Rationing At A Glance

SUGAR—Stamp No. 12 in Book No. 1 good for five pounds from March 16 until midnight May 31, 1943.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 28 in Book No. 1 (for those 14 or older on the date the book was issued) good for 1 pound until midnight, May 30.

SHOES—Stamp No. 17 in Book No. 1 good for one pair of shoes through June 15.

MEAT, EDIBLE FATS and OILS (including butter), CHEESES, CANNED FISH—Red stamps in War Ration Book 2 used. Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week. Red stamps E, F, G, H and J expire May 31 and become valid as follows: E, April 25; F, May 2; G, May 9; H, May 16; and J, May 23.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue G, H, and J stamps (48 points) in War Ration Book 2 good for purchase of rationed processed foods from April 24 through May 31.

GASOLINE—Value of each coupon in A, B and C books is 4 gallons. Third 3 coupons in A book are good until midnight May 31, 1943.

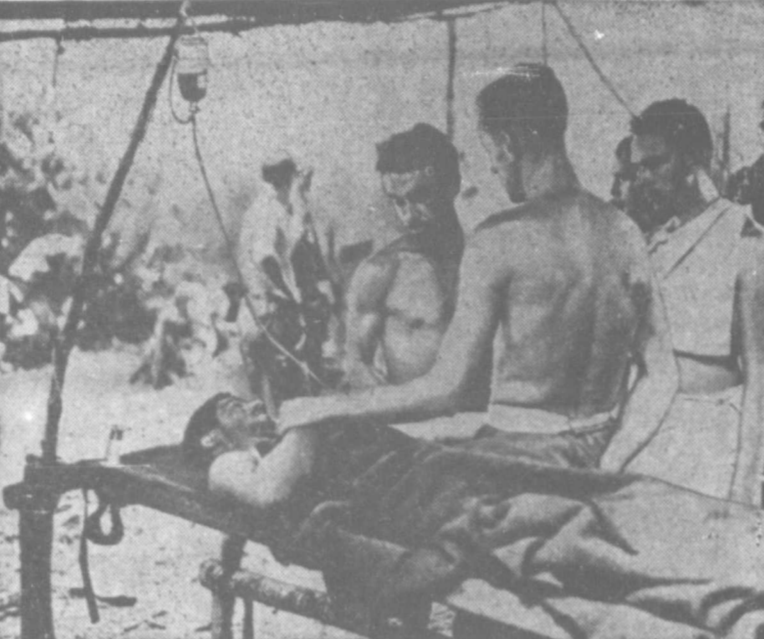

TUNISIA: Master Generalship Axis resistance in Tunisia had steadily crumbled as the Allied armies moved inexorably toward their goal.

CONTROVERSY: Russ Add New Fuel

More fuel was added to the flaming Russ-Polish controversy when the Soviet foreign office charged that cabinet officers of the Polish government-in-exile had engaged in espionage activities against Russia.

United Nations' chancelleries had previously been heartened over the prospects of a resumption in Russ-Polish relations when Premier Josef Stalin had advocated the establishment of a strong and independent Polish state after the war.

Stalin's statement appearing in a letter to Ralph Parker, Moscow correspondent of the New York Times, had unequivocally endorsed the idea of a strong and independent post-war Poland.

DRAFT: Fathers by August

Nation-wide induction of fathers into the armed forces will be started by August "if not sooner," Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey announced.

Under the new instructions to local draft boards, care will be taken to keep fathers in essential occupations out of the armed forces until fathers working in less essential jobs have been inducted.

PACIFIC: U. S. Air Upsurge

Surging American air strength took its toll of the Japs in widely separated actions on the far-flung Pacific front.

In the foggy Aleutians off the North American mainland American bombers kept up their incessant aerial pounding that has prevented the enemy from completing the airfield that has been under construction for several months on Kiska Island.

Reporting an action of tremendous implications because it showed that heavy reinforcements had reached the U. S. air forces in China and that enemy bases near to Japan were now being laid open to our attacks.

From American army headquarters in New Delhi, India, came the announcement that U. S. heavy bombers had dropped more than 30 tons of bombs on Japanese installations in Toungoo, Burma, in the Mandalay area, blasting the enemy headquarters there and causing severe damage to other buildings.

ALIEN BUSINESS: Now in U. S. Hands

More than 2,000 such business firms are operating under licenses from the treasury department. A total of 41,077 patents and pending patent applications owned by enemy nationals are now under control of the alien property custodian.

FEDERAL PAY: Upped for Workers The house completed action on legislation previously adopted by the senate, raising the pay of federal employees who make less than \$10,000 a year.

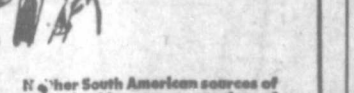

AROUND THE HOUSE

If the young son catches his good linen suit on a nail and you have nothing with which to patch it, take a piece from the back of the shield. This place does not show and the shield can be lined with another material.

If the cellar or basement gets a sort of old dead air odor, if it dampness is there through the spring months it is helpful to set a box or two of quicklime or calcium chloride here and there in the corners. This will dry out the basement, make it fresh and sweet for several weeks or months. Set the chloride in a dish, as it finally dissolves into water itself.

When cutting out a garment of corduroy, be sure to arrange the pattern on the material so that each part runs from neckline to hem the same way. If cut otherwise, some parts of the finished garment will appear lighter than others.

Invention on Shooting Oil Wells Led to 16,000 Suits

The invention of the Roberts Torpedo in 1866 was followed by the greatest patent litigation in American history, says Collier's.
