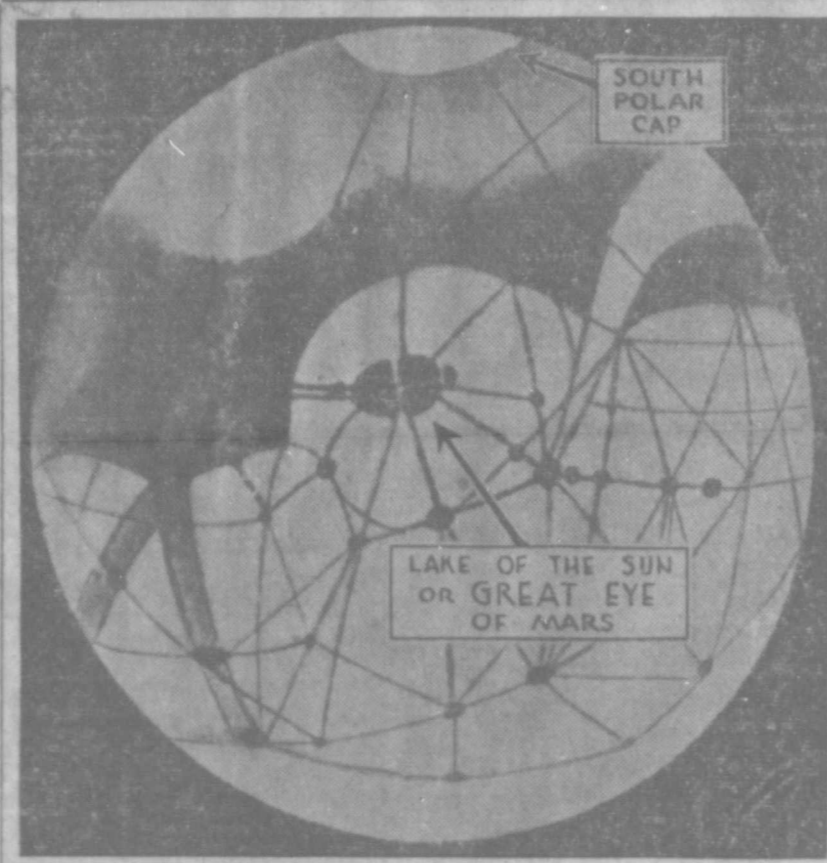

Siegfried-Maginot Lines Rank as Greatest Fortifications in History

French Started Defense Wall Construction After the World War.

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM.—Along the Franco-German border stretch two mighty walls of steel and concrete that deserve ranking with the seven wonders of this modern world. For here the Maginot defense line and the German Siegfried line present two of the greatest fortifications of all history.

Many details of construction and specifications of operation are closely guarded military secrets but through the months and years of grim preparation a trickling of information has seeped through to an interested, anxious world outside. Observers point out that on the land border between the two countries the "lines" are roughly about 12 miles apart, while along the Rhine, they are close to the river's edge.

Reports from the French side indicate that only recently German workmen have been carrying on building activity behind large screens that shield the character of construction. Between this construction on the Siegfried line or West Wall (as the Germans now term it) and the French Maginot line, the two countries have constructed their advance pillbox, anti-aircraft and machine-gun posts. Here in this "super" no-man's-land have sprouted what the French call "asparagus beds" or tank barriers—steel rails, whose unevenly set points are meant to tear off the caterpillar tracks of the invading machines. Here also are the tank traps of concrete and iron railing, resembling medieval battlements.

