### JANUARY

Bovina High School's Fillies racked up three wins to claim the girls championship at the Bovina Invitational basketball tournament.

Bovina High School's Mustangs won the championship of their own invitational tournament here last weekend, racing to three easy wins and running their season record to 13-3 in the process.

The Bovina baseball team made it to the area round of the playoffs, in their first season.

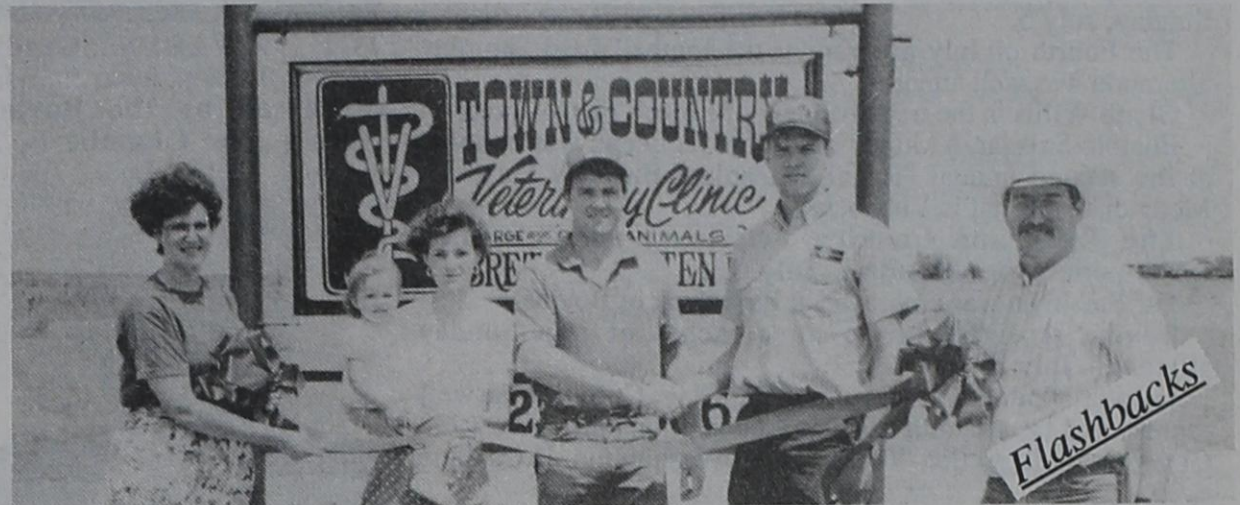
The Drug-Free Party was a big success according to Chamber members.

Kevin's Auto and Service Station will be a full-service station offering oil change, car washing, tire changing and all the services offered at Kevin's Auto will still be available.

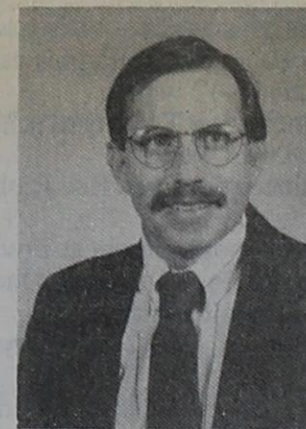

The head of the household or wife must bring social security number, proof of income, proof of residency (such as a utility bill), and drivers license.

