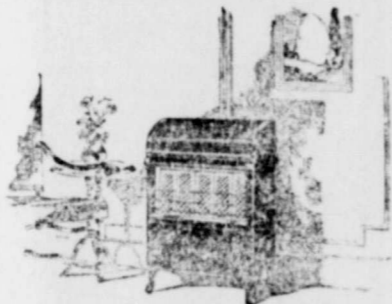

# Newspaper Classics

## INJUN SUMMER

INDIAN SUMMER has come and goes as usual. It did not pass a year without the Chicago Tribune reprinting for the twentieth consecutive time, annually, John T. McCutcheon's famous cartoon, "Injun Summer." The Christmas season is almost here and soon the New York Sun will be reprinting for the thirtieth consecutive time, annually, the reply of one of its editorial writers to Virginia O'Hanlon, the little girl who wanted to know if there was a Santa Claus. And it won't be but a few weeks until the Kansas City Star receives a request from some reader which says, "Won't you please be sure to reprint H. T. Webster's cartoon, 'Hardin County 1809,' in your paper on Lincoln's birthday?" and when the Star does reprint it, it will be the tenth consecutive time, annually, that it has done so. Then a few weeks more and it will be nearly Memorial Day. As that day approaches newspapers all over the State of Kansas (and no doubt in other states as well) will reprint Walt Mason's poem, "Little Green Tents."

For all of these—the cartoons, "Injun Summer" and "Hardin County, 1809," the lit of prose called "Is There a Santa Claus?" and the poem, "Little Green Tents"—are "Newspaper Classics," those inspired pictorial or written pieces which their creators, newspaper men all of them, once turned out, little dreaming that these creations of theirs would become famous. For them it was "all in the day's work." But, somehow, what they wrote or what they drew caught the public fancy, because of some great beauty, some great truth or some inherent human appeal in it, and the public carefully clipped it from the newspaper and hid it aside for future enjoyment. Or perhaps the public, as that anniversary came around again, remembered how they had enjoyed that picture or that bit of writing and immediately wrote to the editor of the paper in which they had seen it to ask, "Won't you please print it again?"

"Injun Summer" first appeared in the Chicago Tribune in the autumn of 1897 and almost immediately McCutcheon began to receive letters of appreciation. But it was not until the next year that the cartoon began its career as a "Newspaper Classic." When Indian summer came around that year, the Tribune began to receive letters from its readers, "Please reprint John McCutcheon's 'Injun Summer.'" It was the same the next year and the next and the next, until now the annual reprinting of the cartoon has become a tradition on the Tribune and an event to be looked forward to by the readers of that newspaper as the herald that Indian summer is again at hand.

Webster's "Hardin County, 1809," first appeared in 1918. One of the newspapers which was then receiving the syndicate service which included the work of this cartoonist, who is now on the staff of the New York World, was the Kansas City Star, and the next year, as Lincoln's birthday approached, the Star began to receive requests that the cartoon be reprinted. So "Hardin County, 1809," became a "Newspaper Classic" and February 12 of each year sees its reappearance. The example of "Is There a Santa Claus?" as a "Newspaper Classic" is, if anything, more interesting than that of the cartoons. Not only has it been printed in the New York Sun every year for the last 30 years, but it has been reprinted repeatedly in thousands of other newspapers throughout the United States during that time. Curious to note, its first appearance was not during the holiday season. Evidently little Virginia O'Hanlon began to be concerned about Santa Claus long before Christmas that year, for it was on September 21, 1857, that the reply to her letter, written by Francis P. Church, an editorial writer, first appeared in the Sun. It is doubtful if there is any other single Christmas piece, with the possible exception of "The Night Before Christmas," which is so widely known.

Thanksgiving also has its "Newspaper Classic," even though it is not so well known as those connected with Christmas. Back in 1890 Irving Bacheller, the distinguished novelist, was the head of a newspaper syndicate in New York and one of his correspondents in the West was Will C. Ferril, now editor of the Rocky Mountain Herald in Denver. In that year Mr. Bacheller asked Mr. Ferril to write a western article for Thanksgiving and in compliance he wrote an article, based on conditions in the Far West at that time, which he called "No Grandmothers There." Under that title, or the title "A Land Without Grand

#### Is There a Santa Claus?

We take pleasure in answering at once and thus promptly the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of the Sun:  
"Dear Editor:  
"I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in the Sun it's so.' Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?"  
"VIRGINIA O'HANLON.

