Breedlove, county agent and secretary of the County Fair, says that all committees have functioned perfectly and the fair this year will be a big fair in spite of the fact that weather conditions are making it hard on the agriculture exhibits. Fifteen communities in Donley county have signed up to have their communities represented in the Agriculture exhibits and all exhibits will be set up this Thursday so that they will be ready for the judging on Friday morning. The Merchants department and Home Economics department are urged to have their displays set up on Thursday so that they will be ready to be judged on Friday. The flower show will be ready for display by 9:00 o'clock on the morning of the 15th and everyone in Donley County is invited to bring in flowers. The Horse Show will be held on the afternoon of the 15th at 2:00 p. m. at the roping arena and the races will be held on the afternoon of the 16th at the air port. The fair grounds buildings will be open all day Thursday and Thursday night so that exhibitors can set up their displays and a night watchman will be hired to look after the displays. School News

Austin, Texas—The smaller public schools of Texas now have available many special services which have raised the standards of education and improved the health of the child. Until enactment by the last legislature of the Gilmer-Aikin school laws, only the larger and richer school districts could afford the numerous services now being utilized throughout the state.

Increased state funds for districts, after they have met state requirements as to financing on the local level has made available teacher supervisors, student counselors, librarians, visiting teachers, nurses, physicians, itinerant teachers, more vocational teachers, home economics and trades and industries courses, distributive education, and handicapped children.

The time is past when children in rural areas cannot have an education as good and in as many fields of endeavor as students in the centers of population.

State aid to schools is offered on a variety of bases. Schools are allowed funds for a supervisor or counselor on the basis of one to every forty classroom teachers. Supervisors work with the teachers to improve education. Counselors devote their time to guiding and advising children.

Librarians, health nurses, doctors and visiting and itinerant teachers are provided for on the basis of the school districts having their choice of one of those for each twenty classroom teachers. Visiting teachers work with parents to overcome conditions which prevent children's regular attendance of school. Itinerant teachers are those specializing in such subjects as art, music or physical education who give instruction in several schools in the same district daily or several times a week. School districts in the same county can combine teacher totals to be eligible for more of these specialists.

School Notice

Representatives of the Texas Employment Commission have contacted the staff members of the Texas Board of Education in relation to a problem that could be of serious proportion in the operation of each school for the 1950-1951 school year. The National Congress amended the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act in 1949 to provide that no school child under the age of sixteen (16) could be employed in agriculture during the hours that the school operates in the district where the parents of the child are working. A severe penalty is assessed against the farmer if he employ such a child during school hours. As a result of this action and with its enforcement, there will be in each school district many migratory children who will not be employed and must be enrolled in school.

(R. C. S. 2933)

The Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, at the August, 1950, term of said court does now divide said county into election precincts, numbered and described as follows:

W. corner of section 62, Block C-3; thence Easterly along the North line of sections 61, 32, 31, 30, 33, 34, 35, 38, Block C-3 and section 4, Block E, to a point in the center of the North line of said section 4, Block E; thence Southerly along the center line of sections 4, Block E and sections 3, 52, 44, 43, 57, 58, 11, and 47, Block C-7 to a point in the center of Salt Fork of Red River; thence Westerly with the meanderings of the center of said river to a point in the East line of League 3, Franklin County School Land; thence Northerly with the East line of League 3 and League 2, Franklin County School Land to the Northeast corner of said League 2; thence Westerly along the North line of League 2 to the S. 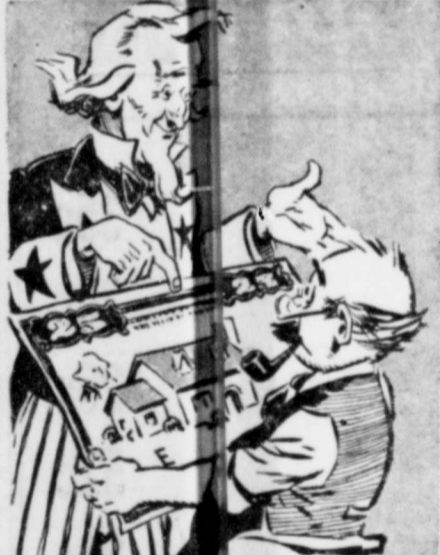

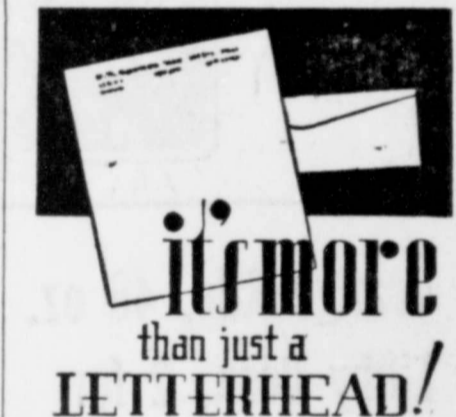

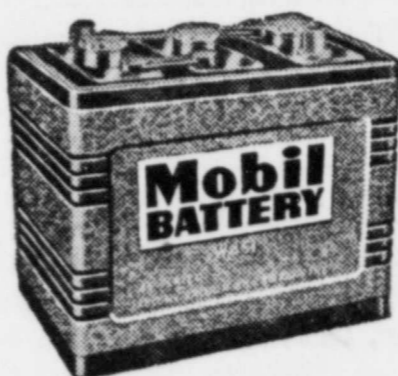
