Mrs. O. C. Hill Observes 90th Birthday

Mrs. O. C. Hill celebrated her 90th birthday with a big dinner honoring her relatives who could attend, and open house honoring her friends and acquaintances from 2:00 to 6:00 on Jan. 25 at her home.

Rachel Elizabeth Rutledge was born Jan. 25, 1858 at Big Cane, a little town not far from New Orleans, where she lived with her father and mother, twin brothers, Edgar and Edward, and a sister, Alice Rosezelia.

Her father, Dudley Rutledge, and his brother William operated a huge warehouse of guns, ammunition, machinery, etc. Mrs. Hill says: "Father took pneumonia and died in 1862, during the Civil War. He asked Uncle Will to sell everything and move his family to the West, which he did. We located in Dallas County in 1869. A few years later my mother died and we children lived with Uncle Will. My brothers became railroad engineers. Edgar was killed when struck by switching sleeping cars as he walked to his engine and Edward was killed when his Sunshine Special passenger was wrecked in 1925 near Palestine. Alice married an engineer, Tom Murton, who was killed in his train. She died in 1924 at Palestine."

"I used to go out in the summer and help cook for harvest hands. That's where I learned to cook a big dinner, and that's where I met the man of my dreams. He was tall and bushy headed, with big black eyes that really scared me when he looked at me. It wasn't long until I realized that the look in those eyes was the love for me pouring out of a heart of gold, which turned all my fears into for Omei Crockett Hill. We had a home candlelight wedding on Dec. 14, 1876 on the Jackson farm northwest of Dallas. We moved on a big wheat farm and gathered the wheat that spring. After harvest we moved to Tarrant county and on Oct. 29 my name was changed to Mommie, for we were the proud parents of a baby girl, Alice."

"We lived in Tarrant, Johnson and Dallas counties and in 1901 we moved to the Panhandle. Our first home was 4 miles north of McKnight. We raised some of the finest whiteface cows and Percheron horses in Donley county at that time, as well as cotton, feed, chickens and garden. We sold our home in 1918 and moved to the Plains, lived there one year and moved back to old Donley on a farm west of Clarendon. After O. C.'s health began to fail we moved near Clarendon."

"One of the saddest events of my life was when O. C. said, 'Mommie, I am going to leave you.' He closed his eyes in death Aug. 3, 1935. I have had lots of sorrows but the good always outweighs the bad for me. Lots of my loved ones and friends have gone to that final resting place, but I still have my friends coming in and new additions to our family tree. It has branched out with 10 children, 48 grandchildren, 99 great-grandchildren and 11 great-great-grandchildren. Four of the children are living, Ormell, Anna Lee, Dudley and Will Tom."

Two Hereford Fibers Killed In Crash

Two young Hereford Fibers, W. B. Whitaker Jr and Quentin R. Williams, both 21, were instantly killed about 12:45 Tuesday afternoon when their Cessna plane crashed into a hill about 8 miles east of Hedley near the Giles roadside park. Flying conditions were very bad at the time of the crash, due to heavy fog, and planes had been grounded during the morning at various points in the Panhandle. The poor visibility was believed to have caused the crash.

Funeral services for the crash victims were held at Hereford Thursday afternoon.

Carl B. Morris Announces For State Representative

Mr. Carl B. Morris of Clarendon, Texas announced Saturday, January 31st, his candidacy for State Representative of the 122nd Legislative District. Mr. Morris stated that he believes he is in every way qualified to capably perform the duties of the office and to serve the people of this district in a truly representative fashion.

He is 25 years old, married, and the father of one child. He saw 37 months service in the U. S. Navy during World War II, obtaining his discharge in April of 1946. Since that time he has wheat farmed in the summer and attended the University of Texas in the winter.

Before entering the service he attended Clarendon High School where he was active in Farm Club Work. He was a well known competitor in the poultry, swine and baby beef shows in Texas, and was a national competitor in judging events. After graduation from high school in 1940 he attended Clarendon Jr. College and Texas A & M. At present Mr. Morris is a mid-law student, that being the term applied to those students in their second year of law at the University of Texas.

Mr. Morris stated that he has long been a student of legislative problems affecting the farmer and people who deal with the farmers. He feels that there is a great need in our state legislature for that kind of representation. He also said he hoped to make a career of representation. He also said he hoped to make a career of serving the people through representative offices, and that is elected he expected to build a record that would entitle him to seek reelection for the same or higher post as representative of the people of this district.

At the same time he invited everyone to investigate his record and satisfy themselves as to his qualifications and capabilities.