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. As alas, how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginia. There would be no childlike faith, there, no poetry, no romance, no noble and exalted sentiments, no grandeur, no glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else so real as this: the love that links all hearts together. No Santa Claus! Thank God he lives and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, say, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.

Can you imagine, in these closing days of the year, with Thanksgiving close upon us, a whole land without grandmothers? That seems almost incredible in the long-settled communities of the East and South, where no family reunion is complete without at least one venerable figure so familiar and so dear to all in that household from the days of childhood's earliest recollection. Yet, between the Rocky mountains and the Pacific coast there are hundreds of thousands of homes where children are growing up without a glimpse of their own, or any other child's grandmother. They know nothing of the dear face, the soft gray hair, the quaint figure of that patient little woman who, day after day, sits in the quiet corner of the old home, knitting, knitting, and still knitting, while her thoughts are wandering far away into the long ago of her childhood. They know nothing of her gentle chiding, nor can they appreciate the quiet and kindly amusement in the household at grandmother's expense; when after searching the house for her "apes," she is reminded, in response to her anxious inquiry, that they are

under the frills of her cap. Then there are the quaint old songs of yore, too, that even the fathers and mothers of the present day know not, which grandmothers, with a quaver in her voice, will hum and sing when she thinks no one is near to hear. Thousands of western boys and girls know nothing of this. A grandmother is to them almost as much of a myth as the heroine of a fairy story. . . . It is true there are some grandmothers in the Far West, but they are imported from the East and South. For most of them, the West is too far away. No doubt their hearts often reach out tenderly toward their grandchildren in and beyond the Rocky mountains. As to native-born grandmothers, they are very hard to find west of the Rocky mountains. With the exception of the early settlements in the Oregon country, the Mormons in Utah and the occasional home of the earlier trappers in the mountains, or ranchmen in California, the civilization is too young for native-born grandmothers. It was nearly forty years ago that the great rush was made to the gold fields of California, and not until ten years later did the tide of immigration start for Pike's peak. Possibly California may produce a few youthful grandmothers, about, say, forty years of age, but you can scarcely find a native-born grandmother of even that early age in Colorado.

Like the Christmas "Is There a Santa Claus?" the Thanksgiving "No Grandmothers There" struck a responsive chord in the hearts of its readers and at their request it has been reprinted by newspaper editors many, many times since it was written.

Out in Kansas, Memorial day would not be Memorial day if the local newspaper did not reprint a bit of verse once written by one of the favorite poets of the Sunflower state. Here is Walt Mason's poem which appears regularly in Kansas newspapers around May 30:

#### LITTLE GREEN TENTS

The little green tents play the soldiers sleep,  
And the sunbeams play and the women weep.  
Are covered with flowers today.

And between the tents walk the weary few,  
Who were young and stalwart in sixty-two,  
When they went to the war away.

The little green tents are built of sod,  
And they art not long and they are not broad,  
But they have lots of room.

And the sod is part of the land they saved  
When the flag of the enemy darkly waved,  
The symbol of dole and gloom.

The little green tent is a thing divine;  
The little green tent is a country's shrine,  
Where the patriots kneel and pray.

And the brave men left, so old, so few,  
Were young and stalwart in sixty-two,  
When they went to the war away.

But it doesn't take an anniversary, such as Christmas, Thanksgiving or Memorial day, to produce a "Newspaper Classic." Sometimes it is a piece of oratory which, when printed in a newspaper, seems to have as much appeal as when it is spoken. Then come requests for a reprinting in the paper in which the speech was originally reported; and other newspapers pick it up, and behold—another "Newspaper Classic!"

Once upon a time Senator George G. Vest of Missouri, while acting as an attorney in a law suit in which a Missouri "houn' dog" was involved, uttered a stirring tribute to "man's best friend." And Vest's "Dog Eulogy" has become a "Newspaper Classic" that has been reprinted thousands of times. The same is true of the "Blue Grass" masterpiece by Senator J. J. Ingalls of Kansas; of that tribute to "The corn, the corn, the royal corn," by Governor Oglesby of Illinois; and of the eulogy on "Cotton" by John Trotwood Moore of Tennessee. Other states have from time to time produced "classics" of more than local fame, but few have become nationally known, as have those above mentioned.

