

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Smith in Acceptance Speech Is Outspoken for Change in Prohibition Laws.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

TITH the courage of his convictions Gov. Al Smith in his speech of acceptance frankly declared his opposition to the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act as they now exist. This was the dominant note of his address, which was delivered in the assembly chamber at Albany because of a persistent rain that prevented the outdoor exercises. Necessarily Smith, like Hoover, declared that if elected he would honestly and vigorously enforce the dry laws. He also repeated his belief that the saloon would not and should not return. But the vital part of this section of the speech was a demand for the mod Mication of the Eighteenth amendment to permit the sale of alcoholic beverages by state agencies if approved by popular referendum; and for amendment of the Volstend act to allow each state to determine its own standard of alcoholic content, the maximum not to exceed that provided by the amended Eighteenth amendment. Severely scoring the evil conditions which he said had resulted from the present dry laws and the failure to enforce them, the candidate | planes and equipment, declared: "I raise what I profoundly believe to be a great moral issue involving the righteousness of our aational conduct and the protection of our children's morals."

Concerning the farm relief problem Smith went little further than the Houston platform on which he stands. He promised to take up the matter immmediately after election, acting on the advice of experts. He pledged himself to the restoration of honesty in government and to scientific tariff making and declared against "sudden or drastie" changes in the economic system which might upset business. In other matters he followed the platform quite closely

Unbiased and nonpartisan epinion is that Smith in his address showed he is making his chief play for the Eastern states; that he believes the South will be solid for him, and that his hopes of winning states in the Middle West are not excessive. His prohibition program is clear enough and is workable, and probably satisfles all the wets except those who still insist the Eighteenth amendment should be utterly wiped out. No one supposes it will please the wet Democrats of the South. But it is likely their attitude is fairly expressed by the Arkansas Gazette of Little Rock. which says:

"The Gazette is for the present dry laws, fully and strictly enforced. It cannot shift ground an inch toward compromise with Governor Smith. Nevertheless this newspaper can and will continue to support Governor Smith for President. The changes Governor Smith deems necessary and expedient would be defeated in congress by dry legislative votes."

GOVERNOR SMITH took time last week to reply to the attack on his record in the New York legislature made by William Allen White, which already had been disowned by the Republican publicity chief. The overnor justified his votes on liquor nd social vice matters by explaining ade answer from Paris it was gen-tally admitted that Smith had much circumstances, and though White

HERBERT HOOVER in his progress from California to Washington topped at West Branch, Iowa, the town of his birth, where he was accorded a fine reception by the villagers and took occasion to elaborate his views on farm relief. He made one concrete proposal-that of an adequate federal revolving fund to be placed at the disposal of the farm industry and intelligently used in financing whatever measure of crop control is found necessary to stabilize prices. He also said that, if elected, he would ask ex-Governor Lowden to be among the counselers for a farm solution.

equalization plan with the words: "It is not intended to put the government into the centrol of the business of agriculture, nor to subsidize prices of farm products and pay the losses thereon, either from the federal treasury or by a tax or fee on the farmer." After a conference with farm leaders in Cedar Rapids, Hoover went on to the national capital.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE named, as Secretary of commerce to succeed Hoover, a personal friend, William F. Whiting of Holyeke, Mass., and the new cabinet member was sworn in immediately at Superior, Wis., in Mr. Coolidge's presence. Mr. Whiting, who is sixty-four years of age, is head of the Whiting Paper company. He has never before held public office but has been keenly interested in politics and was a delegate to the Republican national conventions of 1920, 1924 and 1928. His selection was a surprise in Washington, where it had been expected that either Dr. Julius Klein or Walter F. Brown, both high in the department, would get the appointment.

COMMANDER RICHARD E. BYRD'S antarctic expedition, the most elaborate of its kind ever organized, is on its way toward the South pole. The bark City of New York sailed Saturday from New York carrying planes and equipment to the hopping-off place, and also 31 of the 70 men who compose the expeditionary force. Commander Byrd and the rest of the men will sail in September on the whaler Larsen and the Chelsea, taking more

ville, a cousin of the late Herman Melville, author of sea stories and creator of "Moby Dick," the great white whale. He has been going to sea since he was thirteen years of age. He is now forty-four. The bark is equipped both with sails and auxiliary engines, but will use its sails whenever possible to conserve the fuel supply.

