Mrs. A. G. Nipper Dies

Another long time resident of this vicinity died January 2 when Mrs. A. G. Nipper passed away near Plainview, aged 83 years, 6 months and 27 days.

Funeral services were held Friday from the First Baptist Church here by Rev. Lamb, pastor of the Liberty church near Plainview, assisted by Rev. H. T. Harris. Interment was in Rowe cemetery.

Active pallbearers were grandsons, Rev. Albert McClellan, Clarence Nipper, Joe Nipper, Alvin A. Messer, Willie Keen, John A. Aull and W. A. Nipper.

Susie Ann Josephine Bird was born June 6, 1862, in Randolph County, Alabama. At the age of 15 she was converted, later joining the First Baptist Church. She was a devoted member of the church until her death, a fine Christian character whose good works in the Sunday School and church will remain an inspiration to all who knew her. For several years she was a member of the Eastern Star.

On June 14, 1875, she was married to Albert Green Nipper at Wedowee, Alabama. To this union were born twelve children. Her husband and six children preceded her in death. Those living are Albert Nipper of Lubbock, Mrs. R. K. McClellan of Bowie, Mrs. H. B. Keen of Forestburg, Mrs. W. H. Wallace of Temple, Mrs. M. L. Monroe of Plainview and Mrs. E. C. Franklin of Happy. She also leaves 22 grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great-grandchild, besides a great host of friends to mourn her going.

The Nippers moved to Texas in 1877, settling near Jacksboro, then in 1908 moved to Cotton county, Oklahoma. They came to Hedley in 1917, and remained here until Mrs. Nipper moved to near Plainview in 1934, shortly after the death of her husband.

Templeton Announces For Representative

R. L. Templeton of Wellington announced his candidacy for Representative of the 122nd Legislative District this week. Templeton, who is a veteran of the early air battles in Europe, set forth his views in the following straightforward statement.

Most of the people of this District will remember my race for the office of Representative two years ago when I was defeated by a very narrow margin after being compelled to make the race on a "write-in". I made a valiant effort to win that race in spite of such a discouraging handicap because I felt that I had been unjustly handled and because I felt that this District needed an ex-serviceman in Austin. My feelings in this regard have not changed in the two years that have elapsed. We need a capable ex-serviceman for Representative because many of our greatest problems in these times concern ex-servicemen. We need a man who has been through the trials of war and who has made the adjustment to civil life so that he will be able to understand and cope with problems of this nature.

I believe that I will be able to understand the problems and attend to the Legislative needs of your sons, brothers, and husbands who have returned from the war because I have been through similar military experience. After the U. S. Army Air Corps discharged me in 1940 I enlisted in the RCAF and flew in the early part of the war until I was injured in a crash in England. After some time in the hospital I was sent home in Nov. 1942, and was given a medical discharge. The Canadian Government granted me a disability pension and later gave me the distinction of being the first American sent to college under the Canadian "G. I." Bill, which is very similar to the American G. I. Bill. I am a member of the Frank King American Legion Post at Wellington.

During the present war I had two brothers killed in action with the Air Force. My younger brother, Pat Templeton, was killed in the Royal Air Force on September 7, 1942, while attempting to land a crippled bomber at night in England, and my older brother, John Templeton, was killed on March 18, 1945, while flying as a gunner in a bomber over France.

At this point I would like to have it understood that I am not seeking this office on the strength of a military record. Instead, I am seeking this office because I feel that I am qualified to hold it. For several years I have studied law at the University of Texas in order to train and prepare myself for such an office. I come from a family of lawyers and legislators. My father, the late Judge R. H. Templeton, practiced law in this District for 35 years. My uncle and namesake, the late Judge R. L. Templeton, was the first Representative from this District. He served in the Legislature for four years, and was District Judge at the time of his death in 1927. My grandfather, Newton Gresham a well-known newspaper editor at the turn of the century, was better known as the founder of the Farmers Union of America.

