Rationing At A Glance

Gasoline—In 17 east coast states A-8 coupons are now good. In states outside the east coast area A-8 coupons are now good.

Fast Oil—Period 1 coupons are good through January 2.

Shoes—Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Vanity has been extended indefinitely. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in Book Three good for 1 pair.

Sugar—Stamp No. 23 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through January 15, 1944.

Meats, Fats—Brown stamps G and H good through December 4. Brown stamp J becomes good November 7 and remains good through December 4.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps X, Y, and Z good through Nov. 20. Green stamps A, B, and C in Book Four become good Nov. 1 and remain good through Dec. 20.

Mail Christmas Cards Now

Christmas cards to soldiers overseas should be mailed at once, the War Department says. They must be sent in sealed envelopes as first class mail.

Christmas cards mailed now will reach even the most remote APO by December 25, according to the Army Postal Service.

Roy Kendall Dies At Amarillo

Word was telephoned Saturday night to our townsman, Frank Kendall, that his brother had died in an Amarillo hospital after a two days illness.

Roy Kendall was born in Lampasas, Texas, Aug. 26, 1872. The family moved to West Virginia when he was 2 years old and lived there until he was 12 years of age when they returned to Tennessee. Returning to Texas again in 1889 he stayed some two years with his grandmother in the hotel business at Lampasas and came to Donley County in Jan. 1891. His parents were living at Clarendon at that time. His father was pastor of the Methodist Church.

A resident of the Panhandle for the past 53 years, he was one of the early pioneer settlers in the Naylor Community at the mouth of Lake Creek, where he was married to Eunice Naylor and where their 8 children were born. Some 20 years ago he moved to Clarendon, where he resided for a couple of years and where his wife died. He was working for the bridge department of the Santa Fe Ry and moved to Amarillo where he has resided ever since.

He was the eldest child of 8 children, 6 boys and 2 girls, two of whom preceded him in death. The surviving are Frank Kendall of Hedley, Will Kendall of Oregon, Roy Kendall of Oregon and Roy Newton Kendall of Washington and Mrs. Lura Cockrell of Lampasas. Mrs. Grace Dubbs and John W. Kendall preceded him in death.

Funeral services were conducted by the pastor of the Park St. Methodist Church, Dr. Earl G. Hamlett, at Griggs Chapel in Amarillo at 4 o'clock Monday evening. The lovely floral tribute and the many friends who assembled for the last rites showed the respect in which this good citizen was held in the community where he lived.

His present family consisted of his wife, Mrs. Joan Kendall, his son, Wilbur and his daughters, Mrs. Homer Gettys and Mrs. Lee Woods. The family residence was 608 N. Lincoln St. Amarillo.

Bans Harmful Anti-Freeze

To protect motorists and truck operators, the War Production Board last Saturday halted all sales of an estimated half million gallons of destructive anti-freeze. W.P.B. warned motorists who already have filled their radiators with any of the banned products to drain and flush the cooling system immediately and refill with the alcohol or ethylene glycol type. Harmful types are those compounded with inorganic salts, including calcium, magnesium or sodium chloride and petroleum distillates. Trade names of the products whose sales were halted are: All Winter, Ghem A Cool, Froneze, Permazone, Word-R Solv, Lo Zone, Alcool X, Ever Flo, Bird Antarctic, Flexo, Gold Seal, Security, Ant Arctic, News Freeze, Anti Frost, Bond (op line), Pro Zex, No Freeze 60 Below, Lo Temp, Never Freeze, and No Roll.

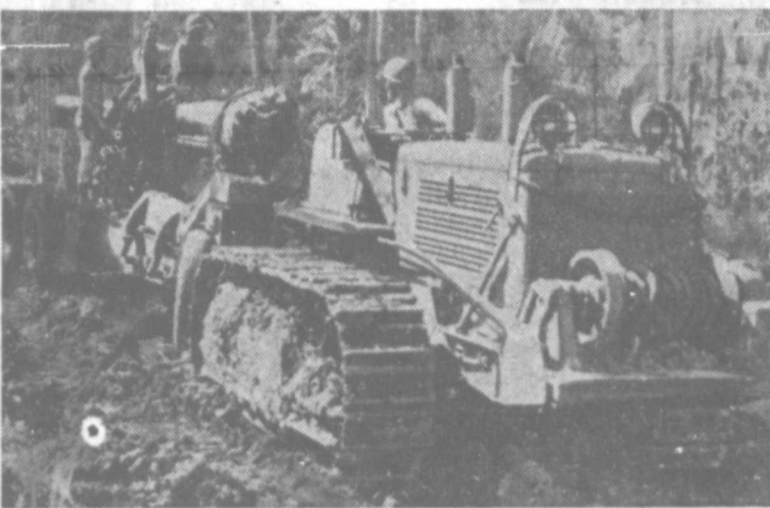

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Muddy Terrain Slows Drive in Italy As Nazis Strengthen Mountain Posts; Germany Rushes Troops to Bolster Broken Defense Lines on Red Front

ITALY:

New Difficulties

To add to the Allies' difficulties in Italy, heavy rain has slogged the countryside, and new burdens have been imposed on the lines of communication bringing supplies to the front.

