Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Most southwest farm products sold around steady to a little higher during the past week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A ternate up and down movements left cotton around \$1 higher. Spot middling 15-16 inch closed Monday at 34.30 cents per pound at Dallas.

Eggs weakened very little last week, as the Easter season approached, and Monday's markets held mostly steady to firm at around 38 to 40 cents a dozen for current receipts in the Southwest. Poultry gained some strength last week and continued firm to higher Monday. Heavy hens ranged mostly from 27 to 30 cents.

Widespread strikes of packing house workers found only half as many cattle coming to 12 mid-west markets last week as the week before and generally fewer hogs and sheep. However Texas and Oklahoma terminals attracted about as many cattle and more hogs and sheep compared to the previous week's weather-lightened receipts. Broad demand from killers, order buyers, and those pickers still able to operate helped offset the effect of strike-bound plants who were out of the market, and southwest livestock prices showed more gains than losses for the week.

Rather uneven trends prevailed on Monday's cattle markets, with spots of strength and weakness. Medium and good steers and yearlings ranged from \$23 to \$26 in Texas and Oklahoma, and good steers sold from \$20.50 to \$27 at Wichita and Denver. Active hog markets gained 50 cents to \$1.50 Monday. A spread from \$23.50 to \$24.50 took most good and choice medium weight butchers. Sows moved mainly at \$17 to \$18.50, but San Antonio paid to \$20.50. Lambs predominated in this week's opening sheep markets in slow trade. Fort Worth sought choice spring lambs to \$23.00.

Skating, Growing Swiftly as the Popular Pastime.

BOSTON.—The winter sports "industry" in the skiing areas of northern New England is in full blast. Usually the winter-time activities reach a peak over Washington's birthday or in March, but this year skiing began in northern Vermont as early as mid-November, and practically every important area is reporting "good" to "excellent" conditions, an unheard-of phenomenon for so early in the season.

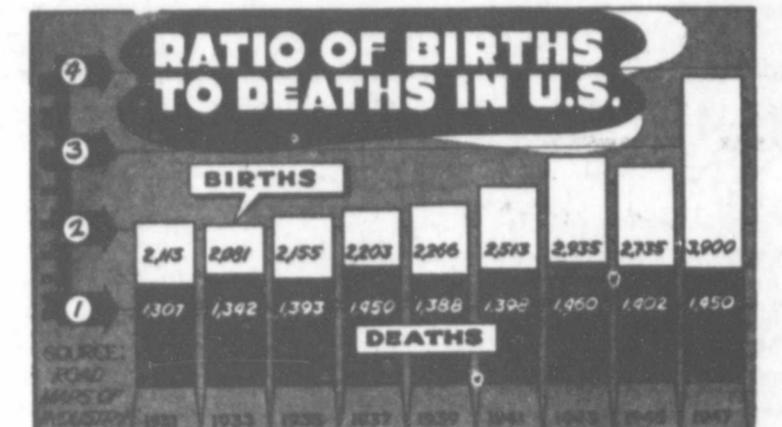
Hotels are packed in all but the more remote areas. At North Conway's Eastern Slope inn, 6,000 people fought for the 260 accommodations available. A record-breaking season is reported for the entire area.

The White mountains of New Hampshire, Green mountains of Vermont and the Berkshire hills in western Massachusetts comprise the most intensively developed winter sports region in the country, all within easy reach of populous New York City and southern New England.

In this area some 700 inns in 200 towns throw open their doors for the cold weather business. This year 253 ski towns and lifts—25 per cent more than were in operation last year—are dragging people uphill to risk life and limb on 1,500 miles of downhill ski trails. At present there are believed to be upward of 300,000 skiers in the six-state territory.

W.S. ANALYSIS Truman, MacArthur Would Accept Presidency "if the People Call"; Great Powers Confer on Palestine

The United States is experiencing a steady increase in population. From a range of 2.1 million to 2.3 million in the 1930s, births rose to 2.9 million in 1945. They totaled 2.7 million in 1945 and then sharply rose again to about 3.9 million in 1947. This sharp rise in births has had the effect of increasing the population some 4.4 million persons since 1945 and 13 million since 1939.

PRESIDENCY: Announcements

As far as grabbing the spotlight was concerned, President Truman and Gen. Douglas MacArthur stumbled all over each other with their coy and almost simultaneous announcements that they would accept a presidential nomination if the people called them.

The declarations by the two men, coming within just a few hours of each other, were perhaps a symbolic prelude to a similar but greater clash of personalities and political forces which it is now possible might develop later this year.

Mr. Truman said he would run for a full term as chief executive if the Democrats would nominate him; and MacArthur declared that he would accept the presidency "if called by the American people" but would not actually seek it.

