Leave Bonds

The Security State Bank is authorized by the United States Treasury Department to cash Armed Forces Leave Bonds for registered owners any time after September 1st, 1947.

There is no requirement that these bonds be cashed at this time in order to get your money. They can be cashed any time in the future upon demand and without delay, and they will bear 2 1/2% interest (up to maturity) until you actually need the cash.

Identification is necessary and if you can not be identified otherwise bring your original separation papers with you, when presenting bonds for payment.

Terminal Leave Deadline Aug. 31, Vets Are Reminded

Washington, D. C.—Only two days remain for former servicemen to file claims for settlement of unused terminal leave under the Armed Forces Leave Act of 1946, finance officers of the four armed services have announced. The two million former servicemen who are estimated to be eligible for payment will have until midnight August 31, 1947 to obtain forms, fill them out, have them notarized and mail them to the proper paying offices listed on Page 2 of the form entitled "Claim for Settlement-Unused Leave." Forms are available at post offices.

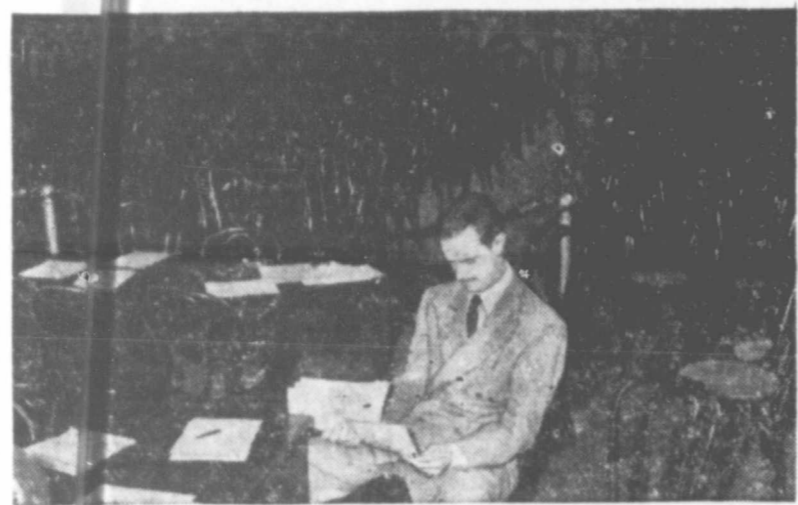

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Seek Conspiracy in High Prices; U. N. Warned on Greek Situation; Tax-Exempt Co-ops Are Studied

Plane builder Howard Hughes sat aloof and aloof amid a forest of chairs in a senate caucus room after the investigation of his aviation contacts had been abruptly and mysteriously called off. Hearings were scheduled to resume November 17.

CONSPIRACY: Probe Prices

Many Americans who have had to empty their pocketbooks to fill their larders probably have entertained, from time to time, the theory that current astronomical costs of living were a conspiracy of some sort.

Now Attorney General Tom Clark has been struck with the same idea, and he is dead serious about it—threatening jail sentences for anyone who can be proved to have conspired to keep prices of food, clothing and shelter in the stratosphere.

Assuming a "get tough" attitude, the justice department ordered a full scale investigation to determine whether there is any subterfuge behind high prices in the nation, as industry spokesmen hurried to point out that their records were unblemished and that they would welcome the uprooting of any existing evils.

In the meantime, the CIO full employment commission urged that congress be summoned into special session to restore price controls and roll back prices to where they were when OPA expired. Congressional committees were already looking into price increases in the East and Midwest.

The justice department's anxiety and its proposed drive to combat monopolists was one of the strongest indications yet that the government is gravely concerned with the possibilities of uncontrollable inflation in the nation.

UN Warned

The United States has put one more iron in the international fire as a result of the red-hot Balkan situation. In a bluntly worded ultimatum, the U. S. told the United Nations security council that it would take direct action to defend Greece from Communist domination if the council and general assembly are unable to do the job.

That development followed a deadlock brought about two weeks previously when Russia vetoed an American plan to have a U. N. commission keep order along the northern frontier of Greece.

And it came on the heels of a report that a seven-nation subcommittee had been unsuccessful in finding a way to resolve the stalemated Russian and U. S. stands. Delivered to the security council by Herschel V. Johnson, deputy U. S. delegate, the warning said:

"The continued failure of the security council to take effective action in this case because of the Soviet veto cannot, in the opinion of the U. S. government, preclude individual or collective action by states willing to act, so long as they act in accordance with the general purposes and principles of the United Nations."

What other nations might be willing to join the United States in "collective action" against Communist inroads in Greece was not immediately evident, however.

MAY SEND TROOPS

U. S. state and war departments have been reviewing the possibility that American troops ultimately may have to be sent to Greece, although officials do not believe such a move is necessary at the present.

