## WEST FARM MARKETS

Major farm products continued to show trends last week. Department of Agricultural Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Corn and barley fell 27 cents a bushel in the week's trading, as oats lost a cent, and hogs 35 cents a hundredweight, for a two-week decline of around 50 to 70 cents on most grains. Lower values brought decreased demand reflected trader's lack of confidence in recent high prices.

Feed prices nosedived along with grains for losses of \$10 to \$20 a ton, but hay and rice held firm. Cotton prices dropped \$9 to \$1 per bale for the week in sympathy with other commodity markets. Sales decreased in less active trading.

Prieseased a little on fryers and broilers during the week, but other poultry changed little, and eggs held firm. Fryers sold from 34 to 37 cents a pound in north Texas. Current receipt eggs receipt eggs remained around 40 to 45 cents at Dallas and Fort Worth.

More sheep and hogs and fewer cattle were marketed in the Southwest the past week. Cattle prices of \$10.40 to \$8 or more per hundred pounds in slow weak markets. Denver showed good steers at \$24 to \$27.50, as medium and good steers and yearlings ranged from \$19 to \$25 at other southwest terminals. Common and medium cows brought generally from \$15 to \$18, and canners and cutters from \$10 to \$15.

Butcher hogs fell \$1 to \$3 or more for the week at southwest markets, and sows and pigs lost up to \$4 or \$5. Late-week top stood at \$21 at San Antonio, \$22 at Fort Worth, \$22.50 at Oklahoma City, \$22.75 at Wichita, and \$23.25 at Denver. Sows moved generally at \$16 to \$18, and feeder pigs \$10 to \$15.

# ANALYSIS

## Solid South Threatens Party Split; Government Eyes Self Ration Plan; Congress Sets Tentative Budget Cut

### CIVIL RIGHTS: 10 Points

President Truman, who seems to run to 10-point programs, concerning another one to congress—concerning the preservation and protection of civil rights—and then stood aside to await the explosion.

It came quickly. Southern Democrats, hopping mad over at least four of the 10 controversial points, began to talk seriously of calling a Dixie convention to split away from Mr. Truman on the civil rights issue.

Focus of the current disunity was a bill, up for approval by the senate labor committee, to create a national commission against job discrimination on grounds of race, creed or color.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender (Dem., La.) predicted that if the bill were approved in its present form the party would erupt into open warfare. Both foes and backers of the measure agreed that it would be a close thing.

The four proposals that most inflamed the southerners were the ones calling for (1) a federal anti-lynching law, (2) a permanent fair employment practice commission, (3) an end to Jim Crow rules in transportation and (4) outlawing of state poll taxes.

Remainder of the points advocated by the President were: A permanent commission on civil rights, a joint congressional committee on civil rights, a civil rights division in the justice department; tightening of civil rights statutes; home rule for the District of Columbia; statehood for Alaska and Hawaii; equalization of naturalization opportunities, and settlement of evacuation claims of Japanese-Americans.

Because 1948 is an election year, and a presidential election year at that, the program, which otherwise might be ignored, was certain to get hot partisan debate.

In answer to Mr. Truman's firm statement that "something must be done" about the civil rights issue, southern Democrats replied that they were thinking of calling an all-southern convention to pick its own presidential candidate.

Some thought that too drastic a step, but at Jackson, Miss., Walter Sillers, speaker of the Mississippi house of representatives, said he flatly favored such a course in order to withhold at least part of the South's electoral votes from Mr. Truman.

### Big Dealer



One of the biggest men to come before a congressional investigating committee was Isadore Ginsberg, New York lumber dealer, who refused to tell Rep. Joseph R. McCarthy (Rep., Wis.) of a joint congressional housing committee the names of 98 retailers from whom he purchased gypsum lath. McCarthy angrily called him a "gray marketer" and cited him for contempt of congress.

### SELF RATIONING: Second Best

Manifestly stymied in its efforts to get congress to pass rationing and price control legislation, the administration tried a new approach in the form of an appeal for nationwide self-rationing.

