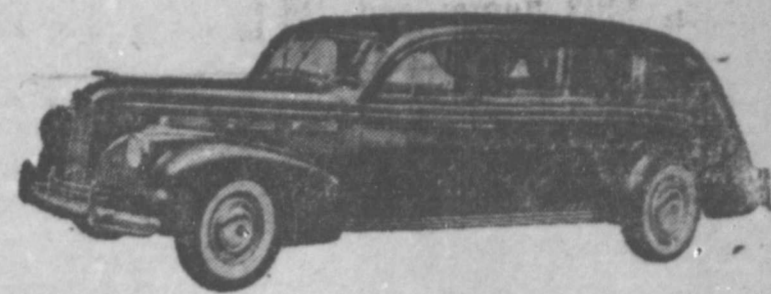

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

When making iron holders put in one layer of leather from an old glove, as it is a nonconductor of heat.

Lubricate the meat chopper and electric mixer with salad oil. This will prevent any disagreeable taste which might occur if regular lubricating oil were used.

Cottage cheese, mixed with orange marmalade, grape jelly or raspberry jam, makes a good filling for graham bread sandwiches. These combinations are tasty as well as nutritious.

Chiffon is easily washed in warm soapy water. Do not have the water hot, otherwise the color will wash out. Rinse it well in clear, warm water, fold smoothly and put through the clothes wringer. Avoid wringing with the hands. Open the chiffon out flat on the wrong side.

Glycerine will remove tea and coffee stains from table linen. Rub spots with glycerine and let stand a few minutes, then wash linen in the usual way.

Care must be taken to avoid opening the oven door for five minutes after the cake has been placed in the oven. When removing it or drawing it to the front to see if it is baked evenly, be very careful, as the least jar may cause the cake to lose its lightness.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS By Roger Shaw

Trouble Looms in Balkans as Russia Masses Troops on Rumanian Border; Nazi Air Raids on London Continue; Political Campaign Enters Final Stages

Reports from the Balkans indicate that Russian troops have massed on the Rumanian border and are keeping a watchful eye on the activities of Hitler's troops who have entered that country. This picture would bear out these facts for here is none other than that seldom photographed Deputy People's Commissar of Defense, Marshal S. Budenny (mustache), looking across the Russian border into Rumania from a Soviet observation post in the Odessa military district. Two army aides are shown with him.

THE WAR:

Boiling Balkans

Always a question mark in the intrigue of European politics, the Balkan states again are claiming their share of the world spotlight.

When Adolf Hitler's troops marched into Rumania to "protect" Rumanian oil fields and "train" Rumanian soldiers, military experts wondered what effect this would have on the attitude of Soviet Russia toward the axis powers. For Russia, too, is interested in Rumania. More than this Russia is vitally interested in an eastward expansion of the Hitler regime.

At first Berlin reported that Moscow knew and approved of this infiltration. Then news began to come in that the Soviet troops were on the march toward the Rumanian border. Two Rumanian patrol boats on the Danube were reported sunk by the Russians. In the strategic area around the mouth of the Danube both the German and Russian forces were reported to be speedily strengthening their military positions.

Just what Hitler's plans in the Balkans are remained, of course, a closely guarded military secret. There was much speculation centering around two possible motives in addition to the avowed aid in training Rumanian troops and the protection of the oil fields, so vital to the German war machine. These speculative motives were: (1) perhaps the axis powers were attempting to draw attention away from the British Isles in order to launch some sort of a surprise tactic against England, or (2) Germany was using the Balkan route for a march to drive the British out of the eastern Mediterranean regions.

CAMPAIGN:

Home Stretch

As the 1940 campaign entered its final stages it continued to follow the outline established following the major party conventions. Willkie continued to make most of the speeches for his party and Henry Wallace was the busiest political speaker of the Democratic party.

Willkie's speeches grew more vigorous as the campaign drew toward a close and Roosevelt's rare "political" appearances still possessed the same pattern of 1932 and 1936.

Public opinion polls came in for their share of the praise and abuse. When the Gallup poll showed that Candidate Roosevelt would more than likely carry the election, the Republicans countered with the Dunn survey, reputed to show Candidate Willkie out in front.

BIG FOUR:

No Like?