Taking note of the fact that petitions have been filed in Wisconsin putting his name in the primary there on April 6, MacArthur issued this sonorous statement:

"While it seems unnecessary for me to repeat that I do not actively seek or covet any office and have no plans for leaving my post in Japan, I can say, and with due humility, that I would be recreant to all my concepts of good citizenship were I to shrink because of the hazards and responsibilities involved from accepting any public duty to which I might be called by the American public."

Republicans, however, were going easy in their comments on the general's willingness to accept presidential nomination, confining them, for the most part, to peripatetic remarks about what a highly regarded figure MacArthur is. Sen. Ralph Flanders (Rep., Vt.) said, "I think General MacArthur would be doing the country a disservice if he left the job he is in until he has put it in such shape he can leave. That's the place the Lord put him."

Other politicians were wondering about the spot that the Lord and Harry Truman was putting them on. Southern Democrats, despite Mr. Truman's announcement of his candidacy, were not burling an inch from their stand opposing him and his civil rights program. Some of the southern states, notably Mississippi, went right ahead with their plans to prevent their electoral votes from going to him.

NEW ATOM: Thorium

Already well beyond the awesome threshold of the atomic age, nuclear scientists are continuing to step deeper into the contradictory wilderness of creation and destruction that appeared when the first atomic blast burned up the night and the sands at Los Alamos, N. M.

Latest step is the manufacture of the first small pieces of a new kind of atomic bomb and fuel metal, according to an announcement by Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, atomic scientist.

Where formerly the extremely rare metal uranium 235 was the only practicable substance through which atomic energy could be produced, there now is a new metal, known as uranium 233, made by changing the heavy metal thorium into uranium.

This new form of uranium does not exist naturally on earth, nor is it known to exist in the stars.

Dr. Seaborg reported that a small fraction of an ounce—actually only a few hundred milligrams—of the thorium metal has been made in the Hanford, Wash., uranium-graphite, chain-reacting atomic piles. Apparently, although Dr. Seaborg did not amplify his announcement to include this implication, the use of thorium for atomic power is considered practicable.

Since thorium is three times more plentiful than uranium it will be the world's main reliance for atomic power.

PANIC PITCH

Americans Ready to Go off Deep End

People of the U. S. are conducting their day-by-day activities in a state of mind that is separated from a condition of acute panic by only the merest veil of self-restraint, says Dr. Frank Fremont-Smith of the International Committee for Mental Hygiene.

CONSULTATION: Holy Land

Leading experts on global anatomy were getting together in a consultation to determine whether there was any conceivable way in which they could perform a painless bisection of Palestine.

Russia, France, China and the U. S. had been requested by the United Nations security council to hold one of their famous conferences to study how partition of the Holy Land into independent Arab and Jewish states might be effected. Britain, too, had been asked to participate but declined the invitation, although consenting to sit in the role of advisor.

As the consultation got under way, the United States was reported ready to seek big power agreement on a new conciliation effort in Palestine. Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate, said he felt the talks should deal primarily with the question of "peaceful settlement."

But while U. N. delegates might talk in New York about a peaceful settlement, Arab military forces on the spot in Palestine had vastly different ideas.

Arab Commander-in-Chief Fawzi el Kawjki publicly issued a vow to free Palestine from "the Zionist menace whether it takes one month, one year or a generation."

Red-haired El Kawjki, the Arab chieftain who had led anti-British and anti-Jewish revolts in 1936 and 1939, had just returned to Palestine after an absence of nine years. He came back, he said, to fight "partition, intrigue and Zionism."

"We came here to fight anyone who stands for partition, be they British, Jewish or an international force."

What the United Nations conferees, none of them eager to apply international power in the Holy Land, could do against this kind of gun-waving local zeal was a problem which so far had them completely baffled.

RUHR: Solution

One of the major problems of the uneasy peace—what to do with the Ruhr, Germany's prime industrial section—was solved when the U. S., Great Britain and France agreed in a series of conferences at London that they would place the Ruhr under international control.

It was decided also that the economic and industrial assets of western Germany, perennial breeding ground for German war machines, would be enlisted in the Marshall plan.

Moreover, the western powers agreed that western Germany should have a federal form of government, providing adequate central authority but protecting the rights of the various states.

Indicative of the manner in which statesmen of the western powers are thinking now was the fact that Germany will be represented in the international control of the Ruhr but that Russia very probably will not.

Recognizing the importance of the Ruhr to the recurring surges of German aggression, the conference communique pointed out that "the purpose of this international control would be to ensure that the economic resources of this area should not again be used for the purposes of aggression and that there should be adequate access to the coal, coke and steel of the Ruhr for the benefit of extensive parts of the European community including Germany."