U. S. Publishes German Documents As Anti-Russian Propaganda Blow; Hoover Proposes Foreign Aid Cut

COLD WAR

New Propaganda

The celebrated "cold war" has been enriched by another U. S. propaganda strike, probably the heaviest yet, against Russia. It took the form of official state department publication of captured German foreign office records revealing the extent and nature of Nazi-Soviet relations from 1939 to 1941, the period covered by the non-aggression pact between the two nations which ended when Hitler attacked Russia on June 22, 1941. In the light of the U. S.-Russian wartime alliance, the Nazi documents, published in book form, tell a sordid story of secret agreements, global gambling with nations for stakes and the feverish fetish of political expediency which gripped the minds of German and Russian leaders before and during the war. High point of the hitherto secret dossier is the revelation that in 1940 Adolf Hitler and V. M. Molotov of Russia agreed that Britain and the U. S. must be excluded from Europe, Asia and Africa. The book told also how, in 1940, Stalin had offered to join the German-Italian-Japanese axis if Hitler would give Russia a free hand in Finland, a military base near the Dardanelles and a dominant voice in the oil-rich Middle East. Then the documents show how Hitler, disdaining even to answer Stalin's proposition, ordered his armies to prepare "to crush Soviet Russia in a quick campaign."

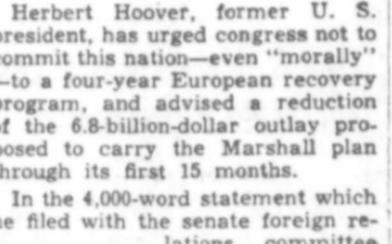

FOREIGN AID:

Hoover Plan

Herbert Hoover, former U. S. president, has urged congress not to commit this nation—even "morally"—to a four-year European recovery program, and advised a reduction of the 6.8-billion-dollar outlay proposed to carry the Marshall plan through its first 15 months. In the 4,000-word statement which he filed with the senate foreign relations committee Hoover expressed his opposition views to the administration's foreign aid plans. Of greater significance, however, was the fact that Hoover's own opinions amounted to a documentary of the entire right-wing, conservative element of thinking which rejects an "internationalist" foreign policy on the grounds that U. S. resources should be concentrated at home. Decrying even a "moral commitment" for the four-year period contemplated in the state department's proposals, he asserted the U. S. should keep itself entirely free "to end our efforts without recommitment."

DOLLARS:

Lordly

Just about the only record that Britons are interested in having broken when the revived Olympic games take place this summer is the one for the number of American dollars spent in England. While Great Britain's campaign to earn dollars in large quantities covers virtually every field from racing dogs to Rolls Royces, it is the American tourist who is getting the lion's share of attention at the moment. Harold Wilson, president of the British board of trade, minced no words when he said with quiet desperation: "Quite frankly, we are going to discriminate between tourists who are bringing in dollars and those who are not." There will be special concessions made for the people with dollars in their pockets. Certain hotels, Wilson implied, will be favored with special food supplies, fuel and labor for the purpose of catering to American tourists. Opposition to this plan is being expressed, with some fury, as a combination of the inherent British love of fair play plus a general criticism of the Labor government's policies. Editorialized the London Daily Mail: "As a bald exposition of the art of exploitation, this (Wilson's) statement would be hard to beat. Here is the profit motive in all its blatancy, expounded by a minister whose party exists to repudiate it. "What about visitors from other countries—including the dominions? Are we to cold-shoulder their francs, lire, guilders or pounds while we rush forward in obsequious welcome to the lordly dollar?"

REFUSAL:

Prediction

About all the average U. S. citizen knows about Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is that he either will or will not get into the campaign for the Republican presidential nomination this year. But Roy A. Roberts, president of the Kansas City Star and leading promoter of pro-Eisenhower sentiment, now says he definitely will not. Roberts' prediction was that the general soon would remove himself from all consideration along those lines. Said Roberts: "I'll venture a guess that before June the general may take himself completely out of the political picture. I am sure the message will come when he lays aside his military uniform February 15." He emphasized, though, that he was not speaking for Eisenhower. With Alf Landon, 1936 Republican presidential nominee, Roberts had been doing most of the political drum-beating for Eisenhower.

POLAR DATA:

The Race

Congressional sources have reported that Russian and American military planes have been competing at the top of the world for vital weather information with regular flights over the North pole. Rubber Bill

Legislation to establish a permanent, government-regulated American rubber industry with a 675,000-ton annual capacity and a required annual production of at least 225,000 tons a year has been introduced by Rep. Paul Shafer (Rep., Mich.). The bill refers throughout to the product in question as "American-made rubber." The word "synthetic" as the term "factory-made" is used in the rubber industry.

SPLITS

'Secession'?