There was increasing talk of a vast four-sided alliance between the British Empire, the United States, Soviet Russia and the China of General-Dictator Chiang Kai-shek. It was intended to thwart the axis of Germany, Italy and Japan. Thus would the world's seven big powers line up, it was stated by some rail-birds.

The state department was undoubtedly wooing the Soviets, to counterbalance the rising sun of Nippon. Stalin liked the axis combine

no better than did Roosevelt. It was true, objectors said, that British investments in the Far East were 10 times as large as those of the Yankees, and that the Far East was 7,000 miles away, and that we were scheduled to get out of the Philippines anyway, and many Americans did not like Moscow at any price whatsoever.

Some of the British were pleased, but others were gravely worried. Some of them said that the more we pointed far eastward, the less we could do for the British Isles in time of stress, strain and the beating hammer of Thor. Certain military men grumbled about quarreling on two fronts at the same time—a basic army axiom, anywhere, any time. It was all on the knees of the gods—yellow, red, and white, alike.

DEFENSE:

Registration

First step in national conscription was completed with the registration of some 16,500,000 young men between the ages of 21 and 36. Reporting to more than 120,000 polling places throughout the country they listed personal information about themselves and now await the results of the lottery in Washington which will decide in what order they may be called into service.

PLANES:

Estimates

According to one conservative British estimator, the Germans have lost close to 6,500 planes in the second world war. This is a whale of an estimate. The planes would be worth around half a billion dollars, which is a lot of money, and in marks is astronomical.

Not only that. There was more to it. The same estimator estimated that the Germans had lost 13,500 pilots. Pilots are much harder to replace than mere airplanes, he they Messerschmitts, Heinkels, Junkers, or Dorniers. It was figured that the Germans had lost three times as many bombers (Heinkels, Junkers) as they had fighters (Messerschmitts made in Augsburg). Most of these planes had Mercedes-Benz motors, built in the old Zeppelin works on Lake Constance, at Mannheim, and Stuttgart. The Mercedes plants have been badly bombed by the royal air force.

Germany was supposed to have an air force of approximately 20,000 planes and 25,000-30,000 pilots. The sensational British figures were probably topheavy, as is usual in aerial warfare.

'Kinder'

Germany might have lost those 6,500 and 13,500, but the Londoners didn't take it to heart. The London county council advised all mothers, in its complete 29 areas, to evacuate themselves and their children in toto. In addition, everybody of 65 or over, and the infirm of body, were told to get out and stay out. These provisions had previously been applied only to the 14 worst local areas, and the spread-over to 29, made the whole matter "totalitarian." Health Minister Malcolm MacDonald, son of the late-lamented famous Ramsay, was in charge of the woman-child-aged-infirm trek to the sticks.

NAMES in the news . . .

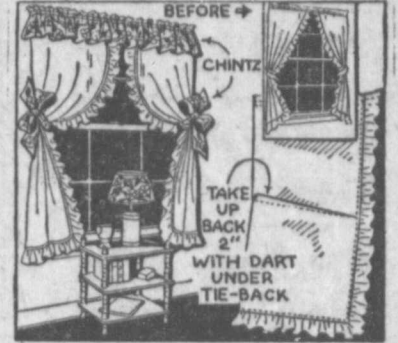

Tie-backs and valance were made of flowered chintz in rose and plum tones, lined with plain plum colored chintz. One yard of each kind of chintz was required for each window.

