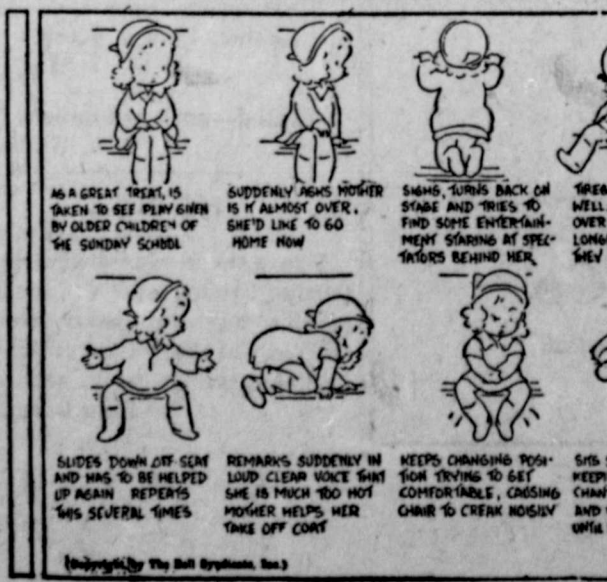


Caveman style