My platform remains the same as it was two years. Namely, if

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Big Three Draw Closer Together; British Break Ruhr Monopoly; New Work Stoppages Looming

BIG THREE: Meeting of Minds

With the declaration that "progress, and great progress, has been made," the foreign ministers of U. S., Britain and Russia concluded their quarterly conference in Moscow, and observers looked to a smoother relation between the major powers for re-establishment of order out of the dislocations in Europe and Asia.

Though the agreement between Messrs. Byrnes, Bevin and Molotov to work for control of atomic energy and eliminate it as a war weapon commanded the most popular attention, political understandings reached were equally important in their assurance of settling populations, permitting organization of comprehensive governments and spurring the resumption of trade.

One of the principal items of accord involved agreement on procedure for drafting the European peace treaties with Axis satellites, the Big Three deciding to let France in on discussions over Italy and consulting all of the United Nations on pacts covering Italy, Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary and Finland.

In agreement on Europe, the Big Three also moved to closer understanding on Asia, where they decided upon the establishment of a four-nation control commission for Japan to implement directives formulated by the far eastern advisory council with unanimous approval of the member countries.

RUHR: British Take Mines

An integral part of Germany's economy, 130 Ruhr coal mines owned by 46 companies were taken over by the British occupation authorities in a move to break up the country's war potential and also contribute to the decentralization of the Reich's industry.

In announcing the expropriation of the properties without compensation to the owners, the British declared that the coal mines were controlled by the same monopolistic interests which dominated the iron, steel and chemical industries and exercised a decisive influence on the character of prewar German economy.

In taking over the mines, the British announced that the financial interests of France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg in the properties would be safeguarded.

Fix Reparations

Though U. S. reparations from western Germany were set at 28 per cent of the total to be shared by 21 countries, this country's actual amount may fall short of the agreed figure since it waived rights to enemy ships and industrial equipment because of small losses in these categories.

In addition to such capital goods as plants, machinery, etc., German foreign assets, current stocks and items from production have been declared available for payments, and the U. S. is expected to draw primarily from these sources.

Besides the U. S., Britain will also receive 28 per cent of reparations, with France allotted 16 per cent. Other recipients include Yugoslavia, the Netherlands, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, Greece, India, Norway, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, Denmark, Luxembourg, Egypt and Albania.

Under the Potsdam agreement, Russia was to obtain its principal reparations from eastern Germany, and German assets in Bulgaria, Finland, Hungary, Romania and eastern Austria.

FRANCE: Trade Move

In a move designed to bring the purchasing power of the franc in line with foreign currencies, France devalued its monetary unit to 119 to the American dollar and 480 to the British pound.

As a result of the new arrangement, French foreign trade is expected to pick up, since the rise in prices due to decreased production will be offset by giving up more francs to the dollar or pound. In certain of its colonies where there has been no inflationary spiral, the French maintained the old value of the local franc.

been shipped to countries abroad. With the devaluation of the franc, the French general assembly moved on to ratification of the Bretton Woods monetary agreement, under which foreign exchange would be made available to subscribers at par rather than appreciated rates

OVERSEAS MUSIC: Petrillo Ban

Stocky little James Caesar Petrillo, czar of the American Federation of Musicians, who got his start playing trumpet for Jane Addams' Hull House band on Chicago's west side, again reasserted his power by issuing an order prohibiting the broadcast on U. S. radio stations of all music originating in foreign countries except Canada.

Having just won a major battle with recording companies by compelling them to pay a percentage of

their returns to the AFM to compensate for the reduction in regular employment of musicians through use of transcriptions, Petrillo declared he drew up his latest ultimatum to preserve the jobs of Americans. Said he: "The government—everybody—protects themselves against cheap labor. Why the — should musicians be suckers? The watchmakers' union muscled the state department into telling the Swiss to stop sending (watches) into the country. We're trying to keep out foreign musicians in person or on the air."

LABOR: New Strikes Loom

With 175,000 workers already idle by the General Motors strike in the automobile industry and the United Steel workers also threatening to walk out, the troubled labor situation took another serious turn with the CIO electrical union pondering a work stoppage in General Electric, Westinghouse and General Motors plants.

