Swing of SOUTH WEST FARM MARKETS

Corn and livestock showed weaker trends as most other south-west products showed steady to slightly higher prices during the past week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Last week's steady to weaker trends continued Monday at south west cattle markets. Stocker and feeder cattle enjoyed relatively better demand than slaughter classes, and often brought higher prices. Medium and good stocker calves brought \$21 to \$25 at Houston, \$24 to \$26.50 at San Antonio, and \$21 to \$26 at Fort Worth, while choice lots sold to \$30 at Denver. Oklahoma City bought common and medium stocker yearlings and calves at \$17 to \$23.

All hog classes suffered net losses of largely \$1 to \$1.50 a hundred pounds for the week. Top butcher hogs brought \$20 at San Antonio Monday, \$21 at Fort Worth and \$21.25 at Oklahoma City. Wichita bought good and choice medium weights from \$20.25 to \$20.75, while Kansas City paid \$20 to \$21, and Denver bid \$20.50. Egg and poultry markets remained firm, and some strengthened slightly, in the week after Easter. Dallas and Denver paid 38 to 39 cents a dozen on Monday for current egg receipts, while Fort Worth gave 40 to 41 cents. The Dallas-Fort Worth area took heavy hens largely from 27 to 28 cents a pound, and fryers 38 to 40 cents on a live bird almost \$6 a bale in the week's tone. Spot middling to 16 inch clover Monday at 16.10 cents a pound at Dallas.

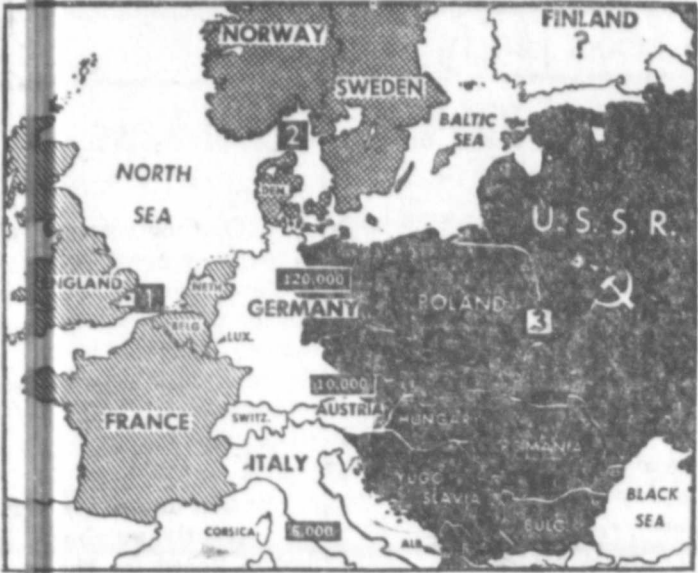

Truman Calls for Draft, Training To Bolster Resistance to Russia; U.S. Reverses Stand on Partition

FORCES AT WORK... Increasing Communist pressure in Europe has been instrumental in dividing the continent into three component power blocs, all of which are influenced by a fourth force—U.S. policy, symbolized by the presence of American troops in Germany, Austria and Italy.

THE PRICE Peace and War

"We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

Those words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U. S. congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation has had for half a century.

Disregarding any political overtones there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of congress reflected the realization at the top level of government that any successful foreign policy must be based on the fundamental concept of striking a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back up those commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation expressing such a policy possesses the strength in military forces and alliances to follow it consistently at all times and to defend it just as consistently in case of war.

In that connection Mr. Truman specifically asked congress for power to draft men to build armed strength against the ruthless aggression of Soviet communism.

He asked also for "prompt enactment of universal training legislation," indicating that the draft should be only temporary until universal military training is giving the country the trained men it needs.

Finally, he sought swift passage of the \$5.3-billion-dollar European recovery program—the Marshall plan for economic recovery of western European nations which is setting the Kremlin's teeth on edge.

