Texas, they are planning to build a similar hall which will hold 25,000. and these two great structures will be used next June to "stable our political zoo." That is to say, the Republican national convention at which candidates for President and vice president of the United States

are to be nominated will be held in Kansas City June 12 and two weeks later, June 26, the Democrats will meet in Houston to name their stapdard-bearers in the 1928 campaign

The Republican "zoo" is pretty much a oneanimal affair, consisting of an elephant bearing the legendary brand of "G. O. P." Of course, the figure of a bull moose may be seen by some lurking in the shadows but it will be only a ghostly animal, reminiscent of the days of 1912 The Democratic "zoo" is somewhat richer in number and variety of its "animals," First and foremost is the donkey, which is as universal ly the symbol of the Democratic party as the elephant is of the Republican, but many persons of the Jeffersonian and Jacksonian political persuasion will tell you that the rooster is the true symbol of their party. The Tammany tiger will also be much in evidence at Houston, ince one the leading candidates learned how to crack the ringmaster's whip in Tammany hall. As for the camel, symbol of the "drys," where will it be stabled-in Kansas City or in Houston? It may be welcomed into both. And then again, it may he cast out by both "into the desert air" where it is supposed to flourish.

The use of these symbols for political parties or certain factions in them has become a recognized part of our political history and nearly every one of them has an interesting history. The rooster as an emblem of the Democrats was the first to appear on the scene and it came about it this way: In 1840, Joseph Chapman was a Democratic candidate for the Indiana legislature from Hancock county. Things were looking gloomy for the Democrats at that time for it was soon after the panic in Van Buren's administration and the Whigs under the leadership of Gen. William Henry Harrison, the "Hero of Tippecanoe," were developing great strength. About that time George Pattison, editor of the Indianapolis Constitution, wrote to a certain William Sebastian of Greenfield as follows: "I have been informed by a Democrat that in one part of your county thirty Van Buren men have turned for Harrison. Please let me know if such be the fact. I think such a deplorable state of fact cannot exist. If so, I will visit Hancock and address the people relative to the policy of the Democratic party, I have no time to spare, but I will refuse to eat or sleep or rest so long as anything can be done. Do, for heaven's sake, stir up the Democracy See Chapman, tell him not to do as he did heretofore. He used to create unnecessary alarm; he must crow: we have much to crow over. I will insure this county to give a Democrat matority of 200 votes. Spare no pains."

This letter nappened to fall into the hands of the Whigs, who promptly published it in an Indianapolis paper as a means of ridiculing the Democrats. However, it had the opposite effect and "Crow, Chapman, Crow," became the stogan of the Indiana Democrats. When the Indiana Sentinel was launched in 1841 it carried at the top of the front page the picture of a proud rooster and under it the slogan of "Crow, Chapman, Crow." In time this symbol spread all over the country and became the popular emblem of the Democratic party. It is still much in use by the Democrats themselves, although the more widely used symbol by cartoonists is the donkey.

The donkey, as well as the Republican elephant and the Tammany tiger, is the product of the genius of one of the greatest cartoonists this country has ever known, Thomas Nast. Nast. s Bavarian by birth, came to this country as a boy. In school he was more interested in drawing pictures than he was in his books and at the age of sixteen he took some of his drawings to the editor of Leslie's Weekly who hired him for the princely sum of four dollars a week, to draw illustrations of news events. Nast left Leslie's in 1860 for a position on the New York Illustrated News but it was not until he began drawing for Harper's Weekly that he attracted much notice. By the third year of the Civil war his war pictures, which stirred the patriotic blood of the North and sent hundreds of young men to join the colors, had made him known throughout the country and President Lincoln was said to have best recruiting sergeants on the side of the

