





NEWS REVIEW OF **CURRENT EVENTS**

Section of Pittsburgh Is Shattered by Explosion of Gas Tanks.

PICKARD THREE huge storage tanks of the Equitable Gas company in Pittsburgh blew up and an entire section of the city, at the point where the Allegheny flows into the Ohio river, was wrecked. The total number of lives lost may never be known, but it probably was forty or more; hundreds of persons were injured. In the immediate vicinity of the gas works many large industrial buildings were totally ruined, as were a number of tenements where women and children were among the victims. The force of the explosion was felt throughout the city and nearly all the glass in the downtown section was smashed.

Cause of the disaster was found in the blunder of some one who ordered workmen to repair the largest of the three tanks while it was partly filled with gas. One man was using a blow torch when the huge basin, which stood 75 feet above the ground, was blown apart and a great sheet of flame shot a thousand feet upward. A second tank holding 4,000,000 cubic feet of gas and situated about 200 feet crushed in, its co nited, and a second mighty blaze went up. A third tank, several hundred feet distant, of 500,000 cubic feet capacity and partly filled, was burst asunder by the force of the explosion and its contents added to the vast breath of flame that could be seen for miles. THOUGH the Colorado coal miners' strike seemed to be slowly waning, the prospects for bloody fighting increased last week. After several days of intermittent picketing at the Columbine mine, the only coal property still operating in the northern Colorado fields, its owners informed Gov. W. H. Adams that the pickets would be shot if they set foot on the property. Machine guns were mounted behind barbed-wire entanglements, and the gunners had orders to shoot any trespassers. A large band of pickets led by a woman were turned back Wednesday by these warlike preparations. Meanwhile the I W W., through their official paper, were calling for "all footloose rebels" in the country to flock to Colorado to aid the strikers. Officers in charge of state police rent an appeal to the governor for fifty more men to meet any contingency. The situation was described as "acute" by William H. Young, a member of the state industrial commission. Gov. John S. Fisher of Pennsylvania told representatives of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor that he would investigate charges they laid before him of the usurpation of power by coal and iron police and of partiality by state police in the strike district of the bituminous coal region. The committee which conferred with Governor Fisher made arrangements to see President Coolidge at the White House to discuss conditions in the bituminous fields of western Pennsylvania. COL. CHARLES A. LINDBERGH was the central figure in a remarkable gathering of aviators in Washington. The men, and one woman, who have distinguished themselves by overseas air flights were entertained at luncheon by the President and then went to the Auditorium where before an audience of 6,000 "Lindy" received from the hands of Mr. Coolidge the Hubbard gold medal of the National Geographic society, a trophy that has been presented to only seven other men. Justices of the Supreme court, members of the cabinet. of the diplomatic corps, and of congress were in attendance, all joining in the cheering and applause.

Ruth Elder and George Haldeman; Bert Acosta, Berndt Balchen and George Noville, who flew with Commander Byrd to France; William S. Brock and Edward H. Schlee, who crossed the Atlantic to London and then flew by successive stages across

Europe and Asia to Japan. Capt. R. H. Macintosh and Bert Hinckler, English aviators, started from Upavon, England, in an attempt to break the distance record for nonstop flights held by Chamberlin and Levine by flying to Karachi, India, a distance of 4.000 miles. At this writing the outcome of the venture is not known.

Sir Alan Cobham, with a crew of six and accompanied by his wife, began a flight around Africa to show the possibility for communication between the various parts of the British empire by air.

IF THE story told by William J. Mc-Mullin, a Burns operative, is true, there was a deliberate and elaborate plot to frame the government in the Fall-Sinclair case and to force a mistrial. According to his statements he revolted at the plan of falsely accusing Assistant Attorney General H. R. Lamb of attempting to influence Juror Glasscock, and told the whole story to Gifford Pinchot, who in turn communicated it to the government counsel. McMullen was directed to "play along" with the Burns men and to report their activities to the district attorney. This he says he did, and the whole alleged plot was then revealed to the grand jury. That bedy also heard W. J. Burns, head of the detective agency, and his son, W. Sherman Burns, who declared the story told by McMullin was false. Justice Siddons, who presided at the Teapot Dome trial, appointed a committee of lawyers to determine whether those involved in the jury fixing scandal should be cited for contempt of court. The government also undertook to bring about the punishment of Harry M. Blackmer, a millionaire oil man who fied to France several years ago rather than testify in the Sinclair-Fall conspiracy trial. An order entered by Justice Siddons directed Federal Marshal E. C. Snyder to seize \$100,000 worth of Blackmer's property wherever it may be found within the United States and summoned Blackmer himself to appear on January 6 to show cause why he should not be held in contempt and his property confiscated.