Greater public support of an intensified drive for voluntary food conservation would have to be developed if living costs are to be curbed, the administration decided.

As an initial step representatives of 18 consumer, producer and distributor groups met with Clinton Anderson, secretary of agriculture,

### to map details of the nationwide program.

Charles F. Brannan, assistant secretary of agriculture, heads the new food saving setup. Originally started by the citizens' food committee last fall, it has been carried on until now under the direct leadership of the cabinet food committee.

Major emphasis, it was understood, would be placed on meat as the pivotal item in the cost of living merry-go-round; however, other foods also would be covered in the voluntary program. Based on specific recommendations of the food industry and public representatives, it is theoretically designed to meet the twin problem of scarce food supplies and high prices.

Biggest talking point the administration had in its attempts to solicit public support was the department of agriculture's somber prediction that the nation is heading for a serious meat shortage in the spring. And by way of emphasis Brannan added that meat rationing "by price" already is in effect because many people cannot afford to buy.

### BUDGETING: Hesitant

Budget busters in the house and senate were going around and around the issues of budget cutting and tax reduction, making oblique motions in the direction of the central problem—what to cut and how much.

In terms of actual accomplishment they managed to agree tentatively on a cut of 2.5 billion dollars in President Truman's 1949 budget.

That would leave a potential surplus of 10.1 billion dollars for tax reductions and payments on the national debt. But, because of the admittedly tentative nature of their estimates, the congressional spokesmen evaded any conclusion that their budget would leave room for the full 6.5 billion dollars in tax reduction recently voted by the house.

Meanwhile, the slight jubilation that had arisen over house passage of the Knutson tax reduction bill already had died down in view of the senate's attitude toward the measure.

The senate intends to keep the bill in drydock, possibly until early summer when it expects to have a better idea of whether or not the budget slash will stick.

### FOR SALE: Some Eggs

U. S. government has hung out a "for sale" sign on 46.8 million dozen eggs that it bought last spring to support domestic prices.

There is one stipulation, however. Only foreign users will be allowed to buy them.

For the comfort of U. S. housewives the agriculture department was swift to point out that these eggs are not the kind that can be used readily for home consumption. They were shelled, dumped into huge containers and frozen before the government bought them in the first place.

Agriculture department decided to sell the eggs to foreign buyers when it was unable to sell them to bakers and confectioners in this country because egg production has been going up and egg prices down.

Hence, the eggs are being offered on a bid basis to foreign governments, relief feeding organizations and to brokers or exporting concerns to "explore possible foreign outlets" and "to help relieve the foreign shortage of food."

### GLOOMY: World Report

In a massive survey of global economy at the end of 1947 the United Nations has blocked out a dismal picture of a world that is critically short of food, plagued by industrial shortages and inflation and lacks the dollars it needs to finance the imports so vital to recovery.

Only the people of the U. S. could take heart from what the U. N. survey had to say. For this nation, with its undamaged wealth of resources and production, holds nearly all the economic chips in a world that is producing less than it did 10 years ago for a population that has increased by 200 million.

More distressing is the fact that the world outside the U. S. has bogged down following the relatively rapid strides in reconstruction made during the 18 months after the end of the war.

By clear implication the U. N. report warned that the United States, as the world's major producer and banker, is in such a position that it must carry a great responsibility toward the rest of the world economy. On this nation is resting the fate of the globe.

This, in the dry, impartial language of a United Nations survey, was the basic reason behind Secretary of State George Marshall's plan for European recovery. Marshall himself couldn't have put up a more forceful argument in favor of it.

### PENSIONS: And a Strike

While John L. Lewis was championing the bit and looking like he might call a strike of his soft coal miners this spring, coal producers were busy thinking up possible reasons for him to do so.

One theory advanced was that rivalry between Lewis and Philip Murray, president of United Steelworkers (CIO), to win pensions for their members is partly to blame for Lewis' veiled strike threat.

Murray has been negotiating for an insurance and pension plan with U. S. Steel since last April and appears to be making progress. Lewis, so the story goes, may be vying with Murray in the fight to secure pensions for workers in the big mass industries. He has demanded \$100-a-month pensions for miners aged 60, with the pensions to be paid from the bituminous welfare and retirement fund.

