"In the Name of the Great Jehovah-"





By ELMO SCOTT WATSON Ethan Allen, leader of the Green Mountain Boys at the capture of Ticonderoga on May 10, 1775, just 155 years ago, call upon the British commandant, Captain Delaplace, to surrender "In the name of the Great Jehovah and Continental Congress"? Of ourse, the schoolbook histories say he did. But there have been iconoclasts who say that this is just another piece of pretty fiction with which our school histories are burdened. Then

there are those who say that his words on that historic occasion in reality were "In the name of God'l-Mighty and the Continental Congress!" And again there are those who say that instead of this sonorous statement the words used by the redoubtable Ethan were "Now get out of here, you damned old rat!" Which are we to believe?

Fortunately for those who would know the truth about historic occasions and historic utterances on those occasions, there has recently appeared a book which may safely be accepted as an authority upon this particular incident and the saying which it produced. It is "Ethan Allen." written by John Pell, scion of the family which has preserved Ticonderoga as a historic strine, and published recently by the Houghton Millin company, a book which critics seem unanimous in regarding as the most authoritative biography of this picturesque Revolutionary war character that has yet appeared. And in his book, the biographer credits Ethan Allen with both the "damned old rat" and "the Great Jehovah and the Continental Congress" atterances. The only correction of commonly-accepted history which he makes is to show that these remarks were addressed, not to Captain Delaplace, but to a subaltern, Lieutenant Feltham. Here is the story as Pell tells it, after describing how the force of Americans, led by Allen and Benedict Arnold, made their way through a break in the center of the south wall of the main fort at Ticonderoga and came upon a sentry sleeping at his post;

The sentry, awakened from his dream, saw in the pale gray light an enormous apparition rushing at him with a sword waving above his head. He had presence of mind enough to cock his musket and pull the trigger, but the flint thished in the pan and the gun misfired. Taking to his beels, he ran through the long archway under the south barracks into the place d'armes and across it to a hombproof on the other side, shouting all the while to rouse the garrison. Ethan rushed after him, and the men, with Indian war-whoops, crowded through the wicket gate and climbed the walls of the hastions. Ethan ordered then to form a hollow square in the place d'armes but after they had given three cheers their enthrsiasm overcame their discipline and, shouting "No quarter!" they rushed at the doors and stairways of the barracks.

The first soldier to emerge from the guardhouse in the south barracks made a pass at one of the invaders with a charged bayonet. but Ethan, coming up just then, hit bim over the head with the flat of his sword. The man's life was probably saved by a comb he was wearing in his hair. He begged for quarter. which Ethan granted on condition that he point out the Commandant's room. The solfler led the way to a stairway leading up the facade off the west barracks. With Arnold beside him and a crowd of his men at his back. Ethan started up.

A door opened at the head of the stairs there appeared on the landing a man wearing an infantry fleutenant's coat and istrout but holding his breeches in his hand. Ethan shouted some such phrase as "Come out of there, you damned old rat!"—and, with

Feltham was immediately locked up in the Commandant's room, with sentries before both doors, while Ethan and Arnold took Deleplace downstairs to order his men to lay down their arms. Meanwhile, the invaders had broken in the doors of the barracks and captured the regulars in their bunks. At Ethan's command they dragged the bewildered prisoners out and lined them up in the place d'armes, while their arms were all piled in a room guarded by a sentry. A guard was aflotted to each prisoner and they were allowed to break ranks and return to their quarters. By now daylight was breaking, the rear guard was swarming into the Fort, and the men had discovered the captain's liquor. As Etban afterward remembered the occasion:

"The sun seemed to rise that morning with a superior luster; and Ticonderoga and its dependencies smiled on its conquerors, who tossed about the flowing bowl, and wished success to Congress, and the liberty and free-

Pell has preserved other anecdotes of Ethan allen which offer interesting sidelights on the character of this "frontier roughneck." Born January 10, 1738, in Litchfield, Conn., the eldest child of a hold, domineering and clever family, he was given the name of Ethan-a Hebrew name signifying "strong." Ethan once declared that "only two women were delivered of seven devils-Mary Magdalene and his mother." At one time, two of his friends, thinking to alarm him, dressed up in sheets and leened into the road as he was riding home late at night. Reining in his horse, Ethan exclaimed, "Well, if you're angels of light, I'm glad to see you, and if you're devils come on home with me. My wife is the devil's sister." But if he had no illusions about his wife, she probably had none about him. Nor did his second wife. "If you marry General Allen," said a Vermont tavern keeper to this woman, "you will be queen of a new state." To which she replied, "If I should marry the devil, I'd be queen of hell."