After the Civil war Nast cartoons came into even greater fame as he turned his attention to the heated politics of the times. The great conson and Edwin M. Stanton, the secretary of war, whom Johnson was trying to remove from office. Nast was strongly anti-Johnson and pro-Stanton. When Stanton died, just after his elevation to the Supreme court bench by President Grant, the bitter feelings of the Johnson-Stanton feud had by no means died down and southern Democratic papers attacked Stanton even in their obituary notices. On January 15, 1870, Nast drew his first donkey cartoon. It pict red Stanton as a dead lion kicked by a donkey labeled "Copperhead papers" Underneath were the lines: "A live Jackass kicking a dead Lion and such a Lion! and such a Jackass!" It is curious to note that this cartoon was a small one buried on the last page of Harner's Weekly among the advertisements for cleansing powders, sewing machines and books. Such was the humble beginning of a symbol which was to receive nation-wide recognition.

Nast did not immediately repeat the donkey symbol. He had others for the Democratic party. the serpent in some cases and the fox in others Soon after the appearance of the donkey emblem Nast gave to the world another political symbol, In 1870 William M. Tweed was the boss of New York and he was ruling with a high hand. The New York Times and Harper's Weekly were virtually the only papers which had the courage to oppose Tweed, Nast especially had fought Tweed with his stinging caricatures until Tweed is said to have exclaimed "Let's stop them d-n pictures. I don't care so much what the papers write about me, my constituents can't read, but d-n it, they can see the pictures." Nast's reply to this threat was a cartoon in Harper's dated November 11, 1871, which appeared just two days before election. It showed Tweed as Roman emperor in the Coliseum, beaming down upon the scene of a giant tiger rending the helpless form of the Republic. On the tiger's collar was the word "Americus," the name of Tweed's club of which the tiger was the badge. That tiger of Nast's literally tore Tweed's ring to pieces. Only one of its members was re-elected and all were indicted for fraud. By the next week another artist had adopted the tiger as the Tammany symbol and from that time on Tammany and Tiger were

Nast's invention of the elephant as a symbol of the Republican party came about in a balfaffectionate jab at his own political party. In 1874 the Republicans faced their first defeat since coming into power in 1860. It was not a Presi dential year but in New York Samuel J. Tiden fighting against the Republican governor. John A. Dix, was making a double-edged fight for that office. Tilden appealed to all classes of voters, for he had been a prosecutor of Tweed and he was also a member of the reformed Tammany Hall. The strength of the Democrats lay not in any local issue or in the power of their cand'date. There was a national issue at stake, whether or not a President of the United States should have a third term, President Grant was believed to be determined to run for President again in 1876. The principal opponent to the idea was James Gordon Bennett's New York Herald, which shrieked incessantly "Caesarism" and declared that Dix must be struck down to punish Grant. The New York World and even the Tribune chimed in the chorus and the New York Times gravely warned, "It is not Grantism that is at stake but Tweedism."

At this crucial moment Nast drew his cartoon showing the first Republican elephant. It was garden as the result of a scientific called "The Third Term Panic"-The New York Herald, an ass dressed in a lion's skin labeled "Caesarism," is braying loudly and all of the animals in the forest are fleeing in alarm. The Tribune is shown as a giraffe, the World as an owl dropping an arithmetic book, the Times as a unicorn with a monocle. At the edge of an abyss, barely hidden by broken planks marked "Inflation," "Repudiation," "Reform" (Tammany) and In the world, though related species "Reconstruction," is a huge elephant marked "Re- are found in California, Japan and publican Vote." Nearby is a half-concealed fox China. They resemble yew trees in with features suggesting Tilden's and labeled "Democratic Party." Two weeks later, after the election of Tilden and, for the first time in fifteen years, a Republican house of representatives, Nast drew a sequel to that cartoon. It showed the elephant tumbling down into the plt with the rotten planks and the rejoicing animals following, and it was called "Caught in a Trap-The Result of the Third Term Hoax." From that time on the elephant was repeatedly the symbol of the Republican party in the Nast cartoons. But it was not until 1880 that he showed the donkey and the elephant together definitely marked Republican party and Democratic party. In this cartoon the elephant lay asleep before the White House while the donkey was jumping over a cliff into financial chaos, despite the efforts of Senator Bayard to pull it back by the tail as he exclaims, "Hold on, and you may walk over the sluggish animal up there yet."