Because of the inability of motor vehicles to operate over the muddy and mountainous terrain, the Allies are relying increasingly on horses, burros and mules. But they are finding it hard to obtain them since the Germans took most of these animals out of southern Italy or shot those they could not take, and the Fighting French have been unwilling to give up the horses, etc., they have in North Africa for fear of breaking up their mounted units.

Encouraged by Allied difficulties, Nazi Marshal Kesselring reportedly has reinforced his army fighting a dogged delaying action in the rugged country. After retreating from the Volturno river line, the Germans took up positions on the 2,500-foot-high Maffico ridge, where they were expected to make another stand before dropping back to the mountains farther north.

Try to Maintain Morale

On October 17, 1918, Germany's General Erich Ludendorff declared: "The tension of the individual man has reached a degree which cannot be increased."

Not long after Germany cracked under the strain, and steady, dynamic General Ludendorff fell apart with the rest. Today, Germany's Hitler, Goebbels and Goering remember 1918, and the Nazis are working feverishly to hold up the people's morale against the Allies' shattering air attacks.

Hitler has ordered the construction of underground concrete hospitals in battle zones, as well as first aid posts and auxiliary hospitals in the cellars of the most solid buildings. Newspapers are carrying on a concerted campaign to educate the people in treatment of eye injuries caused by the heat, smoke, dust, glass-splinters and phosphorus clouds generated by bombing raids.

HOME FRONT:

FDR Meets Labor Leaders

Answering labor's complaint against the stabilization of wages in the face of 5 per cent increase in the cost of living since last year, President Roosevelt promised AFL and CIO leaders that the retail prices would be rolled back through producers' or processors' subsidies.

FDR met with the labor leaders even as there were rumblings of discontent among the railway unions over wage raises. The non-operating railway union was kicking because Economic Stabilization Director Fred Vinson had set aside an eight-cents-an-hour pay boost recommended by a government mediation board, while the operating railway unions claimed they were "insulted" by another mediation panel's award of a four-cents-an-hour increase after they had asked for three dollars a day.

In hearings before the War Labor board, Alabama and eastern coal operators objected to a new contract between Illinois operators and the United Mine Workers, which would boost daily wages between \$1.50 and \$1.75 by increasing the working day to 8½ hours, including all travel time to and from the pits.

HIGHLIGHTS . . . in the week's news

MAESTRO: Ben Bernie, the "O! Maestro" of radio fame, is dead at 50 in Beverly Hills, Calif. He succumbed to a heart ailment following an attack of pneumonia.

TELEGRAPH: Because of its merger with the Postal Telegraph company, the Western Union Telegraph company is closing 1,800 offices.

RUSSIA:

Nazis' 'Darkest Hour'

As Russian troops poured across the Dnieper river and promised to trap 1,000,000 German soldiers from the rear, word came from Berlin that the Nazis admitted they faced their darkest hour.

Upon the shoulders of Hitler's army fell the gigantic task of blunting the Russian drive before it could roll southward across the southern Ukraine's broad plains and trap the Germans from behind while they held the line against other Red forces attacking from the front.

As the German lines sagged, the Nazis were reported rushing thousands of troops from the Crimea, immediately to the south. In Melitopol, German and Russian soldiers fought in the streets of the ruined city, with enemy machine gunners operating from charred buildings to delay the Reds' advance.

Both sides sustained heavy losses in men and material.

Big Three Meet

Behind the high walls of Russia's forbidding Kremlin, U. S. Secretary of State Cordell Hull, British Foreign Minister Anthony Eden and Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov started conferences designed to bring their countries closer together in the military, political and economic fields.

While Molotov was expected to raise the issue of the U. S. and Britain opening a second front in western Europe to draw off some of the 200 German divisions facing Russia in the east, it was said Hull and Eden would attempt to persuade the Reds to reconsider their demands for postwar annexation of the Baltic states and parts of Poland, Rumania and Finland.

As the conferees met, it was announced the U. S., Britain and Canada had entered into a new lend-lease agreement with Russia, promising her additional food and military supplies this winter.

