Farmers Spray Worms

Cotton farmers all over Donley county are dusting for cotton leaf worms. County agent H. M. Breedlove says that poisons have been very hard to get and now about the only available poison is calcium arsenate. The West Texas gin at Hedley has been the distributing point for poison for the county. Calcium arsenate is poison and should be handled with care in regard to livestock. Breedlove says that best results can be obtained by using eight pounds of calcium arsenate per acre and put on the cotton with dew present and the wind not over five miles per hour, this will call for a lot of night dusting and this is one of the best times to apply the poison. Toxaphene spray is very good for leaf worm control as a spray and should be used at the rate of one pound and a half of the poison per acre regardless of the amount of water used per acre. Toxaphene has been impossible to get due to poisoning in the lower part of the state. Mixture of 3-5-40 has been used in the county and good results have been obtained but we can not get it at this time and calcium arsenate is the only poison available. Be sure to dust when the wind and dew is right and you will sure get the best results says the county agent.

Take Notice That an election will be held in the City of Hedley, Texas, on the 16th day of September, 1950, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order adopted by the City Council on the 7th day of August, 1950, which is as follows:

"Resolution"
By the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$57,000.00 Sewer Bonds.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned;

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas:

1. That an election be held in said City of Hedley, Texas, on the 16th day of September, 1950, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

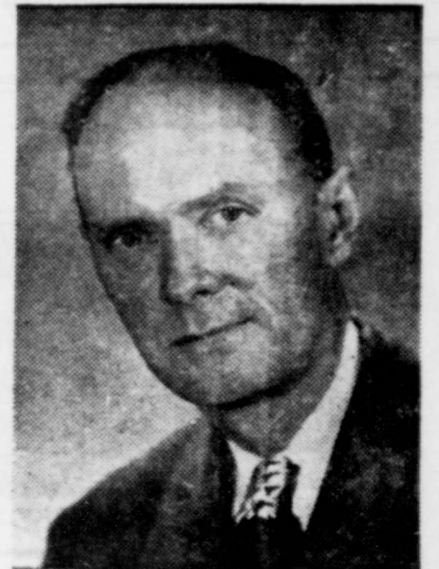
