Mrs. Latimer is directing arrangements for the observance of Poppy Day here, when the veteran-made poppies will be worn to honor the dead of both world wars and to aid the disabled and the children of veterans.

Nearly four years now have passed since the last shots were fired in World War I reached its victorious conclusion. Yet, the dead of those two wars are not forgotten. Their memory has been kept bright all through the years by the little red poppy of remembrance which Americans wear on Poppy Day.

And in the hospital wards are men and women who are suffering because they defended America, comrades of those who died. The poppy is for them, too. Making poppies is a step in their rehabilitation. The poppies are also for the children of the dead and disabled. Contributions for the flowers help bring to them the things they need for a happy, healthful childhood and a fair start in life.
