

erererererererererere WE ALL HAD A BIG LAUGH when the Southern Baptist Convention recently came out with the decree that women should be submissive to their husbands.

My Good Old Boy said his pals had discussed this among themselves at Lions Club. Most were of the opinion that

if they went home and announced that they were "Lord of the Manor" and the little woman should submit to his every whim, he'd be sleeping out

in the dog house for quite awhile. These old Lions are the elder statesmen of the community, active in their church and civic works, with long-time marriages to their credit. They are from the era when you got married first, then lived together, and then had your babies, in that order. These marriages have evolved over many years of talking it over and working it out; the wife taking the lead in some areas, the husband taking the lead in other areas. Neither considers themself to be King or Queen of

In an autocratic relationship, one person makes all the decisions while the other person becomes subservient. Such a relationship opens the door for abuse, especially if the autocrat begins to see himself or herself as being the all-powerful one of the pair. These marriages don't usually work out very well. Research suggests that relationships of all kinds tend to be

happiest when they are roughly equitable. How often have you heard this statement? "Half of all marriages end in divorce?" This is one of the most fallacious pieces of statistical nonsense ever perpetuated on the American people! I hear officials and media throw this statement

around all the time as though it were a true fact. Here's how this came about. . . The U.S. Center for Health Statistics (a division of the Census Bureau) put out a report in the early '80s noting that 2.4 million new marriages occurred in one year and 1.2 million divorces were recorded the same year. So, from that they concluded that one out of every two marriages ends in divorce. This 50 percent figure has been misleadingly represented in this way ever since then.

The fact is, the statisticians simply overlooked the 54 million existing long-term marriages. These were not included in the figures. This changes the outlook considerably. A more accurate set of figures from a later Harris poll tells us that only one out of every eight marriages will end in divorce, and in any single year only about two percent of existing mar-iages will break up. We also note that 98 percent of marriages survive any given year, and seven out of eight will stay intact from the wedding to the death of one spouse. So the traditional family unit is still in pretty good shape regardless of what you hear.

A recent article by the American Board of Family Practice lists the following as the leading problem areas of marriages in this order: #1, Not enough time to spend together. #2, Growing in different directions. #3, Not able to talk about things. #4, Money problems. #5, Raising children. Etc. It would appear that every one of these problems could be helped by open communication with one another.

I think a better decree by the SBC would have been the age-old advice given to young couples who are about to get married: "Never go to bed when you are angry at one another." Just ask the Millers who have been married for over 60 years.







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School Lunch **Prices Given**

Bovina ISD is announcing its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch/Breakfast Program. The Office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

It was stated that there are approximately 450 acres of potatoes in the Bovina free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the spring graduate of Texas household with whom they reside. Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households, provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC case number, and an adult household member must sign the application.

Households who do not list a food stamp number or AFDC case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application.

If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "none". The application must be signed by an adult household member.


Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy the school secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Sue Nuttall, Supt., P.O. Box 70, Bovina, TX, (806) 238-1336.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the US Dept. of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.



"The web site allows potential auction bidders to quickly search for items they are interested in. For example, a fountain pen collector could learn from the computer which of the more than 600 auction lots contain fountain pens--or even a particular brand of fountain pen.

"Computer users can see auction. More photos are available on-line than in the printed version of the auction catalog," Sharp said.



September 17, 1997. He doesn't remember what he might have been thinking about when he was in the bottom level at

the elevator. Maybe Amarillo

College. Maybe a girlfriend. One thing is for sure. He was not thinking about losing his left leg. At 19, you don't think about

those kind life changing events. J. B. says he was walking on the corn at the elevator when he "stepped through a hole". The auger tore off his left leg, just below the knee, tearing through bone, muscle and tendon.

No one is sure how long J. B. screamed and yelled for help. He thinks it was about fifteen minutes. His agon-ized screams eventually aler-ted co-workers who freed him from the auger, He made his way to Muleshoe's hospital, then by airlift to Lubbock. There was too much damage

for doctors to consider reattaching his leg. J. B. says the cut and tear of the auger was clean enough that his doctors did not have to file the bone smooth.

His mother, Barbara, who has not to this day been to the site of the accident, told me he was only in the hospital for a few days before returning home to Muleshoe. In the meantime, his

acceptance to Amarillo College had arrived in the mail. One can only guess if the acceptance letter had arrived sooner, whether J. B.'s leg would still intact.

