AS A YOUNG editor, I had the good fortune of becoming acquainted with Ben Ezzell of Canadian. He was the type of editor and publisher we all aspired to be. Ezzell died last week following heart surgery, after an outstanding career as a weekly newspaper publisher.

Fairly early in our newspaper career, they elected me as president of the Panhandle Press Association. Ezzell was the longtime secretary of the regional press organization, so we had the opportunity of serving with him on the PPA board of directors for a few years, and that gave us the chance to know him a lot better.

Truth of the matter is--Ezzell WAS the Panhandle Press Assn., along with his wife Nancy, for a number of years. They spent countless hours making sure we had a convention, a program and a quarterly publication for members.

Still later, Ezzell and myself were invited by Governor Preston Smith to a dinner at the governor's mansion, for input for Smith's agenda. This was another highlight of our journalism career, particularly in light of the fact that Ezzell and I were among the only journalists from the Panhandle invited to the affair.

Ezzell was always my "father figure" in the business, although he probably never knew it. We were there last April when he was among the first five to be installed into the Panhandle Press Assn's Hall of Fame. At the time, it seemed as though Ben might continue to publish the Canadian Record, and "call them like he saw them" until he was a hundred. And he probably would have, except for his overworked heart.

Another friend, Mary Kate Zeman, mailed us a column this week by Red Gibson, journalism prof at the University of Texas. We felt that some of his remarks were appropriate in our remembrances of Ben Ezzell.

"Every metropolitan newspaper office contains one or a dozen people who dream of the quiet life of the weekly newspaper editor. They would like to swap their daily struggles and deadlines for the life of contemplation, the pleasure of thinking great thoughts of ennobling the citizenry with them.

"I know of no inoculation that would prevent the spread of this kind of thinking, but I have been around enough weekly newspaper people to know that a year on a weekly will cure the disease permanently. I still think editorship of a weekly ranks among the highest callings a man or woman can answer.

There may be a few country editors who spend a good deal of their time at the country club, but these bear little similarity to the sort of people who put out most of this country's weekly newspapers.

"Some 99.999 per cent of the nation's citizens think the editors can put out a first-class newspaper in four days, and spend the rest fishing. The few who think otherwise are the editors of the weeklies.

"Most non-weekly people think the small towns are just a miniature of the world. They believe the country editor spends most of his or her time wielding great power for the benefit of mankind within the county boundaries.

"They do not accept the idea that most country editors do the work of two people for less pay than a good carpenter takes home.

Myths continue, though. Journalism schools are full of people who want to reform the world. More power to them, and to the big city chaps who want to try their luck in the small town. But they should be forewarned that some of their myths are going to evaporate as the years go by."

Pat finally got to teach a real live "one grade" class for a half-year at Irving and that was the sixth


Jack and Pat then moved to Houston where Jack worked for NASA, training astronauts. While they were in Houston, they started their family.

Two Arrests Made For Burglaries

On January 5, Officer Saddler obtained arrest warrants for Fabian Baca of Bovina and John Baca of Portales, New Mexico.

Both men were charged with burglary of a habitation, which is a first degree felony.

After further investigation, Officer Saddler, on January 11, obtained another warrant on Fabian Baca for burglary of a habitation in connection with a second break-in. Johnny Baca was also arrested on this date for an attempted burglary.

At the time of his arrest, Fabian Baca was out of jail on bond for another burglary in Bovina, along with a burglary in Farwell and three more in Muleshoe. He is now in custody at the Parmer County Jail. Johnny Baca is out of jail after posting two \$10,000 bonds. These cases will be presented to the next Grand Jury which is expected to meet in February.

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Preparing Meals For One Or Two People

BY CARLA McKEOWN

I grew up in a family of five and learned to cook using my Mama's recipes which, of course, made at least five servings.

When I moved out on my own, it took me awhile to get used to cooking for just one person. It's a little easier now that I'm married-there are more recipes that make two servings than recipes that make only one serving. However, most recipes still are designed for four or more people.

A single person can try cutting the recipe in half. That works for some recipes; for example, the following recipe for Dessert Tortillas can easily be halved. But many recipes are not as accurate when halved.

Another option for someone cooking for one or two is to make a large-serving recipe and freeze several portions of the dish. A variety of leftover vegetables can often be mixed with some leftover meat for a soup, stew or casserole.

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


