Lt. Willis Thomas Writes

Dear Ed,
At this writing I am on another island of the Philippine group. Am becoming quite an amphibian as the trip was made on an LST (Landing Ship Tank—the kind you see in advertisements of war industries.) Being a smaller type ship than others I have traveled before, the trip was a bit rougher.

Like most landing craft, an LST was built for a job and not comfort. So, I slept on the main weather deck under the stars and salty sprays of the ocean as the ship plowed through its chartered course. During the day there was no alternative but to bask in a tropical sun as little shade was available. To say the least the nights were cool and welcome.

Like all invasion moves, we were in a convoy with naval warships protecting us during the trip and to clear the beachhead for a landing with their big guns. However the voyage was made without mishap or excitement. Enemy planes and sea craft never put in an appearance. It looks like the Nip has neither one nor the other.

Though there are Japs on the island—and have been for the last three years—we hit the beach without opposition and was orderly done. Since then the doughboys—the real fighters of the war—have caught up with a number of them and may they rest in peace henceforth as they would not before.

The ever-present native was on hand to greet the boys and was very glad that the Americans had returned. It didn't take them long, though, to get in the stride of things, as no sooner had we cleared the beach than the happy Filipino was on hand demanding a peso for one egg. They believe that every American is a rich man, so a peso is in keeping with his belief. Of course, the inflationary value of Japanese invasion money had some bearing on their price quotations. A little re-education is in the process. Our previous experiences with Filipinos on the island we left has stood us in good stead.

The condition in which we found villages and towns of this island were appalling. Whole communities have been evacuated for several years and left in ruins. Hardly a school, church or substantial building—public or private—remains intact. Some of the destruction was done by the Filipino when the Japs occupied the island three years ago and the rest by the Japs and ourselves. To drive out the enemy some destruction is inevitable.

Thus, you will gather that I have been pressed for time, not to mention that no mail has been received for the last few weeks. However, drop me a line occasionally when you have the time as I always enjoy hearing from you though I may not be prompt in replying. I am in good health and making the best of it. In closing, I wish you a happy Easter season and Mabuhay from the Philippines.

MOOS OF THE MOMENT

I met a friend recently coming out of a post office with a big grin on his face. "Just sent another batch of ammunition to that boy of mine, and made the last payment on the new milking unit I'll need in a few years," he explained. He had just bought another War Bond.

Figures show how actively farmers are backing up our fighting men by buying bonds. And dairy farmers are smart people. They know that every time they invest \$3.00 in a War Bond, they get back \$4.00 when they cash in the bond at its maturity.

Many dairymen buy bonds with the idea that these bonds will pay for a new milkhouse; a fine heifer; a better herd sire or something of the sort. I could fill my whole column with examples of what dairymen are planning to do with their bonds.

The Seventh War Loan starts in a few weeks so I just wanted to drop a reminder that when you buy a bond, you buy another slice of freedom, slap the Japs, and make sure that when more equipment becomes available you'll have bonds at hand to make your purchases.

KEEP ON BUYING 'EM AND BUY 'EM FOR KEEPS.



If a fellow stopped right in the middle of his work every day and climbed to the top of his windmill, his neighbors would think he had slipped a cog in his thinking machinery.

The University of Minnesota started out to find ways to save labor on a dairy farm. One place was found where a piece of equipment used at each milking stood on an old concrete base six inches high.

Workers stepped up on the block 85 times daily. In doing so they used the same amount of energy it would take for a man to climb 42 feet. The block was removed, and a lot of energy saved.

You may uncover a number of ways of saving time and energy, simply by laying things out more conveniently. Putting equipment where it will be handier, making a

sloping incline out of a step-up and, of course, the use of the correct milking routine, are among things which will save labor.

A Minnesota farmer cut his milking time from 55 minutes to 30 minutes, saving 50 minutes each day or 300 hours per year—more than 12 whole days. Another farmer was carrying feed in a 6-peck basket, making four trips at each milking.

He built a feed cart, mounted on old bicycle wheels, and now a 12-year old boy handles the feed for each milking, in one trip. I think if you study each step in your daily work you may find ways to save minutes in time and plenty of energy.



Out in the Western Pacific the Japs are finding out just how much trouble an airplane carrier can be. Another type of carrier can get into a dairy herd and create trouble of its own kind, too.

At an Eight Point milk meeting I attended in Idaho recently, it was pointed out that cows can have what is called a "mild chronic" case of mastitis which is hard to detect but which makes it possible for the disease to be passed to other cows.

A cow with such a case is called a "carrier." The infection the animal passes on may become serious in other cows. So Idaho suggests a test by a veterinarian to locate such carriers, in addition to your regular mastitis control work such as correct milking routine, sanitation measures and the other things I've talked about recently.

It is best to test the milk from each quarter of the udder separately in making this check. One test may be infected but not all of them. This will help in treating the disease.