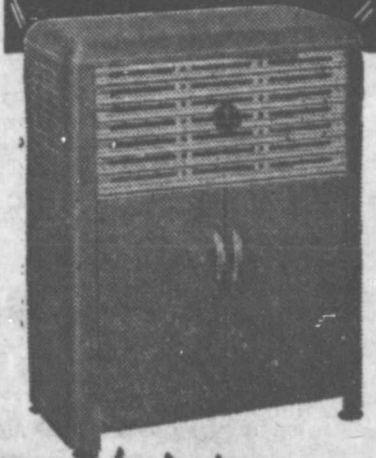

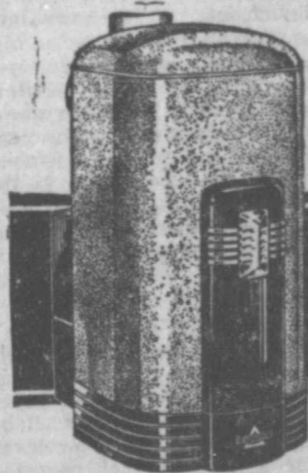

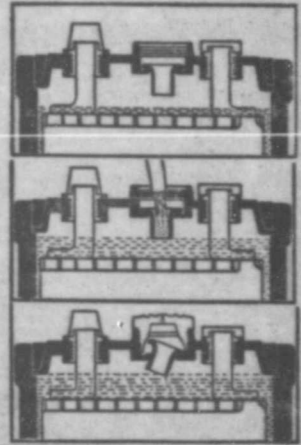

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

83 English Refugee Children Perish As Ship Is Torpedoed in Mid-Atlantic; Kidnaped of 3-Year-Old Lad Captured And Boy Returned, Unharmed, to Home

CRIME:

California Kidnaping

Three days after Marc de Tristan Jr.'s abductor seized him from the street near his home in Hillsborough, Calif., he was returned to his nobleman father, Count de Tristan, in San Francisco.

The child was rescued unharmed from the kidnaper, identified as Wilhelm Jakob Mühlenbroich, a 40-year-old German alien, by two woodsmen at Pine River, in the Sierra foothills 200 miles from Hillsborough.

For this elaborately plotted and boldly executed crime, the kidnaper, a German alien, received no \$100,000 as demanded in a beautifully phrased ransom note of 600 words, but he got a black eye, a

gashed head, a bruised body, and he faces almost certain imprisonment for life. The lumbermen, Cecil Wetzel and Ellis Woods, violently manhandled him when they found him and the child in an automobile on a dead-end road.

THE WAR:

Aerialistics

The British said it would take Hitler 40 years to wipe out London, at the present rate of progress. But at the same rate of progress, the German air force might be wiped out in 40 weeks.

For the first time, just the same, a funny thing happened. The British and Germans both admitted that the other side had outshot them. The British said they had lost at a ratio of 7 to 4. The Germans said they had lost at a ratio of 3 to 1. This was completely unprecedented, not only in the checkered annals of Anglo-German warfare in the clouds, but also in Sino-Japanese, Jap-Russian, and Spanish civil conflicts. Nobody could quite figure it out. It seemed peculiar.

The big question, which vexed the critics, was whether the Germans would actually try a land invasion of England this fall. There were all sorts of stories. The royal air force bombed alleged German troop concentrations along the channel coast, and in Norway. They damaged flat-boats and similar equipment. Whether this equipment was merely a blind, or not, remained to be seen.

There was a yarn that 200,000 Nazis were massed in Norway, for a drive across. Some critics declared that the light German tank had proved itself vulnerable to the two-pounder British anti-tank gun. This, they added, had caused Hitler to delay his invasion, and might postpone it indefinitely. That, again, remained to be seen.

NAMES

... in the news

☛ Elliott Roosevelt, son of the President, applied for a commission in the U. S. army air corps. He is 30 years old, and it was reported he might be assigned to the "specialist reserve."

☛ Mayor LaGuardia of New York city told a United States conference of burgomasters that the U. S. has an 80 per cent chance of escaping war, with the acquisition of the new Atlantic naval and air bases. The conference was held in N. Y.

☛ Martin ("Bugsy") Goldstein and Harry ("Pittsburgh Phil") Strauss were convicted of murder in the first degree for the Brooklyn, N. Y., murder-syndicate killing of Irving ("Faggy") Feinstein, a fellow mal-factor.

☛ Westminster cathedral got into the news. A Nazi dive-bomber just missed the dome, 284 feet high. It dropped a 250-pound bomb in the asphalt playground, adjoining Westminster cathedral is the Roman Catholic headquarters in England, a sort of rival to the Anglican (Episcopal) Westminster Abbey.

Just Kids

A very large number of the Nazi fliers up over England were young kids in their teens. They had been raised under the totalitarian system, and had the reckless fanaticism of utter youth. Their only enthusiasm was Hitler. They almost courted death. The Nazi regime seemed to be deliberately exploiting these amateur wild-men. Their bombs might also be termed: gifts to the school-children of London, from the high school boys of Berlin (or Breslau, or Augsburg, or whatever). No regime in history, said one historian, had ever sacrificed youth in this completely cold-blooded manner—that is, its own youth. The Goering flying circus might well be renamed the Goering suicide squad.

More Kids

The London press screamed "murder" at the announcement by the British government of the sinking of an English refugee ship with a toll of 293 persons, 83 of whom were children en route to Canada.