BERT HASSELL and Parker Cramer, who started to fly from Rockford to Stockholm with stops in Ontario, Greenland and Iceland, reached their first stopping place all right, but on their second hop they disappeared. When hope for their safety was fading amateur radio operators in Chicago received messages from them saying they had been forced to land on a small island "fiftymiles off the Newfoundland coast,' that they were safe but their food supply was getting low.

A RT GOEBEL, the famous winner of the Dole race from San Francisco to Honolulu last year, established a new record last week. Ac companied by Harry Tucker, he made a non stop flight acro's the continent from Los Angeles to New York in 18 hours and 58 minutes. The distance was 2,710 miles and the average speed of their Lockheed-Vega plane was a little over 142 miles an hour.

B USINESS of running liquor across the Detroit river from Canada went to pot last week when a court in Ottawa ordered the stocks of the exporters seized within 20 days. Forty liquor dealers, most of them in Windsor, were reported to be hastily clearing their stocks for Vancouver, from which point they may, if lucky, be able to get them into the United Stafes. The Windsor rum fleet was dispersed, and in Detroit and nearby places the prices of liquor rose rapldly. The Detroit river trade was estimated by Ontario authorities to have amounted to a million dollars a month.

First efforts by Chicago and Toronto interests to merge all breweries in western Canada under one holding company have been completed with the merging of all breweries in Saskatchewan. The scheme outlined is to organize breweries in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia and then to consolidate the organizations into one huge holding company. Coupled with the brewery mergers are plans for a gigantic export business.

He administered a final blow to the | Iowa. Many buildings were wrecked and crops suffered seriously. The town of Austin, Minn., sustained the worst of the blow. In northern Iowa hall followed the wind and destroyed the corn crop in a large district.

American naval forces are renderwho were made homeless by the recent tropical storm. The crops, especially coffee, were badly damaged and the people in the stricken area were without food and medical supplies until the arrival of the United States naval tug Woodstock.

CHINA has a new trouble, but it Pa. terest at this distance. Western Manchuria has been invaded by a large force of Mongolian cavalry that is led, according to report, by Russians, The Manchurians were defeated in two bloody battles and sections of the railway mere destroyed. Japan was worried by the prospect of the weakening of her influence in Manchuria.

ON THE eve of the signing of the Kellogg anti-war treaty France has aroused the animosity of Italy again by holding extensive attack and defense maneuvers in the department of Haute Savole near the Italian border. Many of the crack French regiand artillery and all the elements in warfare in a mountainous country were used. Italy gave its reorganized army a successful test in maneuvers

PREMIER ELEUTHERIOS VENI-ZELOS won an extraordinary victory in the Greek parliamentary elections. The Venizelist party secured 224 seats out of 250. The Royalists elected 20 members, the Kafandarists four and the Pangalists only two. Venizelos now has a free hand to put in operation his program, which includes financial reform and better relations with Yugo-Slavia.

WALDEMARAS, premier of Lithu-nnia, having refused to negotiate in Geneva his country's dispute with Poland, the government at Warsaw has yielded and agreed to the Lithuanian suggestion for a conference at Koenigsberg before the Geneva meeting in order to bring to an end the unofficial state of war between the two countries. The Polish note was notably friendly.

O NE of America's spectacular figures in politics, diplomacy and journalism disappears with the death of Col. George B. Harvey at his summer home in New Hampshire. Nominally a Republican, he was the first to boom Woodrow Wilson for the Presidency, but later they became political enemies, to say the least, and in 1920 Harvey had a good deal to do with the nomination of Harding by the Republicans. His reward was the ambassadorship to the court of St. James. During most of his life he was actively connected with newspapers or magazines and for a time he was president and managing director of Harper & Bros.

Another notable who died last week was Viscount Haldane of Cloap who. as secretary of state for war, created Great Britain's territorial army and thus contributed largely to the success of the allies in the World war. He was driven from office by popular outcry because he reiterated his love for German scholarship, though there was no question of his loyalty.