Operators, however, have rejected this demand, making it clear that they will not consent to any disbursements from the fund until Lewis agrees to set up the fund in accordance with the Taft-Hartley law.

### FREEZES: Honor System

In Great Britain the Labor government was trying to put voluntary self-sacrifice by the people on a paying basis.


Appearing before parliament, Prime Minister Clement Attlee proclaimed his government's opposition to any general increase of personal incomes — wages, salaries, profits or rents. He proposed, in effect, that the British people put themselves on the honor system in sacrificing possible increased earnings.

Purpose of this refined and patriotic masochism would be to combat inflation and rebuild the British economy. The people, Attlee said, must master the crisis instead of waiting to be overwhelmed by it.

Actually, the government was not freezing wages, although newspapers decried Attlee's words as implying such action. But the prime minister only used the word persuasion, not compulsion.

It has been estimated that wages in Britain have risen about 25 per cent higher than prices since 1939, and what Attlee said in effect was that if workers want to keep the gains they have won since before the war they must work harder and not seek beyond their power to achieve.

### Not Convinced

Conviction of Marzani for a one to three-year prison sentence, has been upheld unanimously by U. S. court of appeals.


### Sea Power

**FIND DOG'S FOOD  
HABITS ACQUIRED  
AND NOT INBORN**

Does Not Require Fresh Meat  
to Stay Healthy, Authority  
States

Dog owners who are fearful for the health of their pets because of the current scarcity and high prices of fresh meat are reassured by Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

The dog's welfare does not require that he consume fresh meat, he states. Dogs will do as well or better on popular brands of prepared dog foods of which there is an ample supply in groceries and which contain in balanced nutritious form all the proteins, fats, carbohydrates and the essential vitamins and minerals that meat does not provide.

As a matter of fact, he says, the situation today as regards dog food is not unlike that experienced during the war years. With little fresh meat and no canned dog foods available, millions of dogs were kept on prepared dry dog foods, and they came through in the best physical condition they had ever been in.

**"Lean Red Meat" Myth**

It is erroneous to assume that dogs always prefer raw meat to any other food, according to Mr. Miller. Appetite is an acquired, not an inborn quality, and just as Eskimos with

their raw fish and Pygmies with their ant and caterpillars have food habits different than our own, so do dogs, under domesticated conditions, accept and eat the most diverse kinds of foods as long as they supply the required nutrients. In fact, animals raised in laboratories on "synthetic rations" hardly know what to do with a bone or a piece of meat.

"The feeding habits of the coyote, who is probably the closest American wild cousin of the dog, are a case in point," Mr. Miller states. "When the coyote stalks and kills a sheep, for instance, he doesn't go for the lean red meat his victim offers. He makes instead for the viscera, where he finds a combination of animal proteins and the nourishing, partially digested cereal foods that have resulted from grazing. What the coyote does by instinct man has accomplished for dogs, through science, by combining in prepared dog food all the ingredients a dog requires for complete nourishment."

**Life Span Increasing**

Mr. Miller also points out that, again as in the case of humans, the life-span of the dog has increased tremendously in the last 25 years—the exact period during which prepared dog foods have come into popular use. Countless dogs today live to the age of 11 or 12, whereas not so long ago it was uncommon for a dog to survive beyond 7 or 8 years. One dog died recently at the unheard of age of 26—the equivalent of 135 human years—and to his dying day his meals consisted of prepared dog food of a dry variety. There is little doubt the average life-span of dogs today would be even longer than it is but for the high mortality from car accidents, which snuff out the lives of thousands of dogs annually in the prime period of their existence, he states.

