

increases in railroad freight and passenger rates, army officials pre-dicted continued high traffic after the end of the European war as the emphasis on movement will shift to the west for acceleration of the struggle against the Japs.

In opposing the railroads' petitions for average freight rate increases of 6 per cent, and a retention of the 10 per cent boost in passenger fares, agricultural agencies declared heavy production assured the carriers of continued high tonnage

Not only will the rails have to handle longer hauls to western ports for the Pacific war after Germany's surrender, army officials said, but rolling stock also will be needed for shipments to Atlantic port some troops also will be fight the Japanese and have to be funneled forces and rehabilit

### Planes Drop Rescue Ships Equipped for 36 People

When sutvivors of torpedoed ships and ditched planes cannot be rescued in other ways, a United States AAF plane now drops to them, by parachute, a boat called the Flying Dutchman, says Col-lier's. Weighing 3,000 pounds and holding about 36 people, this boat carries food, clothing, radio, water still, fishing tackle and blood plasma; also sails, two engines and a large supply of gasoline.

When the Flying Dutchman hits the water, a mechanism sets off smokepots to mark its location and fires rockets which carry. long buoy lines to assist survivors in reaching the boat.

rooted, store windows smashed, power lines tangled and many per-sons killed and injured, a destructive hurricane swirled out of Havana, Cuba, and twisted across the Caribbean to lash along the western coast of Florida and then head over the mainland to the northeast.

As the hurricane moved north-ward at a rate of 15 miles per hour, with 60-mile-an-hour gales shifting in its path, residents of the thickly populated beach areas around Bradenton and Sarasota moved inland, with some seeking refuge in churches and schools. Residents of the low-lying coastal area on the Atlantic side of Florida were ad-vised to retire to higher ground since abnormal tides were predict-

Besides taking a toll of two lives in Florida, the hurricane blew virtually all of the state's record crop of oranges and grapefruit to the ground, causing damage estimated at \$50, 000,000.

## GAS tronomy-**BRAISING BEST** FOR UTILITY BEEF

You can have your steak and eat it, too, if you braise the meat. Recent record production of beef has placed large quantities of unra-tioned "utility" or lean beef on the market. When cooked with slow, moist heat, it can be fork-tender and delicious. To braise means to dredge meat in flour, salt and pepper, brown in fat and thea cook at a low heat, with moisture, until it is thoroughly browned and tender. With a pro-press or butane cas range, braising



is easy because the flame can be set at high to brown the meat quick-ly and then lowered quickly and easily so the meat will cook slowly. These fuels, known as "bottled" or "tank" gas, are used in off-the-gas-mains residences. The best cuts of meat to use for braising include beef round, chuck, ribs or plate. The meat is a deep cherry red in color with no fat mar-bing through it but a thin layer of fat on the outside. For Swiss'sfeak at its best, dredge one of the above cuts with ¼ cup flour mixed with 2 teaspoons salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. If possible, pound in the flour mixture with a mallet. Brown it quickly in ¾ table-spoons fat, and then add 2 cups of canned or cooked tomatoes. Cover canned or cooked tomatoes. Cover tightly in kettle or skillet and cook with a very low heat 2½ to 3 hours until meat is tender and easily





It doesn't make much difference to most of us just what time of year our birthday comes around, but it seems to be important to a calf, and to its mother. Records kept by the United States Department of Agriculture in Washington, show that the fall is the best time for a calf to have its birthday.

There's a good discussion of this in Farmers' Bulletin 1470. The USDA got together records from 120,000 cows, to find out the differences in production which resulted when cows freshened at different times of the year.

More milk and more butterfat was produced by cows which freshened in the fall. Such cows averaged 8,238 pounds of milk and 330 pounds of


There isn't much point in putting out hard-earned cash for a fine piece of machinery if you don't get the full benefit from it. Milking machines, are great labor savers and are the most sanitary way to produce milk, but you can make trouble for yourself by neglecting them,

A milking machine will pay dividends on your investment if you give it thorough cleaning. If you don't, it may result in some of your milk being rejected. Milk which is allowed to cling to parts of the machine provides a breeding place for bacteria, and you know what that means.

Idaho University offers a good booklet on the proper cleaning of milking machines. It is War Circular No. 1, which you can get from the Extension Service, at Moscow, Idaho.\* Another source of information on the same subject is the book which came with the machine.

To get rid of the milk which clings to surfaces in the machine after each milking, thorough rinsing, brushing and sterilizing is needed for all the parts. Teat cups require special care, these booklets point out. Once you set up a regular habit of following through on the advice Idaho gives you in its booklet, I know you'll find the job has become easier.


