The election as President brought to an end a campaign since May for the office, and opened the door for a year of work for the Clyde youth. In filling the office, he will skip a year of college and travel over the State and Nation representing State FFA officers and Texas FFA. His work will begin immediately, as he left Sunday for a conference in Washington, D. C.

He plans to begin visiting FFA chapters around the State in September. Texas has the largest FFA organization in the nation and is the only State where a president stays out of school a year.

FORMER CHAPLAIN RESIDES IN CLYDE NURSING HOME

CLYDE — Robert Neal Greer, former Chaplain of the Texas Department of Correction, now resides in the Clyde Nursing Home. He was born in 1891, in Elkins Texas.

While Chaplain, Mr. Greer witnessed many executions but also saw many men and women leave prison to become useful citizens. His days there were therefore sad and rewarding.

Mr. Greer was first inspired to preach following a revival meeting he attended when he was 19 years old. After that he raised the money necessary for his education by doing everything from literally digging ditches to driving mule teams. But he married the girl of his dreams, and went on to graduate from the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, acting as pastor and serving as public school teacher and superintendent.

During World War II he served as Army Chaplain, after attending School at Harvard University.

At 60, he added another degree to his list, that of Master of Arts. Soon after that he became professor of Bible and Philosophy at Howard Payne College.

ught and prayer on both his and his wife's part that he decided to become assistant Chaplain at the Texas Department of Correction. Within a short time he became Chaplain, and served in that capacity for eight years.

Even after retiring, Mr. Greer continued to actively participate as a preacher and frequent guest lecturer and speaker.

Mr. Greer has one daughter, and he now resides in the Clyde Nursing Home.

JUNIOR RODEO OPENS 4-DAY RUN WEDNESDAY

\$1,500 DONATED FOR NEW FIRE TRUCK - MORE NEEDED

BAIRD — Members of Baird Volunteer Fire Dept. are beginning a project which, when completed, will provide a new fire truck to replace well-worn equipment now being used, at about half the normal cost of

a new truck. Firemen plan to build the new piece of equipment themselves, starting with a new 2 1/2 ton, 5 speed truck chassis, which they will purchase, and adding a 1,000 gallon tank, pressure pumps, nozzles and other necessary gear.

Total cost of the truck is estimated at about \$5,500. The Fire Department has donated \$500 and the City of Baird \$1,000 toward the cost of the truck. The remainder of the money is expected to come from donations by citizens who will benefit from its use.

Since the truck will be used for both City and rural fire control, everyone in Baird and the surrounding area is urged to give the Fire Department all the financial assistance they can so that this worthwhile project may be completed as soon as possible.

City Issues Warning Here

BAIRD — A warning is hereby issued to parents of and/or minors that the City Water Utility Plant, located near the T&P Lake dam, must not be used as a play ground.

Youngsters have been climbing the chain-link fence surrounding the plant and riding the trickling filter, a four-arm device used to aerate water, which is a very dangerous practice. Also extremely dangerous are gasses used there, (Chlorine or Methane, either of which would be fatal if they should breath it) high voltage electrical lines, and the possibility of drowning in the 30-foot deep tanks used for purification.

Besides the possibility of some child being killed or severely injured, damage to the plant is also occurring from objects thrown in the final clarifier, and the breaking of equipment.

Please protect your youngsters life, and help maintain the utility plant in proper working order, by insisting that he stay outside the fence when in the vicinity of the plant.

The peak of water flow through the filter plant for one day reached an all-time high of 830,000 gallons, and a 24-hour hour run of electricity reached 27,400 kw.

not the only ones suffering from dry hot weather, as it has caused residential customers to use more water and electricity than any previous month.

Living comfortably and maintaining pretty lawns has become rather expensive, and power companies elsewhere are having difficulty in providing sufficient load to meet normal demands.

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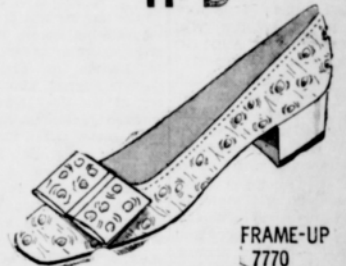
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Lawrence Clayton Due Second Master's

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association of Gorman, Texas proposes a referendum election of September 24, 1969, under provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature on the proposition of whether or not peanut producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of \$1.00 per net ton (farmers stock basis) to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 9-man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of peanuts.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Gorman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced peanuts for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to September 9, 1969, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office. 30-3-c

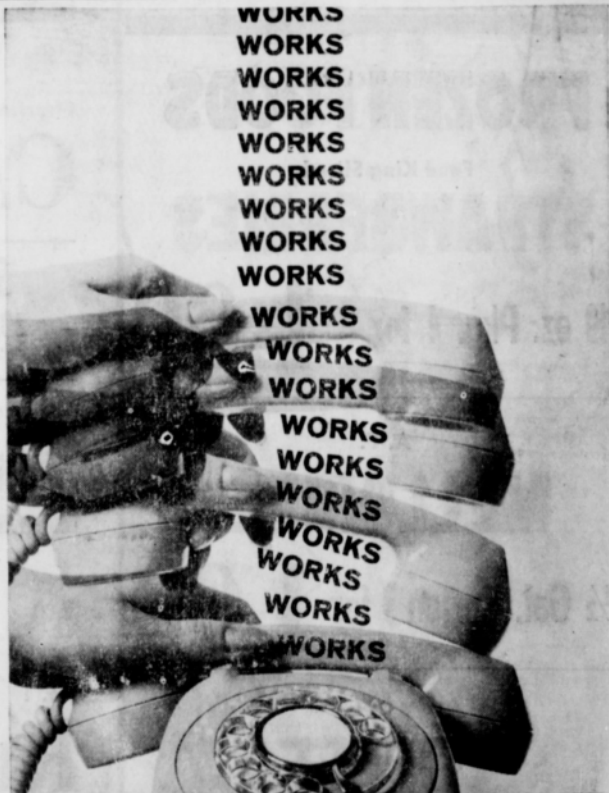