Not all "Newspaper Classics," however, are such because of their appeal to the deeper emotions. Very often a bit of light verse, just a flippant jingle with an unforgettable lilt of rhythm or striking phrase will so catch the public fancy that long after its popularity has apparently died down newspapers will receive a request for its reprinting. How many times have George Thomas Lanigan's "Altkoond of Swat" or the verses about "Punch, Conductor, Punch With Care," the joint composition of Isaac Bromley, Noah Brooks, W. C. Wyckoff and Moses P. Handy (they were not written by Mark Twain, as is often asserted, although he gave them wide circulation) been asked for and reprinted? Nobody knows! The times have been innumerable and they will be reprinted innumerable times, as will all "Newspaper Classics."

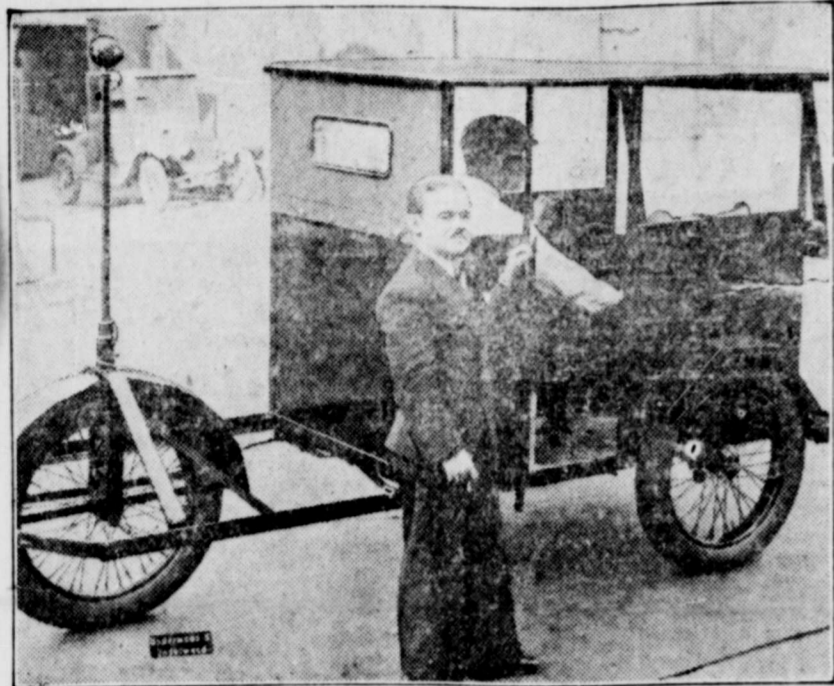

**AGAIN ADVOCATES ROAD COURTESY**

**Giving of Proper Signals in Intelligent Manner Is Often Overlooked.**

Highway courtesy and co-operation are ideals that constantly are laid before motorists in the campaign for safer highways. One of the chief difficulties standing in the way of their attainment by motorists generally is the failure of their advocates, in too many instances, to define precisely what is meant by the term, says a statement issued by national headquarters of the American Automobile association.

"As one of the most enthusiastic and persistent advocates of these ideals, the American Automobile association has submitted a questionnaire to its club executives in 928 communities in an effort to get an accurate and up-to-the-minute definition of courtesy and co-operation between motorists," says the statement.

**Signals Are Important.**

"Co-operation and courtesy apparently begin with the giving of signals," says the statement. "Virtually all of the replies to the questionnaire emphasized this point and, undoubtedly, a large majority of motorists will agree with its primary importance. For with millions using the nation's highways, it is obvious that one driver cannot, with safety, leave another in doubt as to his intentions. The carelessly given signal is almost as bad as no signal at all. Yet many thousands of motorists do not realize that they are being discourteous, to say the least, when they fail to give the signal that is clear."

"The giving of signals does not stop with those involving the extended arm," the statement points out. "Parking lights are very important signals that frequently are overlooked, the A. A. A. finds. To leave a car without a light to inform other motorists of its presence is to invite them to what may be physical disaster. From this, it may be seen that there is much more to using the parking light than merely escaping a visit to traffic court."

**Many Ways to Co-Operate.**

In actual operation of the car on the street or highway, there are many ways to co-operate. These are known to virtually every driver, but many fail to make use of their knowledge in co-operating with other motorists, the statement says.

**Yosemite Park Records Broken for This Year**

Surpassing all yearly attendance records, Yosemite closed the 1925-1927 travel season on September 30 with a total of 490,430 visitors, an increase of 79 per cent over the year previous, when only 274,209 visitors registered at the various park entrances. A study of the travel season just closed reveals 444,786 persons entering the park in motor vehicles, as compared to the 234,567 visitors that were brought to Yosemite during the 1925-1926 travel season in 74,970 motor vehicles.