The family doesn't dwell on that, though. Mother Barbara, a teacher at Bovina schools, says looking back won't change the

Besides, J. B. is doing pretty good these days, in spite of the traumatic events at such an early point in a guy's life.

He got his first artifical leg December 9, 1997. He developed a small goal of being able to run again, like in his high school cross country days.

Through the efforts of a prosthetic research center in Oklahoma City, Nova Care Sabolich, J. B. now has his second artificial leg device.

In a vacant classroom at Bovina Elementary School where we talked this summer, he unlatched it and let me hold it to see how light-weight it was. It had a tennis shoe attached and an American flag at the knee.

This new one has a flexible leg and foot. J. B. did some running with it in June. When I spoke to his mother this week, J. B. was back in Oklahoma City for a few

She said on his first visit there after the accident, he had met a 7year-old boy who had lost a leg to a

The experience of seeing the joy of this youngster being fitted for a prosthetic leg caused J. B. to consider a career somehow involved with prosthetic research.

He told me of other children he met who had lost limbs. One young boy had lost his entire leg up to and including his hip socket. The research center in Oklahoma City was developing a leg especially for his situation.

"Each limb has to be customized for each case", J. B. said. "But there is a real thrill of joy when you see a child's eyes light up when they get their first prosthetic."

J. B. turned 20 on July 5 and will be entering South Plains College in Levelland on August 3 with sights set on an associate degree, the first step toward his present dream of working with others who have lost a limb.

It would not be difficult to lose faith when you have an accident like J. B.'s. But I sure did not see that in this young man.

He has an attitude alright. A strong, positive one. He seemed to me a fine young man who will get where he wants to be. Losing a leg has a way of putting dreams in

The day we talked his mother's little students had made American flag t-shirts in summer school. The shirts were drying on the table where J. B. sat during our interview.

The two words the kids had painted on each shirt struck me as a motto J. B. Beall II will have for a long, long time.

Go for it, J. B. And remember the words your mother had her students print on those 1998 summer school t-shirts.

"Stand Proud!"

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

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Cotton Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Facing the music is something cotton producers on the Texas High Plains get used to early in their careers. Finding ways to live with the tune being played by Mother Nature in 1998, however, hasn't been easy.

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Recognizing the need to move toward the initiation of federal relief efforts to help the farmers and ranchers standing on the front lines of this building economic crisis, Texas Cotton Producers, Inc. (TCP) is taking the story of Texas cotton to Washington, D.C., in order to bolster the efforts of other organizations and states. The timing is right, especially since national media attention has recently been focused on the plight of agriculture in Texas and on cotton in particular.

In order to garner additional support for a comprehensive disaster assistance package for farmers and ranchers, representatives of TCP travelled to Washington, D.C., the week of July 20 to visit with congressional representatives and put a face on the problems that currently exist.

The Texas High Plains will be represented by PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett and Mike Mauldin, president of Security Bank of Idalou. Other TCP representatives include TCP President Jim Ed Miller of Fort Hancock, Craig Shook of Corpus Christi, Bill Lovelady of Tornillo and Craig Brown of the National Cotton Council in Memphis, Tennessee.

TCP is an organization which masses the combined membership of the nine regional cotton grower organizations in Texas.

With the price of cotton settling back to the lower seventy cent range, cotton producers are being encouraged not to wait before fixing prices on the remainder of

Although most had hoped the recent rally would continue, the USDA July crop report failed to provide the spark necessary to take the December futures contract over

the 80 cent level.

High Plains crop losses are rapidly approaching 1.5 million acres of dryland cotton along with a few scattered irrigated acres lost to high winds, hail or a combination of the two. The bottom line is that even though a few scattered showers have fallen in the past few days, it has come too late to help the

dryland crop.

The showers may help some of the irrigated cotton, but even this part of the crop is nowhere close to being out of the woods.

As a result of the extreme temperatures early in the season, many growers have already spent all of the money they had budgeted for irrigation expense. Next they have to face the unpleasant prospect of wells pumping well below normal capacity just as the crop reaches the blooming stage, the most water sensitive stage of its development.

Combined with the potentially explosive threat of insects such as bollworm, beet armyworm and boll weevil, the irrigated crop on the