Other cartoonists were quick to adopt Nast's symbolism and for the last fifty years the Republican elephant, the Democratic donkey and the Tammany tiger have been recognized members of our political zoo. Just when the camel as the emblem of the Prohibition party joined it or which artist is responsible is unknown, but the camel, which traditionally can go without a drink for such long periods of time. was so obviously a symbol of the party which sought to make the country dry that no such originality as was shown in Nast's invention was necessary to bring it into being. Since the passage of the Eighteenth amendment and the consequent decline of the prohibitionists as a national party, the camel has played but little part in the political procession. However the wet and dry issue which is still a concern of both parties has served to keep this hump-backed symbol alive, although each party is cautious about taking the bold step of teaming it with its own emblem.

The name adopted for the new third party was the "Progressives" but it would have been difficult to have symbolized the Progressives with an animal as striking as either the Republican elephant or the Democratic donkey. By a lucky circumstance, however, such a symbol was soon furnished them. One day newspaper reporters, seeking out Colonel Rosevelt, whose robust health had been threatened with a breakdown, asked him how he felt. The reply was characteristic of the Rough Rider and exponent of the strennous life -"I feel like a bull moose," he exclaimed. And thus was the new political symbol born. For such a hardy animal, however, the Bull Moose had r short existence. It was strong enough to help the Democratic donkey defeat the Republican elephant in 1912 but soon afterwards it passed out of the political picture.





# **NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS**

#### Two Germans and an Irishman Cross Atlantic East to West in Plane.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD.

E AST-WEST crossing of the north Atlantic by airplane is an accomplished fact. Two Germans and an Irishman succeeded where French and English had failed at the expense of seven lives. Baron von Huenefeld. Capt. Herman Koehl and Commandant James E. Fitzmaurice of the Irish Free State air forces, starting from Dublin in the Junkers plane Bremen. just managed to get across the ocean in safety. Encountering strong head winds and a heavy snow storm, they wandered some four hundred miles northward of their course and finally. with fuel tanks empty, landed on Greenly island in the Strait of Belle Isle. They were only 100 miles from the open sea. The plane was slightly damaged in landing but the daring aviators were unburt and made their way to a lighthouse, whence news of their arrival was sent out to an anxlously waiting world.

D ISGUSTED and indignant citizens of Illinois gave the Small-Thompson-Crowe machine a terrific walloping in the Republican primaries and felt that they had in a measure redeemed the state and especially the city of Chicago, Governor Small was defeated for renomination by Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson by a majority of more than 400,000, and State's Attorney Crowe of Chicago was beaten by John A. Swanson by nearly 195,000 votes. Frank Smith. whom the United States senate refused to seat after his election last year, went into the discard, the sen atorial nomination being won by Otis F. Glenn of Murphysboro. Big Bill Thompson, mayor of Chicago, protag onist of the "America First" campaign and relentless enemy of King George of England, sought only one office, that of committeeman for his ward, and the voters denied him even that The same fate befell President of the Board of Education Coath who carried out Thempson's orders to dismiss Superintendent of Schools Mc-

In congress and elsewhere great satisfaction was expressed over the renomination of the veteran Representative Martin B. Madden of Chi cago, long one of the most useful and Industrious members of the lower bouse. His constituency has become almost wholly negro, but he decisively defeated his colored rival. For congressmen-at-large the Republicans named Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick. daughter of the late Mark Hanna and widow of Senator McCormick, and H R. Rathbone, dropping Congressman Dick Yates. The voters of the state showed strong preference for Lowden as Presidential nominee and he will have at least forty-nine of the state's delegates at Kansas City.

