This week, it has been a mistake to ask the captain of Bovina Lions' golf team how his foursome came out at the tournament over the weekend at the district convention in Dumas.

The answer has been, "We came out on the 18th hole just like all the rest of the teams did!"

So, that means the team didn't win the tournament or even place, of course.

And that's too bad because at the last Lions meeting, the entire membership voted to double the amount of expense money the club furnishes the team to make the trip.

Two (double) times nothing is still nothing, we'll admit, but even at that we wonder if the club is getting a high enough placing in the golf meet to justify that expenditure.

After all, it takes a little time and effort, not to mention political planning, to get a motion and a second and then a majority vote at a civic club meeting.

Like it or not, Daylight Savings Time is coming. According to the information we have, it'll be here at 2 a.m., April 30, That's Sunday morning.

Unless you make special arrangements to avoid it, you'll sleep an hour less Saturday night than usual. Clocks will be run forward at 2 a.m., Sunday to 3 a.m., Sunday. This means that there'll be an hour lost there.

Don't worry about it, though, because we'll get that hour back next fall when DST is over. We believe the completion date for this year is October 30. Then, the clocks will be moved back and the hour we'll lose in the beginning will be returned in the end.

A limited survey around town shows that Bovinians will go along with the changed time law. No organized effort will be made to hand onto the "old" time, as far as we can tell.

We've been making a strong attempt to not appear non-progressive in regard to the time change and we're trying to go along with it without complaint. But, frankly, we haven't been able to work up much enthusiasm for it.

A coffee-drinking buddy tried to console us with the fact that "within a week after the change we won't know the difference."

Right he is.

But if we won't be able to tell the difference, what's the use in making the change in the first place?

Locally, we think the change will be of little benefit. And, as has been mentioned in this space before, it will be some hardship on people who start a day's work by the clock and quit by the sun.

These people will be getting in an extra hour a day, that's all.

Still a problem here, according to some, is the parking situation around Bovina's post office, which has now been in use over a year.

Parking places are at a premium, especially during the morning rush. This causes some disregard, still, for proper parking procedures in many cases.


At least 10 cars will be parked illegally during a day's time, one citizen was heard to comment recently. We're not in a position to argue for his point or against it.

City officials have made reasonable efforts to improve the situation in a diplomatic way. What else is done by local government officials will probably depend on what "the people" want done.

We've heard, unofficially, that the city could provide additional parking around the building . . . at city expense. That would help the parking situation, there's no doubt. Whether it would be the complete answer to the problem cannot be determined with out actually trying it.

The problem we have here is not an unusual one, we'd guess. Most communities, large and small alike, are apt to be confronted with it.

# Langers Give Site For Bovina Clinic

Joe F. Langer, resident of Bovina since 1918, and his four children have donated a half-block of land to the Bovina Clinic Fund to be used as a clinic, convalescent home, or a hospital, according to the executive committee which accepted the contribution last week.

The property includes Lots 1 and 2, Block 99, Original Township of Bovina. Location is on Ave. 1, between Boyce and Hall-sell near the Oklahoma Lane FM Road across the corner from the Frank Hastings home.

Children of Langer who are involved in the transaction are Joe Langer of Muleshoe, Fred Langer, Mrs. Elton Venable and Mrs. Clyde Blalock, all of Bovina, their husbands and wives.

Bob Estes, president of First State Bank of Bovina, assisted the Langer family in making the arrangements for the contribution, which he says is valued at \$5,000.

The site has been said to be ideal for the proposed clinic, to be constructed here after about \$50,000 has been raised through sales of certificates of indebtedness in multiples of \$25, following the Sears Roebuck Foundation plan for which Bovina recently qualified.

"Our mother and dad lived here a long time," Mrs. Venable said, "all of us attended school in Bovina, and most of us plan to live the rest of our lives

here. This is something we want to do for the community."

Mrs. Langer died about three years ago.

Langer and Margaret Lyons were married about 1914. They came to Bovina in 1918 from Plainview, Minn., and farmed for many years between Bovina and Oklahoma Lane. Two of the children, Mrs. Blalock and Joe Langer, were born in Minnesota while Mrs. Venable and Fred Langer were born in Parmer County.

After many years of farming and custom threshing, the Langers moved to town. Langer is now retired.

Also in the family are one grandson and five granddaughters.

As a member of the family said, "All of us will be gone some day, but this is something we hope the people of Bovina will benefit from for a long, long time."

Members of the executive committee said that the land had been accepted for use as a building site for a medical clinic here. However, it will not become completely legal until a corporation is set up and a permanent board of trustees is named.

# Roberts Resigns; Counselor Named

Richard Roberts, high school mathematics teacher here for the past six years, has resigned

his position to accept a similar teaching position in the Borden County Schools at Gail, Otis

Spears, superintendent, announced this week.

At Gail, Roberts will receive a substantial increase in salary, Spears said, and will be teaching under James McLeroy, superintendent there who was formerly high school principal in Bovina. Roberts taught under McLeroy in Bovina one year.

Mrs. Roberts has served as secretary to the superintendent in the Bovina Independent School District for two years. She is making tentative plans to complete her college work.

