Charley Johnson beat out a bunt sending Hill to third. They put on the double steal and Hill came home with the only run. Brick Stone hit one over the fence in the 9th but it went for a ground rule double and he died there.

For Crippled Children

Austin—A membership development campaign for the Texas Lions League for Crippled Children will be launched here Thursday, Sept. 28 at 4:30 p. m. with a state-wide broadcast over the Lone Star Chain.

Governor Allan Shivers and International Lions President Herb Petry of Carrizo Springs will be the principal speakers. The 30 minute program will be broadcast from the studios of KTBC here.

The Texas Lions League for Crippled Children is a state-wide non-profit organization, representing the state's 621 Lions clubs. It was created for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a rehabilitation camp at Legion, near Kerrville, for the state's crippled children. It will be open to crippled children from the ages of 7 to 16. There will be no admission fee, all costs and expenser to be borne by the League.

This will be the first camp of its kind in the state of Texas, and present plans call for its opening during the summer of 1951.

Flower Care

There is more to cutting and keeping flowers for house or show than one would think. The blossoms do mighty well to live at all after being severed from the plant.

Flooding the beds the day before the flowers are to be cut is a help.

Very early in the morning before the dew is gone or better still after sundown is the best time to cut.

It is wise to carry a bucket of water with you when cutting, placing the newly cut stems at once in deep water prolongs the life of the flower. Do not crowd many flowers into one bucket, or you will find it impossible to remove them without tearing or bruising them. Carry the flowers to a cool dark cellar or room; place the flowers in deep jars of water to harden for several hours or better over night.

In cutting use a sharp knife or razor blade. Cut each stem on an angle so it will not adhere closely to container thus preventing water from being absorbed.

Never use scissors which crush the stems in cutting, reducing the intake of water. If flowers should become wilted place in very warm water; let stay in dark place till cool.

When garden lilies are to feature in a bouquet remove stamens as soon as blossoms are cut.

Temperature and humidity play an important part in keeping qualities of flowers, and keep them out of drafts. Bloom life and floral life are the best preservative.

Keep containers clean; wash with warm soda water, strip off all foliage that might get in the water. Add a lump of charcoal to keep the water sweet.

School News

Austin, Texas—Texans are now taking good care of their million and a half school children including the transporting of 320,000 of them 55,550,365 miles during the last school year, the Texas State Teachers Association pointed out today.

Nearly 6,000 public school buses carried the children to and from their homes during the 175 school days last school term a distance equal to 2,222 trips around the world at the equator. The daily total of travel was 317,431 miles. State school funds provided for transportation averaged a little more than \$30 per pupil for the year, or a total of \$10,346,175. Only children living two or more miles from their school are provided transportation.

A total of 25,212 more pupils were carried by school buses during the last scholastic year than during the 1948-49 term. The increase was partly due to the consolidation of more school districts and more districts qualifying for state aid, but most of it was caused by increased enrollment. Nearly 5 per cent more children were in the public schools last year than in 1948-49. Transportation increased only 6 per cent. The nearly 6,000 buses in use throughout the state are valued at \$17,492,869, according to a survey recently completed by L. H. Griffin, state school director of administration services.

His survey also disclosed that one-fourth of the school buses should be replaced with new ones. School buses are expected to give satisfactory, economical and safe service for five years. More than five per cent of the buses in use are ten or more years old. Another three percent are nine years old and 17 percent of the vehicles have in service from six to eight years. Buses and tires are now purchased through the state at a considerable saving to the individual school districts.

School Notice

Representatives of the Texas Employment Commission have contacted the staff members of the Texas Board of Education in relation to a problem that could be of serious proportion in the operation of each school for the 1950-1951 school year. The National Congress amended the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act in 1949 to provide that no school child under the age of sixteen (16) could be employed in agriculture during the hours that the school operates in the district where the parents of the child are working. A severe penalty is assessed against the farmer if he employs such a child during school hours. As a result of this action and with its enforcement, there will be in each school district many migratory children who will not be employed and must be enrolled in school.

This is a Federal Law passed by the Federal Government for the purpose of educating the public to the extent of not employing school children during school hours and depriving them of an education. This law pertains to all of the forty-eight states in the United States.

