Announcement is made by Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary-Treasurer of the Donley County National Farm Loan Ass'n, of the Annual Stockholders' Meeting to be held on Aug. 23, at the Donley Co. Fair Building in Clarendon at 8:00 p. m.

The main business of the meeting is to elect two directors for a term of 3 years. A 10% dividend on members' Capital Stock has been approved by the directors of the association and checks will be delivered to all stockholders present at the meeting. Dividends returned to members the past year have reduced the average cost of money 3.41%, a fact which is of much interest to farmers and ranchers who are using this member-owned credit organization.

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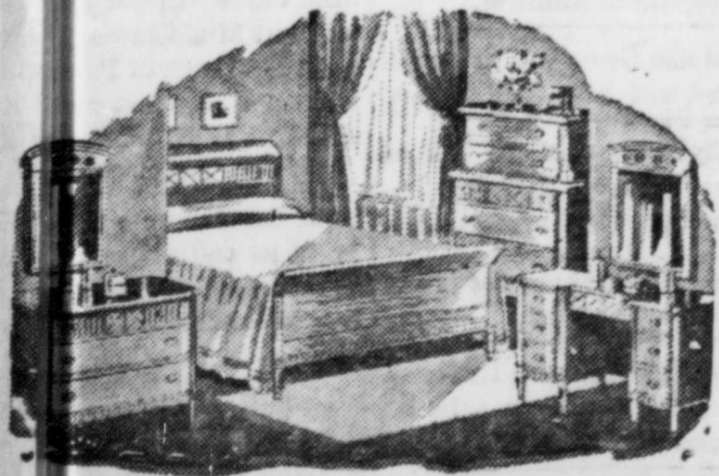

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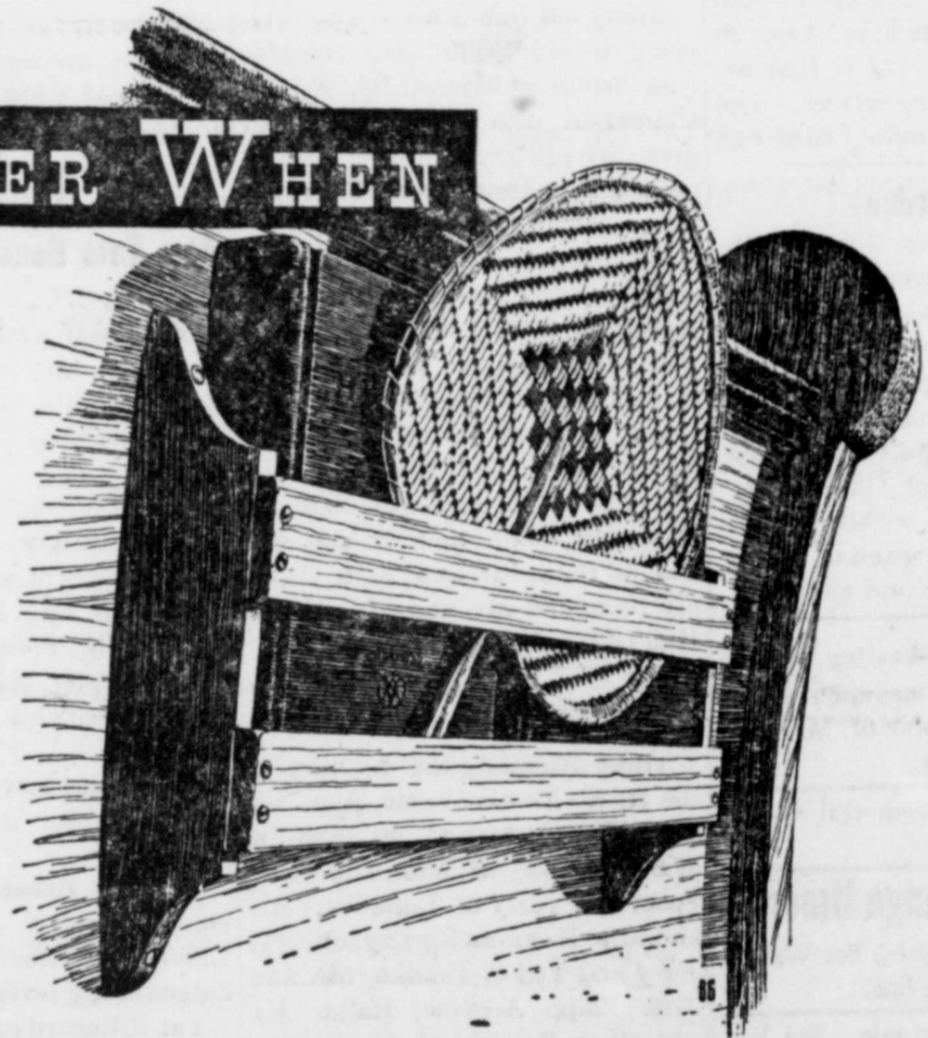