Illinois Democrats put through a slate practically uncontested and by their preference votes determined that Al Smith will have fifty-two sure Illinois votes in the Houston convention, and he may get the entire delegation of fifty-eight.

One murder of a negro and several kidnapings and assaults marked the Chicago primaries, but the picture of a saturnalla of slaughter and other crimes presented in the press of Londen and Paris was scarcely justified by the activities of the gangs of thugs that worked for both the Republican

With the co-operation of the French government he has sent notes to Great Britain, Germany, Italy and Japan asking those powers to state their reaction to the proposal for the conclusion of a treaty renouncing war as an instrument of national policy. If the responses are favorable it is hoped France will recede from her demand for the inclusion of numerous reservations.

FEDERAL Judge W. H. S. Thomp son of Pittsburgh threw out of court the suit of five former memhers of the Ku Klux klan to restrain the order from operating in Pennsylvania, ruling that he was without jurisdiction and that it was a matter for the state courts to handle. The opinion climaxed three days of sensational testimony, during which klansmen were charged with burning men alive in Texas; organizing a "uight riders" terrorist branch in Oktahoma and Ohio; horse whipping "offending citizens" and causing riots and other disorders.

> N A decision written by Chief Jus-tice Taft the Supreme court ruled that congress has the power to delegate its legislative authority to the President in the administration of the flexible tariff law. Justice Taft in his opinion compared the delegation of power to that vested by congress in the Interstate Commerce commission which controls railroad rates. He held that the tariff law was designed to secure revenue and that the declaration for protection of domestic industry did not invalidate it.

> Three opinions bearing directly upon current prohibition enforcement methods were handed down by the Supreme court. One, which sustained conviction of an alleged dope peddler, was accompanied by dissenting views in which Justice Brandeis scored the use of entrapment methods in law enforcement. Another opinion upheld the validity of padlock injunctions against property even after an alleged violator of the dry law has been ousted from the premises. The third sustained the conviction of John P. Donnelley, former prohibition administrator in Nevada, for failure to report an alleged violation of the Volstead act for prosecution.

FEDERAL troops in Caracas, capltal of Venezuela, backed up by university students, staged a revolt last week and engaged in a battle with loyal troops at the San Carlos barracks. The mutineers were speed ily defeated, several being killed and many arrested. Since early in February there have been student riots on various occasions in Caracas. In putting down these demonstrations under arrest, and the casualties have been reported heavy.

UST why any Italians should desire to kill that nonentity King Victor Emmanuel is a puzzle, but they did attempt it, last Thursday. A big bomb was exploded in Place Julius Ceasare, Milan, while the streets were crowded with people waiting for the king to arrive for the opening of a trade fair. The monarch had not reached the scene but fourteen persons were killed and some forty injured.



Brady and Frank Gilmore, said the legiti mate theater had been "handed the worst of it" and that the spoken drama had almost disappeared in many states. The automobile merpromised cuts in prices equal to the tax if the latter is removed.

# Expect Banded Birds

olve the mysteries of bird migration will have plenty of employment trying to get returns on the 270,000 birds that have been banded under the auspices of the United States biological survey. Returns on banded birds, according to Frederick C. Lincoln, in charge of this activity of the survey now amount to 10,338 cases. Knowledge of the movements of the bird after its first banding, gained from these return reports, enables ornithologists to get precise information concerning bird migration, a mystery that has puzzled mankind since the time of Aristotle. Ducks supply the most returns, Mr. Lincoln said. This is undoubtedly due to the fact that many banded waterfowl are taken by the millions of hunters in the field during the hunting season. Prominent among the bird problems of economic interest which banding may be expected to solve, Mr. Lincoln points out, is the control of red-winged blackbirds that do much damage to the rice crop in the South and of California in late summer and early

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

that during the first six months, babies must have three ounces of fluid per pound of body weight daily. An eightpound baby, for instance, needs twenty-four ounces of fluid. Later on the rule is two ounces of fluid per pound of body weight. 

