A member of the Methodist Church, Mrs. Estlack was active in church activities until she became ill 12 years ago. She was president of the Ladies Home Demonstration Club of Donley County more than 15 years, and had been society editor of the Donley County Leader since it was established in 1929.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Sunday from the First Methodist Church at Clarendon with Rev. John A. English, pastor, and Rev. L. A. Sartain, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Clarendon cemetery.

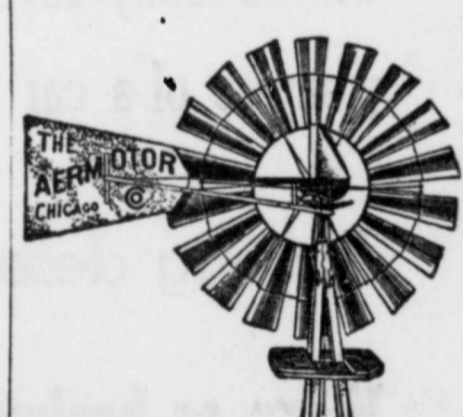

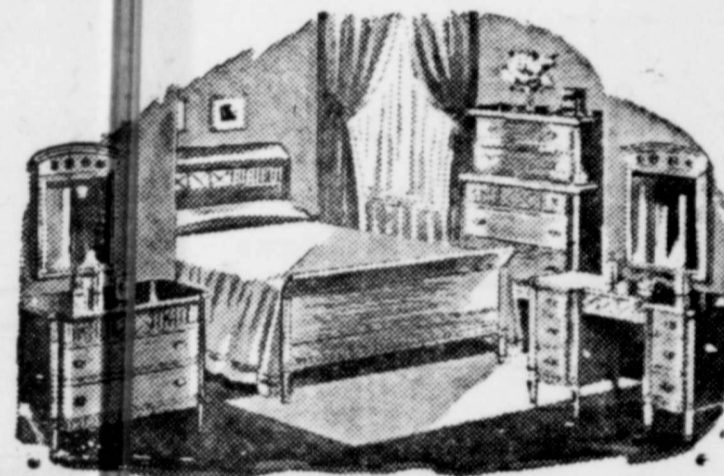
