Tire Rationing Board

Members of the tire rationing board for Donley County were appointed last week by County Judge R. Y. King and Mayor T. F. Connally of Clarendon and Mayor Leon Reeves of Hedley. They are Ed Kinslow of Hedley, J. H. Bullis and Claude Lindsey of Clarendon.

The quota for Donley County was set at 16 tires and 18 tubes for cars, motorcycles and light trucks and 28 tires and 28 tubes for trucks and buses. Administration of the rationing plan will be under the direction of Washington certification of tire needs in the hands of local boards to be formed through cooperation of local defense councils and committees.

Tips On Conserving Tires

America's 27 million car owners can help their country conserve rubber by making their own tires last longer. In an appeal for cooperation of car owners the OPM listed 10 simple rules by which civilian requirements for rubber can be reduced.

1 Use tires as long as possible by having them retreaded. The cost is about half that of a new tire. Retread wear is about 80% of that of a new tire.

2 Inflate tires weekly. Never let pressure fall more than 2 lbs. below recommended minimums.

3 Reduce speed. Tires run at 40 miles per hour last twice as long as at 60 miles per hour.

4 Avoid short stops and jerk rabbit starts. They burn rubber.

5 Avoid hitting curbs, holes, rocks and bumps. That increases wear and encourages blowouts.

6 Check wheel alignment twice a year. A tire a half inch out of line drags sideways 87 feet per mile and causes uneven wear.

7 Repair cuts, leaks, breaks promptly. Delay increases damage. Use blowout patches only temporarily. Use vulcanizing.

8 Swap wheels around every 5,000 miles. Tires last longer.

9 Use only tires that fit your rims. Have your garage man advise you.

10 Cooperate to save rubber. Waste is sabotage. Don't speed around curves. Use your car only when essential. Use public transportation where possible. Team up with your neighbors to use fewer cars, make fewer trips. Help the merchants conserve, too, by carrying small bundles in stead of asking for delivery.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS By Edward C. Wayne

J. S. Forces Will Go to British Isles; Unified High Command in Pacific, Headed by British Veteran, Wavell, Plans Strategy of War Against Axis

BATTLE STATIONS: In Britain

As the new session of congress opened President Roosevelt in delivering his message on the state of the nation outlined extensive plans for the prosecution of the war and declared that U. S. "land, air and sea" forces would take up battle stations in the British Isles.

In addition, said the President, "Powerful and offensive actions must and will be taken at many points in the Far East . . . on all the oceans."

In the coming fiscal year the war against Hitlerism would cost the United States \$56,000,000,000, according to the President.

UNIFIED: High Command

Of primary importance, far overshadowing the loss of Manila or the Philippines, was the fact (1) that Churchill and Roosevelt had pledged a first-class effort in the southwest Pacific area, and (2) the formation of a group of 26 nations to prosecute the war to a successful conclusion and (3) the selection of a high command comprising British, Americans, Dutch and Chinese to carry on the southwest Pacific war against the Japs.

Gen. Sir Archibald Wavell was put in supreme command of the armies, navies and air forces. Admiral Thomas C. Hart was subcommander of the navies; Gen. George H. Brett of the air forces, and Gen. Sir Henry Pownall of the land armies.

This was the high command. Gen. Chiang Kai-shek's ability was recognized and part of the strategy revealed when he was asked to command an army that might at some time be placed in the field at the rear of the Japanese in Burma, Siam or Indo-China.

A glance at the map of the area showed one "life-line" well open to the Allied forces, and this included a line from Darwin in North Australia, along the coast of Sumatra and Java to the Strait of Malacca and thence to Singapore.

This left a fleet action the wide South Pacific on one flank, and not the island-dotted and treacherous waters of the China sea to navigate.

PHILIPPINES: Battle

General MacArthur's army of close to 100,000, mostly Filipinos and ill-equipped with air protection or striking force, finally had been forced back along prearranged lines to make their last stand in the hills and to fall back slowly on their best defensive fortresses to the north of Manila bay.

Few believed that it would produce anything but a delaying action, but many hoped that the final and apparently inevitable surrender might be delayed until the complexion of the war in the Far East might take a more favorable turn for the Allies.

It was conceded by most authorities, including the British, the Dutch, and observers in Washington, "armchair" generals for the most part, that there was scarcely a hope of the American-Filipino army triumphing.