Stressing the absolute need for cooperation among the British, American and French zones of western Germany, the conference observed that the "continuous failure" of the foreign ministers council to reach four-power agreement "has created a situation in Germany which, if permitted to continue, would have increasingly unfortunate consequences for western Europe."

TEA for the Southern taste

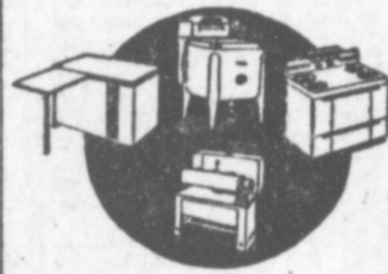

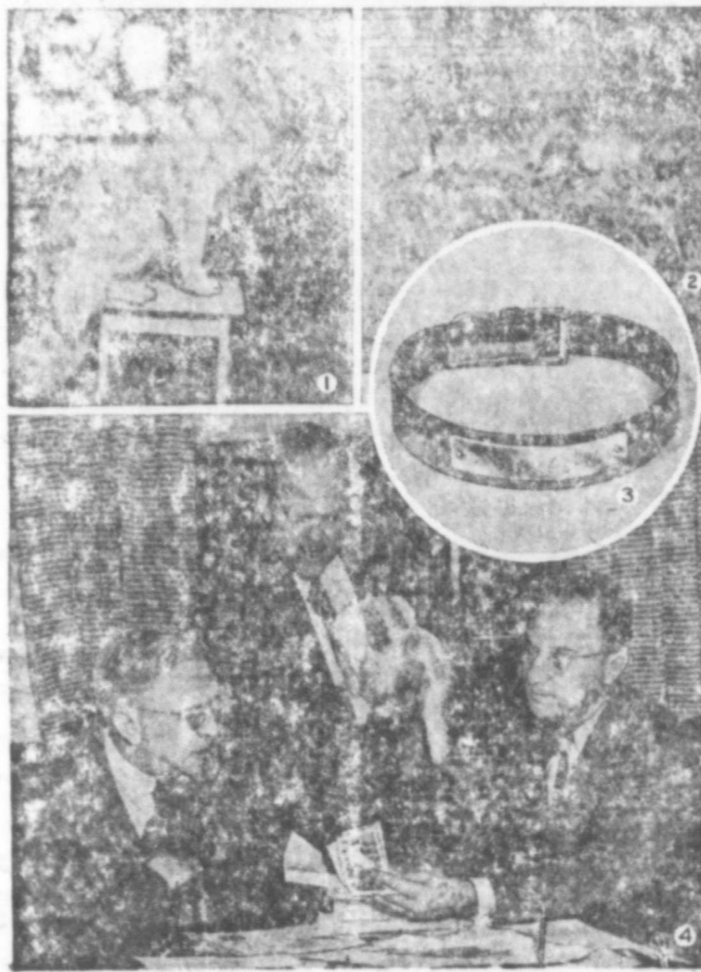

Rural Dogs Voted "Most Useful" Title

Pennsylvania and Idaho Canines So Outstanding Judges Can't Decide Between Them

A committee of judges, weighing the merits of candidates in "America's Most Useful Dog of 1947" contest, finally decided to award the title to two dogs, it has been announced.

The winning dogs are "Tubby," a Collie-St. Bernard owned by Karl B. Loud, R.F.D. 1, Wellsboro, Penna., and "Spike," of German Shepherd and mixed ancestry, owned by Mrs. Ed Schlagel, Route 1, Cataldo, Idaho. Each dog had so many qualifications that the judges simply could not decide between them.

The contest to find the "Most Useful Dog" was undertaken by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, as part of the observance of the 1947 National Dog Week. Judges in the contest were Sydney H. Coleman, executive vice president of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; Ted Malone, prominent radio personality; and Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center. The two dogs have been presented by the Research Center with hands-on red and blue collars bearing sterling silver engraved plates attesting to their honors in this contest.

"Tubby," only a year and a half old, is not only an excellent all-round watch dog, but a real herd dog who takes out and brings in the cows each day in the best farm tradition. For this purpose he carries a stick in his mouth which he wields with great dexterity. In addition, he brings in the mail, carries firewood into the house, carries pills to and from the horse and barn, bears notes to and from his master in the field, saves his mistress endless steps by fetching from upstairs rooms hat, shoes, wallet or other desired articles, and performs a variety of similar chores. He can also do about 50 tricks, count up to ten, and, according to reliable witnesses, can speak a few words—although the judges did not take these last into consideration in selecting him for the award.

"Spike," on the other hand, serves as right-hand-man to Mrs. Schlagel, who, with an invalid husband, has the responsibility of running a 190-acre ranch. He, too, is an expert herd dog with cattle. Among his other accomplishments is acting as chaperone to his owner's flock of chickens, pulling a wagon and skidding small trees. He is an exceptional hunting dog and has cleared his owner's property of coyotes, badgers and other vermin. A vigilant watch dog, "Spike" keeps his home place free of all trespassers. He watches over the Schlagel children, whether at home or in the woods, as anxiously as a mother.