48-HOUR WEEK:

For More Production

To meet the demand for record production, the War Manpower commission ordered 71 different areas to go on a 48 hour week, and advised 112 others to prepare to shift to the longer work period.

To make up for the shortage of manpower, the WMC determined on the 48 hour week to get more production per person. Previously, the 48 hour week had been in effect in 40 out of 71 areas where the WMC had declared a labor scarcity existed. Now, the remaining 31 areas must go on the longer week.

In the other 112 areas, the WMC saw the possibility of a labor shortage. If such a shortage impends, preparations will be made to meet it before it occurs to interfere with production.

The 48-hour week already has been instituted in such industries as logging, non-ferrous mining and smelting, and iron and steel.

Do not allow cover crops in the vegetable garden to attain too much top growth before digging under, as then decomposition is often very slow.

Dates filled with cheese, nuts or peanut butter make a good sweet to top off lunch. Serve them with crackers.

In ironing cuffs, collars, lapels, or any other part of a rayon garment that requires pressing on the right side, remember to use a pressing cloth between the fabric and the iron.

To make a convenient platform for scrub pails, or other cleaning equipment that has to be moved from room to room, simply attach rollers to a piece of board about 15 inches square. It saves a lot of lifting and makes cleaning easier.

Keep a dishpan of warm soapy water handy when cooking and wash each pan as you empty it. You will cut actual dishwashing time in half as the utensils are much easier to wash if done immediately before foods have had an opportunity to dry on them.

56 Prisoner of War Camps

More than 140,000 prisoners of war are now held in 56 permanent camps in the U. S., the War Department has reported. The ratio of Germans to Italians is approximately three to one. In addition to the permanent camps, there are many temporary ones set up to house prisoners in areas with labor shortages. Agricultural work done by prisoners includes harvesting fruit, tomatoes, potatoes, peanuts, cotton, sugar beets and corn. Only a few have escaped and every one of them has been recaptured in a few hours.

Return Ration Books in Mail

Finders of lost ration books may drop them in the mail without prepaying postage or enclosing them in envelopes, according to OPA. On payment of a five cent postage due charge, the Post Office Department will return the lost book to the person whose name and address appear on the cover. When the address cannot be found, the post office will forward the book to the nearest rationing board.

Urges Farmers To Collect Scrap

In support of the all-out "Victory Scrap Bank" drive to collect tin and steel scrap, Marvin Jones, War Food Administrator, has urged farmers to comb their farms for all possible scrap. Pointing out that next to industry, the greatest source of heavy scrap is the American farm, Mr. Jones said, "American farmers are doing the greatest food production job in history. However, if we are to insure ample steel, we must come from our farms in the next six weeks."

Report On Third War Loan

Final figures for the Third War Loan showed \$18,943,000,000 worth of bonds sold. Under Secretary of the Treasury, Daniel W. Bell reported recently, sales to individuals, the first objective of the drive, exceeded the five billion dollar quota by 377 million dollars.

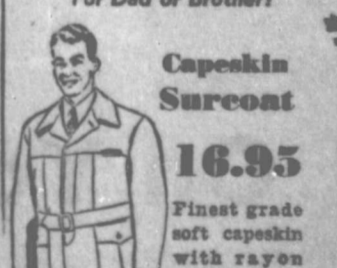

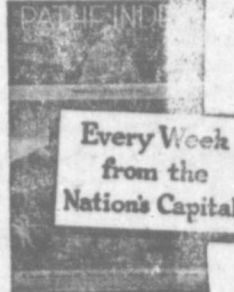

Who May Slaughter Without Permit

A farmer or other producer of livestock may slaughter without a license or permit and consume meat without giving up ration points, if he qualifies under the following OPA regulations: (1) raised livestock from birth or (2) for 60 days before slaughter, (3) the weight has increased 85 percent between time acquired and time of slaughter. In addition, a person must have resided more than six months of each year on a farm he operates, or have visited the farm to give his personal supervision to the raising of livestock for at least a half of the time during the period (one of those listed in the foregoing) on which he bases his claim to the right to consume meat without ration points. If a person has his livestock custom-slaughtered, he must meet these same conditions and give the slaughterer a certificate showing he is eligible to consume the meat point free.

Soldiers' Allowance Payments

Soldiers' dependents must fill out and return a new, one-sheet dependency certificate to benefit by new rates provided by recent servicemen's allowance legislation, the War Department announced. All dependents now receiving family allowances are being sent copies of the new form. These should be filled out, witnessed, and returned to the Office of Dependency Benefits as soon as practicable to avoid possible discontinuance of allowance. Until new accounts can be set up dependents now receiving family allowances will continue to receive their checks in the old amounts. After an account is converted, any sums accrued as a result of an increase in allowance will be included in the first check. The conversion from old to new accounts will take several months.

