## History of the Donley School to Re-open County Old Settlers

The Informer will soon be 40 years old, and naturally this reminds us of the bygone days of this area, which in turn reminds us of our Donley County old settlers' picnic.

A very interesting history of the picnic was given at the 1950 reunion by Mrs. W. C. Bridges, which will be printed in the Informer in two or three installments.

Mrs. Bridges' story follows:

Mrs. Josie Adamson and Mrs. W. I. Rains were talking over the telephone one day. In the conversation it was mentioned that so many places were having Old Settlers Reunions.

These two pioneer Donley County women did not want Donley pioneers left out of the picture so immediately plans were under way to have a picnic for Donley County pioneers. This seemed to be the wishes of most everyone and all hands were ready to help put on this worthy movement.

Mrs. Rains and Mrs. Adamson were mother and father of the picnic. As there was no president or other officers, these two ladies worked hard to make it a success.

On August 28, 1931, the first Donley County Old Settlers Picnic was held at Shorty Spalding's Grove. This proved to be a happy event. Pioneers and their families were all who attended the first picnic. They came in wagons, horse back, on foot, in cars and on bicycles.

The speakers were W. H. Patrick and the late Henry Taylor of Clarendon. Mr. Taylor told how he secured word the Indians were coming. However, the scare proved to be only cowboys butchering a beef.

J. C. Estlack told of pioneering and living on blackeyed peas in a dugout. Tom Bain, M. W. Mosley, Ed C. Bouiver, in fact every one present made a short talk, then we elected officers. W. I. Rains, president; M. W. Mosley, vice president; Mrs. O. R. Culwell, secretary and treasurer. We adjourned to meet again next year. So the beginning of Donley County Pioneer Association was making history.

1932—  
The Second Annual Donley County Pioneer Picnic was held at Tate Grove Friday, August 19.

An interesting program was rendered. When business was transacted the late Judge J. J. Alexander said, "Folks we are making history. If you and I live to see ten years from now our picnic will be numbering into hundreds." He moved that we meet annually on Friday before the third Sunday in August at Tate Grove. The first register was kept at this picnic and 171 pioneers registered.

1933—  
Met Friday, August 18, 1933. Judge Lowe gave the welcome address. R. Y. King told of early life in Donley County.

Clarendon band played. Had old fashioned square dance by Mesdames Rains, Johnson, Shelton, Beverly, Crabtree, Hill and Mann, Messrs. Culwell, Shelton, Riley, Walling, Mosley, Masterson and Douthitt.

The improvement at the grounds was the permanent platform which is still in use. The same group of officers were held over.

1934—Met August 24, 1934. Over 100 registered, W. I. Rains

## School to Re-open

School will resume Monday after a two weeks holiday for cotton picking.

Hugh Brown and Dayton Shelton were the longest residents registered.

Rain broke up the picnic before the business session could be held. Had camp fire all day, with pot of good black coffee between showers. All gathered around and lived over days gone by.

1935—  
Held August 16, 1935

Clarendon Band gave a concert. Rev. Reavis gave the invocation. Judge Lowe gave the welcome address. Dr. B. L. Jenkins spoke on the progress of Donley County.

Mesdames John Henry Myers, deceased, and Stocking were the longest residents registered, 49 years. 202 pioneers signed register. This picnic was saddened by the death of Wiley Post and Will Rogers the man the whole world loved. The same officers were elected again.

1936—  
Held August 14, 1936

About 2000 present, and about 500 signed the register. Unusually good dinner, with barbecue prepared by Frank Whitlock. H. Mulkey was master of ceremonies, assisted by Clyde Bridges.

Addresses were made by Judge Lowe, J. C. Estlack, Clarendon; Judge Moss, Memphis; and Judge A. J. Fires, Childress. During the business session the following officers were elected:

W. I. Rains, president; Tom Tate, vice president; Mrs. Culwell, secretary.

1937—  
Held August 13, 1937.

E. H. Watt gave the invocation, Sam M. Braswell gave the principal address. Other speakers were W. T. Link of Clarendon and Vance Johnson of Amarillo. Among the entertainers were Cal Farley and Stuttering Sam of Amarillo.

Charlie Dickson and Mrs. Maggie Bailey were the oldest persons present, both 92. About 250 signed the register.

This picnic was the first to be held since our beloved Aunt Josie Adamson passed away June 9, 1937. She was and still is greatly missed but her work still lives. A memorial was held in her honor.

Officers were elected: W. I. Rains, president; Tom Tate, vice president; Thava Crawford, secretary.

1938—  
Held August 19, 1938.

