Donley County Fat Stock Show

The Donley County Fat Stock Show will be held in Clarendon on January 24 and all 4-H Club boys and FFA boys in Donley County will compete in the show. The show board met in the office of county agent H. M. Breedlove on Tuesday night with President C. L. Lewis presiding and set the date. The date of the show was set one month earlier than usual so that it would give the boys a chance to show stock at the Fort Worth show as well as the Amarillo Fat Stock show. Doyle Messer of Hedley and Tom Seay of Clarendon are in charge of the FFA boys and H. M. Breedlove is in charge of the 4-H Club boys of the county. All livestock will be on the show grounds by 9:00 o'clock the morning of the show and remain until 4:00 in the afternoon. Billy Cooke of Clarendon is furnishing all hay for the livestock.

There will be a \$420 premium list paid to the boys competing in the different departments of the show. The swine department will have classes of Durocs, Poland, Berkshire, Hampshire and Chester whites, both heavy and light classes in each breed. There will be three places in each class for \$5, \$4 and \$3. There will be three places in pen of three, both heavy and lights, of \$5, \$4 and \$3. The Grand Champion barrow wins \$5, donated by E. S. Ballew, \$3 for reserve champion and \$5 for champion pen of three.

Sheep will be in two classes of fine wool and mutton lambs, each class to have four places \$7.50, \$4, \$3, and \$2. Champion lamb is \$10 and reserve champion is \$5.

Beef calves will have both Hereford and Angus with the following classes:

Herefords, two classes of both heavy and lights, with four placings in each class of \$25, \$15, \$10 and \$5.

Angus, to be shown in one class with three placings of \$25, \$15 and \$5.

Group of three fed by one boy, \$25; grand champion steer, \$25; reserve champion steer, \$15.

H. M. Breedlove, secretary and manager of the show says that the show will be held at the fair ground buildings in Clarendon. Any registered breeders of both swine and cattle are invited to put their

The Eastern New Mexico University choir sang on Jan. 8 at San Jacinto Methodist Church in Amarillo, directed by Robert Page, voice instructor.

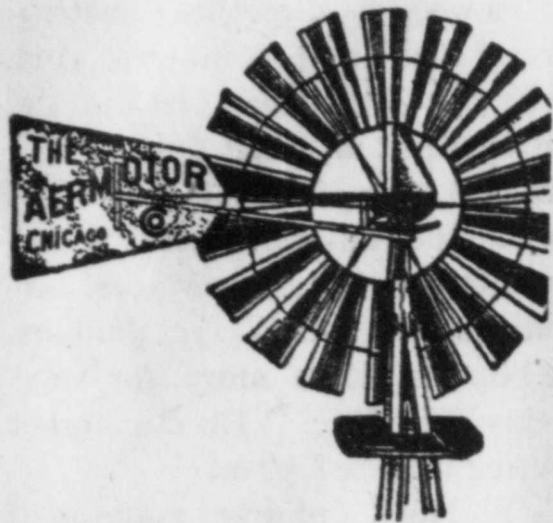

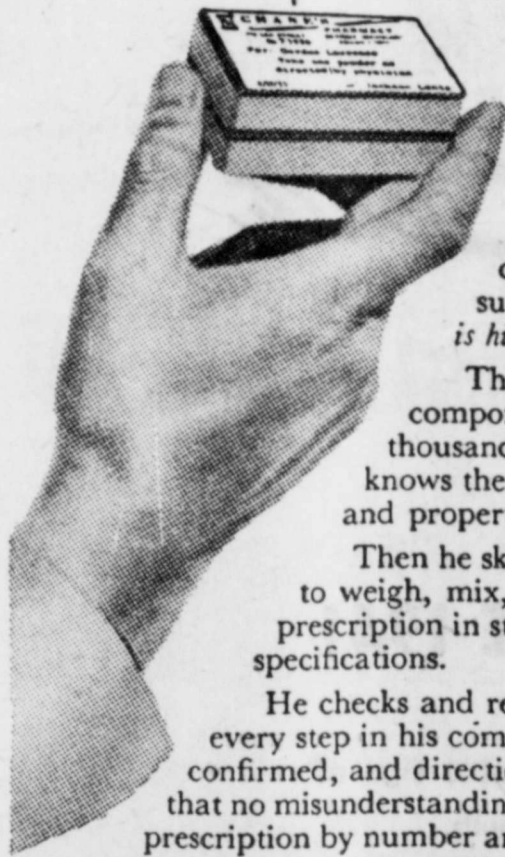

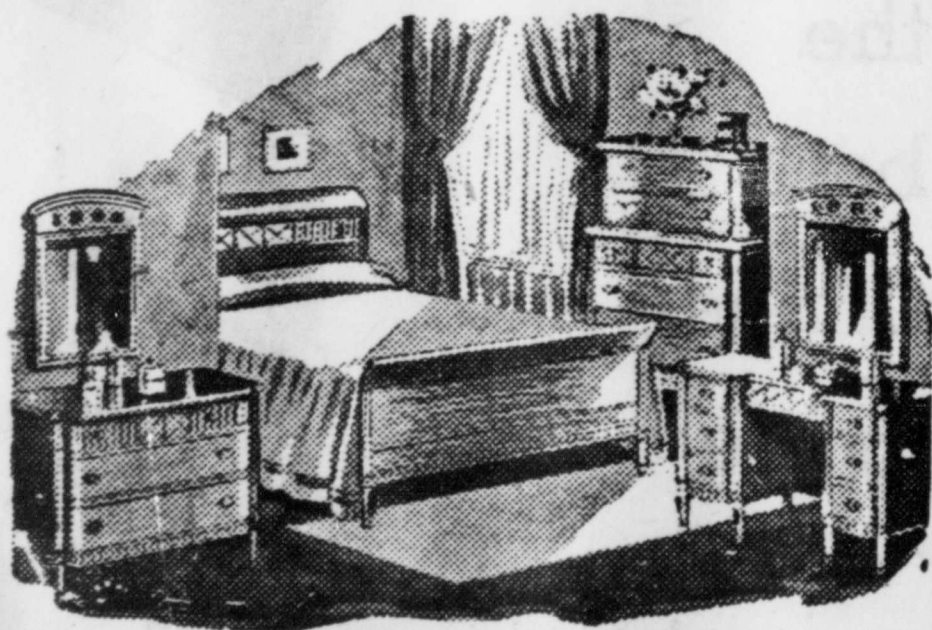