Bluntly the President upbraided Russia for making a travesty of peace:

"One nation has not only refused to cooperate in the establishment of a just and honorable peace, but even worse—has actively sought to prevent it."

Western Pact

Lending force to Mr. Truman's scattering of the seeds of foreign policy was the fact that, an hour before he delivered his pronouncement, the just-completed five-nation western European pact for common defense against attack had been announced officially.

Under the treaty, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

According to the new "Truman doctrine" the United States would be the principal guarantor of this five-power union. Without such a guarantee of U.S. backing, the western European treaty would be meaningless.

By its declaration in support of the western European pact Mr. Truman seemed to be guiding the U.S. to a point of departure from its historic adherence to the diplomatic norm of refusing to engage in "entangling alliances" even at the price of its own welfare.

BACHELORS: Declining

Evidence of an innate desire for family life among adult Americans is revealed in a study by the U. S. bureau of the census showing a long-term decline in the proportion of bachelors of both sexes.

On a numerical basis, census bureau figures disclose, the number of single men and women has dropped to the lowest level since 1920, despite a third increase in population since then.

TRIESTE: Surprise

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U.S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the free territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center coveted by both Italians and Yugoslavs, had been made a free state under United Nations guidance in the six-months-old Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was, apparently, a shrewd and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election.

It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby kicking their Yugoslav cohorts in the face.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a rebuff for the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy, and it will may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, lost little time in answering the proposal of the U.S., Britain and France. He simply rejected the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav.

Moscow diplomats were calling the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed."

But to those who were working tooth and nail against the spread of communism it looked like a master stroke, one which might keep Italy and all of western Europe out of reach of the Kremlin.

FOOD WASTE: Rats, Insects

Although the world is crying for food, hundreds of thousands of tons of American foodstuffs are spoiled each year by the depredations of rats, mice and insects—and often by the carelessness of some producers.

Food and drug administration officials say the amount of so-called "filthy food" they destroy every year is enough to contribute "very substantially" to the hungry areas of the world.

"Filthy food" is the legal term for food spoiled by "contamination of rats, mice, insects or other repulsive foreign bodies." It is the job of the food and drug administration to find and condemn filthy food in the channels of interstate commerce and to prosecute those responsible.

Since FDA's power to condemn filthy foods at their destination was taken away a year ago, officials estimate that, as a result, 20 tons of such food appears in retail outlets every day.

RABBITS: Meat Supply

There is one vast source of meat—maybe an inexhaustible one—that the U.S. public might have to consider seriously if beef and pork become as scarce and expensive as it is predicted they will: Rabbits.

That is a department of agricultural idea. The department suggested that the American people take up the raising of rabbits as a supplementary source of meat to eke out the usual protein fare, destined to become more scarce and costly.

National rabbit week, which was observed during the week following Easter, would be "a good time" for families to plan to produce a "year round supply of this white, delicately flavored, nutritious meat, comparable to breast of chicken," the department hinted.

What does one need to begin raising rabbits? Just rabbits.

Expanding Colleges

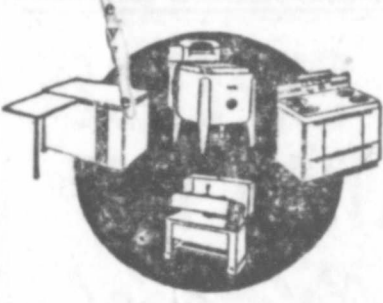

Honey Almond Cream Cake Tops Desserts
(See recipes below)

Dessert Tonic

If you're casting about for new desserts, you'll like the ones we've selected today. All of them are really luscious and fun to make. But there's even more fun to serving them and listening to the family rave over them.

Just about this time of year we want to do something different to our menus and it's a good idea to start in the dessert department.

You may like a delicious honey almond cream cake with a delectable filling to put just the right ending to the dinner; or, perhaps a honey applesauce cake would be just the thing.