RED SAUCERS: Soviets Curious

Those flying disks were fun while they lasted, but by this time everybody has practically forgotten them.

Well, almost everybody. Latest report having to do with the aerial chinaware is that Soviet agents in the United States have been ordered to solve the mystery of the disks. Presupposing the report to be true, it means, at least, that the saucers were not of Russian origin as many at first believed.

Soviet espionage agents here are said to have been advised that the Kremlin believes the flying saucers might have some connection with army experiments on methods of knocking out enemy radar during bombing raids.

CO-OP INQUIRY: Two Questions

Although the public is not too well informed about it, one of the most important and fiercely waged domestic post war battles is that being fought between private business and cooperative enterprises.

Crux of the feud is the fact that cooperatives are tax-exempt, while private business is not. From this evolve two basic questions:

- 1. What effect does tax-exemption have upon growth of the cooperatives? 2. Is tax-exemption a factor of discrimination against private business?

A house small business subcommittee has begun an attempt to find the answers with an investigation of the cooperative community enterprise at Greenbelt, Md. In the Greenbelt case, business groups have charged that the government has aided the cooperative in keeping private business out of the development area.

This hearing, as well as others on the west coast, is being conducted by Rep. B. Walter Riehlman (Rep., N. Y.) as acting chairman of the subcommittee.

In view of the theory that taxes will remain high, compared with the past, for at least 50 years, according to economists, the tax-exemption feature of co-ops' existence will grow increasingly important.

DOUBLE TALK: Inter-American

Indications at the outset were that the 21-nation inter-American conference at Rio de Janeiro, officially called for the purpose of working out a permanent mutual defense treaty among American republics, might find itself more concerned with economic aid discussions.

U. S. policy, as guided by Secretary of State Marshall, will attempt to hold down to a minimum any Latin American hopes for United States loans. The North American delegation was expected, instead, to stress the fact that U. S. capital investments in South America are more available and healthier than outright loans.

Although some South American governments are slowly trending toward that same idea, public opinion is lagging, particularly because of Communist and nationalist-inspired anti-U. S. propaganda. In the meantime, other of the republics were thinking in terms of a "little Marshall plan" for American aid to Latin America.

All in all, it looked like another exciting diplomatic period.

WAGES: Building Trades

Making the biggest jump in any single 12-month period since 1920, wages of union workers in the building trades rose 15 per cent in the past year, according to a report by the bureau of labor statistics.

IRON HAND: Britannia Ruled

It will may be true that "Britons never, never, never shall be slaves," as the anthem has it, but in view of Prime Minister Clement Attlee's new emergency action giving the government stern powers over British industry and labor, many in the islands are now harboring serious doubts about that.

The emergency bill, which Winston Churchill charged invoked such restraints as the government has never before imposed except in time of war, has been passed by both houses of parliament and now—for better or worse—is law of the land.

Designed to bring Britain out of her deadly economic slump, the bill empowers the government to command labor and industry to do practically anything and everything, if it is in the national interest.

Rallying cry of the British conservatives, led by Churchill, is "dictatorship." Anthony Eden, former foreign secretary, got into the fight by asking that parliament cut short a planned vacation so the members can be on hand to examine the measures which the government will order.

"The house cannot be an absent spectator while the government does a split over the ever-widening abyss," said Eden, also a member of the Conservative party.

INDEPENDENCE: India Riots

During the two days before fateful India became a land of free men, more than 200 died in a bloody orgy of violence and rioting in the huge northern province of Punjab. Lahore, the capital, was the center of the disturbance, but fierce fighting also took place throughout the west and east Punjab countryside. Wide sections of Lahore were aflame.

This took place on the eve of India's independence day, just before the Indian constituent assembly sat down to function as a free governing body.

Cause of the rioting, incited, as always, by terrorists, was the bitter disagreement arising out of the partitioning of India into two separate zones—one for Hindus, the other for Moslems.

In New Delhi, the independence day ceremonial program began with two minutes of silence for those who died in the fight for freedom which was finally achieved through amicable negotiations with the British.

Meet the Sheikh



This is 27-year-old Sheikh William Edward Abdur Rahman Lutz of Oakland, Calif., a marine veteran, who says he has been appointed the Moslem Grand Mufti of 11 Western States. He became a convert to Islam in 1943.

TRUE SUB: U. S. S. Odax

Most nearly approaching the scientific conception of a "true submarine" is the U. S. S. Odax, a World War II submersible upon which much work has been done since the war's end to make it almost ideally streamlined.

Despite their amazingly versatile performances, submarines have always been viewed by engineers primarily as surface craft—able to submerge but compelled to operate most of the time on the surface.

It is the navy's aim to construct an actual submarine—a craft whose normal sphere of operation is beneath the sea.

