

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

James A. Patten Bares Oil Bond Deal in Republican Campaign Fund.

JAMES A. PATTEN, veteran Chicago Board of Trade operator, testifying before the senate Teapot Dome investigating committee, related how he unknowingly handled \$25,000 of the \$260,-000 in Liberty bonds advanced by Harry F. Sinclair to help wipe out the Republican national committee's 1920 Presidential campaign deficit.

The bonds were turned over to him in December, 1923, by the late Fred W. Upham, then treasurer of the Repub lican committee, according to Mr. Patten, who declared that while he knew nothing at the time of the source of the bonds he did suspect-because he rather than a bank, had been asked to buy them-that something was wrong.

The suspicion became so strong, Mr. Patten, continued, that after a troubled night of thought, he contributed the \$25,000 in bonds to the building fund of the Evanston hospital,

Mr. Patten's testimony, as well as the inability of William V. Hodges, present treasurer of the national com mittee, to find any record of a \$100,000 contribution by Sinclair in the books turned over by Upham, strengthened, according to Senator Thomas L. Walsh (Dem., Mont.) his own contention that Sinclair's contribution deliberately was concealed and that the bonds were sold to unsuspecting individuals who were credited with gifts in the amount of their bond purchases.

"Partly by consolidation of the units of the industry. Thus you will aid in removing the cut-throat methods of competition among the bituminous companies. You will remove disorganization and fear. You will remove conditions which now lead a coal operator to say: 'I am in favor of paying an American standard of wages, but don't tell anybody I said so.' It is doubtful if the bituminous coal industry pays 1 per cent after its fixed charges are paid. The industry should be treated as the steel industry has been treated."

The representatives, meeting in Gary at the fifth annual convention of the Lake Michigan Sanitation congress, reached, in a resolution, a "Great Lakes Drainage Basin Agreement," in which the health departments of Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Michigan, and New York are pledged to conduct a united and vigorous campaign to stop

This move coupled with Egypt's rejection of a proferred treaty, has caused Great Britain to slap down the lid on Egypt's pretensions to independence. The blow takes the form of a note sent to the Egyptian government by Lord Lloyd. British high commissioner, declaring that it will not tolerate the passing of any laws by the Egyptian parliament which are likely to hamper his administration in Egypt or hinder the British government in its duty of defending the interests and security of foreigners.

The note is directed at three recent laws passed by the Egyptian parliament, but not yet signed by the king. The first permits Egyptians to carry arms: the second repeals a law regulating the public assembly and granting practically free, uncontrolled public meetings, and the last deals with the methods of election of village mayors.

All these, it is believed were passed by the Egyptian parliament to see how far Great Britain would allow the Egyptian Nationalists to go. The position of King Fund is difficult. The decision was made in the case of two Canadians who were arrested on December 1, 1927, as they were entering this country without having unexpired consular immigration visas as required by the immigration act of 1924, and by rule 86 of the Department of Labor. The effect of the higher court's decision is that Canadians may, without restriction, enter the United States to work or seek employment and return to their homes in the evening.

An interesting note on government reports on the fleets of the world. just Issued, shows Great Britain still is vastly superior to any other sea nower. At first sight, America and Great Britain appear almost equal. but an amalysis of the report proves Britain's superiority.

Take the matter of battleshins where the 5-5-3 ratio is supposed to obtain. Great Britain has sixteen battleships, the United States has eighteen, and Japan six, but Great Britain has four new cruisers, while the United States has none, Ir cruisers, Great Britain has forty-nine and the United States has thirty-two while Great Britain has eight aircraft carriers and the United States

In the case of destroyers the United States apparently is far ahead with 300 to Great Britain's 150, but most of the Uniced States' are small and obsolete, while Great Britain's are al up-to-date.

Similarly, in submarines, Great Britain has only 55 to the United States' 121, but again the majority of America's are small, old, and fit only for coast defense.

How the Useful Plants Came to Mankind

By T. E. STEWARD

Cotton

M UCH less ancient than flax, cotmore important material in the manufacture of thread and fabric. The people of extreme antiquity raised no cotton, and its cultivation in the Graeco-Roman world was not begun until after the time of Alexander, though his troops found it under cul tivation in Asiatic countries at the time of his famous Eastern excur-

It has been established that cotton is original in the southern Asiatic peninsulas, India and Burma. It oc curs in many varieties, chief of which are the shrub or herbaceous cotton cultivation of which has spread throughout all parts of the werld having a sultable climate, and the tree cetton, a larger plant somewhat used in ancient times but in modern days practically ignored.

Whether cotton in some varieties is active to the Western hemisphere is a disputed point, but there is some evidence to indicate that there were varieties growing in tropical America. The silky, long-staple cotton known as Sea Island, and first grown on the islands off the Carolinian coast is thought by many to be American in origin. Others assert that it has been changed by the gentle climate and nearness to salt water into the superior plant which it is recognized to be. Relatively little definite evidence exists that cotton is actually indigenous to America.

In South America, especially Peru. cotton has been cultivated for cen turies, and it has been grown also in Central America and in the West In-

The present name of the plant in English, cotton, seems to be a direct derivation from the name outn or kutn applied to it by the Arabs when it was introduced into their country from India before the Christian era. Almost the same name, kattan or kittan, was appllied by the Arabs to flax, the similarity probably arising from the likeness in uses of the two

Oats

O ATS are believed to have come originally from the plains of Hua gary, which is to say, eastern central Europe, and probably, also from Tar tary. There is nothing to indicate that they were grown in the periods of ancient Eastern civilizations, either in Mesopotamia, India, or Egypt, and in the days of Greek and Roman civiliza tion they were known and mentioned. but probably not cultivated by either of those peoples. The modern English joke that oats are food for men in Scotland and for borses in England is a derivation of an old Roman joke. based on the fact that Germans in their northern forests, outside the pale of Roman civilization, lived for the most part "on oatmeal." To which the Germans no doubt responded with the Scotch, "and just see the Ger

man men and the Roman horses. Galen and other recorders of ancient events mentioned oats as a product of Asia Minor, also, where they were fed to horses and eaten by men in years of scarcity. But a colony of Gauls had penetrated in ancient times into Asia Minor and it is not unlikely that they took oats with them. At all events, the assumption hat oats came from central European plains is borne out both by the implication of ancient writings and by the fact that they grow luxuriantly there and spread from cultivated fields into a semi-wild state more readily in that region than anywhere else.

Because oats sow themselves so readily on rubbish heaps and by the wayside, whither they have been carried in the refuse from stables and by horses, reports of wild oats have been almost universal. As a matter of fact, there has never been an authenticated instance of the discovery of oats that were undoubtedly wild, and that apocryphal plant must be left to the young men of whose coat of arms they are supposed to form a part.

Oats have been found among the remains of the Swiss lake dwellings. which belong to the Bronze age, and in Germany, near Wittenberg, in several tombs belonging either to the First century of the Christian era or a little earlier. None, however, have as yet been found in the lake dwellings of northern Italy, which tends to confirm the bellef that oats were cultivated only to the north of Italy, not in that land, at the time of the Roman republic.

Cover with well-buttered crumbs and brown in a moderate oven. Bake forty-five minutes.

Pie of Beef's Heart With Prunes -Prepare and cook the heart in fat. browning it all over. Place in a kettle, cover with boiling water and cook slowly until tender, seasoning during the cooking. Have ready a cupful of prunes soaked and pitted. Cut the cooked heart crosswise, put into a deep dish, add a plut of good gravy and plenty of seasonings. The gravy is made with the prune juice. Cover with the prunes and a crust over all Bake until brown.