As in the case of the auto and steel disputes, the strife in the electrical industry centered around the union's move for maintenance of high wartime take-home pay, its demands equalling the steel workers' bid for a \$2 a day wage increase and comparing with the auto workers' goal of a 30 per cent boost.

Active in the automobile dispute in an effort to bring the contending parties together, government officials also took an aggressive hand in the electrical strife, with Edgar L. Warren, U. S. conciliation service director, conferring with both company and union bigwigs in an attempt to iron out differences.

NATIONAL INCOME: Triples

From the depression low of \$368 in 1933, per capita income in the U. S. jumped to \$1,117 in 1944, reflecting the increased wartime economic activity.

Even before the onset of the war boom, per capita income showed a decided increase from the 1933 low, reaching \$575 in 1940, still considerably under the 1944 top. Where, as such income ranged from \$202 in Mississippi to \$396 in Delaware in 1940, it ran from \$528 in Mississippi to \$1,519 in New York in 1944.

In 1940, 16 states topping the national average of \$575 included California, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Washington and Wyoming. In 1944, all of these states except Wyoming exceeded the national figure, Indiana taking its place.

Food Experiments

More than 50 per cent of the leading schools and state universities covered in a recent survey are either conducting frozen food experiments or planning such experiments, it was revealed.

Most of the experiments are directed toward retaining the fresh flavor of fruits, vegetables, meats and dairy products without losing the vitamin content and nutritive value of the food.

CHINA: Propose Truce

Even while 50,000 communist troops reportedly sought to cut the Yangtze river between Nanking and Shanghai, Red political leaders attempted to bring about a truce with Chiang Kai-shek's nationalist forces by suggesting the cessation of hostilities with troops of the two factions permitted to remain at present positions.

Advanced shortly after Gen. George C. Marshall's arrival in China to help untangle the complicated political situation there and promote unification of the country, the communist proposal was a modification of an earlier demand that nationalist troops withdraw to positions previously occupied before V-J Day.

Meanwhile, as communist and nationalist leaders of the political consultative council sat down to lay preparations for later discussions of unity, Red strategists sought to exert pressure on the U. S. to withdraw more support from Chiang's faction and enhance their own bargaining position in conferences. Held throughout China, leftist student rallies called upon Uncle Sam to let the Chinese settle their own differences without interference.

CANDY: Short Supply

Because of both ingredient and labor shortages, candy production will fall short of expected demands during the first nine months of 1946, the trade predicted, with the deficit amounting to 700 million pounds.

While nuts, peanuts, many fruits, coconuts, cocoa oil and other oil, and sugar apparently will remain in short supply through most of the year, the anticipated return of workers to confectionery plants from higher paying war industries has not materialized, though leveling off of other employment and increased wages should lead to solution of the manpower problem.

In addition to prospective higher labor costs, the trade said, material costs are also expected to remain at upward levels because of the shortage of supplies and the declared program of the government to eliminate subsidies on items entering into manufacture of candy. Straightening of difficulties will be the signal for extensive plant modernization and expansion, experts said, with installation of equipment heading the program.

Journey's End

"O God, thou art my God; early will I seek Thee"—Chaplain Edwin Royal Carter Jr. of Richmond, Va., intoned as soldiers lifted the flag that covered the casket of Gen. George S. Patton and held it a few inches above the silver top.

Rain pattered upon the canvas canopy covering the burial site at the end of a long row of little white crosses in the American military cemetery in Luxembourg, Luxembourg, where 6,000 of the former G.I. Patton had led in the historic Battle of the Bulge the year before rested in peace. Beside Patton lay the body of Pvt. John Przywara of Detroit, Mich.

"But the king shall rejoice in God; everyone that sweareth by Him shall glory; but the mouth of them that speak lies shall be stopped," the chaplain concluded in reading the fallen warrior's favorite Bible Psalm. With the recitation of the Lord's prayer, the military men bowed their heads, then three rifle volleys echoed through the hills. As raps sounded softly, all stood at attention, and distinguished generals from Russia, Britain and France held themselves stiffly in salute until Mrs. Patton turned to leave.

Most distinctive of the floral pieces honoring "Old Blood and Guts" was an evergreen wreath from the men he had led to victory. It bore the simple and touching inscription: "To our leader."