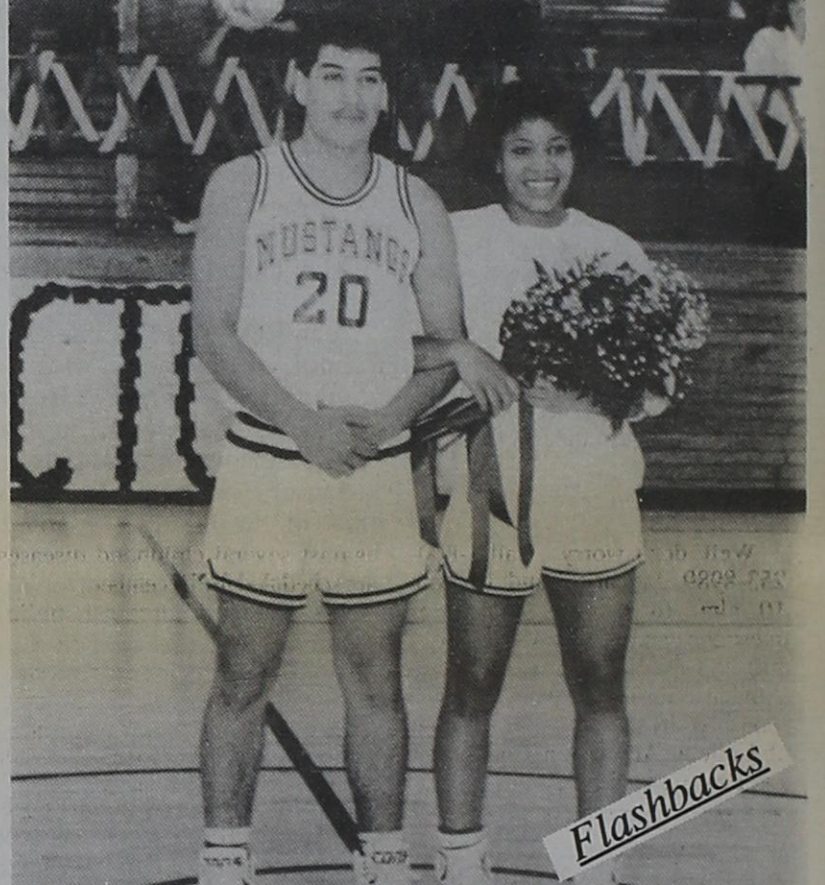

## Screening Clinic Is Scheduled In Friona

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer

Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Tuesday, February 16 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Wednesday, February 17 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

## Wildlife Habitat Discussed

If you like to improve wildlife habitat, some of the best improvements that could benefit the lake areas would be to plant food plots around the outer areas. This could include milo, millet, corn, or native grasses.

From a wildlife standpoint, the greatest benefits would be in the development of nesting and brood-rearing habitat for pheasants, quail, rabbits and a wide variety of non-game wildlife species.

The nesting period for most wildlife in the area is the period from April through August. These are the critical times and spraying, mowing or other disturbances should be kept to an absolute minimum.

At this time, the Parmer County S.W.C.D. has available wildlife packets from the Texas Forest Service. These are for quail

and pheasants, deer, turkey or squirrel.

The deadline to order trees or wildlife packets is March 1, 1993.

All services are available regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status or handicap.

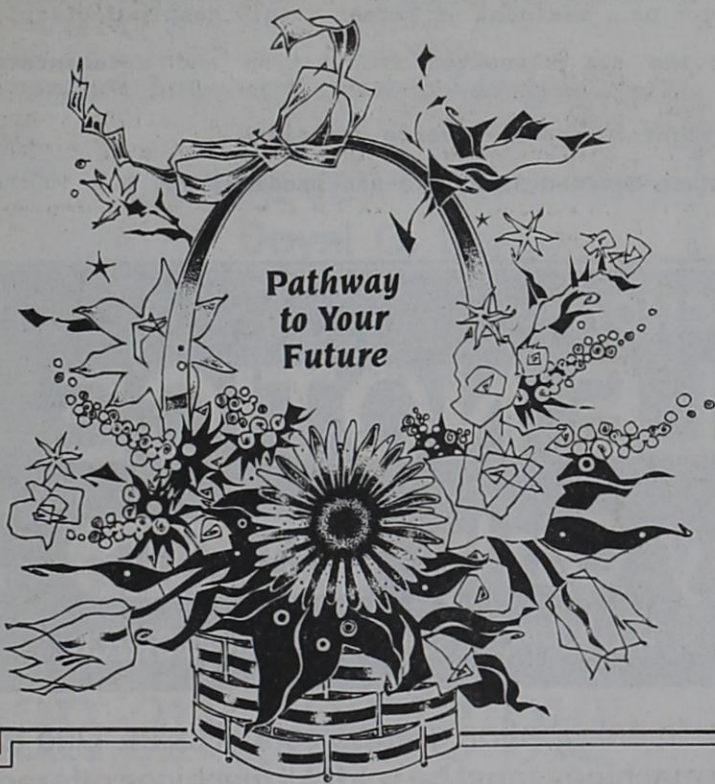

The Lazbuddie Fire Department will have an Open House for the Clay's Corner Station, Saturday, January 16 from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

