Cotton Worms

In a statement this week concerning web worms in cotton, County Agent H. M. Breedlove made several recommendations for getting rid of the worms.

As a spray, he suggested toxaphene at the rate of 1 1/4 lbs. of acid per acre.

As a dust, he recommended calcium arsenate at the rate of 7 lbs. per acre or 3-5-40 at the rate of 8 lbs. per acre.

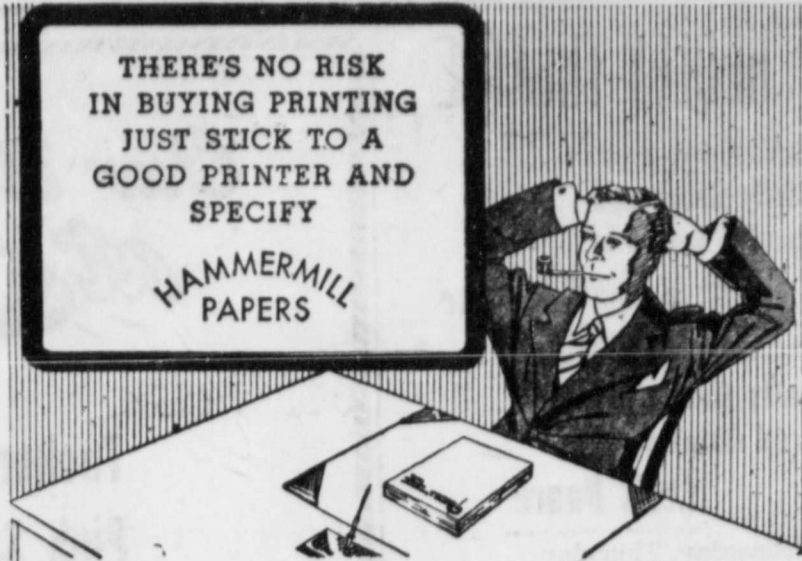