**SLED DOG TEAMS  
SERVE MANKIND**


Indispensable in Arctic Regions  
for Transportation Over  
Land, Sea-Ice

In a world where all forms of transportation have been brought to a high state of speed and perfection, there are still sections of the globe where the colorful sled dog team reigns supreme, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

Sled dogs are still considered to be the only reliable means of transportation over land and sea-ice in the Arctic regions. Eskimos, trappers, traders, mail-carriers, explorers, police and missionaries all depend upon and use sled dogs for travel. The Army has successfully employed sled dogs for airplane salvage operations, rescue missions, and for normal travel and freighting. In the early days of World War II, the Army tested dog teams against three million dollars' worth of snow vehicles, and found the sled dog team indispensable for transporting supplies and equipment, and carrying on ambulance service over terrain where motor vehicles can operate and in weather when aircraft is grounded.

A fine dog team is more than just a group of dogs. It is a hand-picked working unit of dogs which are matched in gait, size and stamina. The training starts at six months of age, when one or two youngsters are hitched with an older, experienced team of dogs and are taught by their example. The young dogs soon learn that they must keep their proper place in the team, must pull a fair share of the weight, and that the lead dog is the boss.

There are four distinct breeds of sled dogs—the Alaskan Malamute, the Eskimo, the Siberian Husky and the Samoyede. All are popularly called "huskies," but the name is ap-

plied properly only to the Siberian breed. While all four breeds do the same work, they vary considerably in abilities and characteristics.

There probably is no more dramatic story of the North than that of the heroic serum dash from Nenana to Nome, Alaska. A severe epidemic of diphtheria broke out in Nome in the winter of 1925, and the entire supply of antitoxin was completely exhausted. An appeal was sent out by radio for serum to be sent to the stricken city, but because of raging blizzards no aircraft could make the trip. A sled dog driver named Gunnar Kasson volunteered to make the over six hundred-mile dash with the serum. His lead dog, a Siberian Husky named Balto, was hitched with a team of twelve other dogs and the dogs and their driver set out in a raging blizzard. Under the most adverse weather conditions, a distance of 665 miles was covered in 5 1/2 days, a record for speed which still stands. Today Balto is immortalized by a larger than life-sized bronze statue in New York City's Central Park.

Dessert lovers everywhere enjoy deep-dish, fruit puddings with their crisp crusts, their mouth-watering fragrance. The grand thing about them is that they are simple to make at any time during the year, but especially during the months when fresh fruit is not so readily available.

First of all, there are canned cherries, plump, red and juicy. But don't stop there, for you may like to use apples or figs, pears and apricots, and even some of the citrus fruits. All of them are happy inspiration for meals that you want to be filling and hearty.

Another thing you'll like about these desserts is that they are simplicity itself to prepare. Use them often for economy's sake on days when you use the oven for the rest of the meal.

**\*Special Cherry Cobbler**  
 (Serves 6)

1 No. 2 can tart, pitted red cherries  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 3 tablespoons cornstarch  
 1/4 to 1/2 cup milk  
 1 cup prepared biscuit mix  
 1 cup shredded American cheese

Drain the cherries and heat the juice to boiling. Blend sugar and cornstarch in enough water to make a thin paste. Gradually add this to the hot cherry juice and cook until thick and clear. Add the cherries. Place in a shallow baking dish. Add the milk to the biscuit mix and blend well. Roll out into an oblong piece, 1/4 inch thick. Sprinkle with shredded slices of cheese and roll up like a jelly roll. Cut into 1/2 inch slices and place them around the edge of the cherry mixture. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes or until the biscuit pinwheels are done.

**Peach Honey Cobblers.**  
 (Serves 6)

1/2 cup strained honey  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 2 teaspoons butter, melted  
 1 No. 2 1/2 can sliced peaches, drained

Combine honey, cinnamon and butter. Add peaches. Place in individual custard cups. Use the following as a crust:

1 cup sifted flour  
 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 2 teaspoons sugar  
 2 tablespoons shortening  
 2/3 cup milk

Sift dry ingredients together; cut in shortening until it resembles coarse meal. Add milk, stirring until mixture is damp.

Drop dough onto prepared fruit; spread evenly to the edge. Bake in a hot oven until crust is nicely browned. Serve warm with cream or hard sauce.

In place of peaches, apricot halves or plums may be used.