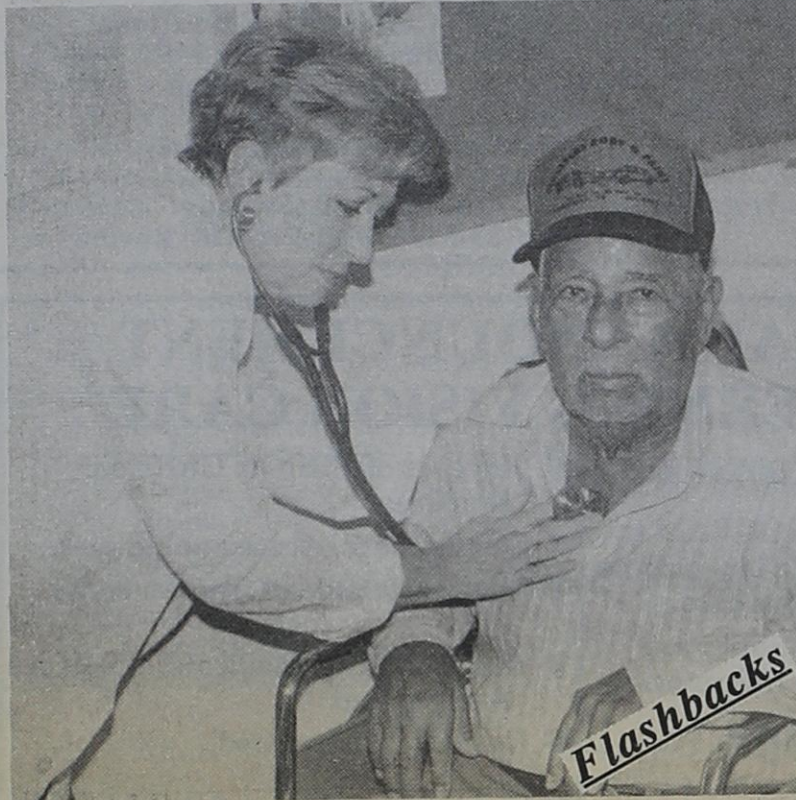
There will be a short program, a demonstration on the Jaws of Life and a meal will be provided free of charge.

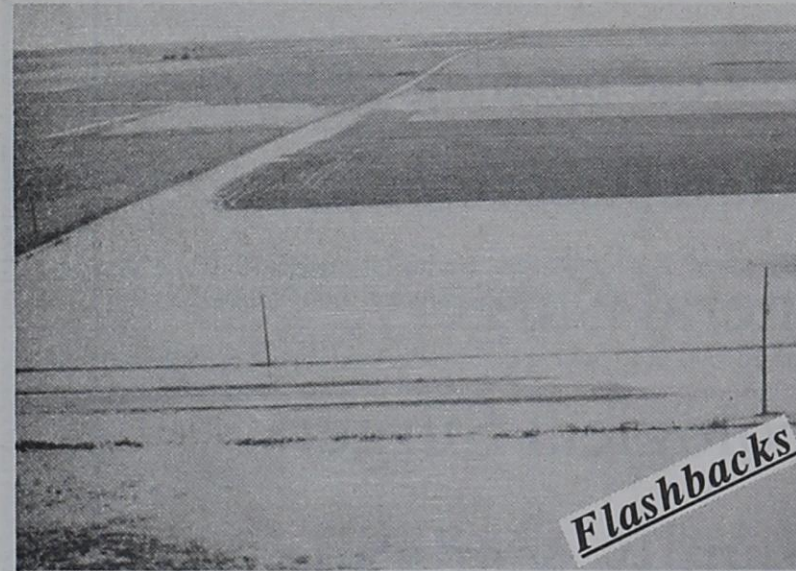

# Homemade Pizza

**BY CARLA McKEOWN**  
One of our favorite wedding gifts is a pizza pan set that a friend from Chicago gave us. Tony and I enjoy working side-by-side in the kitchen creating the pizza of our dreams.