> MOULAY YOUSSEF, sultan of Morocco, seventeenth ruler of his dynasty, died at Fez, chief of his four capital cities. He was the son of Sultan Moulay Hassan and succeeded his brother, Moulay Hafid, in 1912, holding his throne since 1923 under the French protectorate and residing usually in the French zone. He was only fortyfive years old but had been in bad health for some time.

THE British government had rather an unpleasant time last week. Its coal policy was attacked in the house by the Labor-Socialist opposition which declared the government had neglected the difficulties of the industry and demanded immediate action to secure an efficient organization. The Laborites insisted on a reply from Prime Minister Baldwin and would not listen to Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, president of the Board of Trade. They created such a disturbance that the speaker was obliged to order an adjournment In the house of lords Viscount Cecil

attacked the government's attitude toward disarmament, and asserted that its refusal to admit the principle of mathematical parity in naval strength with the United States "bangs, bolts and bars the door" against any hope of agreement with America on naval armaments. He blamed Winston Churchill for the failure of the Geneva conference. W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty announced that in view of the situation disclosed at Geneva it was not thought necessary to proceed with the three cruisers originally provided for in current naval estimates and therefore only one would be laid down.

CHINESE students and workingmen created disturbances at Yeungkong, 150 miles southwest of Canton. making demonstrations against American workers and an American mission. The United States gunboat Asheville was sent there from Hongkong by the commander of the south China. patrol. The Chinese military forces arrested leaders of the mobs, but there was fear of further trouble

The Labor party under Chang Fatfui attempted to seize Canton and there was long continued street fighting. Martial law was declared and the gates of the foreign settlement were closed.

Nanking Nationalists gained a big advantage by the collapse of the radical faction at Hankow and its abandonment of that city. The region was immediately overrun by Kwangsi men belonging to the Nanking party. In the struggle of the southerners with the northern armies the former are reported to have met a severe defeat north of Mingkwang. However, Feng, the Christian general, won a three-day battle against Marshal Chang's forces in Shantung province.

WiTH the aid of 102 lawyers, Mi-hail Manoilescu, former undersecretary of state of Rumania, won acquittal in his trial by court-martial on charges of plotting to place former

Crown Prince Carol on the throne. The defense, engineered by General Avarescu, bitterly attacked Premier Bratiano and his policies and the result of the trial was admittedly a severe blow to that dictatorial official. One of the defense witnesses, an eminent historian, declared: "Onefourth of the country is against Prince Carol, but Rumania is 75 per cent Carolist." The government fears an uprising of the Carolists, and hurried-

TALIANS, who deeply resent the I new Franco-Yugo-Slav treaty, be-Lieve France is arming the Serbs against Italy and have been "demonstrating" before the embassy and legation of those nations in Rome. Dispatches explain that enormous orders for steel, leather and wood are being placed in Germany by the French on their reparations account. The goods are delivered to French agents at the frontier and shipped to Yugo-Slavia. The Germans are delighted over this development as each mark's worth of goods which is delivered to France frees them from delivery of a mark in cash under the Dawes plan.

O UR little tiff with France over tariff rates is virtually ended. French Minister of Commerce Maurice Bokanowski said that the United States had agreed, after the conclusion of a provisional agreement, to study the possibility of a reduction in American tariff rates based on a comparison of American and French costs of production.

E LEVEN cities have applied for the honor of having the Republican national convention next year. They are Chicago, San Francisco, Detroit, Cleveland, Kansas City, Omaha, Denver, Seattle, Minneapolis, San Antonio, and Philadelphia. The winner will be picked by the national committee when it meets December 6. Just now it looks as if San Francisco would be selected, but Detroit also has strong backing. Chicago is said to have little chance because of Illinois candidates for the Presidential nomination,

DRESIDENT COOLIDGE, whose duty it often has been to decorate others, was himself decorated Thursday evening in Philadelphia, receiving the Union League's gold medal for distinguished public service and a certificate of membership in the club. The occasion was Founders' day, and the President delivered the chief address at the banquet. Two other Presidents, Lincoln and Johnson, have received the club's medal, and Harrison, McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft were made honorary members.