Idaho recommends testing every heifer or cow brought into the herd and stresses guarding against injuring teats as such injury in many cases is a direct cause of mastitis.

Ernie Pyle With the Navy:
Marines Land on Okinawa Without Battle Casualties
Leathernecks Show Nervous Tension as Zero Hour Nears

By Ernie Pyle

OFF THE OKINAWA BEACHHEAD—(By navy radio)—This is the last column before the invasion. It is written aboard a troop transport the evening before we storm onto Okinawa.

We are nervous. Anybody with any sense is nervous on the night before D-Day. You feel weak and you try to think of things, but your mind stubbornly drifts back to the awful image of tomorrow. It drags on your soul and you have nightmares.

But those fears do not mean any lack of confidence. We will take Okinawa. Nobody has any doubt about that. But we know we will have to pay for it. Some on this ship will not be alive 24 hours from now.

We are in convoy. Many, many big ships are lined up in columns with our warships escort on the outside. We are an impressive sight—yet we are only one of many similar convoys.

We left from many different places. We have been on our way many days. We are the biggest, strongest force ever to sail in the Pacific. We are going into what we expect to be the biggest battle so far in the Pacific.

Our ship is an APA, or assault transport. The ship itself is a war veteran. She wears five stars on her service ribbon—Africa, Sicily, Italy, Normandy and Southern France. She wears the Purple Heart, Bronze Star and Legion of Merit Silver Star. She has fared well on the other side. We hope her luck holds out in the Pacific.

We are carrying marines. Some of them are going into combat for the first time. Others are veterans from as far back as Guadalcanal. They are a rough, unshaven, competent bunch of Americans. I am landing with them. I feel I am in good hands.

I've shared a cabin with Marine Maj. Reed Taylor of Kensington, Md. He is a Guadal vet and he jokingly belittles newcomers who weren't through "Green Hell." The major and I are sort of two of a stripe and we get along fine.

We have the nicest cabin either of us ever had at sea. And we've taken advantage of it by sleeping away almost the whole trip. We've slept day and night. So have many others.

There is a daily argument on ship whether or not you can store up sleep and energy for the ordeal ahead. The doctor says it's nonsense—that you can't store up sleep.

Life on Ship Found Rather Dull En Route
Our trip has been fairly smooth and not many of the troops were seasick. Down in the holds the marines sleep on racks four tiers high. It isn't a nice way to travel. But I've never heard anybody complain. They come up on deck on nice days to sun and to rest and to wash clothes, or lie and read or play cards.

We don't have movies. The ship is darkened at sunset and after that there are only dim lights. The food is good. We get news every morning in a mimeographed paper and once or twice a day the ship's officers broadcast the latest news over the loudspeaker.

They've kept us informed daily of the progress of the Okinawa bombardment that preceded our landing. Every little bit of good news cheers us.

Meetings are held daily among the officers to iron out last minute details of the landing. Day by day, the marine troops are fully briefed on what they are to do.

Everything we read about Okinawa stresses that the place is lousy with snakes. It's amazing the number of people who are afraid of snakes. Okinawa "snake-talk" crops into every conversation.

On the last day we changed our money into newly manufactured "invasion yen," drew two days K rations, took a last bath, and packed our kits before supper. We had a huge turkey dinner and, say, we have steak and eggs for breakfast.

'Extended Action Bill' Goes Into Effect

Meal hours, instead of being at 12 and 6 o'clock sharp, were changed to run from 11 till 1, and from 4:30 to 8:30, so that men on watch could trade off and dash in for a bite. The captain never left the bridge, either to eat or sleep. When you came into your cabin, you found your bunk had been made up with a "flash sheet" around it. That is a black rubberized sheet, to protect you from bomb burns which may fall on board ship. Everybody was issued "flash gear." That consists of several items—a thin gray hood that covers your head and hangs down over your shoulders; a white cloth on an elastic band to cover your nose and mouth; pair of goggles for your eyes; and long gray cloth gloves with a high guntlet.

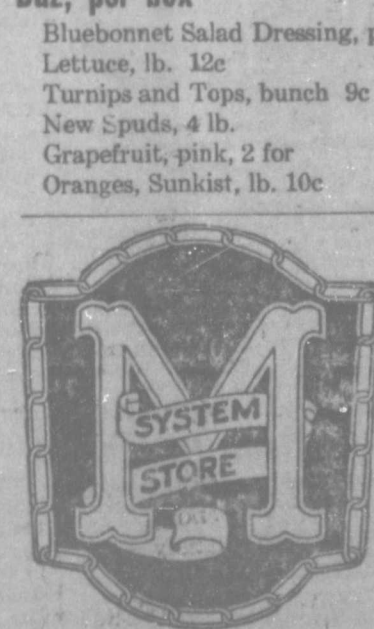
