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

early Saturday morning during a violent hail and electrical storm that riddled crops over a wide area, from Texico-Farwell north to Pleasant Hill and east to the Hub community.

Hail was spotted but also widespread in this region, with crop damage ranging from slight to total. Some of the heaviest losses were reported north of Texico-Farwell, near Bovina, and at the Hub. At places, hail stones were from six to eight inches deep following the storm.

Parmer County Agent Joe Jones estimated Monday that "several thousand" acres received hail damage in the county. Since the amounts of hail did vary throughout the area, it is impossible to estimate just how much of a financial loss the storm would mean to the was cloudy with intermittent summer and early fall. The storm was a severe blow to the farmers, who were just getting started harvesting bumper crops. Only a small percentage of the maize crop in the county had been cut when the hail came. Combines had just started cutting several fields, which were yielding upwards to 7,000 and 8,000 pounds.

individual farms. Nearly everybody who is concerned about weeds knows what bindweed can do, Jones points out. That's why such an all-out effort is constantly being made.

One of the most feared weeds in Texas, bindweed occurs in 167 counties and causes an annual crop loss of more than five million dollars. It climbs any type of support and can smother most every crop.

Even though much has already been done, it is a constant fight to keep bindweed from getting a start and spreading, the county agent explains. Therefore, a continual fight is necessary and everyone should he on the lookout for the weed at all times, he says.

The weed is easily recognized by its arrow-shaped leaves and its three-quarter to one-inch white to pink trumpet-shaped flowers. The black-pebbled seed is produced abundantly and is difficult to separate from small grains, Jones explains. trol it, he adds. EYES EXAMINED