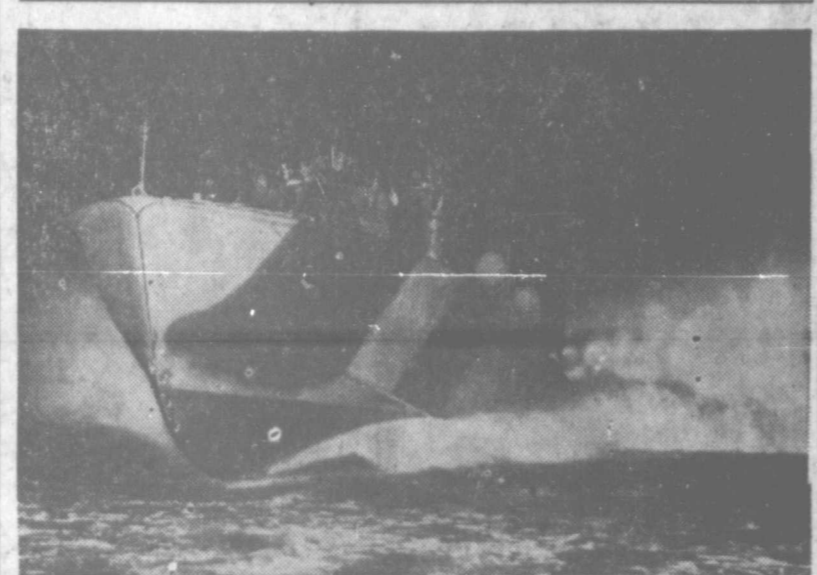

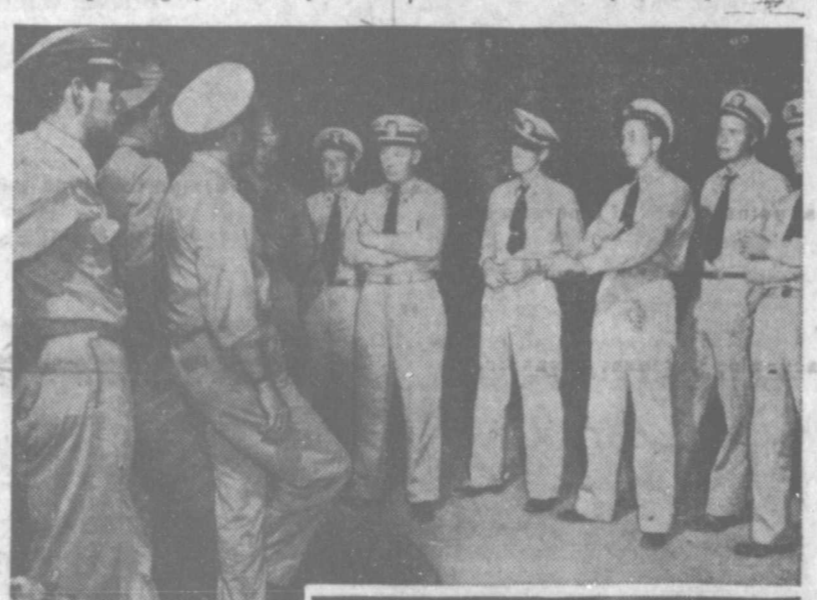
They Strike at Night

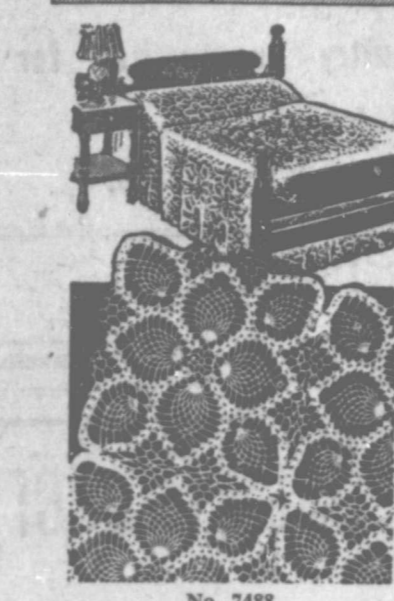

510 Tons of Maps Sent To Our Troops in Africa

When U. S. troops landed in North Africa in November, 1942, their baggage included 110 tons of military maps. During the three months which followed, they received an additional 400 tons of maps. Military maps are made in a closely guarded building on the outskirts of Washington, D. C. (exact location cannot be published). Output of this plant is more than five million military maps a month.

"Pocket-handkerchief maps," 18 inches square and folded like a handkerchief, are printed on balloon cloth which is impervious to salt water. Ink used is also fast.