PIG CROP: Above Average

Though falling below the department of agriculture's goal, the 1945 pig crop of 86,714,000 slightly surpassed 1944 production and topped the 10 year 1934-43 average by over 7,000,000.

While the 1945 spring pig crop fell below 1944, fall production rose to offset the early year drop, USDA reported. While large increases in the fall crop over 1944 were noted in the western corn belt, small decreases were recorded in the Atlantic states.

With 5,503,000 sows farrowed during the fall season, the number of pigs saved per litter totaled 6.38, compared with 6.34 in 1944 and 6.23 for the 10-year period.

In view of farmers' intentions to breed 8,542,000 sows next spring, the USDA's goal of 52,000,000 pigs should be achieved if the number saved in each litter equals the 10-year average. With heavy 1945 fall production and the retention of a large percentage of 1945 spring hogs on farms for extra feeding, pork supplies should be good through the ensuing months.

G.I. INSURANCE:

Despite the fact that the veteran's National Service Life Insurance is probably the greatest bargain in life insurance today, many discharged servicemen are dropping it and making a big mistake, says Dr. W. M. Curtiss of Cornell university. Premium rates are lower than for mutual and stock companies, and include a waiver of premiums in case of disability, Dr. Curtiss said. This feature costs about 75 cents extra per \$1,000 of ordinary life insurance from a private company.

PRIME EDITORIAL SPEAKS FOR DOGS

Canines Wonder Why Man Doesn't Behave Like God, It States

G. W. Barrette, editor of the Hedley (Hedley) Journal-Transcript, has been awarded a \$100 victory bond by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York as author of the "best editorial on a dog topic appearing in an American newspaper during the 1945 National Dog Week, it is announced Mr. Barrette's editorial, titled "A Dog's Eye View," appeared in the Journal-Transcript on September 17.

Mr. Barrette's editorial was chosen by a committee of judges which included Guyancy H. Coleman, president of the American Humane Association, Albany, N. Y.; Capt. Will Judy, editor of Dog World magazine, Chicago; and Harry Miller, executive secretary of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

The judges also voted "honorable mention" to Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt for the "very constructive, helpful" dog information carried in her syndicated newspaper column on September 17.

Following is the Journal-Transcript editorial in full:

"I'm being National Dog Week, we wonder what a dog's eye view of mankind would be. It might be:

"Well, the war is over, we dogs have proven our usefulness as sentry message carriers, Red Cross

helps, guards, agricultural workers and aides to disabled soldiers. We think we've done our part as morale builders during the conflict. We have guarded prisoners. We have learned to lead the blind men who had eyes, once but whose eyes were put out by enemy men. We didn't invent the atom bomb. But since we live with nuclear beings we were its victims too. We never won or lost a war, but we gave our lives in war service. Just because humans set us the example. We are dependent upon you humans for food and care, particularly in the city, but it that food and care is not given us we do not turn and you like people might do. We have become stray cats, an obligation to you and a reproach to your humanity.

"We serve your children by teaching them that inferior creatures deserve their kindness and protection. In return, we give protection to you. We are the first to give notice of danger and to detect the presence of a murderer. We have an instinctive urge to rescue those who are drowning. We smell fire smoke sooner than you do. We enjoy running and playing, but don't enjoy standing people up against the wall and shouting them or beating them to death in concentration camps. Indeed, perhaps, our morality is the morality of loyalty—loyalty to you human beings.

"As we ask in return is that you be a little loyal to us—that you recognize the ancient alliance between dog and man. This alliance is so old in the human race that we don't resent it, one whit, even when you abuse us. But we don't know how to abuse you unless you desert us and ignore us, forget us and starve us, destroy our morale and neglect us.

"Thus, you are pretty close to God. Indeed, you're the only God we know. We sometimes wonder why you don't behave like God—both in your relations with human beings and with us."