Park authorities are positive that the phenomenal increase for the season just closed is due primarily to the new all-year road enabling the automobile owner to drive to Yosemite 365 days in the year.

**Gasoline Evaporation Spoiled Station Profit**

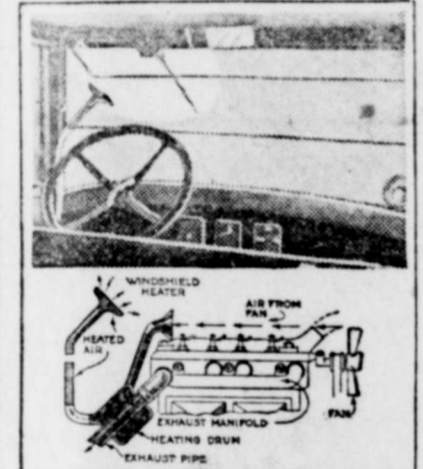
Gasoline service station owners in New Jersey lost approximately \$50,000 through evaporation and leakage when they attempted to take advantage of the 2-cent tax on gasoline which became effective in that state on July 1 last. Several weeks before the tax went into effect retail distributors stocked up, as all gas delivered before July 1 was free of tax. It is estimated that while some dealers made a profit by pocketing the 2 cents, the loss to some of the bigger concerns was heavy.

**Chinese Jay-Walkers Are Being Educated**

Chinese jay-walkers are being educated by professional story tellers, employed by the government, who deliver talks on the Shanghai streets. **Storms Directly Due to Forest Destruction**

Trees are lightning rods, and the increasingly bad weather is due to the destruction of forests, says Edouard Brany, France's grand old man of wireless.

"If there are no longer seasons," he says, "deforestation is the principal, if indeed, also, not the sole cause. Trees on the heights, with their pointed tips toward heaven and their roots deep in the damp ground, are nothing less than so many lightning rods, constantly discharging into the earth the atmospheric electricity and thereby preventing its accumulation in the clouds, an accumulation that would cause terrible storms. In wooded districts there was calm, but now that the woods are being cut down there are constant hard storms."