Maybe you'd even prefer an unusual variation of apple pie, or one of the other pastries which haven't been in the picture. You'll find these in today's column whether it's for luncheon, dinner or just entertaining.

Honey Almond Cream Cake
(Makes two 8-inch layers)
2 cups sifted cake flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1/3 cup milk
3/4 cup light corn syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 eggs
1/2 cup honey
1 1/2 cups oven-popped rice cereal
1 tablespoon melted butter.

Sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt into mixing bowl. Add shortening, milk, corn syrup, vanilla and almond extract. Beat until smooth, about 150 strokes. Scrape bowl and spoon often during baking. Add eggs and beat 250 strokes; scrape bowl. Add honey and beat 150 strokes. Pour batter into two 8-inch greased pans. Sprinkle one layer with rice cereal which has been crushed and mixed with melted butter. Bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven about 30 minutes. When cool, spread honey almond cream between layers, placing the layer with topping on top.

Honey Almond Cream Filling
2 tablespoons light corn syrup
2 tablespoons honey
3 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg yolk, slightly beaten
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Mix together corn syrup, honey, flour and salt. Combine egg and milk. Add to first mixture and blend well. Cook over hot water stirring constantly until thick and smooth, about four minutes. Cool; add flavoring. Spread between layers of cake.

Applesauce Spice Cake
(Makes 9 servings)
1/2 cup bran
1 cup sweetened applesauce
1/2 cup shortening
2/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup seedless raisins

Soak bran in applesauce. Blend shortening, sugar and salt. Add egg and beat well. Stir in bran alternately with sifted dry ingredients. Add nuts and raisins. Spread in

Don't roll the pastry too much or it will be tough. And avoid extra amounts of flour.

Never stretch the pastry to fit the tin or it will shrink. Fit loosely to avoid shrinkage.

To prevent a soggy crust in berry and fruit pies, place in a hot oven on the lower shelf to set the crust and bake it before it becomes soaked with the filling.

Honey Meringue
1/4 cup honey
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 egg white
Heat honey over hot water; pour over egg white; add salt. Beat until thick enough to spread.

Cocoanut Cream Pie
(Nine Inch Pie)

1/2 cup sugar
5 tablespoons flour
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk
3 egg yolks, well beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup cocoanut shredded
Combine first three ingredients, then add milk and cook over low heat until thickened. Add egg yolks and cook two minutes. Remove from fire, cool, and add vanilla and cocoanut. Pour into baked pie shell and cover with the following meringue:

Meringue
4 tablespoons sugar
2 egg whites, well beaten
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Add sugar to egg whites, beating constantly. Add salt and vanilla. Pile lightly on pie bringing it over the crust. Brown in a moderate oven for 9 to 10 minutes.

***Chocolate Chip Custard Pie**
(10 Inch Pie)
4 egg yolks, beaten
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups milk, scalded
1 tablespoon gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 graham cracker crust
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate, chopped fine
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup sugar
Beat egg yolks, add sugar and milk and cook in double boiler until thick. Add gelatin softened in water and vanilla. Cool. Pour into crust and sprinkle with chocolate. Add cream of tartar to egg whites and beat until stiff. Add sugar. Continue beating until very stiff. Spread over chocolate. Chill one hour.

Deep Dish Cherry Pie
(Makes 6 servings)
1 quart pitted sour cherries, drained
3 1/2 tablespoons corn starch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon melted butter
1 cup syrup
1/2 pastry recipe

Place cherries in nine-inch deep pie dish. Combine a half cup of cherry juice with other ingredients; stir until well blended. Pour over cherries. Cut nine-inch circle from pastry rolled 1/8 inch thick; cut slits or a cherry design to let steam escape. Bake in hot (450 degree) oven 10 minutes; reduce to moderate (350 degree) oven, bake 35 minutes longer. Serve warm.