French Are Years Ahead.
Although reinforcements and repairs are constantly being made on both sides, as far as time goes, the German line is years behind the Maginot line. Nearly a decade and a half ago plans were first submitted for permanent fortifications to be built along France's eastern boundary for the special protection of the vital industrial region of Briey. The original idea has been expanded until a vast defense line now stretches in full strength more than 200 miles along the German front, with less strongly fortified sections extending along the Luxem-

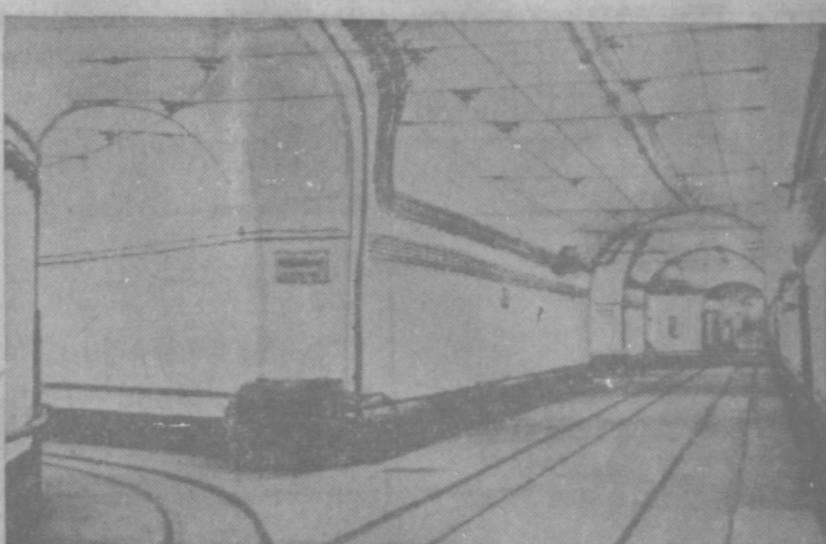
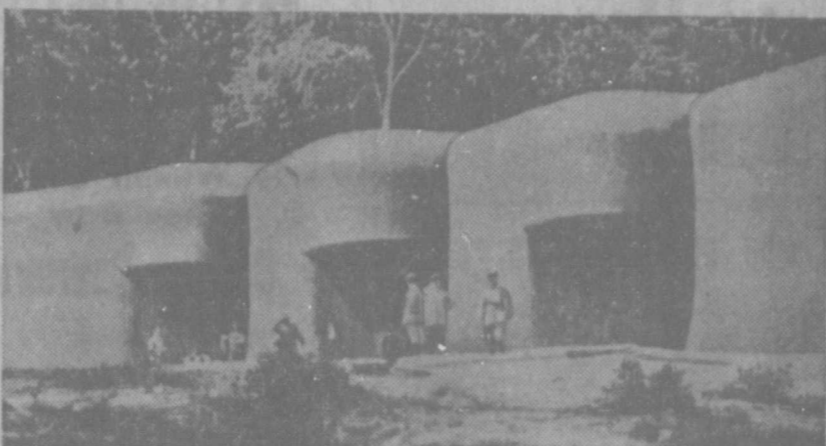

bourg, Swiss and Belgian borders. South, along the Italian frontier, are still more soldiers—trained in mountain operations—with more forts, pillboxes and barbed wire.

By contrast, it was not until 1936, after the reoccupation of the demilitarized zone of the Rhineland, that the German government took steps to build their western fortifications. Since then, however, the work has been carried on at a feverish pace. About a year ago, in his speech at Nuremberg, Hitler told his listeners that nearly half a million workers, engineers, and infantry were on the job, and that the wall would be completed within a short time.

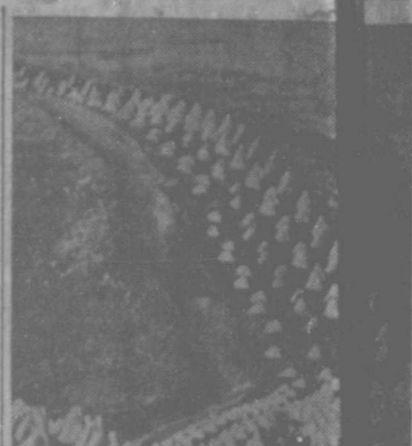
According to a special bulletin of the National Geographic society, hundreds of thousands of men may live for several months in the subterranean "barracks" of the French fortifications. Adapted to the terrain of the country, these buried chambers and galleries contain power stations, control posts, storerooms, elevators, narrow gauge railways, hospitals, and living quarters equipped with bunks, food supplies, radios, kitchens, hot water and ventilation apparatus—and even amusement facilities. Movable armored doors and interior firing chambers provide additional protection for the

defense of underground fortresses in sections, in case of penetration by the enemy.