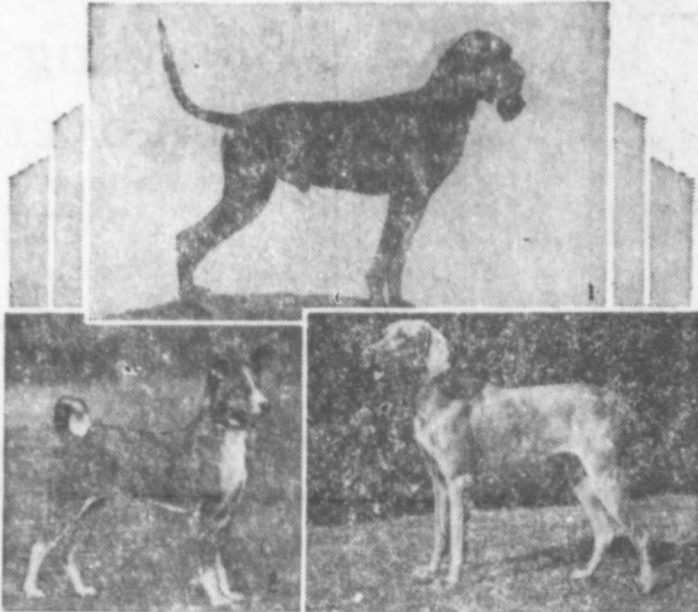

Newest Members of U. S. Canine Aristocracy

With the formal recognition by the American Kennel Club of the Weimaraner, the Basenji and the black-and-tan Coonhound, the number of recognized breeds of dogs in the United States now stands at the impressive figure of 110, the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, reports.

The Weimaraner has been added to the Sporting Dogs group and the Basenji and Coonhound to the Hounds group.

The Weimaraner, sometimes spoken of as the "Grey Ghost" because of its color, was developed by the nobles of the Weimar section of Germany as an all-around hunting dog of distinctive appearance. The breed in its present purebred form—it stands 22 to 26 inches in height—has been known since about 1810. In this country the Weimaraner has proven itself as a pointer on feathered and furred game and also as a retriever.

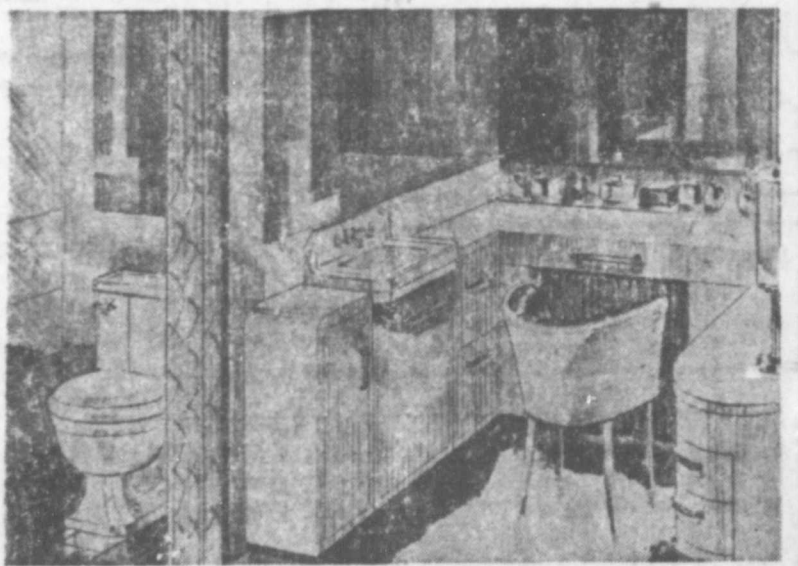
The Basenji is one of the oldest of the dog breeds. Popular in the days of the Pharaohs, he was rediscovered in recent years in his original purity in a remote section of darkest Africa. He is believed to be the original of the dogs that "cannot bark" mentioned in the Old Testament. A small dog, yellow yellow and white, black and white in color, he is distin-

guished by his foxlike head, upright ears and tail slightly curled over his back. His head has been described as an "inverted pyramid," and a peculiar mass of wrinkles appears on his face when he is at attention.

