county suffered an over-whelming  
defeat at the polls Wednesday of  
this week. The vote throughout  
the county (unofficial, but au-  
thentic) was 758 to 399 against  
the proposition.

This (Thursday) morning the  
Informer has at hand the vote of  
only seven boxes, as follows:
