O. O. Hill will give the Test V. 12 for candidates for Army and Navy training program at the High School April 2nd. This will give young men a chance to receive beneficial training at the expense of the government. All young men from 18 to 22 should be interested.

The school census reveals that Hedley will have more scholastics this year than last. Several families have been lost but more have come to the district.

The Junior play will be given April 16. Parts have been assigned and rehearsing time scheduled.

Hedley High School had 100% attendance at the annual State Teachers' convention at Amarillo last week.

Four H Clubs will be organized at the Hedley High School April 2nd. Plans will be made for Victory gardens and many special projects. Mr. Broedlove, our County Agent will be here to assist. Boys and girls interested in the work are asked to be thinking of the projects in which they are most interested.

New soft ball and baseball equipment has been bought for the school and spring training has begun. Volley ball nets have been placed for both grade and high schools.

The scrap collected by the school last fall has disappeared this week. Car bodies and other sheet metal have been processed and shipped to parts unknown for part of our war effort. Hedley schools will now begin their jeep campaign. We plan to buy enough jeeps to buy three jeeps. This will give us as high a percentage of jeep buying as any other school in the county.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

**New Ration Orders Assure Healthy Diet; Nazi's Kharkov Offensive Recalls Drive That Preceded Collapse in World War I; Congress Ponders Postwar Security Plan**

**WAR PROGRAM: Centralization Needed**

Like doctors in a clinic, members of the Senate's Truman investigating committee gave the progress of the war program a thorough examination and emerged with three basic reasons for "nearly all the failures and shortcomings" found.

First reason was "inadequate over-all planning within government agencies at the beginning of the various programs"; second was "conflicting authority over various phases of the war program"; and third, "hesitancy of the government to adopt unpopular or unpleasant policies long after the facts indicated such policies were necessary."

In recommending corrections, the committee called for clearly defined authority, centralized in a few officials, during the coming year. Incidentally, the committee warned that the year ahead would be the toughest and grimmest in U. S. history.

**RATIONING: Healthy Diet Sure**

Americans tightened their belts in anticipation of the slimmer portions of meat, canned fish, butter, cheese and edible fats in the new rationing regulations effective March 29 would impose.

To those who for months had been following the Food Administration's request to ration themselves voluntarily, the new estimated ration of about two pounds weekly of meat per person "more or less" represented only a slight shift downward. Still unrationed as the orders went into effect were poultry, fresh fish and such rarely used meats as rabbit and other game. The new rationing orders had been accompanied by the heartening news that commodities would be more plentiful, with one pound every five instead of six weeks, and that point values on dry beans and peas had been lowered.

Things considered, the new regulations would reduce consumption of the foods they covered by from 12 to 15 per cent. That supplies assured a healthy diet was emphasized by Food Administrator Wickard. Estimates indicated that 1943 per capita civilian supplies of meat, cheese, fats and other commodities would be about equal to the average for 1935-39.

**NORTH AFRICA: Axis Hopes Dimmer**

Boled up in the Mareth line after having received a punishing beating Nazi Marshal Rommel has had to face the consequences of being routed in by an Allied line of steel.

That those consequences were to be serious and might even reach the disastrous proportions of a defeat recalling the Axis rout at Stalingrad was the opinion of seasoned observers.

Faced by the increasing strength of General Montgomery's British 8th army and by the reinforced and battle-seasoned American forces of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, Rommel and his cohort, Col. Gen. Von Arnim, had their work cut out for them.

**NAZI OFFENSIVE: Same Result as '18?**

Military historians were drawing parallels between the latest German offensive whose initial operations had hurled the Russians back in the Kharkov area, and the historic Ludendorff-Hindenburg offensive in July, 1918, which preceded Germany's final collapse.

As in World War I, this new offensive was undertaken after weeks of costly defeat. A major victory now was urgently needed—the same as 25 years ago, if the military gains resulting from invasion were to be held.

Whether the final result this time would be as rapid as before, time alone would tell. But it was clear that the Nazis had thrown in superior forces and equipment in a gamble to prevent a complete loss of their conquests.

Further north the picture was different. The fall of Vyazma had clearly proved that Nazi pressure on the Kharkov front did not prevent the Russians from continuing their advances toward Smolensk. With Vyazma and Rzhev gone, the main bastions protecting Smolensk from the east were now in Russian hands.

**FARM DEBTS: Repayment Rapid**

How farmers are using their war-expanded income to set their financial house in order was indicated by a department of agriculture report showing that more than 100,000 farmer-borrowers from the 12 Federal Land Banks had repaid their loans in full in 1942.

A total of \$303,000,000 was repaid by all farmers during the year and in addition they deposited \$21,239,169 to be used in paying future installments on land bank and commissioner loans.

The demand for new farm mortgages was about 22 per cent less in the last six months of 1942 than in the corresponding period of 1941.

**CRADLE TO GRAVE: Security Plan Proposed**

A postwar economy in the United States in which "freedom from want" would be translated from a pious theory to an operating reality was envisioned in a revolutionary social security plan drawn up by the National Resources Planning board and laid before congress by President Roosevelt.

Stating that it should be the declared policy of this government "not only to promote and maintain a high level of national production and consumption," the board's report urged:

1—Guarantee of a job for every man released from the armed forces and war industry after the war's conclusion, with fair pay and working conditions; 2—Government underwriting of full employment for all employables.

Among other recommendations were plans for joint private-government partnerships in various post-war industries; creation of a national unemployment compensation fund; increased old age benefits; expanded public works programs.

HIGHLIGHTS . . . in the week's news

**CANBERRA:** Diplomatic relations between Australia and Russia were brought closer together when Lord Gowrie, governor general of the commonwealth, received the credentials of the new Soviet minister, M. Vlasov. Lord Gowrie told the new envoy that "both our peoples are encouraged by the knowledge they are fighting for the preservation of the world in the same way."

**ANKARA:** The elevation of Col. Gen. Rudolph Hasse to the post of commander in chief of German forces in Greece, Thrace and the Aegean area was reported here. He succeeds General Stuntz who was reported to have died in a railway accident in Bulgaria in which sabotage was suspected. Hasse was described as a close friend of prominent German military leaders.

**TAX PLANS: Rumor Revived**

Like the cat with nine lives, the Rumor plan to skip a tax year and put America's 44,000,000 taxpayers on a pay-as-you-go basis, was hard to kill.

Even though the house ways and means committee had approved a plan imposing a 20 per cent withholding levy from pay envelopes effective July 1 and making "pay-as-you-go" optional with each taxpayer, proponents of the Rumor plan, principally in the ranks of the Republican minority, had ranged themselves solidly behind a bill embracing the Rumor principles.

Sponsors of the house ways and means committee's tax program pointed out that the withholding levy would not be a straight 20 per cent deduction against wages and salaries, but against the portions of such earnings remaining after deductions were made on the basis of dependents. The levy would not be an additional tax, but merely a means of collecting actual taxes through wage and salary deductions.

**LEND-LEASE: Diplomacy Weapon**

Predictions that lend-lease shipments in the coming year would dwarf all previous records and that Uncle Sam would use it more and more as a means of obtaining agreements with nations receiving it for postwar security, were voiced by Washington observers, after the house and senate had approved extension of lend-lease for another year.

What eventual payment this nation will seek for its wartime aid to its allies and friendly neutrals remained to be seen. Two major principles were involved, however. One was the promotion of a stable economic situation throughout the world after the war. The other was the necessity of America obtaining additional naval and air bases to help prevent a recurrence of Axis aggression.

A report to congress by Edward R. Stettinius Jr., lend-lease administrator, disclosed that aid extended by the United States under the act aggregated \$9,632,000,000 in its first two years of operation. Mr. Stettinius reported Russia was allotted 29 per cent of all lend-lease shipments last year, including half of all tanks shipped and 40 per cent of all tactical planes.

**CHINA AIR FORCE: Victory for Mme. Chiang**

The labors of Madame Chiang Kai-shek had not been in vain. One of the first fruits of her American visit and Washington conferences was the creation of a full-fledged U. S. air force command in China.

Hailed as the fulfillment of long-deferred Chinese hopes this move indicated a sizable expansion of

American air power in the China war theater and a new phase in the war against Japan.

Under the new arrangement the newly activated 14th U. S. air force under command of Brig. Gen. Claire L. Chennault replaced the former China Air Task force. Famous as the trainer of the "Flying Tigers" which scoured Jap air invaders, Chennault with augmented manpower and planes would now be able to expand his operations greatly.

**FRANCE: Patriots Fight**

As repressive measures by the Nazis had failed to halt the underground revolt by French patriots against conscription into German slave legions, it became clear that this movement was well organized and had the leadership of key men in General De Gaulle's Fighting French forces.

As hundreds of thousands of youths were reported fleeing from their homes to escape conscription, the fare-up of anti-Nazi sabotage and terrorism resulted in the wrecking of German troop trains, the killing of Axis soldiers and attempts to assassinate pro-Nazi French leaders.

**PACIFIC FRONT**

Over widely scattered fronts in the East, Allied forces continued their battles against the Japanese. One major action in the Pacific area was reported from China's capital, Chungking, where it was announced that the Chinese had driven the Japs back toward the Burma frontier toward Tung-yueh in the Salween river area.

In the Solomon Islands area, American dive bombers continued their attacks on Japanese-held Munda,

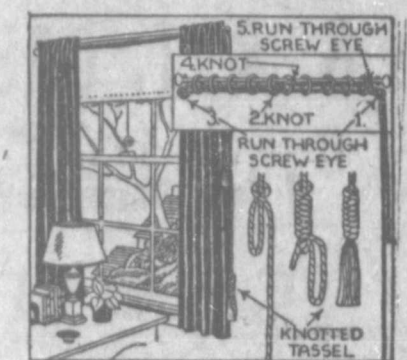

**Here's Easy Way to Make Draw Curtains**

IT IS easy to make draw curtains with the fixtures you have, plus a pair of large screw-eyes, some wood or brass rings, and about five yards of cord.

The screw-eyes are placed just under the hooks for the curtain rods; then run the cord through the screw-eye at the right; then through the rings, knotting it to the left ring at center; then



through the rings and the screw-eye at the left; and back through the rings, knotting it to the right ring at center.

Now pass the cord through the rings and the right screw-eye and then make the tassels, raveling the ends of the cord after making the knots. Sew safety pins to the back of the curtains so that they may be fastened quickly to the rings.

### Rationing At A Glance

**SUGAR**—Stamp No. 12 in Book No. 1 good for five pounds from March 16 until midnight March 31.

**COFFEE**—Stamp No. 26 in Book No. 1 (or those 14 or older on the date the book was issued) good for 1 pound until midnight April 25.

**SHOES**—Stamp No. 17 in Book No. 1 good for one pair of shoes through June 15.

**MEAT, EDIBLE FATS and OILS** (including butter), **CHEESES, CANNED FISH**—Red stamps in War Ration Book 2 will be used beginning March 23. Each holder of Book 2 will need 16 points per week in first month. Red stamps will become valid and will expire as follows: Week beginning March 29, A stamps worth (16 points) expire April 30; Week beginning April 5, B stamps (16 points) expire April 30; week beginning April 11, C stamp (16 points) expires April 30; week beginning April 18, D stamps (16 points) expire April 30; and week beginning April 25, E stamp (16 points) expires as date first war rationed.

**PROCESSED FOODS**—Blue A, B, and C stamps (48 points) in War Ration Book 2 good for purchase of rationed processed foods until midnight, March 31. **GASOLINE**—Value of each coupon in A, B and C books is 4 gallons. Second B coupons in A book are good until midnight March 21, 1943. Third B coupons in A book good from March 22 to midnight May 21, 1943. Those who think they are eligible for supplemental rations should see their local ration board.

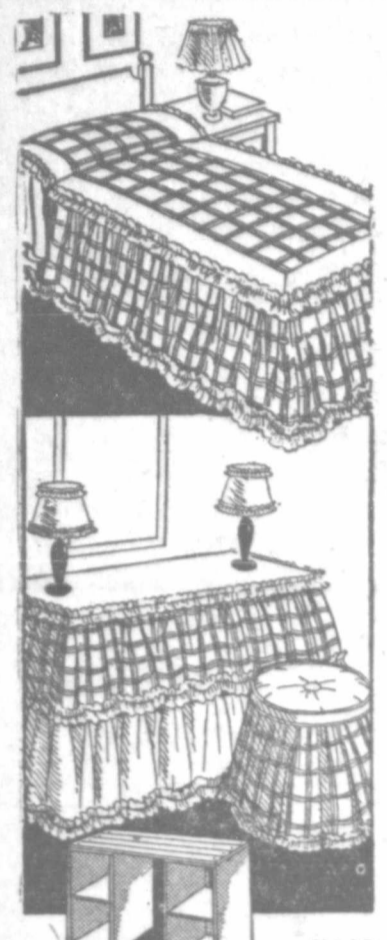

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Allied Command Moves to Clear Africa And Secure Control of Mediterranean; Hitler Decrees Added Nazi Sacrifices In Effort to Bolster Failing Manpower

TUNISIA: Activities Stepped Up

Indications that the long awaited offensive to drive the Axis out of North Africa might be near, were seen in reports of the recapture of several central Tunisian positions with which the enemy had sought to form a line of protection for the flanks of Marshal Rommel's army retreating into Tunisia from Libya.

Conferences of top American and British military chiefs in Casablanca even after the departure of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill had emphasized the importance of the next Allied moves.

Lieut. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's American forces had driven the Germans back from six to nine miles in the Masetta Valley and had pressed steadily toward a pass through which Rommel's troops must pass in their effort to join German Gen. Von Arnim's army.

Rommel's widely strung out rear guard has been constantly under attack by General Montgomery's British Eighth army.

One of the heartening features of the American activity was that this drive has recaptured several positions of tactical importance previously lost by the French when German armored units had smashed through their lines.

AIR BLOWS: By 'All-American' Team

Ominously prophetic of more and deadlier blows at the heart of German industries and naval bases were the first "All-American" daylight bombing attacks in which swarms of unescorted Flying Fortresses and Liberators smashed at the naval base of Wilhelmshaven and industrial installations at Emden.

While three of the unescorted American bombers were lost on the Wilhelmshaven-Emden raids, United States headquarters said that a "number" of enemy planes were destroyed.

Hitler's northern flank was given a pounding when the shipyards in Copenhagen, Denmark, hitherto unscathed, were bombed by the RAF. The principal targets of this raid were U-boat engine factories which are working for Germany.

RUSSIA: Cause for Rejoicing

With President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill's joint note in his hands promising decisive blows to the West, "Uncle Joe" Stalin could look with considerable satisfaction on affairs in the East.

How well the Russian offensives were going was indicated by a steady parade of Soviet communiqués reporting successes all along the line. The Red army had driven forward to within 60 miles of Rostov, with the recapture of the railroad towns of Ataman and Yegorlyk. To the north, the Ukrainian offensive westward from captured Voronezh had pressed on to within 30 miles of the big Nazi base of Kursk, with the recapture of Gorsehechnoye.

The Russian Stalingrad trap had closed its jaws on all but a few scattered remnants of the Axis divisions of 200,000 men who had besieged that industrial stronghold.

HITLER: Produce or Die

Significant of even sterner measures ahead on the Nazi home front was Adolf Hitler's decree imposing compulsory labor service on all German men from 16 to 65 and all women from 17 to 45 and hinting the death penalty awaited slackers.

Observers who had been puzzled for weeks over Nazi radio propaganda stressing the seriousness of the military situation in Russia now readily saw that this device had been employed to prepare the German people for new sacrifices of a most bitter and stringent nature.

Clearly Hitler was trying desperately to solve his manpower problem. Allied military experts estimated Germany must recruit at least 1,000,000 new men to fill the gaps in her army.

DRAFT CALL: Faces Fathers in '43

Evidence mounted that the drafting of married men with children would be under way before the end of 1943, following the U. S. high command's announcement that the nation's armed forces would total 10,420,000 this year.

Observers recalled a statement some time ago by Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service chief, indicating that the supply of childless married men would last only about 10 months. The statement inferred that drafting of men with children would begin around next October if 10,000,000 or more were to be called without drafting 18 and 19 year olds.

Since General Hershey spoke, the minimum draft age has been lowered to include those age brackets, but the gain thus made in the number of draft eligibles has been offset by deferment of all men 38 years or older, apparently reinstating his forecast.

NAZI PEACE: Offensive Is Nipped

As political observers viewed in perspective President Roosevelt's historic North Africa conference with Prime Minister Churchill, the conviction grew that one of the most significant but unheralded results of that meeting was the forestalling of a prospective new German peace offensive.

For several months it had been evident in world chancelleries that Hitler would offer a compromise peace as part of his 1943 plans. Reports had indicated that the proposals would be made through non-belligerent Spain and would include an offer to withdraw from Western Europe while still retaining territories occupied in Poland, Russia and the Balkans.

In the light of these disclosures the Casablanca declaration that the Allied nations would be satisfied with nothing short of the unconditional surrender of Germany, Italy and Japan, definitely destroyed this spurious peace offensive.

President Roosevelt's visit with President Vargas of Brazil at Natal, en route home, was significant of the solidarity of South America's adherence to the Allies. Observers believed Axis peace moves would make no dent in Latin America, even if made through still-neutral Argentina.

SOUTH PACIFIC: Jap Casualties Heavy

From New Guinea came Gen. Douglas MacArthur's consoling announcement that American casualties in the victorious Papuan campaign were less than half the Japanese losses. Previous statements had said that a Japanese Papuan army of 15,000 had been wiped out. This indicated American casualties might have totaled 7,000, including those incapacitated by sickness.

As General MacArthur consolidated his forces for the drive to clear the enemy out of the rest of New Guinea, military activity was limited to continuous bombing of enemy bases. The raids included a heavy concentration on Lae, which is expected to be the next target of MacArthur's offensive operations.

The navy department disclosed that a new Jap air base established within easy raiding distance of Guadalcanal in the Solomons had been strongly attacked by American bombers. The new Jap airfield is on Ballale island, about 300 miles northwest of Henderson airfield on Guadalcanal.

The navy likewise announced that in air action over Wake island, a number of Jap Zero planes had been shot down, while all United States aircraft had returned safely to their fields.

CORN GROWERS: Reap Big Benefits

Corn belt farmers and western wheat growers will get the lion's share of the \$595,500,000 in benefit payments to be distributed among growers for complying with last year's federal crop control programs, it was indicated in a preliminary report of the department of agriculture on 1942 farm subsidies.

Southern cotton farmers will get the smallest amount since 1936, largely because of the improved price position of this crop.

The department's figures disclosed that payments to wheat farmers will total \$133,477,000, compared with \$107,353 for the 1941 crop. Corn payments will amount to \$188,219,000, which is the record for that crop. Payments on the 1941 crop totaled \$130,186,000.

Cotton payments for 1942 will amount to about \$78,533,000, compared with \$194,957,000 in 1941 and a peak of \$238,595,000 for the 1933 crop. Until the 1942 crop year, cotton payments exceeded those for any other commodity.

YANKEE FOOD: Aids Russ Offensive

That American lend-lease food shipments have helped the Russian armies deal their deadly blows to Hitler's Nazi legions was revealed by Claude R. Wickard, secretary of agriculture.