The black-and-tan Coonhound—the one with the long ears—is one of the few breeds of dogs native to America. Usually he is coal black, with rich tan markings about the eyes, on the sides of the muzzle, chest, legs and breeching, and with black pencil markings on his toes. He measures over 25 inches at the shoulders and covers the ground with powerful rhythmic strokes. His skull tends toward the oval, and on the whole he has a majestic appearance.

Based on 1944 American Kennel Club registrations, says the Center, the 10 most popular dog breeds in the United States, in the order of their popularity, are: Cocker Spaniel, Beagle, Boston Terrier, Pekingese, Collie, Fox-terrier, Dachshund, Scottish Terrier, Springer Spaniel and Pomeranian. While only about 20 per cent of purebred dogs eligible for registration in the United States are actually registered with the American Kennel Club, AKC figures are believed to be a fairly accurate reflection of the popularity of the various breeds in the country as a whole, according to the Center.

Plan a Bathroom to Please Entire Family



CALL a family consultation when you're planning that new bathroom is the advice given farm folks in an article in nationally circulated *Country Living*. Then you'll not be forever after wishing the fixtures had been installed some other way. Juggle space and fixtures on paper, then when the final decision is reached, the work of installing the bathroom may go ahead without confusion.

If the family is large, you'll need more than one bathroom. Or if there can be only one, it should be planned to accommodate more than a single person at a time. Simple partitions, like those used in the bathroom pictured above, will do the trick. The lavatory and toilet are separated from the tub. Further convenience is provided by the extra stool in the tub compartment.

Between adjoining bathrooms a partition bath may have a stool and

lavatory available to each room and a tub compartment connection with both. If there are several children to get ready for school at once, have two lavatories in the bathroom. Better still, put one of the lavatories with a stool downstairs. Make a complete second bathroom by adding a prefabricated shower cabinet.

A bathroom ought to be pretty as well as utilitarian, the *Country Living* article points out. That will be easy enough with the good-looking fixtures now being manufactured. Porcelain enamel will be made in almost any shade your artistic heart desires. You'll also have a wide variety of wall finishes to choose from—plastic-finished wall-board, wallpaper, tile, tile board, paint, wall linoleum, structural glass. Linoleum and tile are the most popular floor coverings. All these are available in many colors and designs.

HINTS ON CARE OF THE DOG IN COLD WEATHER

There is no surer way to court disaster for your dog than to keep him part of the time outdoors during the cold weather months, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

Keep him in your heated home or in his own unheated house, but if you value his health, do not keep shifting him from one to the other, it says.

Virtually every rough-coated or long-coated dog can be kept outdoors all the year round, providing certain precautions are observed. Be sure his house is free from dampness and draft, but has ample ventilation—preferably from the top. A strip of old carpeting across the doorway and the right sort of bedding—straw, cedar shavings or a blanket that can be cleaned occasionally—will contribute mightily to his comfort. You can obtain without cost a working plan for building a substantial dog house out of a barrel by writing the Gaines Dog Research Center, 250 Park Avenue, New York 17, N. Y.

For the dog who sleeps in the home, a bed at least four inches from the floor should be used. This should be placed in a corner or other protected spot out of the way of drafts and as far away as possible from the radiators. A great deal of dog coat troubles in winter can be traced to the drying out of the natural oils in the skin of the dog mistakenly allowed to sleep close to a heating unit.

Most dog authorities do not encourage the use of sweaters, blankets or other covering for dogs when taken out, except for sick or aged

dogs and certain very short-haired breeds. Instead, they recommend that the dog be given every chance to run freely when taken out, to offset the sudden exposure to the lower outdoor temperature. Dogs kept outdoors should be provided with long chains to give them the opportunity of getting exercise without risk of their wandering away. Dogs taken out in rain and snow require immediate and thorough drying on their return to the house.

Cold weather calls for an increase in the dog's food intake, though the basic feeding should continue the same as in any other season. A serving of cod-liver oil every other day is excellent practice, if you are so inclined. The outdoor drinking pan must be watched and the water renewed if it should freeze. Neither hot nor frozen water is suitable for drinking by a dog.