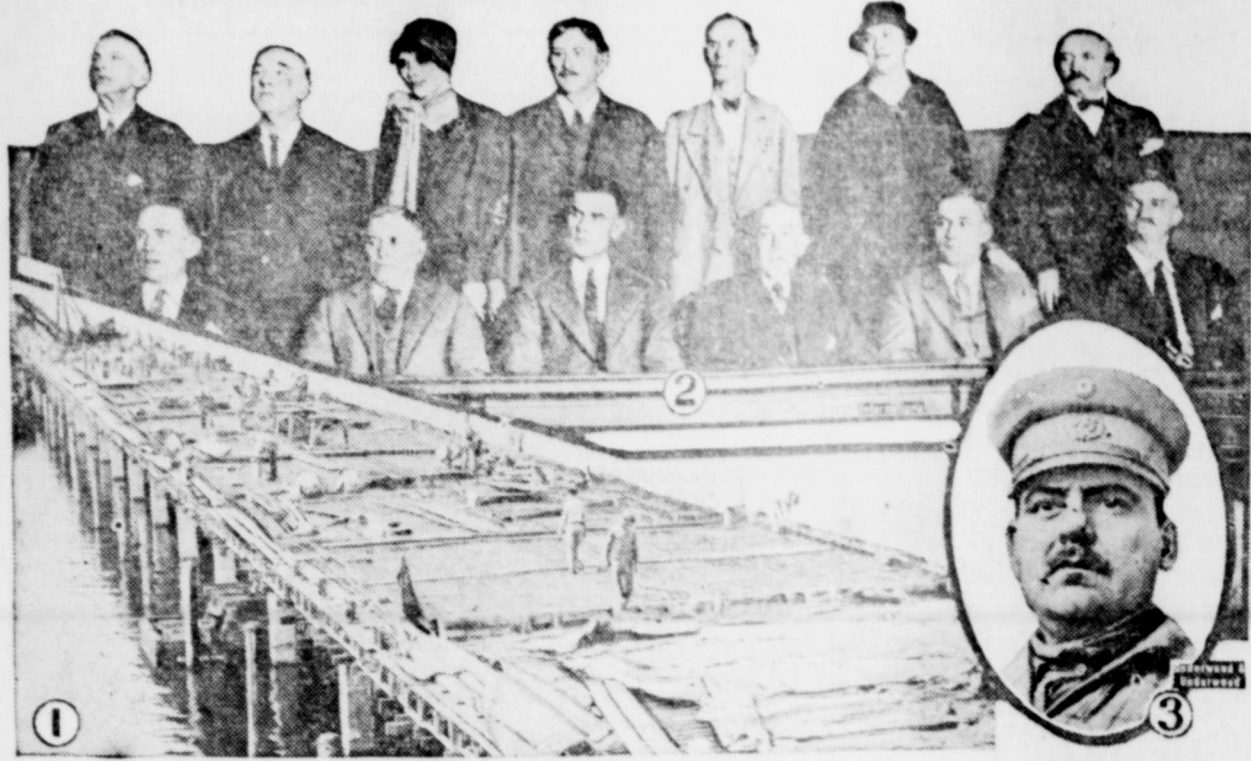

### NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

#### New Englanders and Wall Street Eager to "Draft" President Coolidge.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

EASTERN Republicans, political and business leaders, cannot reconcile themselves to seeing President Coolidge eliminated from the contest for the nomination next year. They never have given up the idea that he could be "drafted" by the convention, and should be, despite his expressed reluctance to run again. Last week they got very busy, especially in Wall Street and in New England, with plans to push the Coolidge boom. In Boston a chain letter petition was started by some of those who believe Mr. Coolidge should be virtually compelled to accept a re-nomination. The White House correspondents questioned the President on this matter and he told them he could not see that the circulation of the petition would serve any good purpose and he hoped it would be discontinued. This being telegraphed over the country, the proponents of the chain letter issued a statement asking that all work on the plan cease immediately.

However, the correspondents left the White House somewhat mystified and as uncertain as ever in their interpretation of the President's attitude toward the general proposition of conscripting him for another term. Many Republican senators and representatives thought nothing had been added to the Coolidge statement of August 2 and that, while the President does not want another term and does not want to be drafted, he nevertheless would not refuse to respond to the call if the party should ask him to sacrifice his personal inclinations. Others influential in the party believe he will not be a candidate under any circumstances.

The theory accounting for the sudden interest manifested by New York Republican leaders in the renomination of the President is that they are becoming panic stricken over the danger of losing that state in the Presidential election. That Al Smith will be the Democratic nominee is now generally taken for granted, particularly since dry Democrats have been seen throwing up the sponge in various parts of the country, and Smith has repeatedly shown his ability to carry New York state against great odds.

Unless Mr. Coolidge absolutely rejects a re-nomination before congress meets on December 5 the anti-third term agitation will be renewed, and Senator La Follette will reintroduce his resolution declaring a President should not serve more than eight years.

Frank O. Lowden's boom grew somewhat with the authorized announcement that his name would be entered in the Indiana preferential primary. Dawes, it was understood, would not contest the delegation with the former governor of Illinois, and Senator Watson, who has been credited with Presidential ambitions, was advised emphatically by his friends to stay out of the race. The Lowden boomers declare their man will enter the convention with more assured votes than he had in 1920.

SECRETARY MELLON'S program of tax reduction was ripped all up the back by the house ways and means committee, which practically completed the new revenue bill. First the committee agreed upon a reduction of taxes not to exceed \$250,000,000, and then it slashed the miscellaneous taxes that Mr. Mellon wanted unchanged. The taxes on automobiles and capital stock transfers were cut in half. The exemption on admissions was raised from 75 cents to \$1, the rate on boxing matches being increased from 10 to 25 per cent on admissions of \$5 and more. The stamp tax on dealings in futures on grain and produce exchanges was repealed. The taxes on grape wines were reduced to the pre-war level. The tax on corporation earnings was cut from 18 1/2 to 11 1/2 per cent, one-half per cent more than recommended by Sec-

retary Mellon. The Mellon proposal under which corporations with net earnings of \$25,000 or less and with no more than ten stockholders would have the option of paying taxes as partnerships was rejected. In place of it the committee increased the exemption on corporations with earnings of less than \$25,000 from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

CHICAGO won a big victory in the battle over diversion of water from Lake Michigan through the Chicago sanitary canal. Charles Evans Hughes, special master for the United States Supreme court, recommended to that tribunal that the case brought by Wisconsin and other states bordering on the Great Lakes be dismissed. After holding that the complainants had presented a justifiable controversy and that the sanitary district has no authority to divert the water without the consent of the United States, Judge Hughes declared that congress has conferred authority upon the secretary of war to regulate the diversion, and that the permit of March 3, 1925, is valid and effective according to its terms, the entire control of the diversion remaining with congress. Therefore he recommended that the bill be dismissed.

