NFLA Meeting

Two hundred thirty-eight members and guests of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association were registered in attendance at its annual Stockholders' Meeting on Wednesday, August 23.

C. B. Morris of Clarendon and W. H. Moss of Hedley were re-elected to serve as directors of the organization for a three year term. Other business of the meeting was a report by Secretary-Treasurer, Rayburn L. Smith. The Association's Surplus and Reserves now equal 118% of Capital Stock, according to his report. In spite of heavy pay off of loans, due to high prices and good crop years, the total of outstanding loans shows an increase for the year, said Mr. Smith. This indicates that farmers and ranchers are using their co-operatively owned organization to finance their agricultural operations and buy homes.

Checks representing a 10% dividend on their Capital Stock were handed to Stockholders present. The average cost of money to members on their Federal Land Bank Loans in Donley County in 1949, after dividends were paid, was only 3.41%, said Mr. Smith in his report.

The bond election for a sewage system for the town of Hedley will be held Saturday September 16th for the purpose of letting its citizens vote on such a proposal.

Impure air as well as being disagreeable is the forerunner of epidemics and plagues that ravage communities, along with the countless dangerous insects that infest the stagnant water.

Convenience is another good advantage of a sewage system. No home, industry or school is complete without it.

The property would be worth far more to the owner in such a system could be maintained.

Since our children are "the citizens and leaders of tomorrow", we must make every effort to build them physically, mentally and emotionally. Therefore the community has a great responsibility of making the child's life worth while. The community, school, home, and church must not pass by any opportunity to further the child's well being.

The tax payer, because of these advantages and many more will be glad to know taxes for such a proposal amount to very little.

Can they pass up such an opportunity to make Hedley and its schools the best for their children and themselves?

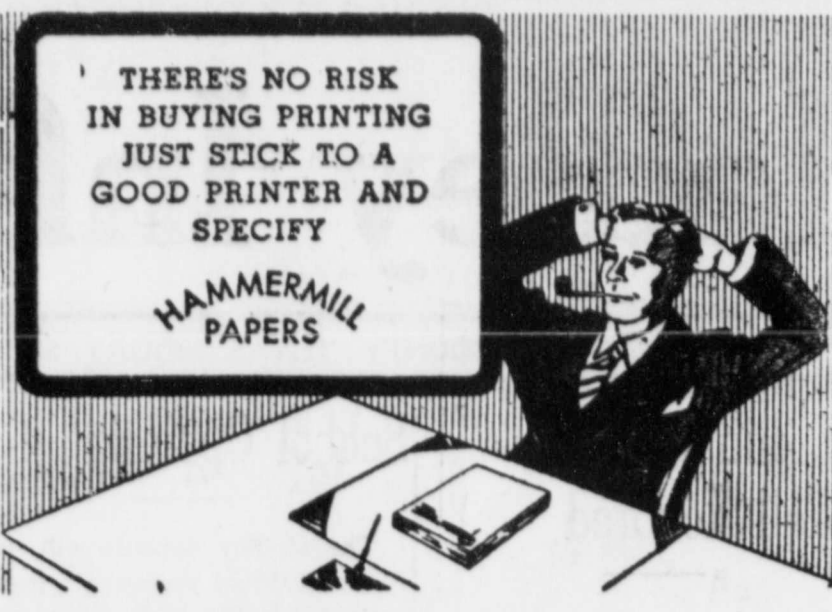

Take Notice That an election will be held in the City of Hedley, Texas, on the 16th day of September, 1950, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order adopted by the City Council on the 7th day of August, 1950, which is as follows: "Resolution"

By the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$57000.00 Sewer Bonds.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned;

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas:

1. That an election be held in said City of Hedley, Texas, on the 16th day of September, 1950, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

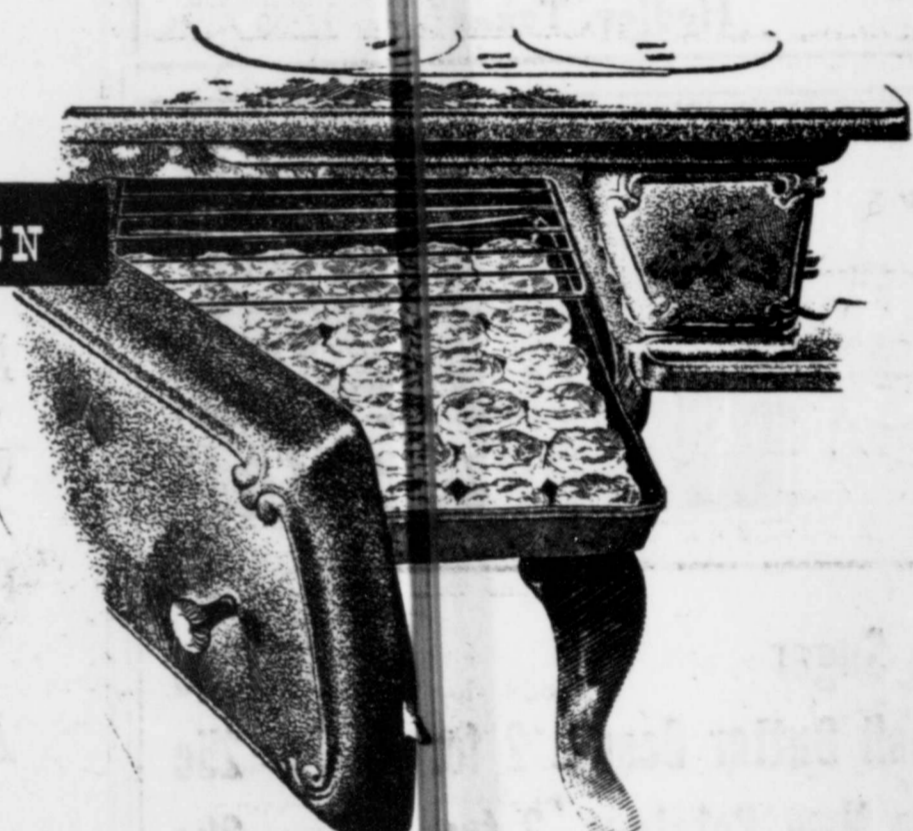

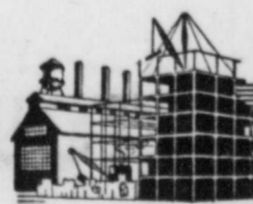