FOUR men attempted to assassinate General Obregon, Presidential candidate in Mexico, with bombs, but the general escaped with cuts on his face from broken glass of his automobile windshield. Three of the assassins were caught, two being wounded by the police.





Now, of course, It's true that the city boy has in the past been under somewhat of a handlcap for the same kind of outdoors enjoyment that the country boy could have. But there are city parks where the grass is just as green as in the country and where the shade of the trees is just as cool (though it must be admitted that park policemen would look with unfriendly eye upon any attempt to "shin up" those trees). And there are public playgrounds where the city boy can "whoop it up" all he pleases and have all sorts of riotous fun (even though "supervised play" would sort of cramp the style of carefree youth, according to the country boy's notion). In late years, however, the city boy hasn't had to depend upon such limited resources as the city offers for his outdoors recreation. The development of the summer camp idea has been giving him an opportunity to know the same kind of enjoyable outdoor life as his country cousin knows.

The pioneer in the idea of summer camps for city boys was the Young Men's Christian association, which began establishing temporary camps back in the eightles. The plan developed rapidly until today it is one of the most important pleces of work being done by this organization and there are permanent Y. M. C. A. camps in all parts of the country. A newer development, however, is the winter camp idea which gives the city boy an opportunity to enjoy life in the country in the winter as well as summer and if the experience of the Chicago Y. M. C. A. with the two winter camps, which it established three years ago, is any criterion, these camps with their opportunity to the city boy for an outing when the snow covers the ground will be as popular as the others which give him his recreation when the earth is carpeted with green.

The work of the Chicago Y. M. C. A., which is typical of the service rendered by this organization to Young America which lives in other congested metropolitan areas, began with the establishment of one summer camp back in 1900. At the present time it has four camps in Michigan, two in Wisconsin and three in Illinois, a total of nine camps for boys, as well as anothe, for men. The Michigan camps are the following: Camp Channing, on Upper Scott lake, near Pullman; Camp Martin Johnson, near Ludington; Camp Pinewood on Echo lake, near Twin lake, and Camp Wabash, near Benton Harbor. In Wisconsin it maintains Camp North Woods and Camp Nawakwa, both on the Lac du Flambeau Indian reservation in the northern part of the state, and in Illinois it has Camp Duncan on Fish lake, near Round Lake station, forty miles from Chicago, and two camps, the Hastings Lake camps, on Hastings lake, near Lake Villa.

It is in the Illinois camps that the idea of giving the city boy a winter outing was first tried. Camp Duncan was given to the West Side department of the Chicago Y. by Joseph S. Duncan, and It serves particularly the poorer boys of Chicago's great West side. This camp is open to boys between the ages of ten and eighteen, all of each summer, and it is also open during the Thanksgiving and Christmas vacations and the spring vacations for special outings. The boys pay about half of the cost of the camp and the balance is made up by Mr. Duncan and other friends of the boys. The Hastings lake camps were provided

through the generosity of A. E. Cross and Arthur Cutten of the Chicago Board of Trade, and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Worcester of Chicago. It is under the general management of the general offices of the Chicago association. It has a camp director, J. P. Hargrove, who lives there the year round, having boys come to camp each week end throughout the year.

As the result of the establishment of these camps by the Y. M. C. A. more than 4,000 city boys each year have the opportunity for healthful, wholesome play in a new environment and under circumstances which are particularly valuable in building a finer type of young manhood. In the winter camps their days are filled with all sorts of outdoor sports. They have their choice of skimming over the glassy surface of the lake on skates, sliding down the steep hills on skis or on a toboggan and go whizzing out over the lake, fishing through the ice or playing any of the number of games which a good fall of snow offers. It may be a lively snowball fight in the open or behind the defense of a snow fort which they have built, or it may be he old game of "fox and geese," a game which American country boys have played for generations.

The city boy learns woodcraft, too, in these camps, for when there's snow on the ground they "turn Indian" and test their skill in tracking through the woods. In fact, in a region that is rich in Indian lore there is plenty of inspiration for "playing Indian." A recent issue of "Chicago Men," the official publication of the Chicago



Y. M. C. A., contains the following story of how "Young Palefaces Hold Powwow":

"A Indian powwow in camp was enjoyed by 50 boys and their dads from the Englewood, Hyde Park, and South Chicago departments Y. M. C. A., over one week-end at Hastings Lake camp.

