School News

Austin, Texas—Texas' already vastly improved public school system will be on an even higher level during the 1950-51 school year it was predicted here today. More classroom facilities and more and better trained teachers will be available, it was pointed out by L. P. Sturgeon, state associate commissioner of education.

Under the new Gilmer-Aikin laws which went into effect last fall the teaching staff was increased by 2,000 and more than half of the school districts of the state added to their classroom facilities.

Increase in pay for teachers has added to their morale and made the profession far more attractive to young people. More young people are preparing for careers as teachers and these better trained instructors will be available in larger numbers next year to replace retiring instructors and those less adequately trained.

School districts which met the requirements of state law in order to receive additional financial aid from the state had a teacher for every twenty-five pupils in average daily attendance during the last school year, but many districts were forced to put pupils on a half-time basis. This will be partly alleviated during the 1950-51 school year by the construction of more classrooms and the availability of more teachers.

While the pay increases under the Gilmer-Aikin laws averaged only \$500 for teachers, their morale is at the highest in the history of Texas. Teachers are satisfied and are proud of their profession. That means better education for our children in rooms presided over by well-trained instructors. It is only reasonable that happy, efficient teachers can do far more in imparting knowledge than dissatisfied, inefficient persons.

School Notice

Representatives of the Texas Employment Commission have contacted the staff members of the Texas Board of Education in relation to a problem that could be of serious proportion in the operation of each school for the 1950-1951 school year. The National Congress amended the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act in 1949 to provide that no school child under the age of sixteen (16) could be employed in agriculture during the hours that the school operates in the district where the parents of the child are working. A severe penalty is assessed against the farmer if he employs such a child during school hours.

As a result of this action and with its enforcement, there will be each school district many migratory children who will not be employed and must be enrolled in school. This is a Federal Law passed by the Federal Government for the purpose of educating the public to the extent of not employing school children during school hours and depriving them of an education. This law pertains to all of the forty-eight states in the United States.

Election Precincts Formed

(R. C. S. 2933)

The Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, at the August, 1950, term of said court does now divide said county into election precincts, numbered and described as follows:

PRECINCT NO. 1

Beginning at a point, the N. W. corner of section 11, Block B-3; thence Easterly along the North line of sections 11 and 8, Block B-3, to the N. E. corner of said section 8; thence Southerly along the East line of section 8 to the N. W. corner of section 32, Block C-3; thence Easterly along the North line of sections 62, 31, 30, 33, 34, 35, 38, Block C-3 and section 4, Block E, to a point in the center of the North line of said section 4, Block E; thence Southerly along the center line of sections 4, Block E and sections 37, 42, 44, 43, 57, 58, 11, and 47, Block C-7 to a point in the center of Salt Fork of Red River; thence Southerly with the meanderings of the center of said river to a point in the East line of League 3, Franklin County School Land; thence Northerly with the East line of League 3 and League 2, Franklin County School Land to the Northeast corner of said League 2; thence Westerly along the North line of League 2 to the S. W. corner of Section 3, Block 2, thence Northerly along the West line of sections 3 and 2, Block 2, and sections 10 and 11, Block B-3, to the place of beginning.

PRECINCT NO. 2

Beginning at a point, the intersection of the East line of League 3, Franklin County School Land and the center of Salt Fork of Red River; thence Easterly with the meanderings of the center of said river to its point of intersection with the center line of State Highway No. 70; thence Southerly with the center line of said State Highway No. 70 to a point in the North line of section 30, Block C-6; thence Easterly along the North line of section 30, Block C-6 to its N. E. corner; thence Southerly along the East line of said section 30 to its intersection with Jefferson Street in the town of Clarendon; thence Southerly along the center of Jefferson Street to the North line of the right-of-way of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway; thence Southerly across said right-of-way to a point where the South line of said right-of-way intersects the center of Sully street; thence Southerly with said Sully street to its intersection with West Second Street; thence Easterly with West Second Street to its intersection with Kearney Street; thence Southerly with Kearney Street to its intersection with Sixth Street; thence Easterly with Sixth Street to its intersection with Carhart Street; thence Southerly with Carhart Street to its intersection with West Second Street; thence Easterly with West Second Street to its intersection with Kearney Street; thence Southerly with Kearney Street to its intersection with Sixth Street; thence Easterly with Sixth Street to its intersection with Carhart Street; thence Southerly with Carhart Street to its intersection with West Second Street; thence Easterly with West Second Street to its intersection with State Highway No. 70; thence Southerly with said State Highway No. 70 to the Donley County South Line; thence Westerly with said South county line to the Southwest corner of Donley County; thence Northerly with the West county line to its intersection with the line between the W. 3, Block C-5 to its Southeast corner; thence Northerly along the East line of section 3, Block C-5 and League 3, Franklin County School Land to the place of beginning.

