Would it be reasonable to think the Bible teaches one thing in one place and the reverse of that some place else? Would the Holy Spirit cause one writer of the New Testament to write that baptism saves, I Peter 3:21, and inspire another writer to say that baptism does not save, but rather one is saved by "faith only"? Would God inspire one to warn men about falling from grace, yet cause another writer of the New Testament to say one cannot fall from grace? This would be confusion, I Cor. 14:33. Some people think that all the denominations are right with God even though they are teaching conflicting doctrines. Did Jesus say that anything taught in the name of religion is all right? Or did He say this? Matt. 15:13-14, "But he answered and said, Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up. Let them alone, they be blind leaders of the blind. 

Club Sells Rummage Merchandise