TAX laws were materially clarified by the Supreme court in its interpretation of numerous questions which had worried both taxpayer and tax collector. In one case involving taxes on incomes derived by lessees of Indian tribal oil lands, the government established its right to retain approximately \$150,000,000 in revenue. In another proceeding the government lost in its contention that under the revenue act of 1924 it could tax gifts made prior to enactment of the law.

IN A case brought down from Alaska the Supreme court held invalid the drastic provisions of the dry law of the territory prohibiting the possession of liquor in a private home even for the personal use of the owner, and declared residents of Alaska are entitled to the same protection against unreasonable searches as are given residents of other parts of the United States.

Federal Judge Kilhitz in Toledo, Ohio, in dismissing a case against a farmer charged with operating a still, declared the law of the sanctity of the home was a higher and more sacred law than the Volstead act or any prohibition law.

HARRY SINCLAIR, William J. Burns, W. Sherman Burns, Sheldon Clark, H. Mason Day and C. L. Veitch, manager of the Burns agency in Baltimore, were cited by Justice Suddens of the District of Columbia Supreme court for criminal contempt in connection with the mistrial of the Teapot Dome oil case. They are ordered to appear before the court on December 5 to show cause why they should not be sentenced under the statutes.

REAR ADMIRAL WILLIAM H. BULLARD, chairman of the federal radio commission, died suddenly of heart disease at the naval hospital in Washington, where he had gone to rest for a slight operation. His death came at the end of a famous career, 36 years which was spent in the United States navy.

ABOUT fifteen hundred convicts in the California state prison at Folsom staged a desperate revolt on Thanksgiving day and fought the guards, militiamen and other officers with guns, knives and other weapons in their effort to escape to the hills. In the first encounters two guards and six convicts were killed and a number wounded. Two United States army tanks were sent from Salinas to help the state troops, and at this writing the convicts are under siege in the prison.

COL. NOBLE BRANDON JUDAH, well known Chicago banker and lawyer and a distinguished war veteran, was appointed ambassador to Cuba by President Coolidge. This is his first diplomatic post, and it is considered an important one, especially because the Pan-American congress is to meet in Havana in January. Colonel Judah was born in Chicago in 1884 and went to France with the Three Hundred and Thirty-second field

artillery, later becoming assistant chief of staff of the First army corps. He participated in five major campaigns and was decorated for bravery by America and France.

COL. CHARLES R. FORBES, former director of the federal veterans' bureau, who was sent to Leavenworth for two years for defrauding the government, left the penitentiary last week. He had completed his sentence and, having signed a pauper's affidavit, served thirty additional days in lieu of paying a \$10,000 fine.

WARFARE in the Colorado coal strike region broke out, as predicted, when state police and mine guards at the Columbine mine, thirty miles from Denver, opened fire on a big and threatening mob of strikers that invaded the mine property. Five of the mob were killed and more than a score were wounded. Governor Adams called out the National Guard and tank, airplane, infantry and cavalry units were sent to the trouble zone. A proclamation declaring martial law was given to Adjutant General Newlon to post if he deemed it necessary. The I. W. W. leaders of the strike rather unexpectedly did not meet the situation with arms, but instead called on all the strikers to refrain from violence. They swore out warrants for the arrest of the mine superintendent and an under sheriff on charges of murder.

RUMANIA was thrown into mourning by the sudden death of its premier and virtual dictator, Ionel Bratianu. This brought to the fore again the possible return of former Crown Prince Carol, but the Rumanian minister to Paris was instructed to warn Carol not to attempt to enter the country.

ITALY'S reply to the Franco-Yugoslav treaty was the publication of a treaty of military alliance between Italy and Albania which was signed Tuesday. The danger of hostilities was so serious that, on orders from Foreign Secretary Chamberlain of Great Britain, the British ambassador to Rome urged Mussolini not to be rough with Yugo-Slavia, because it is a young state and unversed in the niceties of diplomacy.