Sometimes we make pizzas completely from scratch, including the crust and sauce. Other times when we want the meal but not the hassle, we use refrigerated pizza dough and canned sauce. Either way, we're guaranteed a pizza made exactly the way we want it.

For an even quicker "pizza," top a variety of prepared breads—English muffins, tortillas, pita halves, sliced French bread—with pizza sauce, cooked meat and cheese.

To make any pizza—traditional or quick and easy—spread pizza sauce on the crust, sprinkle with shredded

cheese, and top with the meat and vegetables of your choice. Bake until the crust is browned and the cheese melted and bubbly.

Experiment with different combinations of toppings. Try the traditional ground beef, pepperoni, Italian sausage; or opt for something new, such as shrimp, chicken or turkey. For a vegetarian pizza, use sliced squash and eggplant, chopped onion, mushrooms, bell peppers, garlic and chopped parsley.

Use an assortment of cheeses, including Mozzarella, Cheddar, Swiss, Monterey Jack, American and Colby-Jack.

Try the following recipes, adapting them to your tastes if necessary.

### PIZZA SAUCE

- 1 15 ounce can tomato puree
- 1 14-1/2 ounce can whole tomatoes, drained and chopped
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil leaves or 1-1/2 teaspoons chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves or 1 teaspoon fresh tarragon leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves or 1 teaspoon fresh oregano leaves

Combine all ingredients in a large skillet; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Cool. Makes about 2-1/2 cups.

### PIZZA CRUST

- 1 package active dry yeast
  - 3/4 cup warm water
  - 2-1/2 cups packaged biscuit mix
  - Vegetable oil
- Soften yeast in warm water (110 degrees). Add biscuit mix; beat vigorously for 2 minutes. Dust surface with biscuit mix, knead dough until smooth. Divide dough in half and roll each piece of dough into a 12-inch circle. Place dough circles on greased baking sheets; crimp edges. Brush dough with oil. Fill with desired toppings. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes or until crust is done. Makes 2 12-inch pizzas.

### QUICK AND EASY MEXICAN PIZZAS

- 1/2 cup Pizza Sauce
- 1/2 cup hot or mild salsa
- 1 tablespoon minced cilantro or parsley
- 4 large flour tortillas
- 1 8 ounce can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 5-1/2 ounce can canned chicken or turkey, drained
- 1/2 cup drained canned pinto beans
- 1 4 ounce green chilies, drained, cut into strips
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese

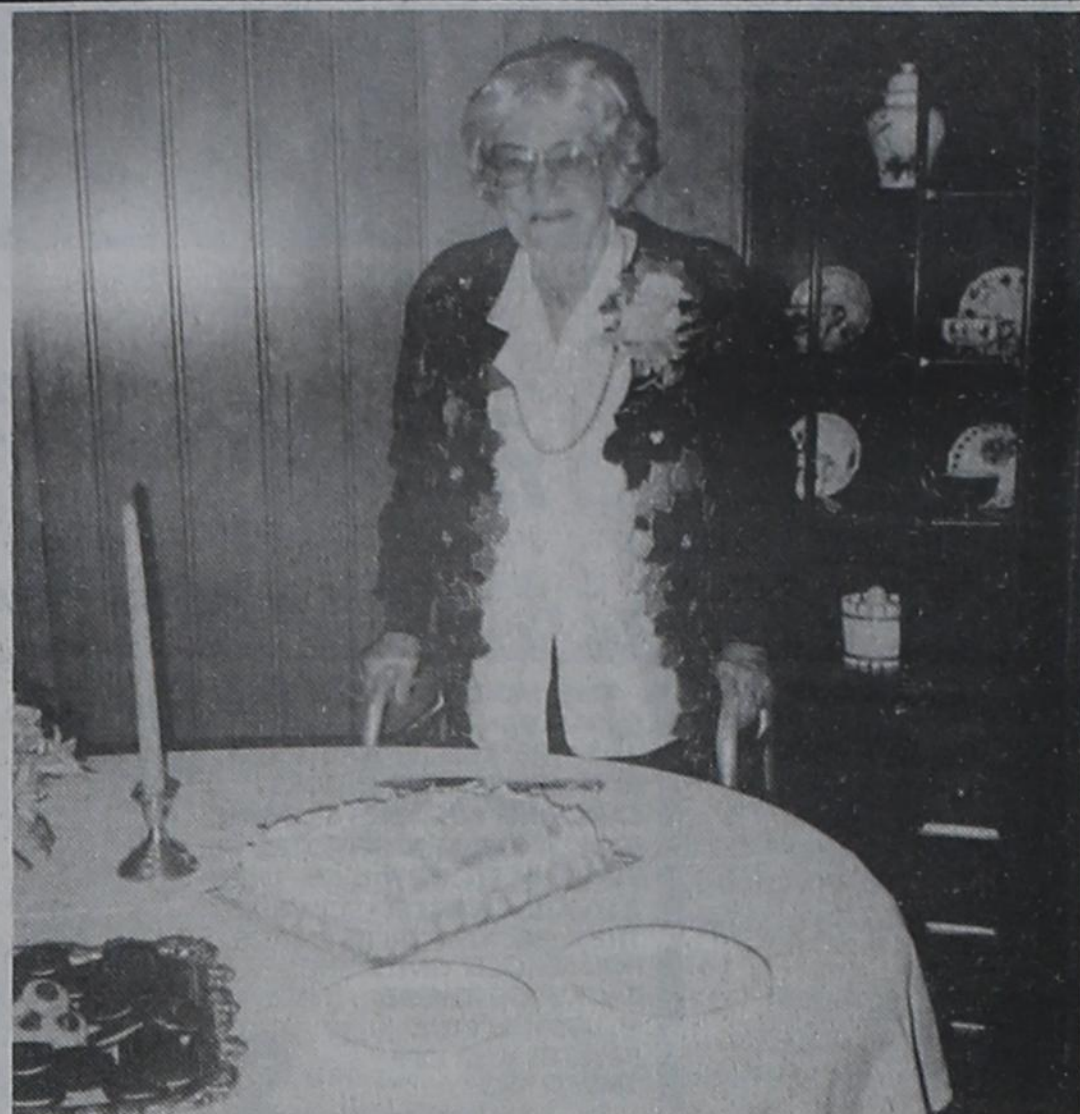
Mix pizza sauce, salsa and cilantro; spread on tortillas. Arrange corn, chicken, pinto beans and chilies over sauce; sprinkle with cheese. Broil until cheese is melted, about 3 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

### QUICK AND EASY FRENCH PIZZAS

- 1 cup pizza sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves
- 1/8 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 4 pita breads
- 1-10 ounce can baby or minced clams, drained
- 1 4-1/4-ounce medium shrimp, rinsed, drained
- 1 small red pepper, sliced
- 8 pitted ripe olives, sliced
- 1 tablespoon drained capers
- 1/4 cup crumbled goat cheese

Mix pizza sauce, tarragon and thyme; spread on pita breads. Arrange clams, shrimp, red pepper and olives over sauce. Sprinkle with capers and goat cheese. Broil until cheese is melted, about 3 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

## LOOKING UP!

 What we accomplish for good in 1993 will depend much on whether we see opportunities or make excuses!

Then when the war came, the family was permanently separated. "You see," the beggar said, "I never had a chance."

The other man responded, "This is strange. My background is similar to yours. I too lost my mother when I was young. My father was also brutal and cruel. I also lost track of my family because of the war. But I felt that I had no choice but to try and overcome my circumstances rather than be overcome by them!"

Excuses have been around ever since Adam said, "It was my wife's fault!", and Eve exclaimed, "The devil made me do it!" Excuses are the easy way around responsibility.

Dr. Charles Snyder, professor of clinical psychology at the University of Kansas, says, "An excuse makes reality easier to bear when we make a mistake." He goes on to explain that excuses come in four different categories. First, its human nature to blame someone or something else for our failures. "It's not my fault!", we say, but when caught red-handed, and it is our fault, we're prone to minimize and soften the truth: "It's not so bad!"