Food shipments to Russia which rose sharply as the winter offensive progressed went directly to the Red

army, Wickard disclosed. "In December, for the first time," he declared in a report to the war council of the National-American Wholesale Grocers association in Chicago, "shipments to Russia were larger than the combined shipments to the United Kingdom and other British destinations."

Discussing the 1943 outlook, Mr. Wickard said that "our armed forces and those of our Allies will require almost a quarter of all the food we produce."

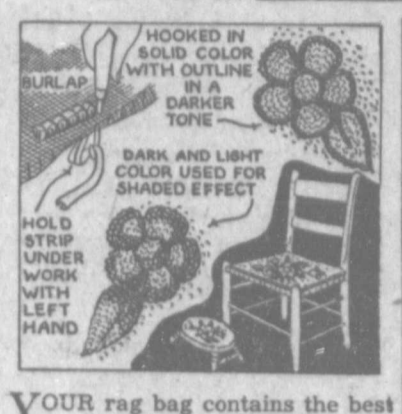
RUBBER PROGRAM: Green Light on 55%

While a house of representatives naval committee ordered an investigation of charges made by Rubber Administrator William M. Jeffers that "army and navy loafers" were interfering with war production, WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson disclosed that he had directed that 55 per cent of the synthetic rubber program for which Mr. Jeffers has been battling vigorously be carried through "as rapidly as possible."

In testimony before the senate rubber investigating committee, Mr. Nelson defended his curtailment of the rubber administration's demands and declared he was aiding Jeffers as much as possible without serious interference with other urgent war production.

The 55 per cent rubber plant construction program means that 25 synthetic rubber plants will be completed as early as possible, the WPB chairman indicated. Mr. Jeffers had been fighting for that way for

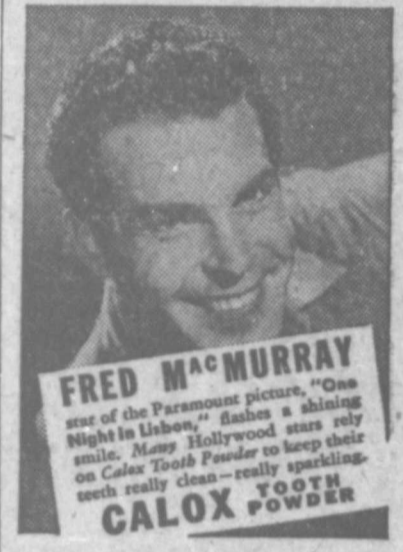

## SNAPPY FACTS ABOUT RUBBER

Indians of the Amazon River region made the first rubber shoes, which were imported into the U. S. in 1800.

Mistakes of many kinds are cut into the rubber conservation program, as is indicated by the fact that annually 150,000 pounds of rubber was used annually in the manufacture of pencil mark-erasers.

Before vulcanization was discovered in 1829 rubber goods hardened in hot water and melted in summer. Early rubber goods manufacturers suffered severe financial losses because of the unreliability of their products. That was many years ago.

A check of the tires on 800 vehicles recently disclosed that 80% were under-inflated, even to the extent of from 10 to 15 pounds. This is a heavy waste of rubber because it has been found that 50 per cent under-inflation permits the return of only 74 per cent of the mileage built into a tire.

## Household Hints

Gold-trimmed china needs special care if the beauty of the gold is to be preserved. Wash the plates in water less hot than for ordinary dishes and always use a mild soap. Do not rub at gold trim more than is absolutely necessary. Rinse well and drain on rubber-covered rack or on towels. This will prevent chipping of gold-trimmed edges.

When boiling eggs, wet the shells thoroughly in cold water before dropping in boiling water and they will not crack.

Stippling a floor isn't hard to do if you are your own decorator. Use a sponge with a flat surface and when your ground color is dry, take a piece of board and paint on it the stippling color. Then, press the sponge on the stippling color and then on floor. In this way you transfer the pattern of the sponge from the board to the floor.

