## BETTER TIMES

From all reports the Hedley trade territory will wind out the year in better condition than for some four years. Our crops are good and the better prices paid for cotton together with the plow up checks will bring in around \$400,000 and our farmers are well supplied with plenty of hogs, milch cows, chickens, and enough feed to make another crop.

You will notice the statement of our bank in this issue which shows that it is in fine condition. It shows about 800% increase in deposits, with no borrowed money and its loans and discounts have been reduced to reasonable figures and it reports the best business in four years.

The merchants report their collections coming in fine, some of them collecting accounts and notes three years old and all report a good volume of business being done.

It is estimated our cotton crop is about two thirds sold and most of our plow-up checks have been received but after we round out the year we believe this community will be in fine shape and with sensible planning for next year old man 'Depression' will soon be a back number.