F THE Interstate Commerce commission approves the consolidation of the Great Northern and the Northern l'acific railways, there is likely to be a new railroad grouping which would bring into co-operation those lines, the Southern Pacific and the Burlington system. This prediction followed the announcement of important changes in the personnel of some of the companies. Hale Holden, president of the Burlington, is to be chairman of the board of the Southern Pacific, of which Paul Shoup will be made president; and other changes were in prospec*. The new grouping, with its rate agreements with Eastern lines, would offer a service speaning

BANKER RIDES TO OFFICE IN PLANE

Puts Interest in Aviation Into Practice.

New York .- Richard F. Hoyt, junior member of the firm of Hayden, Stone & Company, investment bankers, is putting his reputation as one of the leading business advocates of commercial aviation in this country into actual practice by using a plane to commute between his Marian (Mass.) summer home and his Broad street office. The East river provides a convenient landing place at this end of the journey.

The plane, a Loening amphibian 'air yacht," equipped with a Wright "cyclone" 525-horse power air-cooled motor, has a luxurious cabin upholstered in broadcloth and saddle leather. Concealed lockers hold equipment for lunches and card games, permitting the banker to have breakfast en route to the office and relaxation with cards on the Journey home.

Windows are of unbreakable glass, while an engine muffler insures sufficient quietness for conversation. The plane has a cruising speed of 100 miles per hour and top speed of 130, with quick take-off, considering the load, on either land or water.

Mr. Hoyt, known as a sportsman as well as a successful business man, is active in the management of several airplane manufacturing and operating corporations. He is chairman the board of the Pan-American ing aid to 10,000 inhabitants of Haiti Airways, now operating between Key West, Havana and Santiago de Cuba and which recently was awarded the government mall contract for routes to Colon, Porto Rico and Trinidad. Paris.-The power of airship engines is being reduced sharply by European manufacturers, inspired by the success of the 200-horse power motors that brought Lindbergh. Chamberlin. Byrd and others across the Atlantic.

Most of the engines at last year's peroportical exhibition in France were 400 and 500 horse power and up. This year the majority develop less than 200 horse power. There are several engines in light planes that develop no more than many automobile motors

The baby engine of the show comes from Germany and develops only 20 horse power. The plane has room for two passengers and flies 25 miles on a gallon of gasoline.

Jurist Spends Spare Time Mystifying Friends.

Eagle River, Wis .- Here's a Judge who likes to cast aside the somber robes of the bench and put on the magician's shiny frock coat, who likes to lay aside the periwig to don the high slik hat from whence rabbits are pulled, who would lay down the gavel to take up the ventriloquist's

Frank Carter of Eagle River, judge for the Vilas county court, enjoys the unusual hobby.

He has a room in the basement of his home equipped as a theater, with stage, footlights and many accessories peculiar to his art. There he sometimes entertains friends, sometimes practices new things to amuse himself and neighbors.

Lays Off the Wine. The judge doesn't let the magic go so far as to try to turn water into wine in that basement. No, sir, he sees plenty of "cases" of that kind of "black art" in his courtroom.

And in the courtroom the judge was never before so severe with a prisoner that he forces him to be "the kind gentleman down in front who has lent us the derby," into which the eggs are broken. The judge wouldn't jeopardize the dignity of the court in that way or by suddenly jerking a rabbit from under the bench.

He wouldn't-maybe couldn'tshow any of the prisoners before his daytime stage, the bench, the card tricks that all magicians know.

But he might, some day, using his knowledge of ventriloguism, make his voice come from behind the prisoners to say:

"You're gullt as - thirty days." Now, you take Judge R. A. Richards of Sparta, county judge of Monroe county; he likes to make bets with the weather man.

He has gained considerable reputation as a weather prophet. Judge Richards has made a special study of weather conditions and his friends claim he can tell almost to the quarter of an hour when it's going to rain next. He is in good standing with the court attaches on his ability to tell whether they should borrow his umbrella or wear their rubbers.

He has his own system, his own basis for prognostication as a side line to promulgation of decrees. Got a War Voice.