On one occasion Ethan nearly broke up one of the law suits in which he was perpetually engaged by marching late the courthouse in full military regalia with a bage sword swinging at his side. Waving his cocked hat to demand silence and turniag to the prosecuting attorney, he roared out, "I would have the young gentleman to know that, with my logic and reasoning from the eternal fitness of things, I can upset his Blackstone, his white stones, his grave stones and his brimstones," And these are only a few of the sayings and do-logs, which characterized this man who has been "the typical frontiersman," "the Rob Roy Wilderness Commonwealth," "the Robin f New England" and "the Strong Boy of soon found the Nutmeg state too narrow

Capins were offered as "burnt sacrifices to the Gods of the World," and the settlers driven out with instructions to "Go your way now and complain to that Danmed Scoundrel, Your Governor, Damn your Governor, Laws, King, Council and Assembly." In despair, the officials of New York proclaimed Ethan Allen an outlaw and placed a price on his head. Ethan retaliated with a similar proclamation against the governor of New York. So the war of words, and from time to time a more serious war of action, continued.

Then came the outbreak of the Revolution and Ethan Allen, embarking upon what was ostensibly a patrictic expedition but what was in reality a move to safeguard the frontiers of his wilderness commonwealth in case of war between Canada and the United Colonies, "thundered on the portal of all earthly kings at Ticonderoga" and won an imperishable place in American history. Unfortunately for that fame, the remainder of his Revolutionary war career was a sad anticlimax. He organized a filibustering expedition into Canada with the object of capturing Montreal, but after a short and almost farcical campaign was captured by the British. Kept as a prisoner of war until 1778, he then returned to his wilderness commonwealth, by now organized under the name of Vermont but still not a member of the

There he rose to even greater power as a sort of an uncrowned king. His hatred for New York was as strong as ever; for New Hampshire he had an aversion almost as great as for the other colony and for the Continental congress, in whose he had sworn at Ticonderoga, he had profound contempt. This congress, refusing to deal with Allen's "outlaw administration," steadfastly declined to consider adding Vermont to the United Colonies. So Allen began negotiations with the for annexation of Vermont to Canada under British dominion with a certain measure of independence reserved. For this he has been branded by some historians as a traitor, although als "treason" is doubtful in light of the fact that the congress had cast Vermont loose to shift for its own independent existence.

Ethan Allen's turbulent career came to an end in the roistering manner in which he had lived. In February, 1789, he died on a load of hay while returning from a Joyous drinking party on an island in Lake Champlain. A year later New York gave up its claim to the Vermont lands and recognized the independence of that colony. In 1791 it was taken into the United States as the first to be admitted after the thirteen original colonies. And when Vermont came to honor her two greatest men by placing their monuments in Statuary hall in the National Capitol in Washington, the first one chosen was Ethan

POOR FEED PLANS CUT HERD PROFIT

Milk Yield Decreases if Cows Don't Get Right Ration.

Indifferent feeding methods for the dairy herd are sometimes largely responsible for a drop in milk production during the summer, and an uneven production which has a bad effect upon the profits of the dairyman, it is pointed out by C. L. Blackman of the animal husbandry department of the Ohio State university.

"The time to plan the summer management program is while the cattle are enjoying good pasture," says Blackman, "The big flew of milk usually comes in May and June while cattle are enjoying nearly ideal feeding conditions. Later, when flies, hot weather and dried-up pastures come along, there comes a big slump in milk production and the spring freshening cows never come back to the high level of production."

Blackman asserts that when the undesirable pasture conditions come on it may be profitable to keep the cattle up during the day, and to feed some extra roughage, such as silage. Sometimes more grain may also be added profitably.