The Roberts have a daughter, Teresa.

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Spears also announced that Charles Turner of Farwell has been selected as school counselor for the Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools in a cooperative program to replace Mrs. Frances Clarke who has resigned to accept a position in Central Texas as a counselor.

Turner has been in the Farwell school system as band director for two years.

Mrs. Clarke has served as counselor for the three school districts for five years. She taught high school English here in 1960-'61 and spent a year teaching in Farwell before becoming counselor.

The resignations of Roberts and Mrs. Clarke are effective at the end of this school year.

# Bovina Clinic Fund Committees Named

Committees have been named by the executive group of the Bovina Clinic Fund of which Leon Grissom is chairman. These will begin laying plans for the fund drive and other aspects of the campaign immediately, Grissom announced this week.

The fund-raising committee is composed of Alfred Moody, J. B. Fowler and Billy Marshall.

Detailed plans for the fund drive will be made before it actually begins, Grissom explained. In this way it is hoped the necessary \$50,000 can be raised in a minimum of time.

On the building committee are E. B. Caldwell, Grady Sorley and Mrs. Bob Estes.

The publicity committee is composed of Dolph Moten, Mrs.

Jess Walling and Mrs. Earl Stevenson.

Earl Stevenson, Mrs. Ovid Lawlis and Mrs. A. M. Wilson will serve on the doctor committee.

Verification of committee members was made by the executive committee during the past week and completed Monday.

An executive committee was named after leaders of the community recently decided to follow the Sears-Roebuck Foundation program in securing a doctor and clinic in Bovina.

The Bovina Woman's Study Club with the aid of volunteer workers last fall made a survey of the medical needs of the community and trade area, which went over the top, according to the Foundation's standards.

Norman Davis of Chicago, director of the Foundation medical program, came to Bovina, talked to a town meeting and told of the program, how it could help the community secure a doctor, and how Bovina could help itself.

First step is raising approximately \$50,000 for construction of a clinic for two doctors.

The Foundation will then contact doctors already practicing medicine, approved by the American Medical Association, and interns who will soon be practicing medicine who might be interested in coming to Bovina.

Those contacted will also include doctors now serving in the Armed Forces in Vietnam and other locations, who may soon finish their service obligations.

# Pre-Schoolers Day Thursday

Registration for next year's first grade students will be held Thursday at 1:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria, according to Tom Templeton, elementary principal.

At that time the children who will be six years of age before Sept. 1 will be registered by a parent or guardian.


The children, along with younger brothers and sisters, will be entertained at the homemaking cottage by students. This service is being provided so that mothers will be free to attend the meeting in the cafeteria.

In addition to registering the students for the fall semester of school, Mrs. Katherine Lockhart, school nurse, will explain the necessary immunizations the children will need before entering school next September.

Parents should bring the records of any immunizations the child has had, as well as his or her birth certificate.

All boys and girls who will attend school for the first time next year should attend the pre-school day, Templeton said.

Pre-registering the children not only helps school officials in planning next year's program, but aids the parent in knowing what to expect when the child begins school.

# DST Begins This Sunday

Bovina joins most of the nation at 2 a.m. Sunday when clocks will be turned up one hour to comply with Daylight Saving Time.

First to be affected by DST will be Sunday School and church services.

All churches here apparently will hold services at regular times (by the clock), although actually they will be an hour earlier.

On Monday morning, school will begin at 8:30 a.m., as usual, except 8:30 will also be an hour earlier, and will be dismissed at 3:45 p.m., giving those affected an extra hour of daylight.

According to Chamber of Commerce manager, Jim Ware, all business institutions will continue to observe their regular hours, although these, too will open and close an hour earlier. Some businesses may

be forced to remain open an extra hour according to need, say some owners.


First State Bank will continue its regular 8 to 4 schedule and the U. S. Post Office its 8:30 to 5 hours.

Last week, his engagement to Miss Saralyn Doherty of Hillsboro was also announced. The couple plan to marry in September.


## Pvt. Clayton Ends Courses

# Center Organized For Area Schools

Oris Spears, superintendent of Bovina Independent School District, Friday attended an organizational meeting of a regional instructional media-service center to be headquartered in the PESO building in Amarillo.

Purpose of the center is to disseminate the most modern information in every field of education. Experts in their fields will travel over the country collecting data on modern educational methods in the United States and the world. These methods will be brought to the member schools with the experts coming in to work with local teachers.

In addition a film library including film strips, slides and machines will be available on a loan basis to member schools, Spears said.

The advisory board is made up of 84 superintendents in the area participating in the program. They select seven persons who are not connected with a school system to serve on the board of directors. This board will select a director of the center.

The center will be financed by the state and school districts, with districts contributing 50 cents to \$1.00 per child per year. Some Federal money

will also be forthcoming, Spears said, but in what way is not known.

Spears said the new center will be of invaluable aid to school districts in keeping abreast with the latest teaching methods which have proved successful through trial.

When experts in their fields come to Bovina they will work directly with the teacher, giving them instructions in methods which can be passed on to the students, Spears feels that Bovina is fortunate to have the opportunity to be a part of such a program.