Senator LeBlanc Says South Has Great Industrial Future

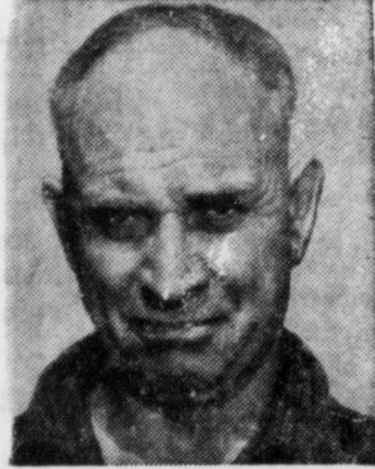

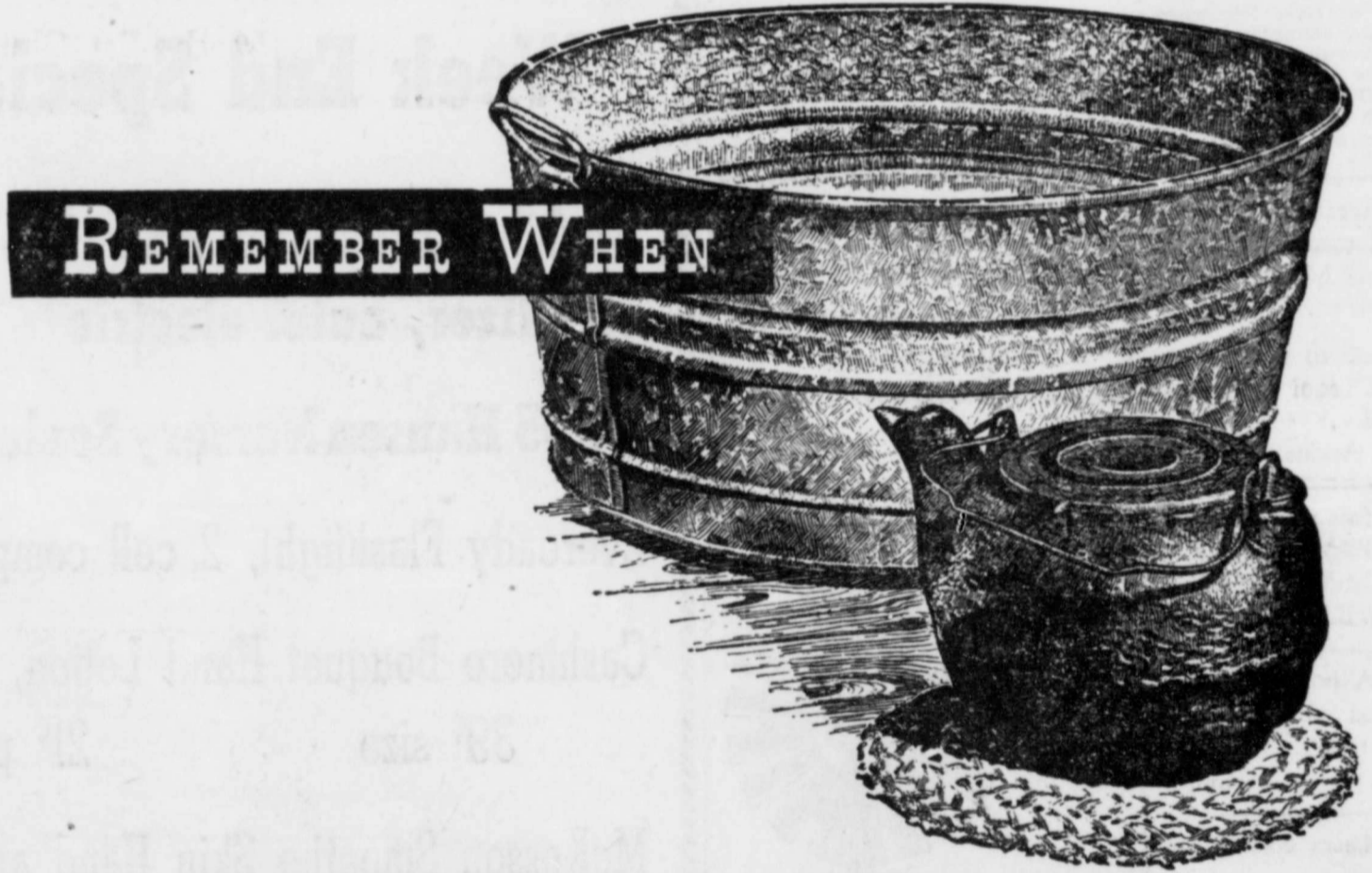

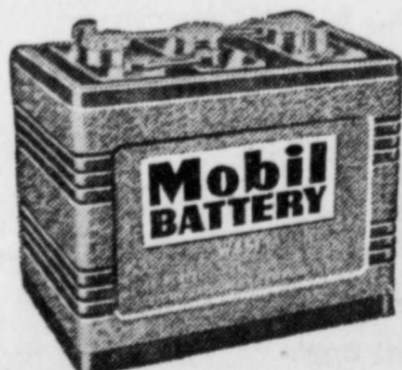