The third wave of excuse making is self-justification. There were extenuating circumstances! You didn't really deserve that speeding ticket because there was an emergency at the office. And of course there is a final type of excuse, the "good excuse." It projects deficiencies onto other things to explain failure. For example, "I just didn't have enough time" or "Old people just can't remember things."

But we must all be careful that excuse making does not become a habit! Dr. Edward Martin, a Los Angeles psychologist, warns that ones credibility with others may be destroyed by excessive excuse making.

It may also be harmful to our mental and spiritual well being if we allow excuses to keep us from facing the realities and responsibilities of life. "They prevent us from looking at a part of our lives we don't want to face," says Dr. Martin. "Excuses are a warning sign that something is wrong in our lives that needs to be changed." Excessive excuse making may rob us of true success of life.

Two men met at a railroad station in Austria one day. One of the men, an alcoholic, begged of the other man enough money to buy a bottle of wine. The other man said with surprise, "Why should an intelligent-looking man like you sink to the level of living from one drink to another?"

The beggar explained his difficult life. His mother had died when he was young. His father had beaten the children unmercifully.

How many of you have written 1992 on one of your checks? I suppose that this is one of the hardest things to not do right after the new year has begun.

I wrote a check on January 2, and just as soon as I wrote '1992' I realized what I had done but it was already there.

It is nice to know that you are not the only one that does this and that you are not just getting old and forgetful because it is really hard to change something overnight you've been doing for a full year.

### Bovina Lady Gets Award

Celeste Olvera of Bovina I.S.D. has been awarded a Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential in recognition of outstanding work with young children. The credential was awarded by the Council for Early Childhood Professional Recognition in Washington, D.C., which represents the early childhood profession.

CDA is the only major national effort to improve child care by evaluating and recognizing the skills of individuals providing care. Although the first credential was awarded just over 15 years ago, fifty states plus the District of Columbia already include CDA in child care licensing regulations. Others are considering similar action.

Parents who use child care are especially concerned today about their children's welfare. Every candidate for the CDA credential is observed working with young children and is evaluated by a team which includes early childhood experts and a parent. The candidate must demonstrate ability to work with families to develop children's physical and intellectual capabilities in a safe and healthy learning environment.

### Xmas Project Raises \$1410

The Christmas Card Fund, sponsored by the Bovina Women's Study Club, amounted to \$1,410.

Dear Editor:

In an effort to make Bovina a cleaner and safer place to live, as of January 15, 1993, there will be an increased effort in enforcing certain city ordinances.

The first of these will be the ordinance regarding dogs running loose inside the city limits. The large number of dogs running loose on our streets is a safety hazard to traffic and a danger to our children playing outside. There is also the danger to the dogs themselves.

All dogs inside the city limits of Bovina must be licensed and vaccinated. They must also be under the control of the owner at all times. If a dog is caught, the pick up fee and fine is \$25 plus \$3 per day that the dog is kept.

The second time a dog is caught, the pick up fee and fine is \$50 plus \$3 per day. The third time a dog is caught it will be destroyed. Also, no livestock is allowed inside the city limits.

The second ordinance scheduled for increased enforcement regards "junked" or abandoned vehicles.

A junked vehicle is any motor vehicle that is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed to an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle inspection certificate and which is wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded or remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than 120 days.

Owners of such vehicles will be given notice to remove the vehicles. If after 10 days the vehicle has not been removed it will be removed by the City of Bovina. Any person in violation of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and conviction under this ordinance is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.

The third ordinance regards trash, weeds, grass and rubbish on property inside the city limits. It is unlawful for an owner, lessee, occupant or any person in charge of any premises to allow weeds to grow or trash or rubbish to accumulate upon said premises to such an extent as is reasonably calculated to create a fire hazard or

to become injurious to the health of the citizens of Bovina.

Persons in violation will be given five days from the date of notice to remove the items or cut the weeds or grass. If the premises is not up to standard after five days, the City of Bovina will clean the premises and will then bill the owner for the expenses incurred and if not paid, a lien will be placed against the property.

Also, the person or persons responsible for the premises shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and conviction under this ordinance is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$50 and each day that the violation continues will constitute a separate offense.

