order not to disrupt business but that the principle would not be surrendered. The Nationalists are retrenche ing on military expenses and concentrating their troops south of the Yangtse, and presumably will leave the northern campaign in the hands of Gen. Feng Yu-hsiang.

M EXICO has a hard time handling her bandits. Just after Gen. Manuel Reyes, leader of the gang that kidnaped and murdered Jacob Rosenthal, American millionaire, had been executed, another band of several hundred men attacked a train between dalajara and Mazatlan and fire more than 40 shots into the cars beeause the engineer refused to stop. Miss Florence M. Anderson of Los Angeles, a school teacher, was wounded and died a few days later. J. Winsor Ives, American vice consul at Mazatlan, made vigorous demands upon the Mexican government for the capture and punishment of the bandits.

Reports reached Nogales, Ariz., of a Yaqui rebel concentration in the Sierra De Bacatetes mountains of Sonora and of three towns in southern Jalisco, Mexico, being captured by revolutionary bands. The Yaquis were reported to have committed depredations within sight of El Palme, railroad division point. Buenos Aires, Mazamatla and Conception were occupied by the rebels in Jalisco.

CARDINAL RIEG Y CASANOVA, archbishop of Toledo and primate of Spain, died in Toledo after a lingering illness. The cardinal, one of the greatest prelates of the Catholic church attended the Eucharistic congress in Chicago last year and made many friends in America. He liked the United States, and lauded its youth.

Murray Roe, son of E. P. Roe, the once-popular novelist, and himself a famous engineer and a social figure in New York, was found dead in Central park, New York. Years ago, after his wife divorced him, Roe went to South America, where he lost both his health and a fortune of about \$1,000,-000. Since his return in 1913 he had been employed in a theater.

Other deaths worthy of mention were those of Mrs. Fannie Bloomfield Zeisler of Chicago, one of the mostnoted planists in the world, and of Zaghlul Pasha, former premier of Egypt and leader of the Egyptian Nationalists.

N MISSISSIPPI'S second primary I for the Democratic gubernatorial election incomplete returns indicated that Theodore G. Bibo had defeated Murphree by something like 10,000 votes. Of course the nomination is equivalent to election. "I am the happlest man in the state of Mississippi," Mr. Bilbo said. Deviled Oysters.-Clean. drain and chop slightly one pint of oysters. Prepare a sauce of one-fourth cupful each of butter and flour and when well blended add two-thirds of a cupful of milk, one egg yolk, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-half tablespoonful of minced parsley, a dash of cayenne, a teaspoonful of lemon juice. Arrange in buttered scallop shells or in ramekins, cover with buttered crumbs and bake for twelve to fifteen minutes.

Cheese Savory .- Place a cake of cream cheese in a small bowl which has been rubbed with a cut clove of garlic, add a tablespoonful of soft ened butter, one-half teaspoonful of minced parsley, one teaspoonful of chopped olives, and one-third of a teaspoonful each of worcestershire sauce and anchovy paste. Season hai in a statement which said: "While with salt, pepper, paprika and pack closely in a glass mold. Turn onto a plate when firm. Serve with toasted crackers.

Brandy Peaches Without Brandy .-This is an old fashioned recipe which has been tried and proven many times. Fill mason jars with carefully selected, perfectly ripe peaches which have been peeled, but not stoned. Fill the spaces with granulated sugar. shaking down well and putting in as much as pessible. Seal as usual and bury in a hole in the ground dug three feet deep to below the frost. Line the hole with hay or straw and cover the jars with it, then the dirt. Leave until spring, or the ground is thawed. before digging up. When opened the fruit will be covered with a delicious sirup and will be much better flavored than by any other method of preserving them. Be sure to remember where they are buried.

Peach Pickles. - Dip a peck of peaches into hot water and rub with a coarse towel to remove the fuzz. The skin may be removed if desired. dipping into bolling water. Most cooks prefer to keep the skin for flavor. Stick each peach with four whele cloves and drop them a few at a time into the following sirup: Boil a pint of vinegar with two pounds of brown sugar and an ounce of cinnamon in the stick. When the peaches are easily pleced, place in the jar until all are cooked. Cook down the sirup for a few minutes, pour ever the peaches and cover as usual.

Peach Ice Cream,-Cut up and put through a ricer sufficient ripe peaches to make one and one-half cupfuls of pulp, add the juice of a lemon and one and one-fourth cupfuls of sugar. Add one pint of thin cream and freeze as usual. Pack in a brick or melen mold and turn out on a platter, garnish with quartered peaches and sprinkle the cream with chopped pistachio nuts.

Peach Cobbler. - Peel and slice enough peaches to fill a deep plate. piling high in the center. Sprinkle thickly with sugar mixed with a tablespoonful of flour. Cover with a crust, leaving an opening for the steam to escape. Bake in a moderate oven until brown. Serve with cream and sugar.

It is not necessary that any one meal of the day should be well balanced with the proper food principles: the important thing is that the day's food should be so balanced.



EN the Illinois legislature in 1919 esignated the fourth Friday In September as American Indian day state holiday, a decidedly forward step was taken in paying a greatly enriched our national traditions.