Measure shortening accurately. The water displacement method is good. For every cup of flour, 1/3 cup of shortening is required. Place 2/3 cup of water in the cup and add shortening until the water reaches the top. Saves a dirty cup, too.

Never over-mix the flour and shortening. It's best to use scissors or a pastry blender to prevent heating the fat with warm fingers. Leave some of the fat in large sized pieces so these streak through the crust and give a desired flakiness.

Religion in Schools

NOT in a generation has there been a more controversial ruling handed down by the supreme court than the 8 to 1 decision overruling the lower courts in the religious instruction case at Champaign, Ill.

Coming at a time when the nation is engaged in an all-out battle against the forces of atheistic communism and even war looms as a consequence, the court itself and newspapers throughout the country have been swamped with letters for and against the decision.

The court's ruling was based on use of tax-supported school property for religious instruction in various faiths provided by the Champaign council on religious education one period a week. An atheist brought suit because her son was "embarrassed." The court said she was right and the practice violated the first amendment to the Constitution which reads:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." No federal law was in question, merely the action of a school board which is under jurisdiction of the state, as are all public schools.

Justice Reed in his dissenting opinion held there was no more violation of the traditional separation of church and state than the practice of using chaplains in the army and navy or for congress itself.

So concerned was the neutral National Education association that it issued a statement holding the decision "in no way voids the responsibility of the public schools to inculcate those moral and ethical principles which are the essence of the good life. One of the important objectives of public education has been, and always will be, to inspire in youth a deep appreciation for the basic spiritual and religious values which give meaning to existence, provide the foundations of good character and are guides to a high order of human conduct."

About the only semblance of control remaining in the so-called rent control bill as it came from the house banking and currency committee is the name. As the measure passed the senate it was weak but the house committee merely enlarged these weaknesses and gave sole and autonomous power over rents to local boards. So it is now a "local option" law without any federal authority since right of review is taken away from the housing expediter and is, in the opinion of many, except perhaps the real estate moguls, a farce.

As was predicted in this column months ago, that section of the Taft-Hartley law which prohibited political activity by labor unions and expressions of political opinions by labor newspapers has been declared unconstitutional. The case which had president Phil Murray of the CIO under indictment will go to the supreme court.

Back to the Kitchen

The supercharged issue of whether or not federal taxes on oleomargarine should be repealed was supposed to develop into one of the most historic fights since the battle of Agincourt, but instead it dropped dead before it even got up to the line of scrimmage. The house agriculture committee administered the coup de grace by voting 16 to 10 to shelve all legislation to repeal federal taxes on oleo.

Said Rep. Clifford Hope (Rep., Kas.): "This kills legislation to repeal these taxes at this session of congress."

Some diehards, however, want to get a bill to the house floor by a discharge petition, but that would require 218 signatures and it is doubtful that they could be obtained. Meantime, housewives all over the nation continued to develop lame arms by mixing the color into the margarine themselves.

For no apparent reason except that he doesn't like to live in Washington and is not content with the way his party is running things in his home state, freshman Sen. William E. Jenner of Indiana whose term runs to 1953 plans to run for governor at the coming republican state convention at Indianapolis. And he does so despite a resolution adopted by the Indiana Republican Editorial association reminding him that he was elected to the U. S. senate and urging him to stay in Washington and tend to his knittin'.

Preparedness Program

The crisis in world affairs concerning which the President spoke in his special message to congress almost certainly will embark the government on a huge preparedness program—a program designed not for war but for peace if possible. In debate over the Marshall plan, the senate virtually howled down further Russian appeasement. But several senators urged the government to seek an atmosphere of understanding with Russia.

Two Ozark Families Sign
Treaty to Halt 'Feuding'

SALEM, ARK.—Male members of two "feuding" Ozark families have signed an agreement to "live in peace and harmony" and to let "all difficulties, differences and troubles of the past be forgotten and forever done away with."

The unusual document, filed in justice court here, was the outgrowth of a rock fight between the Lawyer and Shepard families last December.