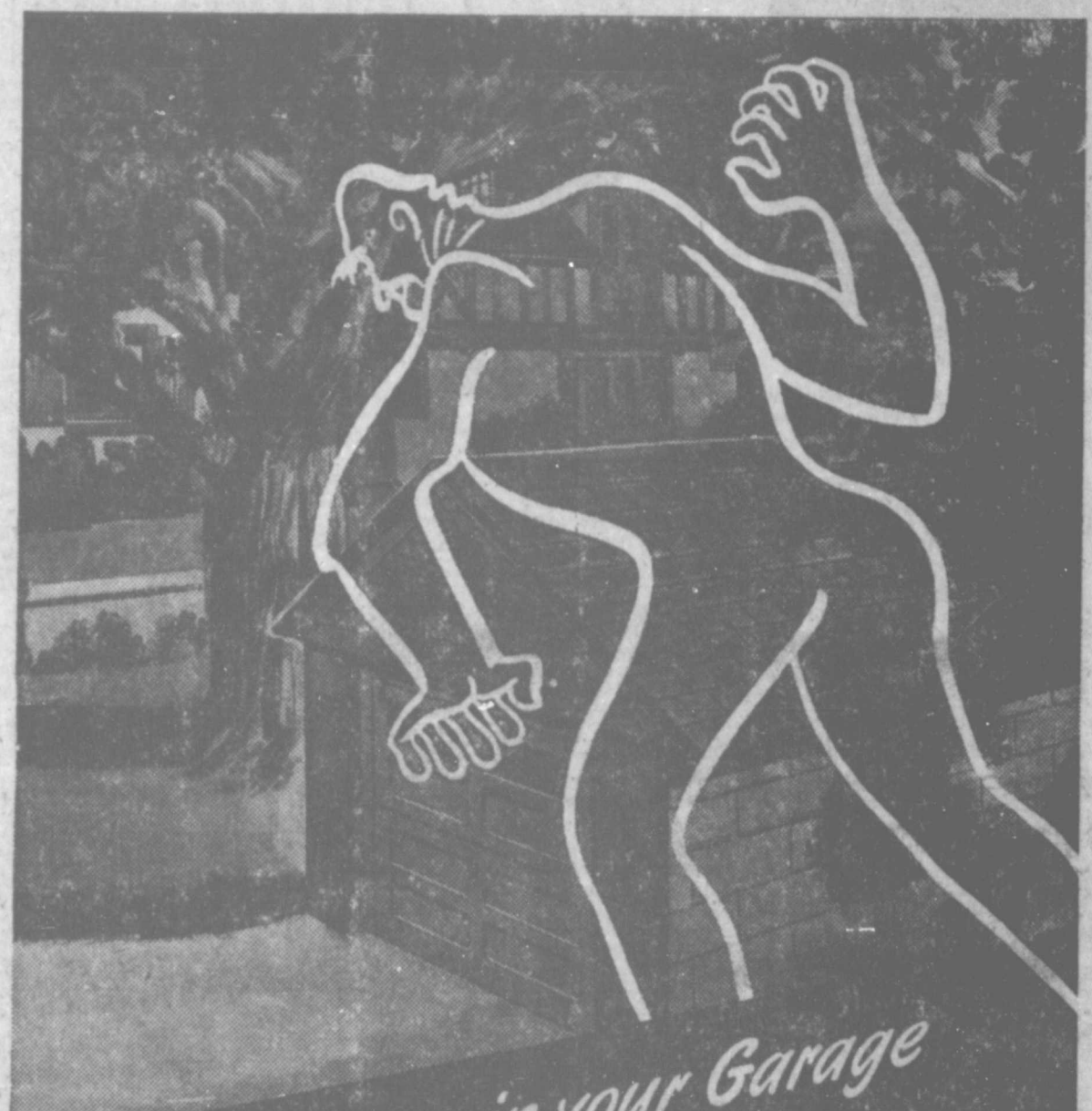