The ship, her name not disclosed, was torpedoed 600 miles west of England and sank in a stormy sea within 20 minutes after she was attacked.

Of 406 men, women, and children aboard, only 113 were brought back alive by a warship which reached the scene at dawn—almost eight hours after the torpedo struck. Stories of heroism and horror told by survivors of the disaster indicated that many lives were lost in the terrific explosion which ripped the vessel. Many others were swept from lifeboats or died of injuries and exposure.

The children were from 5 to 15 years old, and were the first lost in the child evacuation movements which have been under way ever since the war began.

The attacking submarine was not identified, but the tragedy was described by government officials as "another example of the barbarous methods associated with Nazi Germany."

CAMPAIGN:

Spirit of 1776-'40

The drums beat. The bugles blared, the fifes tooted, the crowds cheered, the urchins ducked in and out, while women fainted, and candidates kissed babies, and wrapped themselves in the old red, white and blue bunting. The electoral campaign of 1940 still was in progress.

The latest Gallup poll galloped all over Mr. Willkie's chances. It told the following sad tale—that is—for

the Grande Olde Partisans. According to Gallup, Roosevelt would get 37 states and 453 electoral votes. According to the same Mr. Gallup, Willkie would get 10 states and 78 electoral votes. This did not look any too encouraging for the Willkists. Said an old cynic: "This is one golf game where the caddies are going to beat the country-club members."

The Republicans, of course, failed to agree with this estimate. Sam Pryor, director of the eastern division of the Republican national committee, couldn't endorse the Gallup estimate. Pryor thought that Willkie would get 300 or more electoral votes, leaving Roosevelt with 231 or less. Pryor added that about two-thirds of the country editors were for Willkie, and that these editors conceded Willkie more than half of the popular votes in their editorial districts.

Etc., Etc.

Each side accused the other side of dictatorial ambitions. The Democrats said the Willkists were planning a "fascist" big-business dictatorship, while the Republicans said the Rooseveltians were scheming a personal sort of "war" dictatorship. Earl Browder wanted the dictatorship of the proletariat, and that left only Norman Thomas, whom one prominent literary critic described as a 1940 streamlined Jefferson. But nobody expected many votes for Mr. Thomas, and perhaps he didn't either.

Mrs. Chips



MRS. S. for his starring role in the motion picture, "Goodbye, Mr. Chips."

RUMANIA:

Transylvania

Rumania was settling down, under the anti-Carol dictatorship of Gen. John Antonescu, who had been locked up in a monastery until recently. Antonescu helped to chase Carol out of the country, with his hated, red-headed girl-pal Lupescu. Then it turned out that Carol and Lupescu were married, and had been since perhaps 1929. This news cheered the Mrs. Grundy's of the entire world.

Antonescu's new Rumania was pro-Nazi and anti-Jewish. It had lost about two-thirds of its territory: Bessarabia and Bukovina to Russia, Transylvania to Hungary, and the southern part of the Dubruja province to little Bulgaria. Antonescu didn't care for all this. The Rumanians accused the Hungarians of committing all sorts of atrocities in Transylvania province as they marched in. The Hungarian-Rumanian tension seemed scheduled to go on forever.

The Germans and Italians had forced Rumania to cede territory to Hungary and the Bulgarians. Now, the Rumanians began to talk about Germany and Italy forcing the Hungarians, etc., etc., to cede territory back to them. Meanwhile, Rumanian oil exports to Germany were soaring. The best high-test airplane gas comes from the Rumanian wells and today one can consider Rumania as General Goering's "kept" filling station.

CHALLENGE:

Duello

General Goering, flying chief of the Third Reich, was up over London in his own Junkers 88 bomber. Goering was the former commander of the Richthofen flying circus in the first world war, and an ace of great renown. Like many an old war horse, in the second world war he couldn't keep his hands off the controls. It was the first time, in a very long time, that a general led his own troops into battle.