Guns Are Camouflaged.
Where the casemates stick their heads above ground, camouflaged and hidden in hillsides and wooded sectors, they are armed with guns that can be moved up from below and operated by means of periscopes

Chinese gun pillboxes, blockhouses, and tank and infantry barriers, both Germans and French have special air-raid defenses, whose anti-aircraft guns are capable of spraying the air with a wall of shell fragments more than half a mile deep.

Moreover, all of the features of the two border defense systems are so camouflaged and concealed behind natural and man-made rocks that from a distance the whole landscape appears as a peaceful landscape.

The width and strength of the Maginot line and the West Wall are not definitely known by neutral observers. Various figures for width, varying only a few miles to more than 30 miles, however, have been given for both sides.

RURAL SCENE

Comes word from Newsberry, S. C., of an acre of land that has been planted to cotton for 39 years in succession. Never has it yielded less than 420 pounds of lint cotton and this year it hit 1,000 pounds. Remarkable, but it still isn't good farming practice.

Another item of interest from the Carolina's is that letter sent out early this fall by Dean I. O. Schaub of the North Carolina State college regarding the flue-cured tobacco situation. The dean calls the marketing of the 1939 crop at a fair price—"the most critical problem ever to confront the tobacco growers." The dean is right.

Grain feed for horses hard at work should be from 1 to 1 1/4 pounds of grain and 1 pound of hay for each 100 pounds of live weight. The better the hay, the less the amount of grain needed.

College Enrollment In Southern States Shows New Gains

NEW YORK.—Rising educational standards in southern states have resulted in college enrollment increases ranging from 75 to 225 per cent during the 10-year period ending August 30, 1939, according to Kenneth J. Beebe, director of the American Schools association with headquarters at Rockefeller Center, New York.

Many southern states, which formerly lagged in educational facilities, have made outstanding advances during this period. Mr. Beebe reveals, and now rival the northern states, which for many decades have set national educational standards. Mr. Beebe attributes this trend to increased cultural and industrial activity of the South. Southern state legislatures, he points out, have during the past five years, increased appropriations for educational purposes. He also reveals that each year an increasing number of northern students attend colleges in the South.

Especially in the field of junior colleges is the increased standard noticeable, maintains Mr. Beebe. Southern states lead all others in the number of junior colleges. Establishment of junior colleges, he contends, is a healthy sign, indicating that communities are progressing and adopting educational methods suited to the locale and to the changing times.

EDITH BARBER SAYS Mexicans Like U. S. Corn

Every country cultivates some grain which furnishes its people with bread which is actually life to them. In Mexico it is maize, or American corn.

It is fully as important today as it was 400 years ago when one of Cortez's officers wrote "the grain with which they make their bread is white, orange, red or black. To make the bread, they take a large jug, they build a fire underneath until the water boils and put the grain in the jug and they add a little lime to make the skin loosen. The next day they wash it very well and then grind it on some stones shaped for the purpose. It becomes a paste and they shape the bread and cook it on some large flat dishes." This is the tortilla, which is not only bread, but which serves as knife, fork and spoon after it is rolled and dipped into other foods on the plate.

The tamale is a food which most of us associate with Mexico. I found that there were dozens of different kinds. It is made from the tortilla dough, which is wrapped around a stuffing and then wrapped in corn husks or banana leaves and cooked slowly in water. Those made with the fresh corn are considered a summer delicacy and I ate these wrapped in fresh corn husks. In the winter when the drier corn is used, banana leaves are usually used for the wrapping.

Put nuts, sesame seeds, bread and raisins through food chopper and then add to the flour-fat mixture. Add the spices and tomato sauce. Cook five minutes. Add three cups of chicken stock, heat and add chicken. Serve on a hot platter, garnished with a sprinkling of toasted sesame seeds. (Bell Syndicate—WNU Service.)