But if the Japanese should find a heavy naval engagement on their hands, or if the battle in Malaya should turn against them, or if they found their supply-lines cut by an attack on their rear in Thailand or Indo-China, it was at least conceivable that the Philippine battle would turn the other way.

Sen. Connally of Texas had said, when Manila fell, "this is what military men have been telling us for 15 years would happen if we went to war with Japan. We don't like it, but it was bound to happen."

If there was any expedition for the relief or reinforcement of the Philippines, it was a closely guarded secret.

That there was activity was certain. That the navy was busy and hard at work also was certain.

But by the rules of wartime necessity the nature of that activity had not been revealed.

SINGAPORE: Delaying Action

The British forces in Malaya, though hurled back a long distance from the opening of the Japanese onslaught, were slowing down the enemy advance, and were fighting a delaying action of growing severity.

Though the general movement was southward toward Singapore, though Penang had been lost and Kuantan was tottering, there were certain hopeful indications that the tide might shortly be turned.

One of these was the increasing severity of Royal Air force attacks on the Japanese lines, especially on several southerly landing attempts that had been made. Another was the fact that the British artillery, as their positions began to draw closer to Singapore, began to find something to shoot at.

Weird descriptive stories had been told of Japanese swinging from tree to tree like undersized apes, getting behind the British lines and causing the fighting to become confused at times. There was less of this as the battle lines became better marked.

Late reports had told of one Japanese landing effort being balked by artillery fire alone, with one transport and four barges sunk and the others withdrawing.

Many felt that the arrival of a sizeable Allied fleet, and perhaps 100,000 first-class troops, together with a few hundred planes could easily turn the tide of battle in Malaya.

RUSSIANS: New Objective

The Russians, perhaps flushed with repeated victories after long defeats, perhaps in the calm realization that they had the Germans on the run, were setting a new and seemingly grandiose objective for the rest of the winter.

They would not be satisfied, they said, until the fighting was taking place on German soil before spring. They had a long way to go, but even with Hitler reported in personal command at Smolensk, only 90 miles from the nearest Russian troops, there were many evidences that large portions of the German army were in extremely precarious positions.

The recapture of Maloyaroslavets, a key point, the loss of which had been keenly felt by the Russians in the first place, was reported by them to have trapped in giant pincers 150,000 of the first-class Nazi fighters.

"Surrender or die" was the grim command of the Russians.

So much of an impression were the Russians making on England that many sources in London expressed the sober belief that a "third front" would be created on the continent in the spring if the Germans attempted a new offensive against Russia.

London had been studying the Russian technique of using to the fullest extent the disgruntled peoples in the conquered territories through which the Germans had been passing in their far flung drive toward Moscow and through the Crimea.

Back of the Germans were millions of murderously angry Russians, Poles, Czechs, Greeks. Every one of them, half-starved, beaten down, were only too ready to conduct guerrilla tactics against communication lines.

The British now pointed out that this same formula existed in much of western Europe. And they were planning to use it soon.

LIBYA:

Although delayed from time to time by bad weather, the British forces in Libya, under command of General Auchinleck, were keeping well abreast of the enemy, constantly in contact with him.

Prisoners piled up after the final completion of the conquest of Bardia, coastal town close to the Egyptian border, which had promised to become a "pocket of resistance" of as much trouble to the British as the Tobruk garrison had been to the German-Italian forces.

"Dumbo," Walt Disney's latest feature, has been voted one of the ten best pictures of the year in a nation-wide poll of junior film critics, conducted by the National Board of Review. "The Little Foxes" and "Citizen Kane" were also included.

"Paramount's going to make "Wake Island" an all-star picture; it is being written by W. R. Burnett, author of "Little Caesar" and "High Sierra," and was suggested, of course, by the gallant fight put up by the marines on the tiny Pacific outpost.