We hope that this notice will explain the ordinances listed and how they will be enforced. This does not, however, mean that we will not be enforcing all of the city ordinances, but that these need special attention at this time.

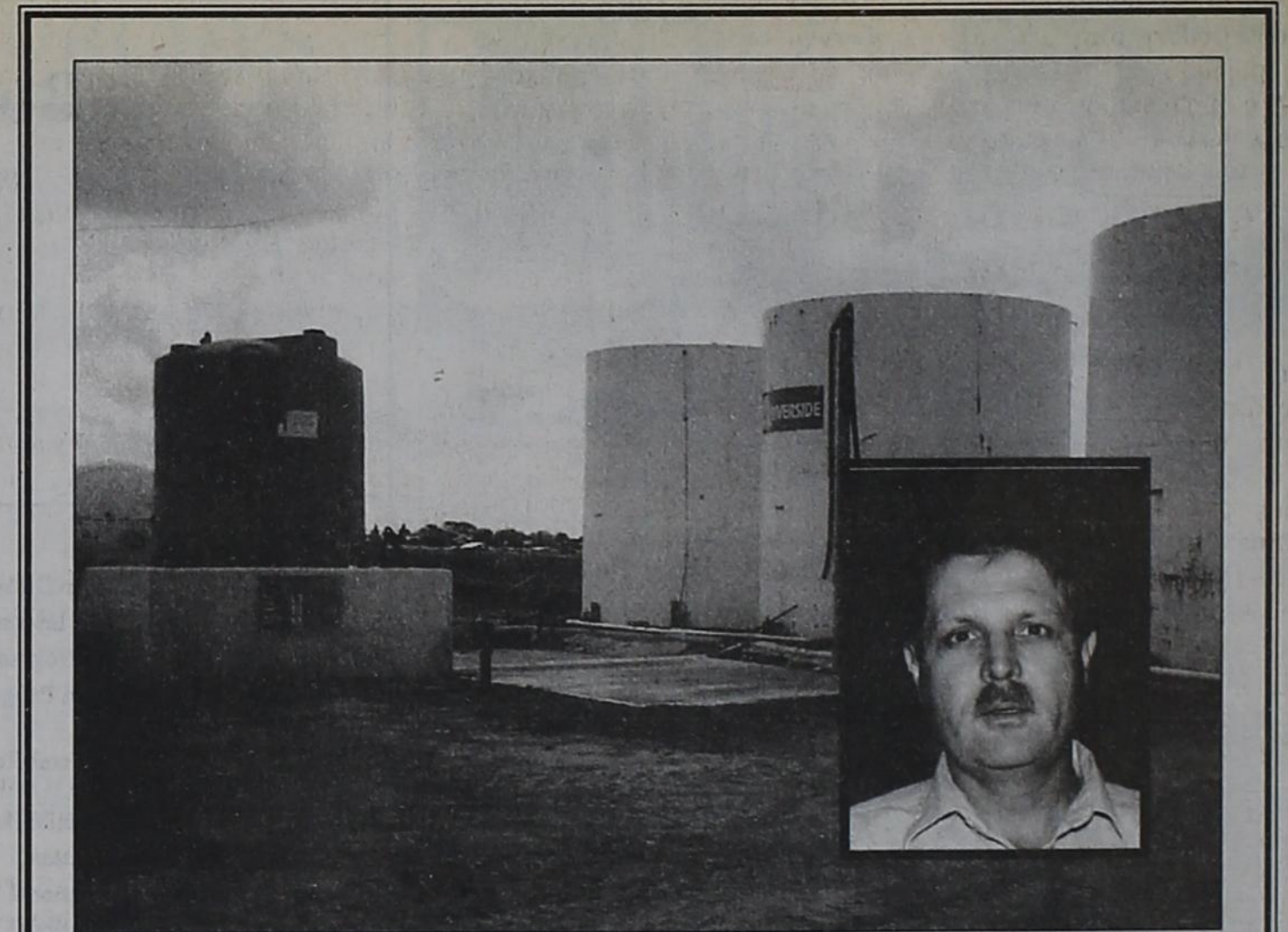