SOVIET Russia has agreed to take part in the coming disarmament conference at Geneva, and its full intentions there are a matter of much concern to the other nations. Premier Rykov said last week: "The Soviet union is ready to propose, support and carry out the most radical program of disarmament for the whole globe, and simultaneously conduct a campaign against proposals only destined to mislead and disguise preparation for a new war under a mask of pacifism." Vice Foreign Minister Litvinoff declared the Soviet delegation was going to Geneva to propose a complete and general disarmament, and he added that Moscow has no faith in the good will of "capitalist nations" or in their ability to disarm.

Leon Trozky and his associates in the opposition party in Russia, having been ousted from the Communist party, have been put on probation for six months with plain warning that unless they cease their machinations they will be banished to Siberia or executed. Reports from south Russia said Trozky supporters had fought the government police in Odessa, Khar'kov and other Ukrainian cities and that 18 persons were killed and 30 injured. The Ukrainians want a separate republic.

GERMANY and Poland have ended their long customs war by the signing of a protocol which declares an armistice in the economic battle over coal and manufactured products on the principle that the Poles will have the right to send coal, farm products and manufactured articles into Germany while the Germans will have the right to open banks and places of business and sell manufactured articles in Poland.

SOCIALIST members of the Belgian cabinet insisted on a reduction of the term of military service and brought about the resignation of the ministry. Premier Jaspars promptly formed a new ministry which contains no Socialists.

