1946—

Old time fiddle music was played by Bill Walling, Walter Johnson, Pete Chandler and Joe Davis.

No business session was held.

1947—

The Pioneers of Donley County met Aug. 22 at Tate Grove. About 500 attended and 200 pioneers registered.

Amazing Grace was sung by the audience. Rev. Coston gave the invocation, Uncle Billy Rains the Welcome and J. Claude Wells the Response.

A bountiful dinner was enjoyed at noon.

The oldest pioneers present were Hugh Brown, 90 and Mitch Bell, 82. Both had lived in Donley County for 63 years.

Officers elected were R. E. Mann, president; M. C. DeBord, vice president; and Mrs. Cherry, secretary and treasurer.

1948—

The Pioneers of Donley County met Aug. 20 at Tate Grove. A large crowd was present and 137 pioneers signed the register.