MAKES \$10,000 IN ONE FISH CATCH

Fisherman Seines 20,000 Bushels of Herring.

West Southport, Maine.-Residents along the Sheepscot river are willing to concede all deserved fishing honors to the Brule river in Wisconsin. Still, they say, fishing can't be so bad on the Sheepscot when a man can go out and get 20,000 bushels of fish in one

Something about the feed the Sheepscot supplies; something about its cold, clear waters; something about the countless little tributaries or deep coves gashing its shore line seems to appeal particularly to all schooling fish.

"I advised a man to try his luck at Maddocks cover, near West Southport, last August," explains Luther Maddocks, dean of the Maine fishing industry. "He watched until he saw the herring school swim in and then closed the mouth of the cove with a drop net. He took out 20,000 bushels of sardine herring, which he sold right there to the sardine carriers for 50 cents a bushel or a total of \$10,000.

"Another man at Cosy barbor, opening into the Sheepscot, made \$8,000 in seining herring in six weeks.

"This year the season is starting late, just as it did a year ago, but it looks as if big catches will be made in the Sheepscot during August, September and October. And current prices are 60 cents a bushel. The fish are measured right on the spot in dories. A full dory holds 50 bushels."

South Wind Is Blamed for Crying of Babies

GREEN PEAS



There is no vegetable so well liked and often served from June until the last crop is frost bitten than peas. One may buy a fine variety canned, but the sweet, fresh vegetable, cooked in very little water and served with

a pinch of sugar, salt, pepper and a little butter or cream is always en joyed.

Shrimp Wiggle.-Melt two tablespoonfuls of flour, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, a few grains of pep per and when smooth one cupful of mlik added slowly. Stir and cook until the mixture is thick. Remove the intestinal veins from the shrimps and break into pieces. Add the sauce with one cupful of cooked peas and serve on toast. Chicken, salmon and other meat or fish may be used in place of shrimps.

Peas With Onions .- Cut two slices of bacon into squares and put into a saucepan with four button onlons peeled and halved; cook, shaking the pan until the bacon is crisp. Add one tablespoonful of flour, mix unti! smooth, tren add one cupful of stock or water and cook ten minutes. Add one plut of fresh peas, season with salt and pepper. Cook until the vegetables are tender.

Peas Souffle .- Take four tablespoon fuls of butter, add four tablespoonfuls or flour; when well blended and cooked add one cupful of milk and cook until the mixture boils and is well cooked. Add one cupful of cooked mashed peas, the yolks of three eggs well beaten, one teaspoon ful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper and a few drops of lemon fuice. Fold in the beaten whites and put into a well-buttered baking dish. Set in a pan of water and bake until

Spanish Meat Dish .- Put thinly sliced potatoes into a buttered baking dish, cover with a sprinkling of thinly sliced onion, then add any leftover meat, cold roast of beef, with any gravy left, add one cupful of tomato or more to moisten the dish. and bake until the potatoes are tender. Just before serving sprinkle the top of the dish with a half cupful more or less of cooked peas. Serve

Add one table spoonful of vanilla. Mix. using the hands if necessary. Make into rolls and place on a tray or board and let stand in the . e chest over night. Cut into thin slices and bake in a quick oven about stx minutes.

Fruit Cookies .- Mix five quarts of flour, one tenspoonful of salt, two quarts of brown sugar, one table spoonful each of cloves and cinnamon. the grated rind of two lemons, onehalf pound of candled orange peel, one-fourth pound of candled citron finely sliced and two pounds of chopped almonds. Mix the following: One pound of butter and one pound of any good sweet fat melted, one cupful of cream, five teaspoonfuls of soda dissolved in one-half cupful of hot water and four beaten eggs. Combine the mixtures. Roll and place on tce. In the morning slice into thin slices and bake in a moderate oven These cookles will keep a year.

Peanut and Almond Cookies .- To one cupful of softened shortening add one cupful each of brown and white sugar. Add three well-beaten eggs. one pound of roasted, shelled and chopped reanuts or half a pound of shredded almonds; five cupful of Jour two teaspoonfuls of soda, one ceaspoonful o' salt, one tablespoonful of cinnamon. Make into rolls and chill.