The first celebration of American Indian day in Illinois, which brought together representatives from 14 tribes, saw also the first meeting of the Indian Fellowship league, an assoclation fostered by various civic and patriotic organizations in Chicago. The purpose of the league was the promotion of more cordial relations and a better understanding between the two races by bringing to the attention of the whites the many accomplishments of the Indian and by giving the Indian a better idea of American life as he must live it in order to become an effective citizen.

Since this first celebration seven years ago, the event has been observed annually in Illinois and the idea of American Indian day has spread to other states. Although it has not yet become established as a general holiday, it is indicative of an increasing interest in the Indian and that Interest has been added to by various large gatherings of red men from time to time in recent years which have attracted national attention. Notable among these have been the big reunion held in Tulsa, Okla,, in 1924, under the auspices of the Society of Oklahoma Indians, which was attended by more than 10,000 members of 183 tribes in the United States, Canada and Mexico; the meeting of the first national Indian congress at Spokane, Wash., in 1925, where 30 tribes were represented; and the big pow-wow at Lawrence, Kan., last year when Indians from all parts of the country gathered for the dedication of a new stadium at Haskell Indian institute.

Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior. who was the principal speaker at the Haskell dedication, declared that the event was a forecast of further development of Indian progress. He pointed out the fact that the stadium project, which was financed entirely by Indians, especially the older Indians, was the first united effort of the red race to advance in modern sports. Since one of the greatest battles in the educational campaign among the Indians has been against ill health and disease, he looked upon the fact that the Indian realized the wisdom of providing for physical education as significant of even greater progress to be made by the red race in the coming years.

While at all of these gatherings there were enough councils and ceremonials, barbecues and native games, native songs and dances, tepees and tribal costumes to be reminiscent of the old days when the Indian ruled the continent, yet the striking fact about these meetings was that they were dominated by a new style of "noble red man" and that the underlying purpose of all was for the representatives of the various tribes to confer on how the Indian shall meet the problems of modern life when he, as a part of the citizenship of the United States, is confronted with them, In the old days the Indians' leaders led them in ways of war; in these days they are leading their brethren in ways of peace.

Perhaps no more striking contrast between the "noble red man," old style and new style, can be shown than in the case of two Indians whose portraits appear above. One of them is Kicking Bear of the Miniconjou Teton Sioux, a typical

DARD OF INDIAN COMMISSIONERS performed his work,


When Senator Kirkwood became secretary of the interior in 1881 he called La Flesche to Washington and gave him a position in the office of Indian affairs, a position which he held for more than thirty years. During this time he continued with his education and in 1893 was graduated from the National university law school. He also became interested in the study of the history, religion and folklore of his tribe, the Omahas, and collected a great amount of material on the subject which was published by the bureau of American ethnology of the Smithsonian institution. He has made ethnological collections for a number of institutions of learning and is a member of several learned societies.

It is such Indians as Francis La Flesche who are the "noble red men," new style. Others of his kind are Dr. Charles A. Eastman of the Sioux, noted as a doctor, author and lecturer; the late Dr. Carlos Montezuma of the Apaches, another physician, writer and lecturer; Rev. Joseph K. Griffis (Chief Tahan) of the Klowas, a minister and author; Dr. Sherman Coolidge of the Arapahoes, who helds a high position in the Episcopal church: Chaupcey Yellow Robe of the Sioux, who recently initiated President' Coolidge into his tribe and who is head of an Indian school at Rapid City, S. D.; Chief Red Fox (Skiuhushu) of the Blackfeet; Thomas L. Sloan of the Omahas and a host of others, all of whom have risen high in their respective professions. Most of them have been actively engaged in the fight waged for citizenship for their people and they have seen

one. As far back as 1817 provision was made in a treaty with the Cherokees by which any member of the tribe who desired might become a citizen of the United States. The United States Supreme court ruled that the Fourteenth amendment to the Constitution did not confer upon the Indian, by severing his tribal relations, the right to become a citizen. No general law provided a means for citizenship of all Indians until 1887 when congress passed the general allotment act, which provided for the allotment of lands in severalty and declared all Indians bern within its limits who shall have complied with certain conditions, to be citizens of the United States. The broad citizenship provisions of this act were modified by congress when on May 8, 1906, it passed the Burke act. Since the enactment of this law the issuance of a fee simple patent has been the primary legal requirement for citizenship of

Indians. It rests with congress to determine when and how the tribal relation may be dissolved and the guardianship brought to an end and whether the emancipation shall at first be complete or only partial. The Supreme court of the United States has stated that "citizenship is not incompatible with tribal existence or continued guardianship, and so may be conferred without completely emancipating the Indians or placing them beyond the reach of congressional regulations adopted for

#### Employ New Process for Coloring Wood

The use of colored woods in the construction of furniture has long been known, the material being stained after the necessary seasoning process. Within the last few years, however, a method of Austrian origin has been employed, whereby the wood is colored when in a green state.

By means of heavy pressure in a closed vessel the sap is driven out of the wood and is replaced by the coloring fluid, which may consist of a solution of the more permanent aniline dves. The best kinds of wood for treatment are found to be birch. beech, alder, plane, elm and lime; oak, fir and pine being unsuitable because they do not stain uniformly.

The colored wood is used for furniture making and for the manufacture of doors and window frames. It can also be employed for outdoor purposes, in which case no painting is necessary, although a coating of varnish would seem to be a necessity. For the fitting of ships, raffway cars. and similar purposes, this stained wood appears to be eminently fitted.

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

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

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