EDUCATION And Religion

In a ruling that, for good or ill, could stand to affect the moral stature of this and succeeding generations of Americans, the U. S. supreme court declared unconstitutional the use of public school systems to help any religious group spread its faith.

Religion and government, the decision said, "can best work to achieve their lofty aims if each is left free from the other within its respective sphere."

The ruling upheld a protest by self-professed atheist mother, Mrs. Vashti McCollum, that a system of religious teaching in Champaign, Ill., schools breaks down the wall between church and state.

Delivering the main opinion, Justice Black held that under the facts shown the compulsory education system in Illinois "assists and is integrated with the program of religious instruction carried on by separate religious sects." He said pupils legally required to go to school for secular education are released from some of that legal duty on condition that they attend religious classes.

"This is beyond all question a utilization of the tax-established and tax-supported public school system to aid religious groups to spread their faith."

It was an issue that parents as well as all other U. S. citizens would do well to consider.

There were two facets which would bear reflection:
 The supreme court's decision confirmed a long-standing and honorable theory in the U. S. that there should be no interference between church and state and no influence exerted by one on the other. The ruling would seem to safeguard the nation against the two extremes of a state-controlled church or a church-controlled state.

But at the same time, the broad language of the decision failed to recognize the historical importance of religion in creating civilizations and forming and molding nations. Western civilization grew out of the Christian church. Divorcement of the cause and effect now could be dangerous.

FINNISH: Aid to Russia

It was with no clapping of hands that the government of Finland decided to accept the proposal of Prime Minister Josef Stalin of Russia to discuss a treaty of mutual military aid.

Russia, which needs military help from Finland about as much as the U. S. needs a five-year plan, put the proposal of a discussion to Finland's President Jugo K. Paasikivi within a week after it had swept Czechoslovakia into the Soviet orbit.

Having no alternative, Paasikivi accepted the "invitation" and appointed a negotiating delegation of seven members, including one military expert, government officials and parliament members.

Soviets say they want a binding treaty of mutual military assistance against future German aggression. Talks presumably were being held on that basis, but it was the task of the Finnish negotiators to do all they could to prevent Finland from being chained to Russia in a military treaty.

There was little doubt in the minds of Finnish leaders that this was Russia's first step in a campaign to gain as complete control over that little northern nation as it now holds over the Balkans. And in the final analysis the Finns would capitulate in the stark interests of self-preservation.

ALCOHOL: For Fuel

NEW YORK. — A supreme justice ruled that a child born the result of artificial insemination is legitimate.

The ruling was made by Justice Henry Clay Greenberg in deciding that the estranged husband of Mrs. Julie Strnad, 41, had a right to visit her daughter, four-year-old Antoinette, who she said was a product of artificial insemination.

Mrs. Strnad claimed that her husband, Antoine, 42, was sterile since birth, an allegation he denied. She sought to prevent him from seeing the child on the ground Antoinette was not the offspring of her ex-husband. She had won a separation decree and principal custody of the child last October.

Atomic Danger Zone Posted For Tests on New Weapons

WASHINGTON. — The atomic energy commission has posted a "Danger—Keep Out" notice covering 39,000 square miles of the Pacific ocean surrounding Eniwetok atoll, site of forthcoming "tests of military weapons."
 "Hazards will exist" in a rectangular area approximately 173 miles north and south and 226 miles east and west, the commission said.
 The danger will continue throughout 1948.

Plane Crosses Ocean With Dead Man; Bishop Safe

did in 1947. The number of people doing so had risen to 200,000 in 1948. Fast-growing mechanization of farms is largely responsible for this feat, Joseph A. Hoban, merchandising manager of B. F. Goodrich company, told members of Midwest Implement Dealers association. He cited the fact that the nation's tractor "population" had doubled, from one million to two million, just since 1940.
 Praising "the way America's farmers and other food producers had come through to ease tragic conditions in many lands," Hoban cited the following estimates on the nation's 1947 exports of foodstuffs: 392 million bushels of wheat, five times the amount exported in 1939; 88 million bushels of corn, compared to 32 million in 1939, and 328 million pounds of meat products, against 193 million in 1939.
 The farm market offered "the biggest sales opportunity" for industry in 1947, Hoban said, adding that "there is no question that this market is going forward at as great or even greater pace in 1948."
 Hoban said that all tractors now made are rubber-tired, and that changing all a farm's rolling stock from steel to rubber tires produced an average saving of 24 working days and 675 gallons of gasoline per year, for each 150 acres worked.
