On Monday evening, after appropriate and impressive services at the Baptist church, the body was tenderly laid away to await the resurrection morn, under a bank of beautiful floral offerings.

Mrs Hall was 26 years of age, and joined the Missionary Baptist church at the age of 18. She was one of those rare, beautiful characters, sunny, helpful and kind. Her many friends will miss her encouraging smile. Her church has lost a faithful, zealous worker. She was a comfort to her parents, an inspiration to sisters and brother, relatives and friends, a loving, devoted wife and mother. Her home was an ideal one.

To the sorrowing husband, the two beautiful children, Janie Ruth, 8, and Bobbie Lee, 3, and other loved ones there is a message of hope in the risen Christ: "Because I live ye shall live also." She lives, and we shall meet her. Her life here was a ray of sunshine. For 26 years she shed around her the joy and fragrance of a pure heart, then the Father took her to the mansions prepared for His children from the foundation of the world. She is waiting and beckoning us to join the "Saints who are marching in."

**DECLARING RESULTS OF LOCAL OPTION ELECTION**

The State of Texas, County of Donley.

On this 29th day of August, A. D. 1933 the Commissioners Court of said county being called and convened in special session for the purpose of canvassing the votes and certifying the results of an election heretofore held on the 26th day of August A. D. 1933 to determine whether or not the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight should be prohibited or permitted in Donley county, Texas; and a quorum being present, this court proceeded to canvass the votes and certify the results of said election; and it appearing to the court that said election was in all things held in conformity with law, and in accordance with an order, heretofore and on the 7th day of August A. D. 1933 made by this court ordering said election; and it further appearing and being satisfactorily shown to the court that copies of said order were posted by the County Clerk of said county in the manner and form and for the length of time required by law, this court do hereby make and enter its order declaring the result of said election and finds upon canvassing the votes thereof, the voters at said election voted and cast their votes as follows, to wit:

372 to permit and "For the sale of beer containing not more than three and two tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight."

670 to prohibit and "Against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight."

And as a consequence the court declares that said election has resulted in a majority vote against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight, and upon this order's becoming effective as provided for by law, shall be prohibited in said county.

It is therefore declared, ordered and decreed by this court that said election failed to carry and a majority of the voters, who cast their ballots and voted there in, voted "Against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight" and upon this order's becoming effective as provided by law, the sale of beer containing not more than three and two tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight shall be prohibited in said county; and it is further ordered that this decree be entered of record as the law requires; and that this order be published for four successive weeks in some newspaper published in Donley county, Texas.

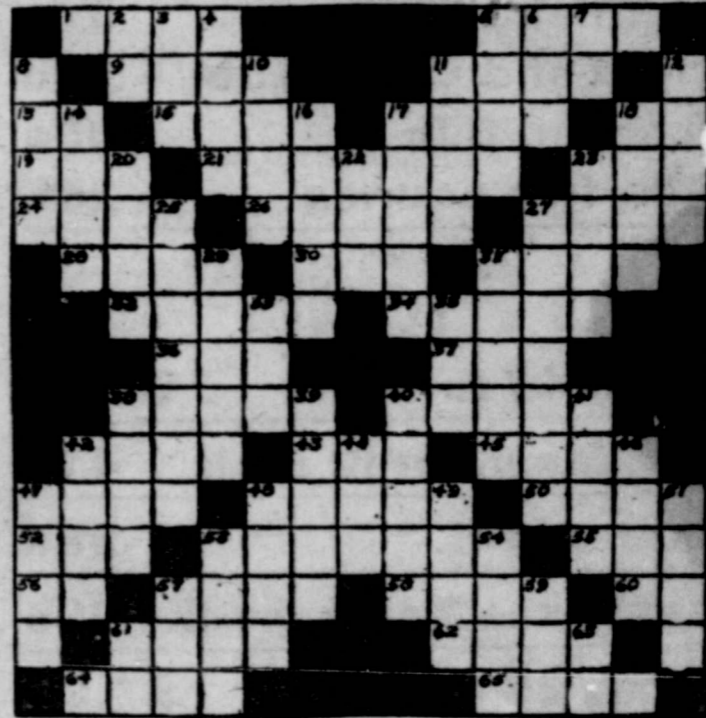

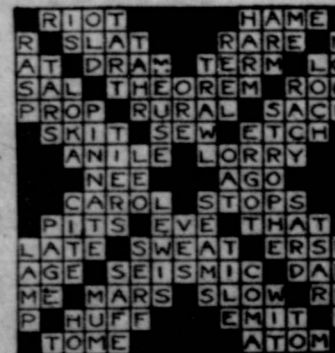

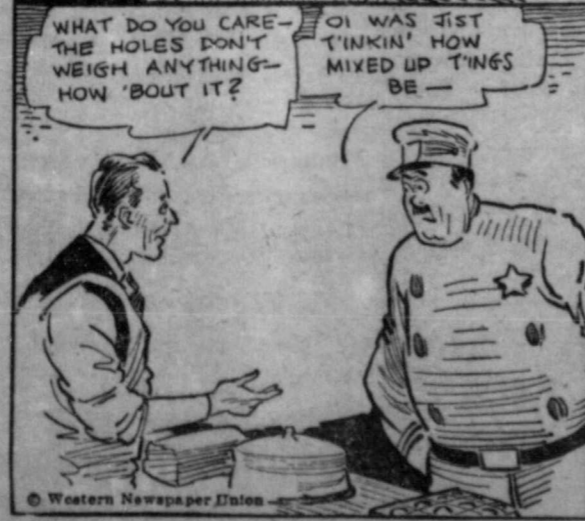