Election year was shaping up in great style, with both Democrats and Republicans taking to the public wailing wall their fears of harmful factionalism within the party. While both sides have been pointing with enamelled smiles to evidences of their parties' unity, Democrats are worried about a possible revolt by the southern states and Republicans can't quite get together on some major issues, particularly meat rationing. Democrats ostensibly were cheered by the decision of A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, to go along with the campaign to keep President Truman in the White House. Whitney, who underwent a change of heart after having promised unrelenting opposition to Mr. Truman during the 1946 rail strike controversy, said that "we want to see the party win in 1948."

Less prepossessing, although no loyal Democrat would admit it publicly, was a threat of party "secession" from Fielding L. Wright, taking office for a full term as governor of Mississippi. In his inaugural address Wright declared that the time had come for southern Democrats to leave a party that continues to press congress to enact such "anti-southern" legislation as a permanent fair employment practices commission, anti-lynch and anti-poll tax bills and similar measures.

Democrats are starting to worry afresh over the possibility that Henry Wallace might take enough votes away from them to swing the November presidential election to the Republicans. On the basis of the 1944 presidential results, if 6 per cent of the voters switch from the Democratic nominee to Wallace in November, a Republican will be elected.

Reasons why Democratic bosses are fretting over Wallace can be seen from a survey made of the popular vote in the 1944 election. Here is what could happen:

1. If Wallace takes 10 per cent more Democratic votes than Republican votes, the GOP will carry 31 states with a total of 349 electoral college votes. That would leave the Democrats with 17 states and 182 electoral votes.
2. If Wallace gets only 7 per cent of the votes, the Democrats would salvage another state—New Mexico—and raise their electoral votes to 186, but the Republicans still would win.
3. If Wallace wins over just 6 per cent of the voters, the Democrats would remain on the short end because the Republicans would take 22 states and the comfortable margin of 281 electoral votes.

Only by holding Wallace's inroads into the Democratic vote below 6 per cent can the Democrats hope to win.

ALPHABET:

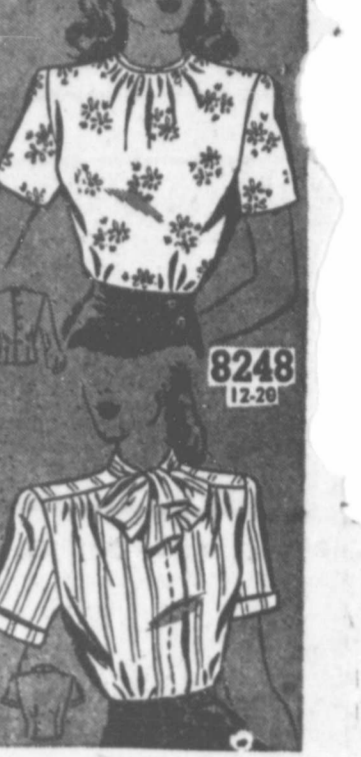
Ancient

An American scientist, Prof. W. F. Albright of Johns Hopkins university, claims to have discovered readable samples of the oldest known precursor of European and Semitic alphabets in a turquoise mine in Egypt's Biblical Mount Sinai area. The samples were in the form of inscriptions left in the pits by ancient miners, probably around 1500 B. C. The mine was last operated between the 11th and 12th centuries B. C. and the inscriptions are believed to be at least 300 years older. Apparently the alphabet contains about 28 consonants and no vowels. The inscriptions included pleas from slaves to their masters to show them mercy, Albright said. Other examples of the ancient alphabet have been discovered in Jerusalem but have proved too fragmentary for complete analysis. The newly found inscriptions are complete and detailed, Albright revealed, and evidently were chiseled with copper tools in the red sandstone walls of the mine. Albright said he made the find after climbing the summit of Abit el Khadem.

If the seat of a cane chair has worn through, and the chair does not warrant a new cane seat, buy a leatherette one at the dime store and tack it over the vacancy.

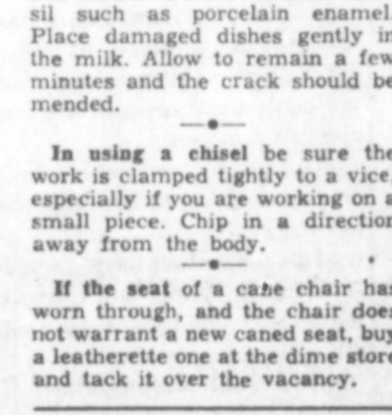

It's Easy to Serve Eggs Daily! (See recipes below.)

Eggs A-Plenty!

"My family simply refuses to eat eggs, and I don't know how to work them into my menus," says many a housewife who is trying desperately to give each member of her family "the egg a day" that nutritionists recommend.

Today, we're devoting the column to recipes which are rich in eggs. For the families who refuse to eat eggs as such, there are many ways of disguising them. Instead of poached eggs for breakfast, serve a Dutch pancake, for example, and see how well received it is; use batter bread for lunch, and serve a vegetable custard for dinner. Isn't it easy?