Finally, there is the matter of bathing the dog in cold weather. Here it is better to err on the side of underdoing rather than overdoing. A bath once in two weeks is sufficient. Be sure you dry the dog down to his skin after his bath. In the case of some long-haired dogs it may require two hours of warmth to thoroughly complete the drying job. In bathing a white dog, incidentally, a bit of bluing in the rinsing water enhances the whiteness of the coat. Daily brushing reduces the need for bathing, which not all dogs relish, and is very beneficial in keeping the coat glistening, the skin free from dandruff, the dead hair out of the coat, and the dog less liable to skin ailments.

Dachshund Popularity In Sensational Gain

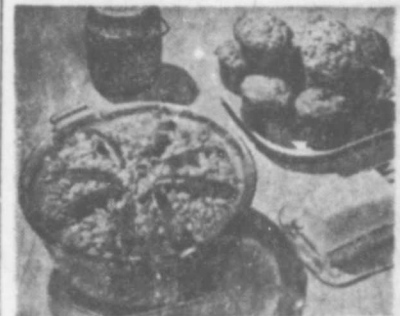
The lowly Dachshund is now up among the ten dog breeds which lead in the number of purebred registrations in this country, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, which states that a lot of the credit for this achievement is due to the efforts of the Dachshund Club of America which this year celebrates the golden jubilee of its affiliation with the American Kennel Club.

Figures compiled by Joseph E. Balmer, Xenia, Ohio, show a sensational gain of Dachshund registrations in 1945 over the year 1926 of 5,789%. For the same years the Cocker Spaniel, the leader in registrations, showed a gain of 1,814% and Beagles a gain of 288%.

Sausage Casserole Makes Savory Meal



There's nothing quite like a corn-sausage casserole as the main dish for a cold evening supper, invites Marjorie Griffin, rural home editor of *Country Living*, nationally-circulated farm magazine.

Corn-Sausage Casserole.
1/2 lb. sausage, 1/2 cup. pepper, 1/2 c. onion, 2/3 c. whole kernel corn, 1/2 c. green pepper, 2/3 c. canned tomatoes, 1 tsp. flour, 1 c. rice cereal, 1 tsp. salt.
Use link sausages or bulk sausage shaped into links; brown them in a heavy frying pan and drain well. Brown chopped onion and green pepper in meat drippings. Add flour and seasonings and mix well. Add corn and tomatoes and simmer until juice has partially evaporated (about one-half hour). Pour into casserole; arrange sausages on top in pinwheel shape. Sprinkle cereal over top. Bake at 400° F. about 15 minutes. Serves 6.

Serve a Breakfast That Spells a Cheery Morning (See Recipes Below)

Bright Beginning

Do you serve the kind of breakfast that demands to be eaten, or are you content to let the family slip away with just a sip of fruit juice and a swallow of hot coffee?

Surveys show that people spend an average of 12 minutes eating breakfast. Five minutes more time to eat a good breakfast can give added energy for the day's work, and about a third of the day's share in calories and nutrients.

Few women spend the time in planning breakfast that they give to other meals. The only way to serve a good breakfast is, of course, to plan it in advance. It should be appetizing and interesting, with foods prepared carefully and served appetizingly. There should be contrast in the texture, flavor and color of foods to avoid monotony.

Breakfast, too, can have the glamour that other meals possess. Bright cheerful dishes and linens dispel early morning gloom. Flowers and other pretty centerpieces make an attractive setting. The breakfast table should be set away from kitchen odors and confusion, and the setting should be as cheery as possible. Above all, be cheerful, yourself!

Use Variety in Fruits.
Fruits-in-season offer a good way of introducing variety to the breakfast. There will be berries, juicy and bright-colored, fruit juices, and then, of course, the fruit itself, halves of grapefruit, sliced oranges, luscious pears, peaches, etc.

Incidentally, right now there are winter pears which are plentiful. Anjou pears which run from green to creamy-yellow in skin color are juicy and full-flavored reach the peak of their season about this time and are available until April. The Nelis, which is a russet-skinned, small and extra-sweet pear, starts trickling to the market now and will be available until May. Bosc pears which are russet-skinned, with a long tapering neck, and Comice pears which are similar to the Anjou are still available, but are passing.