In addition to the careful management during the summer, a good breeding system which will bring the cov's into milk at the times when the supply of milk is generally low and prices good, will help the dairyman solve the problem of uneven produc tion and consequent loss.

Grain Feeding of Cows on Pasture Necessary

Green, succulent pasture is naturally high in protein but is low in total digestible nutrients. A cow milking over twenty pounds of milk a day cannot eat enough pasture to provide the necessary carbohydrates to maintain that production. Grain feeding of this cow on pasture is absolutely necessary, says J. C. Nisbet, extension dairyman, Kansas State Agricultural college. Her grain ration need not be high in protein-home-grown feeds will balance the pasture. A mixture of 400 pounds of corn and 200 pounds of oats should be fed at the rate of one pound of grain to every four and one-half pounds of milk from the Ayrshire, Jersey and Guernsey, and one pound of grain to five pounds

of milk from the Holstein. Dry pasture contains about onethird as much protein as the green succulent grass. An understanding of this fact makes the successful dairyman begin to add a high protein feed to his grain ration as soon as pasture starts to dry. The grain mix then is composed of 400 pounds corn, 200 pounds oats, and 100 pounds of cottonseed meal. The rate of feeding is changed to one pound of grain daily to every pound of fat produced

Plan Abundant Supply

of Roughages for Winter The shortage of good roughage during the past winter should insure an abundant supply of this type of dairy feed during the future. Sometimes we need a real shortage in order to impress upon us the value of roughage as an essential part of the dairy cow's ration. As a matter of fact, roughage should form the basic part of the ration, with enough concentrated feeds being used to supplement the roughage from the standpoint of total nutrients and protein needed.

If sufficient alfalfa and clover hay is not in sight to meet the needs of the cattle during the coming winter. we would suggest that soy beans be given consideration. Soy beans are an annual. They may be cut for hay or they may be threshed and used as a protein supplement. They will grow on land that is more acid than will clover or alfalfa. However, they will respond well to lime. The seed should be inoculated to give the best results in most cases.

Physical Condition of

Cow at Time of Calving The physical condition of the cow at the time of freshening has a direct relation to the milk production for the ntire tactation period, according to Doctor Eckles. Experience shows that if a cow freshens in poor physical condition as a result of having been fed poor rations for a period preceding, she starts considerably below her normai level of milk production and no amount of care in feeding and management will later bring her up to the level she should have reached had she been in proper condition.

Pasture Food Value

More food value per acre is obtained from pastures when they are not grazed too early or too closely, Early pastures, even though they are bulky, supply an abundance of pro-For dairy cows such pastures should be supplemented by highly carbonaceaus concentrates such as corn, kafir or barley. Grain should be fed at the rate of one pound to each five or six pounds of milk produced when the cows are on good

t, like any cut of pork, must ne without being dry. After sice the temperature and cook spareribs quickly in a hot Id water. The full directions the bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture follow:

Roast Stuffed Spareribs.

2 sections of spare- 1/2 cup chopped 1 cup fine dry bread onion
crumbs
4 cup diced sait 5 tart apples, diced apples,

cup chopped cel-ery a tsp. salt tsp. pepper

Select well-fleshed rib sections that match. Have the breast bone cracked so that it will be easy to carve be tween the ribs. Wipe the meat with a damp cloth. Prepare the stuffing as follows: Fry the salt pork until crisp and remove the pieces from the skillet. Cook the celery, onion, and parsley in the fat for a few minutes and remove them. Put the apples into the skillet, sprinkle with the sugar, cover, and cook until tender, then re move the lid and continue to cook until the juice evaporates and the pleces of apple are candled. Mix the apples with the bread crumbs, crisp salt pork, cooked vegetables, salt, and pepper Lay one section of the ribs out tlat. sprinkle with salt and pepper, and spread with the hot stuffing. Cover with the other sections and sew the two together. Sprinkle the outside with salt and pepper and rub with flour. Lay the stuffed ribs on a rack in an open roasting pan and sear in a hot oven (480 degrees Fahrenheit) for 20 minutes, or until the meat is

Boil one cupful of corn sirup or maple sirup, one-half cupful of brown sugar, three tablespoonfuls of butter, and one-fourth teuspoonfu! salt until slightly thickened. Pour the sirup over the sweet potatoes. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 to 400 degrees Fahrenheit) 45 minutes to one hour. Turn the pieces carefully while

cooking and brown them on all sides.