Dutch Pancake (Serves 4)

4 eggs
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons soft butter
Confectioners' sugar
Jam

Beat the eggs. Sift flour and salt together and add to eggs alternately with milk to make a smooth batter. Spread butter over the bottom and sides of a cold frying pan. Pour in batter and place in a hot (400 degrees) oven. Bake 20 to 25 minutes, reducing heat gradually to moderate (350 degrees) during the baking. Pancake should puff at the sides and be crisp and brown. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar and spread with jam. Roll like an omelet. Serve on hot platter at once.

Batter Bread (Serves 4)

3 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup sweet milk
1/2 cup fine white cornmeal
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons melted butter or shortening

Set baking pan in oven to heat. Beat eggs, add buttermilk and sweet milk, beat well and add dry ingredients sifted together, then the butter. Grease heated pan, pour in batter and bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) until set in center, about one hour. Serve at once.

There was a number of vegetables which are enhanced if they are made with an egg mixture and baked. Why not try one of these when adding eggs to the diet as well as your vegetable?

Corn Custard (Serves 6)

3 eggs
2 cups canned corn, kernel style
2 tablespoons melted butter
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon sugar
Cracker crumbs
Butter

Beat eggs well. Combine with corn, melted butter and milk. Stir well. Add seasoning and sugar. Pour into a buttered casserole and sprinkle with cracker crumbs, then dot with butter and bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven for 40 minutes or until the custard is firm.

LYNN SAYS: You Need Time Savers in the Kitchen

Potatoes will bake in half the time if you parboil them first for 15 minutes.

Rhubarb, celery, asparagus and green onions should be cut by the bunch rather than by the stalk. Use a board and a very sharp knife.

Paper towels or napkins kept in the bottom of a hydrator will prevent rust from forming on lettuce and other greens.

Ham-Cheese Souffle (Serves 4)

1 1/2 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese
4 eggs
4 slices ham
4 slices tomato

Add milk, seasoning and cheese to slightly beaten eggs. Turn the mixture into a baking dish which has been greased and lined with ham and tomato and set into a pan of hot water. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 25 to 30 minutes or until the custard is firm. Let stand for three minutes and unroll onto a platter. Serve with tomato sauce, which may be heated canned tomato soup.

The above mixture also may be baked in individual ramekins. Place ham and tomato slice on bottom of each before pouring in the mixture.

There are lots of fine variations for omelet that make it ideal for serving as a main luncheon or supper dish.

***Omelet Supreme (Serves 6)**

6 eggs, separated
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup green pepper or parsley, finely chopped
2 tablespoons onion, finely chopped
2 cups creamed tuna, chicken, lobster or vegetables

Add salt to whites and beat stiff. Beat yolks then add pepper and flour and beat to blend thoroughly. Add green pepper and onion. Fold yolk mixture into beaten whites. Pour mixture into two well greased hot eight-inch layer pans (place pans in oven to heat while mixing omelet). Spread mixture lightly in the pans having mixture higher around the edge. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 15 minutes or until knife inserted comes out clean. To serve, invert one layer on warm serving platter. Pour about 1/2 cup creamed mixture over layer, invert second layer atop sauce. To serve, cut in pie-shaped pieces. Pans remaining creamed mixture in a bowl.

Other fillings for omelet: Chopped crisp bacon and fried potatoes; creamed tongue; chopped, cooked chicken livers with sauteed onions; creamed oysters or shrimp; corned beef hash; highly seasoned, stewed kidneys, chopped and spread over top; cooked sausage meat; broiled or creamed sweetbreads; thin slices of tomato sprinkled with soft, grated American cheese—place under broiler until cheese melts, then serve omelet immediately.

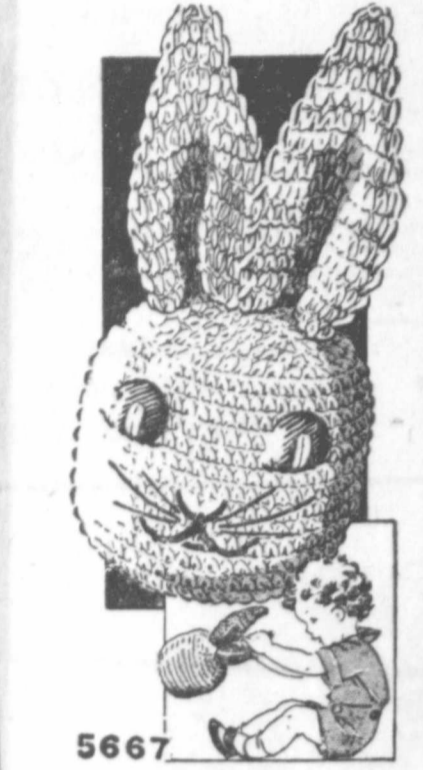