Serve Cereals.
Cereals help add carbohydrate or energy to the diet, and they are available in a variety of ways. You might like a nice hot bowl of cooked oatmeal or wheat cereal to start the day, and then again it may be one of the prepared cereals that strikes the fancy. Try a variety in cereals, too.

It may be wise to combine the cereal with some fruit to have picture-pretty cereals for breakfast. This is easily done with canned fruits, berries or even the fresh, sliced variety.

Lynn Says:

You'll want these handy hints for housekeeping: To keep iron frying pans in good condition, give them a soda bath occasionally. Mix two tablespoons of soda with two quarts of hot soapy water. Place the frying pans in this and boil gently for a few minutes. Rinse well and wash in more soapy water.

Cotton flannel cloths are excellent for polishing silverware. Keep old flannel cloths on hand and wash them often in hot soapy water.

Slow drying at a moderate temperature is best for woollens. Never expose them to excessive heat, direct sun rays or freezing temperatures.

Place a teaspoon of salt in water in which eggs are boiled. This aids in keeping the shell from breaking.

Popular Breakfast Breads.

Toast is our national breakfast bread favorite, but it should never be allowed to reach the doldrum stage. Different types may be used, and of course, there are numerous spreads to entice weary breakfast appetites. Picture the pleasure of the family when they see golden slices of toast with a dish of cranberry orange marmalade that can be spread thick while the toast is hot. Or, cranberry preserves, made from fresh berries, are particularly appealing to morning appetites because of their tart, bright flavor.

If you plan breakfasts carefully, then you will find time to spare for baking some of those delicious quick breads that make such a delightful feast of this first meal of the day. Here are several bright beginnings:

Honey Butter Roll-Ups.

(Makes 16)
2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons shortening
3/4 to 1 cup milk
1 tablespoon melted butter
2 tablespoons honey
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk and stir to form a soft dough. Turn on a lightly floured board and knead 1/2 minute. Divide dough into two equal proportions. Roll each portion into a circular shape about 1/4 inch thick. Brush with melted butter and honey. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Cut into pie-shaped pieces. Roll, beginning at wide end. Bake in a hot (400-degree) oven 10 to 12 minutes.

Date-Orange Muffins.

(Makes 1 dozen)
1/2 cup sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup dates, cut fine
Grated rind of 1 large orange
1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
1/4 cup molasses
1 egg, beaten
1 cup milk
1/4 cup shortening, melted
Sift together white flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Add dates and orange rind; mix well. Add flour. Combine molasses, egg, milk and melted shortening and add to dry ingredients mixing only until the dry ingredients are moistened. Do not beat until smooth. Spoon batter into well-greased muffin tins, filling them 3/4 full. Bake in a hot (400-degree) oven for about 20 minutes.

Don't forget that eggs add nourishment and interest to breakfast and may be prepared in any number of ways. You'll like sausage-flecked omelet, bacon-flecked waffle, creamy scrambled eggs with ham, and poached eggs riding on top of golden brown toast.

And if it's variety you're seeking, then try these special pears filled with sausage for a breakfast treat:

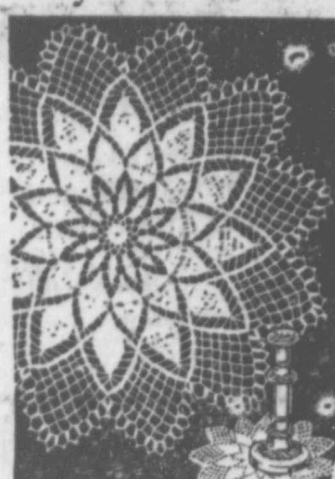
Sausage Pears.

(Serves 6)
6 pears
Juice of 1 lemon
Brown sugar
1/2 pound bulk sausage
1/2 cup water
Peel and core pears. Leave whole. Sprinkle with lemon juice and place a heaping teaspoonful of brown sugar in each pear. Crumble sausage and fry until brown. Drain off fat. Pack cooked, drained sausage into pears, filling generously. Arrange pears upright in baking dish, add water and bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven for 30 minutes or until pears are tender.