Some Welcome Dishes for the Table Daddys Evening

"Anyone who can assemble, pre-pare" and cook an appetizing, wholesome meal should feel that it is an achievement. A well balanced meal takes information, knowledge, training and application."

These recipes have been gathered from various sources; some will like to try them as they are

not common: Salmon With Sauce Piquant. - Take threequarter inch slices of salmon, place in a saucepan with hot fish broth, adding a touch of fruit fuice or vinegar. Simmer fif-

teen minutes. Remove from the broth, wipe dry, place on a hot platter and serve with the sauce prepared as follows: Melt a quantity of butter, flavor to taste with tarragon vinegar, pepper, mustard, fepnel and any spices liked. Stir over the heat until cooked, move to the back of the range and add the yolk of an egg to thicken. Serve at once.

Bisque of Herbs .- Chop together a handful of lettuce, sorrel, spinach, a small onion, a little celery and chervil and cook with two tablespoonfuls of butter until soft, stirring constantly. Add three tablespoonfuls of flour with four cupfuls of cauliflower water; add a beaten egg and serve with croutons.

Fresh Perch.-I'repare six fresh perch and marinate them in two tablespoonfuls of olive oil, a sprig of parsley, a little pepper and salt, allspice, bayleaf and other spices. Keep

Ham Loaf for Sandwiches .- Take two cupfuls of cooked ham, one-half cupful of bread crumbs, one small onion chopped, two canned pimentos, a tablespoonful of chopped green pepper and one-half cupful of tomato soup. Add enough water to moisten. Bake in a loaf. Slice when cold and use as filling with lettuce.

Ham With Chowchow Sandwich.-Mince sufficient boiled ham to make a solid cupful and enough chowchow and mustard pickle to make onefourth of a cupful. Mix enough of the liquid mustard from the bottle to soften to the spreading consistency. Use on buttered rye or whole wheat

Interesting Ways of Serving Lettuce

Who ever heard of cooking lettuce? The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture, among others interested in trying out new ways with familiar foods. Braised lettuce, preferably of the iceberg type, is an excellent change in the way of a green vegetable. The suggestion of bacon flavor given by using bacon fat makes the lettuce especially tasty. Here's how it's prepared:

large hard heads 4 tbs. bacon fat-liceberg lettuce Salt Pepper

Cut each head of lettuce into four pieces, taking care that a portion of the center stem is left on each section to hold the leaves together. Heat the fat in a large skillet, put in the lettuce, cover, and cook for 30 minutes, or until the lettuce is tender. If much liquid is drawn out of the lettuce, discard some of it during cook-Turn carefully if necessary. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and serve on a hot platter.





Maryland Plans Lining

Roadsides With Trees An extensive tree-planting program along the principal highways of the state is planned by the Maryland department of forestry, according to Fi

W. Besley, chief forester, A concerted effort is to be made by Mr. Besley and his assistants to ob tain greater beauty along the Mary-

land roads. Not only will the forestry department furnish and supervise the planting of roadside shade trees, but towns and cities of the state have the privilege of calling on the state forester for improvement in tree planting.

Mr. Besley plans to set out thousands of shade trees along roadsides and in the nurseries. Trees for planting on roadside property are furnished free from the state's nursery at the University of Maryland's college park headquarters.

"The forestry department has under taken an educational program throughout the state, as the planting of trees along the public highways is now recognized as an improvement second only in importance to the building and maintaining of the highways themselves," Mr. Besley safd.

"While trees are furnished free at the College Park nursery, transportation charges must be paid by the applicant."

Florida has miles and miles of splendid roadways that can be made all the more splendid and attractive through roadside beautification, such as already has been done, or is being done, in many localities in the state. There is growing appreciation in Florids of roadside beautification. 