Goering may be the black eagle of Germany. But Harlem—New York city's Negro section—has a black eagle, too. His august name is Col. Hubert Fauntleroy Julian. Julian had just finished reading Hitler's book, "Mein Kampf." Julian's blood boiled over, at Hitler's remarks on the colored race. This is what happened:

Colonel Julian issued a challenge to General Goering, to meet him in a single, solitary combat. The place was to be up over the English channel. The weapons were to be Messerschmitt planes. Colonel Julian inferred that General Goering was a "lousy 0 divided by 0." Goering was to have 30 days in which to accept the Julian challenge. The challenge itself read as follows:

"I therefore challenge and defy you, Herman Goering, as head of the Nazi air force, to meet me at 10,000 feet, to fight an aerial duel to avenge the cowardly insult to my race. Neutral correspondents must be the referees." Colonel Julian added that he would buy a Messerschmitt from the British government, which had two captured ones up for sale. Colonel Julian overlooked one detail. General Goering is probably too fat to get into a Messerschmitt.

Julian was Haile Selassie's only fier in the Ethiopian war.

BRITISH TROUBLE:

Egypt

The Italians came out of Tripoli-Libya, and started to invade Egypt, up the long coastline. Already, they had conquered British Somaliland down in East Africa. The British in Egypt were slowly retreating along the coast before Mussolini's Marshal Graziani.

The object of the Italian general command was to cut the Suez canal. This would sever the imperial life-line of England to India.

A Halloween party without decorations just isn't a party. They're little time to put them up; pumpkins, cornstalks, and lighted jack-o'-lanterns. nutmeats and whipped cream, and pour into the freezing container of an ice cream freezer, filling it not more than 3/4 full. Assemble and cover the freezer. Surround with a mixture of 3 parts of crushed ice to 1 part rock salt. Next turn the crank slowly and steadily until turning becomes difficult. When the mixture is frozen, carefully remove the dasher and pack down the cream with a spoon. Replace the cover, draw off the water, and replenish the ice and salt. Let stand for an hour.

Orange Sauce.
1 tablespoon cornstarch mixed with 1 tablespoon cold water
5 tablespoons sugar
5 tablespoons hot water
5 tablespoons orange juice
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon butter
Make a paste of the cornstarch and cold water. Add sugar and hot water and cook for 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Add fruit juices and butter.

Goblin's Dessert.
(Serves 4 to 5)
2 eggs (separated)
7 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon butter (melted)
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup orange juice
1 1/2 cups stale bread (cut in pieces)
Beat egg yolks until very light, and gradually beat in the sugar. Add butter, salt and orange juice. Pour over the cubed bread. Beat egg whites until stiff, and fold into the first mixture. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake in a moderately slow oven (325 degrees) for about 30 minutes.

Ginger Snap Pie Crust.
(Makes 2 crusts)
Make 3 cups ginger snap crumbs by rolling ginger snaps on bread board or crumbling through food chopper. Combine with 3/4 cup melted butter and blend lightly. Then press mixture into pie plate, shaping firmly all around, and place in refrigerator to chill until firm.

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie.
(Makes 2 pies)
3 tablespoons gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
8 eggs
2 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups strained pumpkin
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ginger
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1 cup whipping cream
Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Separate eggs and beat egg yolks. Then combine 1 cup of the sugar, the strained pumpkin, milk, salt, and spices with the egg yolks and cook slowly, stirring constantly, until thickened. Remove from fire, add gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool. When mixture begins to thicken, stir in the remaining cup of sugar and fold in the beaten egg whites. Pour filling in the chilled ginger snap pastry shells and chill in refrigerator until set. Before serving decorate pies with whipped cream faces, using chilled pastry tube.

1/2 teaspoon orange rind (grated)
1/2 cup pecan meats

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United Gas Pipe Line Co. To Protect Employees

Employees of United Gas Pipe Line Company and associated companies who enter the military service of the United States either by enlistment or selection under the National Guard and Selective Training and Service Acts of 1940, will receive three months pay, a year's leave of absence and other benefits, according to an announcement today by company officials.

Various other provisions which will protect employee's continuity of service, group insurance and other rights are embodied in the general statement of company policy. During the first three months that employees are in military service they will be paid their regular salaries, less the amount of their government pay.

The group insurance of each employee will be maintained in force by the companies during the entire period the employee is in military service and the companies will pay the employee's share of the premium after the first 90 days of service.

All regular employees of the companies are eligible for these benefits and at the conclusion of their service with the United States armed forces they will have an additional period of 40 days in which to apply for re-employment. Any employee so applying during the 40 day period will be reemployed at the same rate of pay he was receiving when he was inducted into military service and will be restored to his former position or to a relatively similar position, provided he is still qualified to perform the duties required.