PRECINCT NO. 3

Beginning at a point, the intersection of the Donley County South line and the West line of section 27, Block A; thence Northerly along the West line of sections 27 and 26, Block A to the Northwest corner of said section 26; thence Northerly across the W. R. Kelley land and the Adair Estate land; thence Easterly with said property line to the Southwest corner of the W. R. Kelley land in the Northeast line of section 24, Block G-4; thence Northerly along the West line of the A. L. Thornberry land to a point in the South line of section 3, Block G-7; thence Easterly with the South line of said section 3, Block G-7 to its Southeast corner; thence Northerly with the East line of sections 3 and 2, Block G-7, and sections 18 and 17, Block C-6 to the Northeast corner of said section 17, Block C-6; thence Easterly along the South line of section 3, Block C-6 to its Southeast corner; thence Northerly along the East line of sections 3, Block C-5 and League 3, Franklin County School Land to the place of beginning.

North-South center line of section 47, Block C-7; thence Northerly along the center line of sections 47, 11, 58, 57, 43, 44, 52, 37, Block C-7, and sections 4 and 5, Block E, to a point in the center of the North line of said section 5; thence North across section 8, Block E, section 77HD, A. L. Connally, and Rockwall County School Land to the North line of the County; thence Easterly along the North county line to the place of beginning.

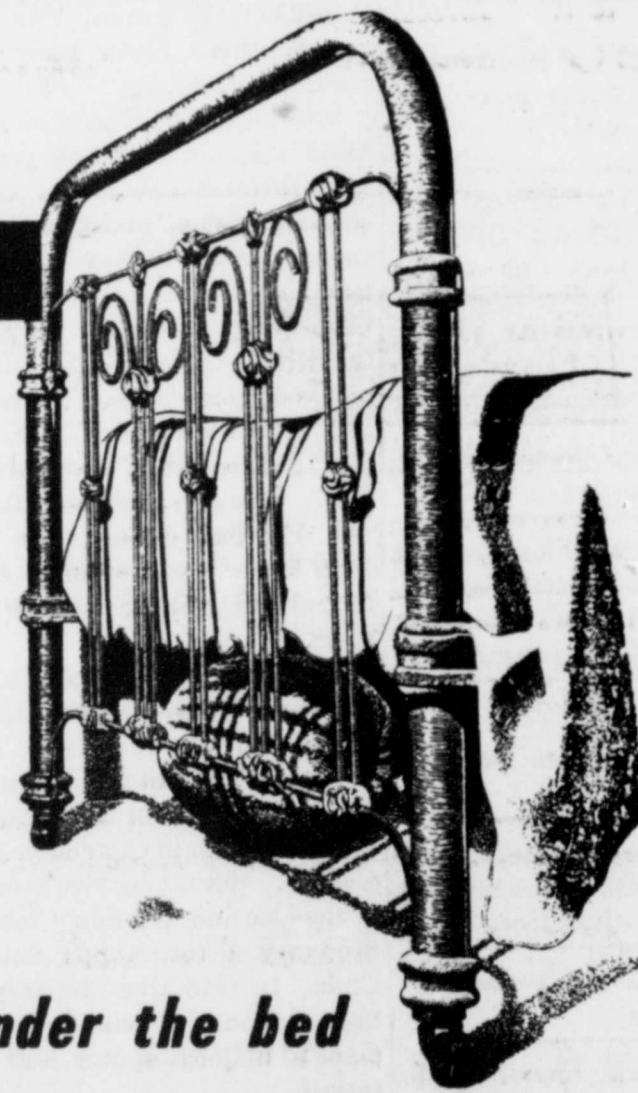
Beginning at a point, the intersection of the North county line with the West line of section 65, Block E; thence Southerly with the West line of sections 65 and 62, Block E, to the Southwest corner of said section 62; thence Southerly across survey 1, C. T. Ry. Co. and the G. Lindsley survey to the Northwest corner of section 10, Block 29; thence Southerly with the West line of sections 10 and 5, Block 29, sections 85, 86 and 87, Block E, section 13, Block R, and section 22, Block 1, to the intersection with the center of Whitefish Creek; thence Southeasterly with the meanderings of said creek to its intersection with the center of Salt Fork of Red River; thence Easterly with the meanderings of said river to the East county line; thence Northerly with the East county line to the Northeast corner of the county; thence Westerly with the North county line to the place of beginning.

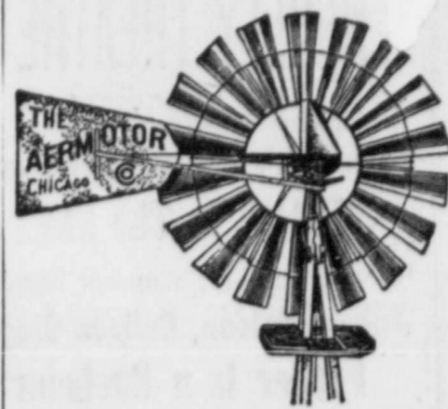

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