The Odax has not reached that end, but it is a step in the right direction. Her exterior has been streamlined by reducing the size of the superstructure and removing deck guns and other topside fixtures.

Tourist Trade

Operating on the highly plausible theory that left-over land mines are not only unhealthy for wandering tourists but are also bad for business, the French ministry of reconstruction is working hard to clear all possible danger spots in former fighting areas around France. While the French admit that erstwhile battle zones must be cleared of mines, the trade, however, is not so sure.

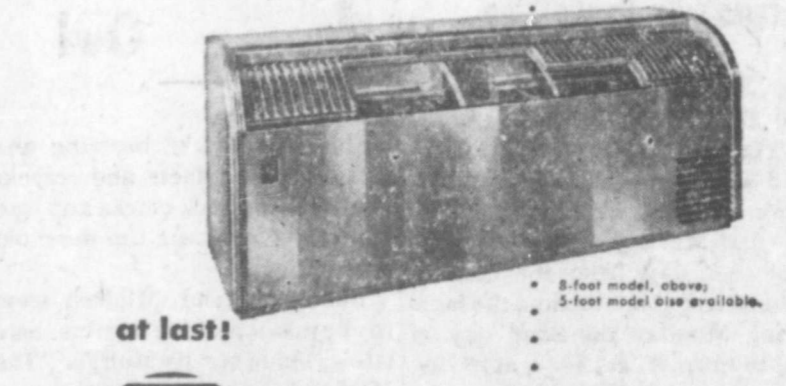

Vegetables at Their Best

Real enjoyment of your home vegetable garden depends largely upon proper preparation of the vegetables for the table.

Gather leafy crops early in the morning, if possible, before the sun withers them. If they are to be kept until a later meal, wash and cover them and place in the refrigerator. Pick peas and sweet corn within an hour of getting them ready for the kettle; if gathered very long before cooking, they lose both sweetness and flavor. Gathering any vegetable too long before using causes loss of vitamins.

Scrape or peel vegetables thinly; valuable minerals are just beneath the outer skin. Young carrots, beets, and summer squash should merely be scrubbed and not peeled. Neither should vegetables be soaked in water before cooking. This, too, causes loss of minerals.

Cook vegetables quickly and only until barely tender. Usually they taste better if slightly undercooked than they do if soft and mushy from overcooking. In boiling, use only a small amount of water, saving whatever li-

quid remains when the cooking is finished. If there is too much to serve with the vegetable, keep it to add to soup. In boiling vegetables make sure the water is really boiling before adding them. If put over the fire in cold water, vegetables lose color, flavor, texture, and much of their food value.

Vegetables fresh from the garden need very little dressing up to make them deliciously appetizing. Simple methods of cooking are best with the simplest of seasonings added. Until you have eaten vegetables fresh picked from your garden and properly cooked, you do not know the taste of vegetables at their best.

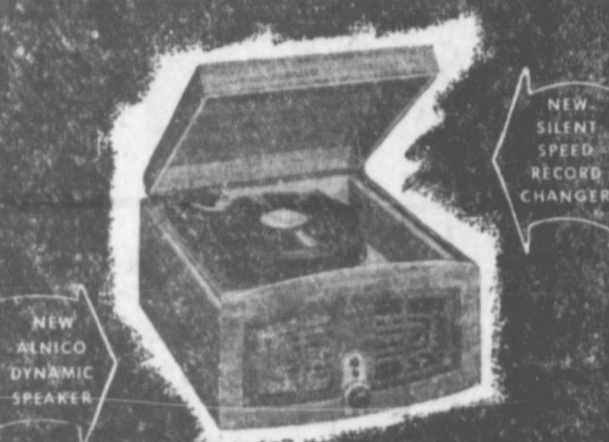

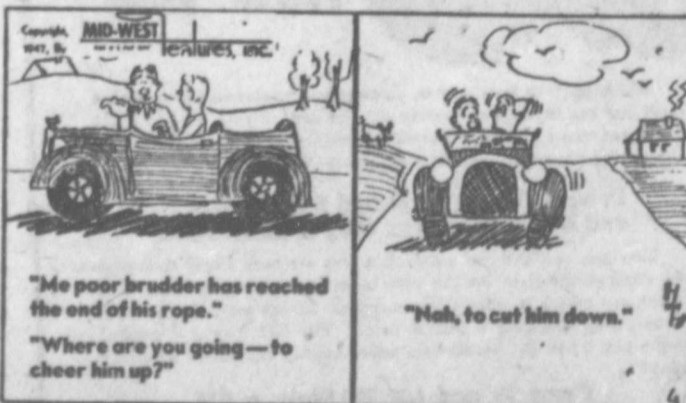

Pickles, Relishes, Jams Satisfy Taste Needs During Meals



Late-in-season grapes are ideal for use as preserves, a jam-like product which gives a true lift to fall and winter menus. A true conserve contains raisins or nuts, or both, but they may be omitted.