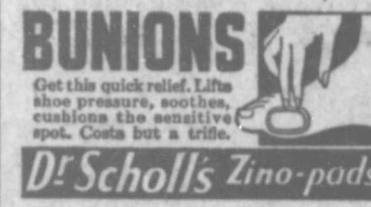

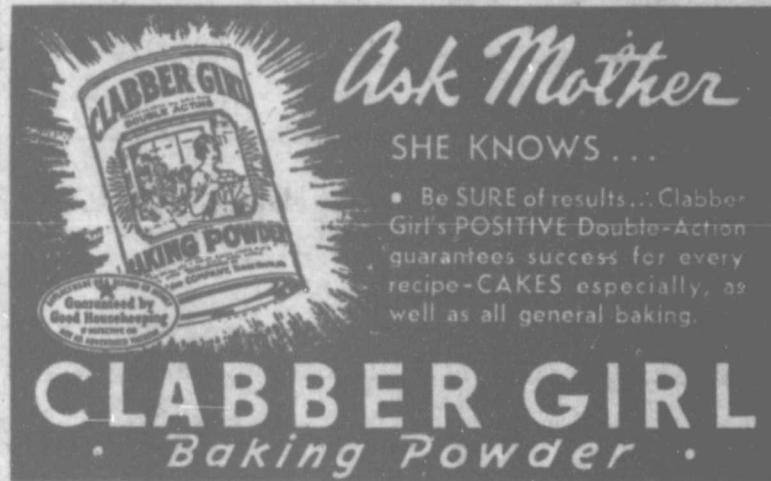

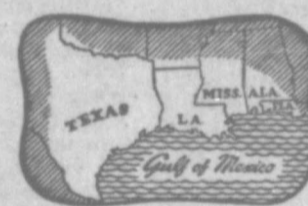

Invite the Club—Serve Apple-Banana Rings (See Recipes Below)

"Come over for dessert" has become one of the most popular ways of entertaining at luncheon or afternoon meetings of bridge or sewing clubs. Your guests will take a light snack at home and come over to your home for dessert only. Easy? Yes, and a very successful way of starting out your afternoon. So, take out your best recipes for dessert and let's go: Whatever you have must be attractive, so bring out your nicest dessert plates and doilies. First idea on our list today are these broiled Banana-Apple Rings which will polka-dot your table in dessert perfection:

*Broiled Banana-Apple Rings. (Serves 6) 1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup water, 2 apples, unpeeled, 3 firm bananas, Melted butter, Salt, Cinnamon

Bring sugar and water to a boil and cook until sugar is dissolved. Core apples and cut crosswise into three thick slices. Add to syrup and cook until tender, but firm. Remove from syrup and place on a broiler rack or pan. Cover apple slices with overlapping slices of bananas which have been peeled and sliced thin. Brush with butter and sprinkle with salt and cinnamon. Broil about 10 minutes or until bananas are brown and tender, easily pierced with a fork. Serve hot with sweetened, whipped cream.

To make your dessert party a double success, serve: Banana Oatmeal Cookies. (Makes 3 1/2 dozen) 1 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 3/4 cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup mashed bananas (2 or 3 bananas), 1 1/2 cup rolled oats, 1/4 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, soda, salt and spices. Add sugar gradually to shortening, beating and cream well. Add egg and beat well. Add bananas, rolled oats and nuts and mix thoroughly. Add flour mixture and blend. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto an ungreased cookie sheet about 1 1/2 inches apart. Bake in a moderately hot oven about 15 minutes. Remove from pans at once.

Simply elegant will be your guests' or family's verdict when you serve:

Orange Ice-Box Cake. (Serves 8) 1 tablespoon gelatine, 3 tablespoons cold water, 2 cups milk or 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1 teaspoon grated orange rind, 2 dozen lady fingers

Soak gelatine in cold water. Scald the milk in a double boiler, mix cornstarch and sugar, and add to hot milk. Add the eggs slightly beaten, combined with cold milk. Cook several minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from fire and add gelatine. Add orange rind and juice. Line a mold with lady fingers, then fill with alternate layers of the cooked mixture and lady fingers. Have a layer of lady fingers on top. Chill in refrigerator overnight. Serve with whipped cream, garnished with orange sections.

Piquant peppermint adds a never-to-be-forgotten flavor to chocolate, and served in quaint tarts, here's a dessert that will mark you as a leader in your crowd:

Chocolate Mint Tarts. (Serves 6) 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water, 3/4 cup sugar, 5 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 6 baked tart shells

Sweetened whipped cream, 3/4 cup crushed peppermint candy. Add chocolate to diluted milk in double boiler and heat until chocolate melts. Beat with rotary beater until chocolate is blended with milk. Combine sugar, flour and salt and add gradually to chocolate mixture. Cook until thick and smooth, about 15 minutes. Beat yolks and add to cooked mixture gradually. Cook two minutes longer. Remove from fire, add butter, vanilla and nuts. When cool, pour into tart shells. Top with whipped cream, mixed lightly with the crushed candy.