GOOD THINGS TO EAT A dainty cruller or cake to serve



Sour Cream Crullers. - Take one cupful each of sour cream and sugar, one egg, one-fourtu teaspoonful of baking powder, mix and add

enough flour to make a soft dough. Chill well, then roll in a sheet and cut into oblongs and score, or into rings or strips and twist. Fry in deep fat, drain on paper and roll when cool in sugar or sprinkle powdered sugar

Spring Pudding .- Beat the whites of three egg yolks and one-half cupful of sugar. When well mixed add onefourth teaspoonful of salt and one pint of milk (hot scalded milk) soak over hot water until the custard coats the spoon, remove and add one and one-half tablespoonfuls of gelatin which has been well soaked in onethird of a cupful of cold water, stir until dissolved. Place six pieces of cake or six lady fingers in a dish in which the pudding is to be served. pour over the custard and cover with a meringue, using the whites beaten stiff; add one-half cupful of powdered sugar, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla and one cupful of canned pine apple, peaches, apricots or a mixture of them. Poach the meringue and top the pudding after placing the fruit Serve well chilled.

Date Custards.-Beat three eggs slightly, scald a pint of milk and mix such a fashion that it's hard to give all the ingredients together, using their number with any exactness, three tables; confuls of sugar and one half cupful of stoned and chopped troquois there in the hope of drawing dates. Turn into buttered molds and bake in a pan of hot water until the custard is set. Chill before using.

Ginger Custards .- Scald one cupfu each of milk and cream, add one fourth cupful of sugar, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of ginger sirup, one-fourth cupful of preserved ginger cut into small pieces throw down the hatchet and return to beat three eggs slightly and add. Pour into buttered cups to which the ginger preserve has been added, place in a pan with hot water and bake until firm. Serve chilled.

Savory Cereal .- Cut cubes of cold farina and put a lager into a buttered talks French and fools an officer of glass baking dish. Sprinkle with minced ham, or sausage, dot with butter or sweet fat, add a layer of well seasoned tomato sauce or cream sauce. sprinkle with crumbs well buttered and brown in a quick oven. Serve hot.

The hot cooked cereal with plenty of good top milk (that is the milk with the cream stirred in) is a fine breakfast for the growing child. The prepared cereals may be used occasionally to avoid monotony, then with whole wheat bread, a baked apple and a glass of milk the breakfast is disposed of satisfactorily.

Favorite Fish Foods. We are constantly told to eat more



fish, to cut down food expenses, to add variety and easily digested food more freely to our menus. Where the fresh fish are not obtainable, the canned fish may be found in the markets. Salt and smoked tish are so palatable that they should often appear

on our tables. Salt Fish Souffle .- Soak one-half pound of boneless codfish over night. Cover with fresh water, bring to a boil, and drain and simmer gently for ten minutes, drain and flake, then chop fine. Add a pint of smoothly mashed potatoes, one beaten egg, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper, one-half teaspoonful of salt and three-fourths of a cupful of rich milk. Mix well and spread lightly on a shallow baking dish; bake in a moderate oven ten minutes. Beat the yolk and white of an egg separately and lightly mix the two with a few grains of salt. Spread the mixture over the top and brown. Serve from the baking dish with a drawn butter sauce or a good tomato

Finnan Haddie Fritters.-Select a short thick haddle and soak it in warm water twenty minutes. Put over the heat and bring to a slow boil: remove from the heat and pick the fish from the bones in fillets. Make a fritter batter as follows: Mix and sift one and one-third cupfuls of flour with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, half a teaspoonful of salt and pepper to taste. Add gradually two-thirds of a cupful of milk, one beaten egg and a small onion grated. Dip each piece of fish in this batter and fry in deep fat. Drain on paper and serve with tartar sauce.


