Insurance Commissioner Calls For Quick Action

Mayor A. T. Simmons has received the following letter from the State Fire Insurance Commissioner which should give our citizens something to think about:

Dear Mr. Simmons:

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking you for the cooperation rendered our engineers at the time of their visit to your city, and we regret to note that it is necessary for us to make a 2¢ charge in your key rate on account of the fact that your fire department and equipment are not being properly maintained. We might advise that if something is not done about this situation, and in a quick manner, that on the next inspection or check up on this matter we will have no alternative but to place your city in the unprotected class with a key rate of \$1.00. Inspection showed that there were only 6 members of your fire department and drills were being held only once a month. We should think that the businessmen in your city should realize how important it is that they have adequate protection of their property and every citizen in Hedley should get right behind the fire department at once. This organization must consist of not less than 20 members, and there must be held at least two meetings each month with two hours to each drill and a majority of all the members must attend each meeting. We are going to send you under separate cover a supply of drill report blanks and you will see that the department is properly organized as outlined above and that monthly drill reports are sent to this office so as to arrive by not later than the fifth of the following month. You will also please arrange to purchase the enclosed list of drill manuals and notify us when they have been received. Please also see that the enclosed guide form is put to use in setting up a drill program and in making the monthly reports.

You will also arrange to contact Colonel H. R. Brayton, Director of the Firemen's Training School at College Station, and have him send one of his field instructors to your city when available in order to set up a recognized training program.

The fire department hose and apparatus were found on inspection to be very dirty and all in need of proper cleaning and maintenance. Your truck ought to be overhauled and equipped with several hand chemical extinguishers, pump cans and the necessary ladders and other auxiliary equipment because using this equipment is very necessary and needed when the emergency occurs. You will also arrange to have all of your fire hose tested to 200 pounds pressure at least twice each year and a pumper hose rack for washing and drying fire hose should be erected without delay. The cost of fire hose amounts to a good deal of money and this investment should be properly protected. We cannot emphasize the importance of taking care of this fire department situation immediately and without any delay.

The electric wiring at the city pumping station is in very bad condition. All of it is open and not properly supported and should be installed in an approved rigid metal conduit in accordance with the provisions of National Electric Code. We would recommend, too, the installation of a second service pumping unit, preferably with dual-driven power arrangements since you only have a single electric circuit to your pumping station.

The fire hydrants in your distribution system were found in very poor condition and we regret very much that this condition makes it necessary for us to place a charge of 2¢ in your key rate for this lack of maintenance. The hydrants all needed oil, grease, packing and painting. Some of the hydrants would not open all the way. The fire hydrant at the corner of North Third and Beaves would only open two turns and the packing leaked badly. This is a very bad situation since you have no automobile pumper and rely on hydrant flow for fighting fire. You will please arrange to have the city council pass a written order to the water works superintendent requiring that he oil, grease, flush and inspect every fire hydrant each 90 days in the future and that he paint them a distinctive color at least once a year. A copy of this order should be sent to this office for our records. All of the weeds around fire hydrants should be kept cut down and away from them at all times so that the fire hydrants will be immediately available for use in any emergency. We will strongly urge that the fire hydrant at North First and Dallas be placed back in service since there is a lumber yard adjacent with no fire hydrant available at the present time. Also your public school building, protection is poor on account of the fact that the water has come through a long dead end 4" main with pressure and volume very low.

Your fire limits ordinance is wholly inadequate. It does not specify any permissible areas or wall thickness. We are going to ask that you please arrange to pass the enclosed fire limits ordinance and send this office a certified copy of the same.

Please arrange to see that all alleys in the mercantile district are kept clean of trash and weeds at all times throughout the year and move the stored butane bottles which are now located in the fire limits out of this area to beyond the city limits if possible.

Your city is now receiving a credit of 2% for arson reward ordinance which presupposes the fact that you have arson reward placards 8x12" in size posted inside of that many public buildings in wooden frames under glass at all times. Please see that this is done if you are interested in maintaining the 2% credit, sending us a copy of one of the placards and a list of the places where they have been posted. 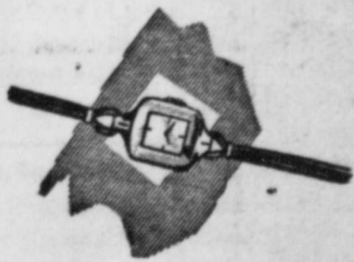

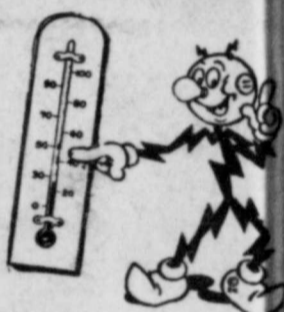