When planning your luncheon dessert parties, be sure to use this season's rich color schemes on your tables and favors and placecards. White with silver, gold, blue, red are tops right now. If you like three color combinations, there's green, white and gold, blue, white and gold, or white, red and green. For an elaborate color scheme use the rich tones of violet, emerald, gold, blue and red. This is especially good in a centerpiece. Bridge placecards may be made out of paper chrysanthemums in your favorite color with the card tilting out of the flower. The white cards may also be decorated with painted flowers, or candy-shaped flowers pasted in the corner. Evergreen, holly, mistletoe, bright berries, pine cones, used alone or with a silver ornament such as a bell on the place card are sure to bring delighted murmurs from your bridge guests.

Household Hints

Grapefruit and oranges will peel more easily if you soak them three minutes in boiling water to cover. That will make the membrane come off along with the skin. Then chill the fruit for use in salads, cocktails, or desserts.

If doors and drawers swell so much that they won't close, sandpaper or plane the edges, and then varnish the surface to prevent further swelling or shrinking.

If your vacuum cleaner has several attachments, make the best use of them. They come in handy for cleaning behind radiators, book cases and the refrigerator.

Here's a fine way to use leftover biscuits, muffins or rolls: Scoop out the insides, butter the case well and fill in with a thick cream vegetable, meat or chicken. For a creole version, spread the insides with chili sauce blended with butter. Quickly fill with piquant creamed shrimps or salmon. Bake 10 minutes in a moderately hot oven.

Try dipping the knife in boiling water before cutting cake or pie. The white part of orange and lemon rinds is usually bitter. So when grating use only the outside yellow part.

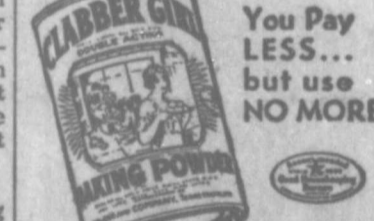

Housewarming Time

Soft, sweet, crusty rolls, a fruity coffee-cake, a plate of cookies, tempting sandwiches in crescent, diamond, circle or heart shapes, coffee, tea or cider from which to choose your drink—these form the basis of the refreshments for a housewarming. The event isn't lavish, it's simple, sincere and warm with friendliness for you've gathered to greet your friends in their new home.

Whether you've planned the housewarming as a surprise to the family in their new home, or whether you're inviting friends to an "at home" in your own home, keep everything as simple as possible. If you have many coming, ask some earlier and others later so the house

will never be too crowded. No entertainment need be planned for everyone will want to inspect the house or apartment and have a light snack before leaving perhaps.

Clever invitations can be sent out by using a miniature plan of the house, a rough drawing or silhouette of the house and writing the invitation inside or out as it best fits.

All refreshments can be placed on a table set simply with a plain cloth and attractive flowers. Teenage girls will enjoy helping at the table pouring coffee or tea and helping fill the trays of rolls and sandwiches as they're used.

Hot rolls with the smell of the oven still on them will spell a grand welcome, especially when your guests come in from frost-nipped outdoors:

***Sweet Bow Knot Rolls.**

- (Makes 2½ dozen)
- 1 cup milk
- ¼ cup butter
- ¼ cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cakes compressed yeast
- ¼ cup lukewarm water
- 2 eggs
- 4½ cups sifted flour (about)

Scald milk and pour over butter, sugar and salt. Crumble yeast into water to soften. Cool milk to lukewarm, add yeast, beaten eggs and 2 cups flour. Beat well. Add enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on a floured board and knead until smooth. Form into a ball and place in a greased bowl. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. When light, knead down and shape into long strands, 6 inches long, ½ inch in diameter. Tie these strands into a single looped knot. Place on greased baking sheet and let rise until doubled. Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven, 15 to 20 minutes. Brush with powdered sugar icing and sprinkle with chopped nuts.