"Contests in tracking, running, shooting with bows and arrows, and other sports give a chance for the young bucks to test their mettle in competition with the older and wiser sachems.

"Ten of these young paleface braves competed in an Indian story-telling contest in the evening around the campfire. The old men of the tribe served as judges to determine the winner, who received a genuine Indian bonnet as a prize. Clement Studebaker, thirteen years, 6337 Drexel avenue, won this honor telling the story of Chief Blackbird."

Not only do these city boys enjoy imitating the life of the first inhabitants of their state, the red men, but they also learn how the pioneers, who conquered the wilderness, that is now a rich and thriving country, lived. They hear tales of those brave old days when they gather around the campfire at night, after the day's fun is over, to eat toasted marshmallows, nuts and apples, and the fire is kept blazing with the wood which they have cut for the fireplace themselves. That is, they spend the evenings thus, unless the lure of outdoors is still too strong for them to resist even when dar'tness falls. Often the boys put up lanterns and torches along the shore of the lake and continue their fun far into the night.

Aside from the chance for healthful recreation which these camps offer for the youth of the big city, there are other values in these Y. M. C. A camps which are indicated in the following editorial notes in a recent issue of "Chlcago Men";

"When a city boy learns to pitch his tent, make his bunk, and fry his own flapjacks and bacon in the woods, the camp has encouraged that boy to develop rew qualities of self-reliance that should help him through life.

"When this boy in the out-of-doors hears the moaning of the pine trees and looks up at the great silent wars overhead, he gets a new understanding of the Eternal Creator that he may never get in the man-made city.

"Two Catholics, one orthodox Jew, and a Methodist make a tour of six Chicago and two other Y. M. C. A. camps this summer in Wisconsin and Michigan. One of these men has already spent five years studying for the priesthood. Each rendered a specific service in behalf of these camps, The four became close friends and enthusiastic boosters for the campa."

Younger Indans Turn From Faith of Fathers

Sixty or seventy years ago the Fox Indians of Iowa began the acquisition of the English alphabet from missionaries. They learned a method of writing their own language by means of the English alphabet, separating their words into syllables. Since there is only a rough conformity between the characters as employed by the Fox Indians and the actual sounds, it is necessary to restore the phonetics of any Fox text so that the symbols may correctly represent them. Dr. Truman Michelson, of the Smithsonian Institution's Bureau of American Ethnology, has been foremost in this work of collection and restoration.

Doctor Michelson, whose work has made him the foremost authority on the Fox Indians, describes their rituals as consisting mainly of eating. dancing and prayer. As is natural with a primitive people, their prayers invite material benefits such as long life, freedom from disease, that the chief's village should be strong enough to resist its enemies, and that no foe should even be permitted to gossip against the willage.

According to Doctor Michelson, the younger generation now turn these once serious ceremonies into occasions for amusement. Up to some 15 years ago the tribe was so conservative as to resist education, but it has since grown progressive and all the young Indians are anxious to go to school. The tribe are good farmers and compete with the whites in the state agricultural fairs.

Cheese With Celery .-Take the outer stalks from a bunch or two of celery, cut into half-inch pieces and coo': until tender, saving the liquor to use with the white sauce. Prepare a white sauce, using two tablespoonfuls of butter, iwo of flour and coo. until smooth,

then add one-half cupful each of the celery liquor and mi'k; cook until thick. Put a layer of white sauce over a layer of the cooked celery, then cover with a layer of grated cheese; repeat and finish the top with buttered crumbs. Brown in a hot oven.

Swiss Steak .- Wipe carefully two pounds of round steak and pound as much flour into it as it will hold. Meit one-fourth of a cupful of suet in a heavy iron pan. Add the meat and sear on both sides. Now add two tablespoonfuls of chopped onion, salt and pepper and two cupfuls of boiling water. Cover and simmer for one and one-half hours. About one-half hour before it is done add a cupful of tomato cr tomato soup or two sliced fresh tomatoes. Thicken the gravy and serve the meat with the gravy poured around it.

Boston Brown Bread.-Take one cupful of whole wheat flour, one cupful of cornmeal, one cupful of rye flour (or wheat flour may be used). mix with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, add two cupfuls of sour milk with two teaspoonfuls of soda, threefourths of a cupful of molasses and ne and three-fourths of water. 