Homer Mulkey was master of ceremonies. President W. I. Rains made a short talk. Judge Lowe gave the invocation, E. H. Watt gave the welcome address. J. C. Estlack responded. Other talks were made by J. Claude Wells, Memphis; Sam M. Braswell, Clarendon; R. Y. King, Clarendon and Representative Moffett of Chillicothe.

About 2,000 were present. Over 330 registered. A splendid program of varied entertainment was enjoyed throughout the day.

Same officers were retained in office.

1939—  
Held August 18, 1939

E. H. Watt gave the welcome address. J. Claude Wells responded. Rev. Walter Patterson arranged old time singing. Among the speakers were Judge Henry S. Bishop, John Stroud, Vance Johnson and Stuttering Sam all of Amarillo.

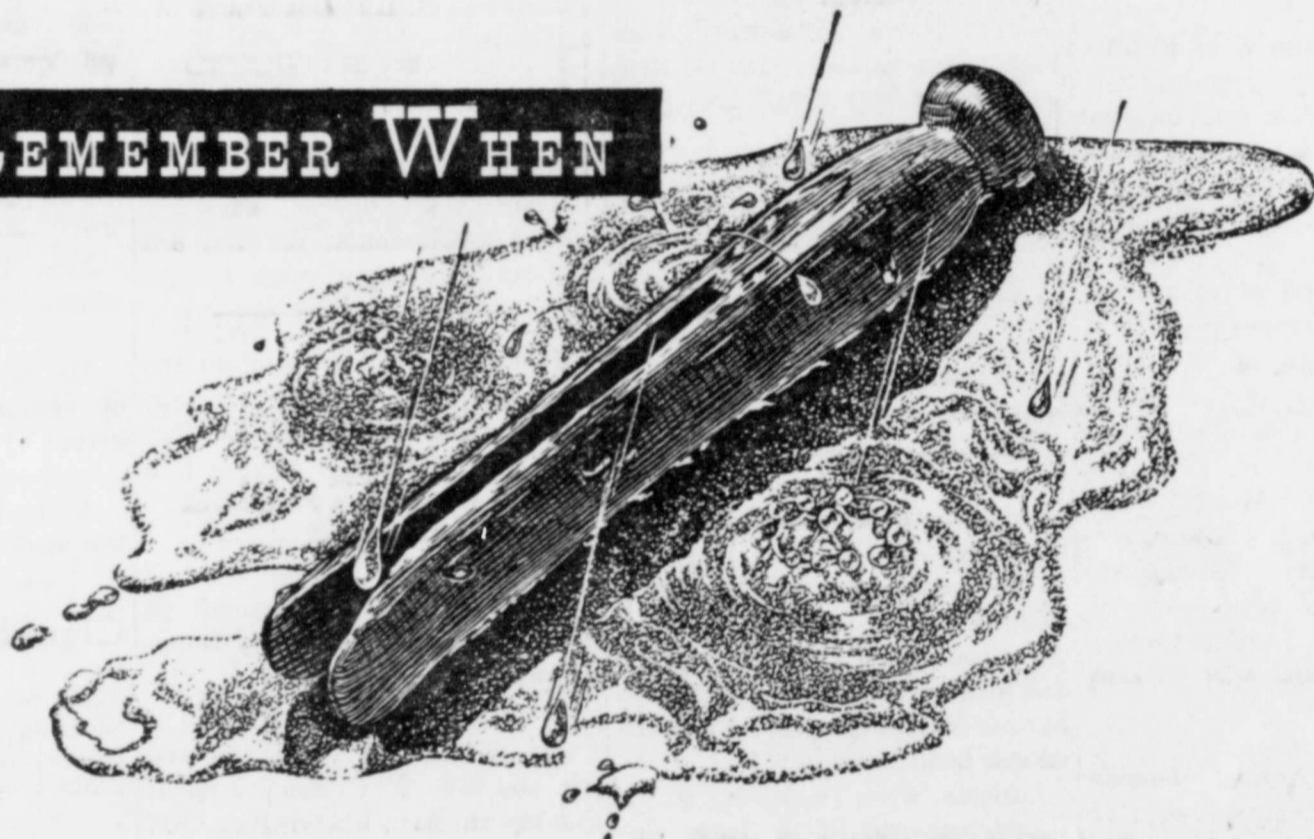



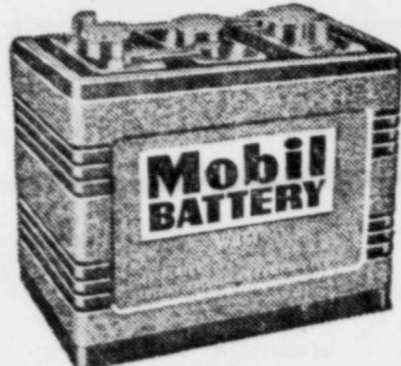