***Honey Twists.**

(Makes 2½ dozen)
Use the same ingredients as in Sweet Bow Knot Rolls. Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk, add butter, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm and add enough flour to make a thick batter. Add yeast and eggs. Beat well and add more flour to make a soft dough. Place in a greased bowl and let rise until doubled. When light punch down and roll into small strands about 6 inches long, ½ inch in diameter. Coil into greased 2-inch muffin pans, beginning at the outer edge and covering the bottom. Brush with Honey Topping. Let rise until double in bulk and bake in a moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes.

Honey Topping.

- ¼ cup butter
- ¼ cup powdered sugar
- 1 egg white
- 2 tablespoons honey, warmed
- Cream all ingredients together

and brush over Twists before baking.

***Fruited Coffee Cake.**

- (Makes 1 large ring)
- 1 cake yeast
- ½ cup lukewarm potato water
- 6 cups flour, sifted
- 1 cup lukewarm water
- 1 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1 cup shortening or butter
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon nutmeg
- ¼ pound large raisins
- ¼ cup currants
- ¼ pound candied citron
- ½ pound candied lemon peel
- Soften yeast in potato water, add 1 cup flour and warm water. Let rise. Cut shortening into remaining flour, add remaining ingredients then combine with first mixture. Let rise until double. Shape into large, buttered ring or loaf and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven 1 hour. Frost with a powdered sugar icing and sprinkle with chopped or shredded nuts.

Here are some cookies that are as delightful as homespun. They're especially nice for housewarming because the recipe makes a large quantity and you won't be able to count consumption on them. The blending of fruits with spices makes this a popular cookie:

Cape Elizabeth Cookies.

- (Makes 3½ dozen medium)
- ½ cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 5 tablespoons milk
- 1½ cups flour
- 1 cup rolled oats
- ¼ teaspoon cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon allspice
- ½ cup pineapple cut into shreds, drained
- ½ cup walnuts, chopped
- ½ cup raisins
- 3 tablespoons grated orange rind
- Combine sugar and butter, add egg and milk, then dry ingredients. Last of all add the fruit and nuts. Drop by spoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven 8 minutes.

Here are some tempting sandwich combinations for the sandwich platter. Made in crescent, star, heart or triangle shapes they'll be one of the most popular numbers at the housewarming:

***Assorted Sandwiches.**

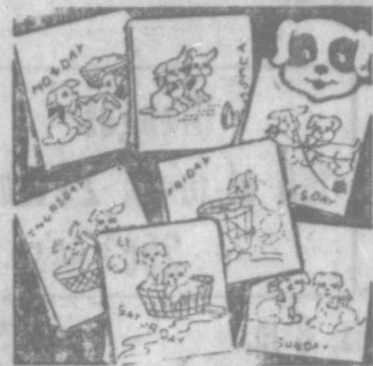
- Flaked tuna or salmon seasoned with mayonnaise, lemon juice, and butter.
- Mashed sardines, lemon juice, chili sauce.
- Mashed liverwurst with chili sauce.
- Peanut butter and chopped, cooked bacon.
- Cooked ham ground with sweet pickle, moistened with mayonnaise.
- Cream cheese with orange marmalade or cranberry jelly.
- Sliced American cheese, thinly sliced fried ham, mustard.
- Cream cheese and honey.
- Peanut butter, lemon juice and mashed banana.

LYNN SAYS:

Rolls in a variety of shapes are guaranteed to please the most fastidious family. Here's a list of favorite shapes to try out:
Knots: Twist and tie strip of dough into a knot.
Parker House: Roll dough ¼ inch thick, cut into rounds with biscuit cutter, dip in melted butter and fold in half. Place rolls close together in pan.
Crescents: Cut dough into triangle shapes, having dough at least four inches at wide end. Spread with butter, roll beginning at one corner. Pull ends to resemble a crescent.
Butterhorns: Cut dough in edge shapes, brush with butter, roll towards point.
Butter Flakes: Roll dough ¼ inch thick, brush with butter, cut in 2-inch strips. Stack strips 4 or 5 high, cut into 2-inch pieces and place in greased muffin tins cut side down.

The most gigantic sacrificial sabotage in world history was the destruction of Russia's Dnieper river dam by the Red army last August, says Collier's. This great hydroelectric project, which was completed in 1932, required five years to build and cost \$500,000,000.