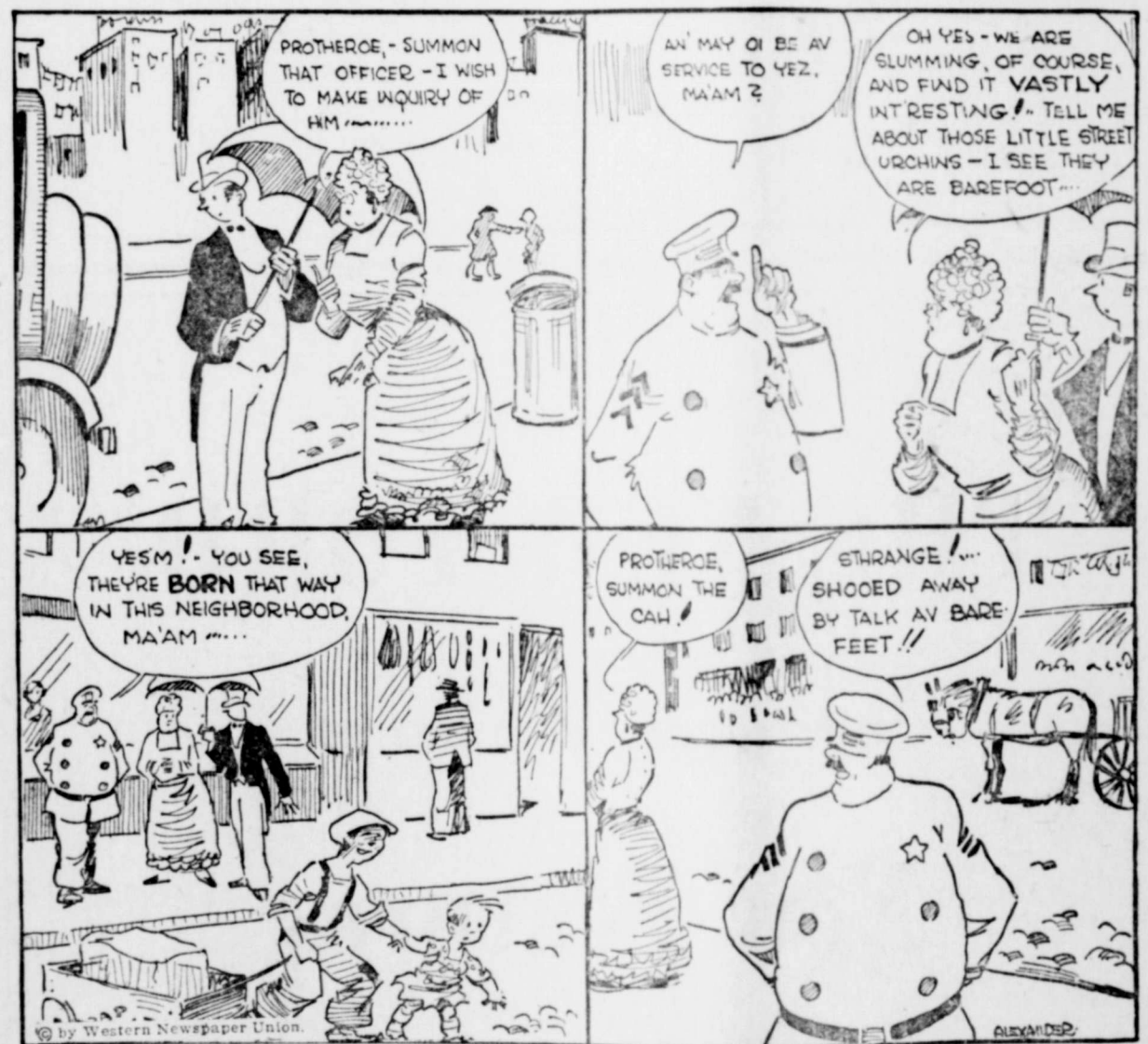

Chocolate Custard.—Take one and three-fourths cups of milk, one square of chocolate one-half cupful of sugar.

Caramel Pudding.—Brown one cupful of granulated sugar on a granite saucepan, stirring until melted and light brown in color.

Angel Food.—Take one cupful of pastry flour, one cupful of fine granulated sugar, one cupful of egg whites, and one-half teaspoonful of cream of tartar.

Fifteen-Minute Pudding.—Take one cupful of flour, add one teaspoonful of baking powder and a little salt, mix with enough milk to make a drop batter.

Rice and Graham Griddle Cakes.—To one cupful of cooked rice add one cupful of sour milk, one-third teaspoonful each of salt and soda.

Frozen Tomato Cream.—Cook one can of tomatoes, a slice of onion, a stalk of celery, a sprig of parsley with any herbs liked until the water is evaporated.

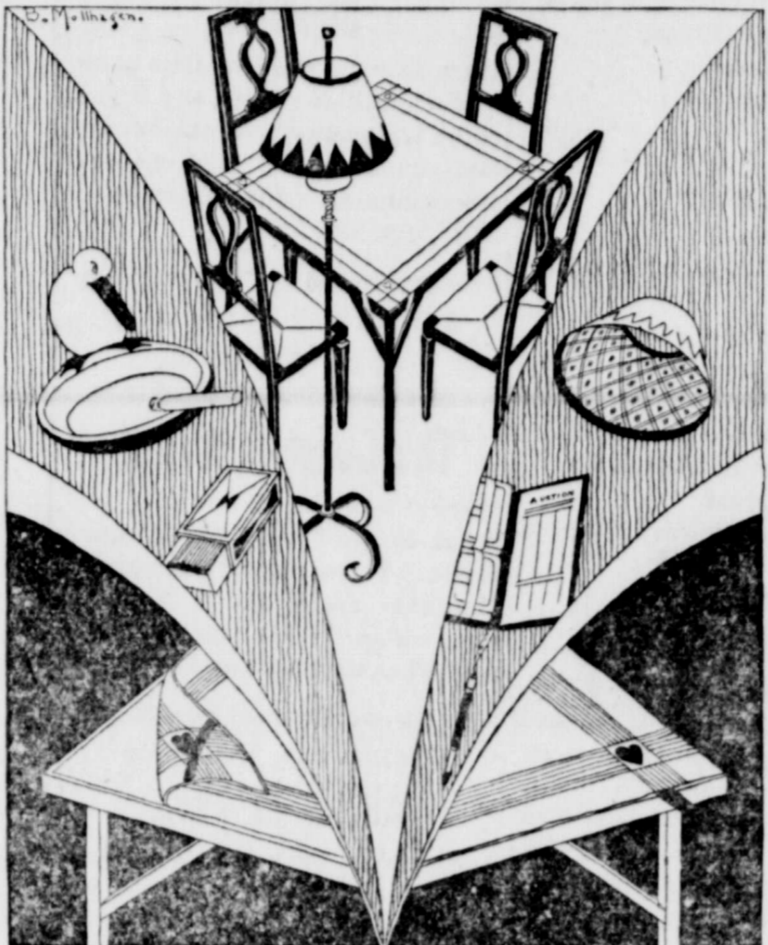

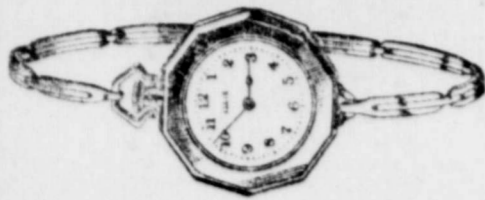