Even though most of us like simple meals, well cooked and attractively served, there's an almost universal hunger for something tart or a bit of a sweet that we look for in addition to the basic foods.

This may take the form of a colorful tomato relish, a crisp green pickle, or a thick sweet jam or conserve. These accompaniments are often the finishing, "polished" touches to a meal that make the difference between a success or a failure in the food line.

Now that sugar is plentiful, we can indulge ourselves a bit in the way of sweet fruit mixtures. Pickles and other relishes don't require much sweetening, and there's enough in the gardens and on the markets to make our shelves both bulge and sparkle with other goodies.

Think of sandwiches and you immediately remember how good pickles are with them. Then, too, you can use them with meats, in dressings and sauces.

- Bread and Butter Chips.**
3 quarts sliced cucumbers
3 onions, sliced
5 1/2 cups cider vinegar
5 cups brown sugar
1 pod hot red pepper
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ginger
2 tablespoons mustard seed
1 teaspoon turmeric
1/2 tablespoon celery seed
1 piece horseradish

Soak the cucumbers and onions (separately) for 5 to 10 hours in brine, made by dissolving 1/2 cup salt in 1/2 gallon of cool water. Drain well. Add onions, 2 1/2 cups vinegar and 2 1/2 cups of water to the cucumbers. Simmer about 15 minutes. Do not cook until soft. Drain; discard liquid in which scalded. Make syrup by boiling the sugar and spices with 3 cups of vinegar and 1 cup water for 5 minutes. Pack well drained cucumbers and onions in hot jars. Cover with boiling syrup and seal at once.

This next is a variation of chili sauce that has seasonings you'll like. It has the same thickness as chili sauce when you have finished cooking it.

- Peruvian Sauce.**
24 ripe tomatoes
3 large onions
3 green peppers
1 pod hot pepper
3 large cucumbers
4 tart apples
3 cups brown sugar
1 clove garlic
1 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon ground allspice
1 tablespoon mustard seed
1 teaspoon cinnamon
3 cups vinegar

LYNN SAYS:

Use Ingenuity for Breakfasts

When apples are in season during the fall and winter, serve the family apple-spice pancakes. Add 1 cup chopped apples to your pancake batter and serve them dusted with a mixture of 1/2 cup of sugar and 2 tablespoons of cinnamon. One cup of minced ham, cooked sausage meat or roast beef may be added into pancake batter.

Scald and skin tomatoes, skin onions, remove seeds from peppers, pare cucumbers and discard their seeds if very large, pare and core apples. Run vegetables and apples through the food chopper. Add sugar and cook until thick. Add spices and vinegar and continue cooking until of the same consistency as chili sauce. Pour, while boiling hot, into hot sterile jars. Seal at once.

- Pear Pickles.**
1 gallon pears
6 cups sugar
2 cups water
4 cups vinegar
2 pieces of ginger root
2 sticks of cinnamon
2 tablespoons whole allspice
1 tablespoon cloves

Select firm pears. Pare and leave small ones whole. Halve or quarter the larger ones. Boil for 20 minutes in clear water. Boil sugar, water, vinegar and spices (tied in a bag) for 10 minutes. Add pears and let stand overnight. Cook until tender. Pack pears into hot jars. Cook syrup until thick and pour over pears. Process for 5 minutes in a hot water bath.

- Peach Chutney.**
1 gallon peaches
2 onions
1 clove garlic
1 cup seeded raisins
5 cups vinegar
1/4 cup white mustard seed
2 tablespoons ground ginger
1 pod hot red pepper
1 cup brown sugar

Chop peeled peaches, onions, garlic and raisins. Add 1/2 of the vinegar. Cook until soft. Add all other ingredients. Cook until thick. Pour into hot jars and seal immediately.

The above chutney recipe may also be used with apples, pears or plums.

- Grape Conserve.**
2 quarts stemmed grapes
6 cups sugar
1 cup nut meats
1/4 teaspoon salt

For the Concord type grapes, press to remove pulps from skins. Run skins through the food chopper, then boil for 20 minutes in just enough water to prevent sticking. Cook pulps down in their own juice until soft. Rub through colander to remove seeds. Combine skins and pulps with sugar and boil rapidly until thick. Add nuts and salt. Pour, boiling hot, into sterile jars and seal at once.

- Plum Conserve.**
2 quarts seeded plums
1 lemon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 large stick cinnamon
6 cups sugar
1 cup raisins
1 cup nut meats

Use firm-fleshed plums. Cook until soft with pulp and grated lemon rind, salt and cinnamon. Add sugar and raisins. Cook until thick. Remove cinnamon and add nuts. Pour boiling hot into hot jars and seal immediately.
