The booster club will meet every Friday evening at 7:30 and anyone with a suggestion or idea for improvement of our community is invited to attend at the Lions Den.

The Booster Club was set up as a Lions Club public service project by Lions President Clyde Bridges and while still a part of the Lions Club will function as an individual organization.

The groups over all project, The March of Progress, is set up to make Hedley "A Town With A Future."

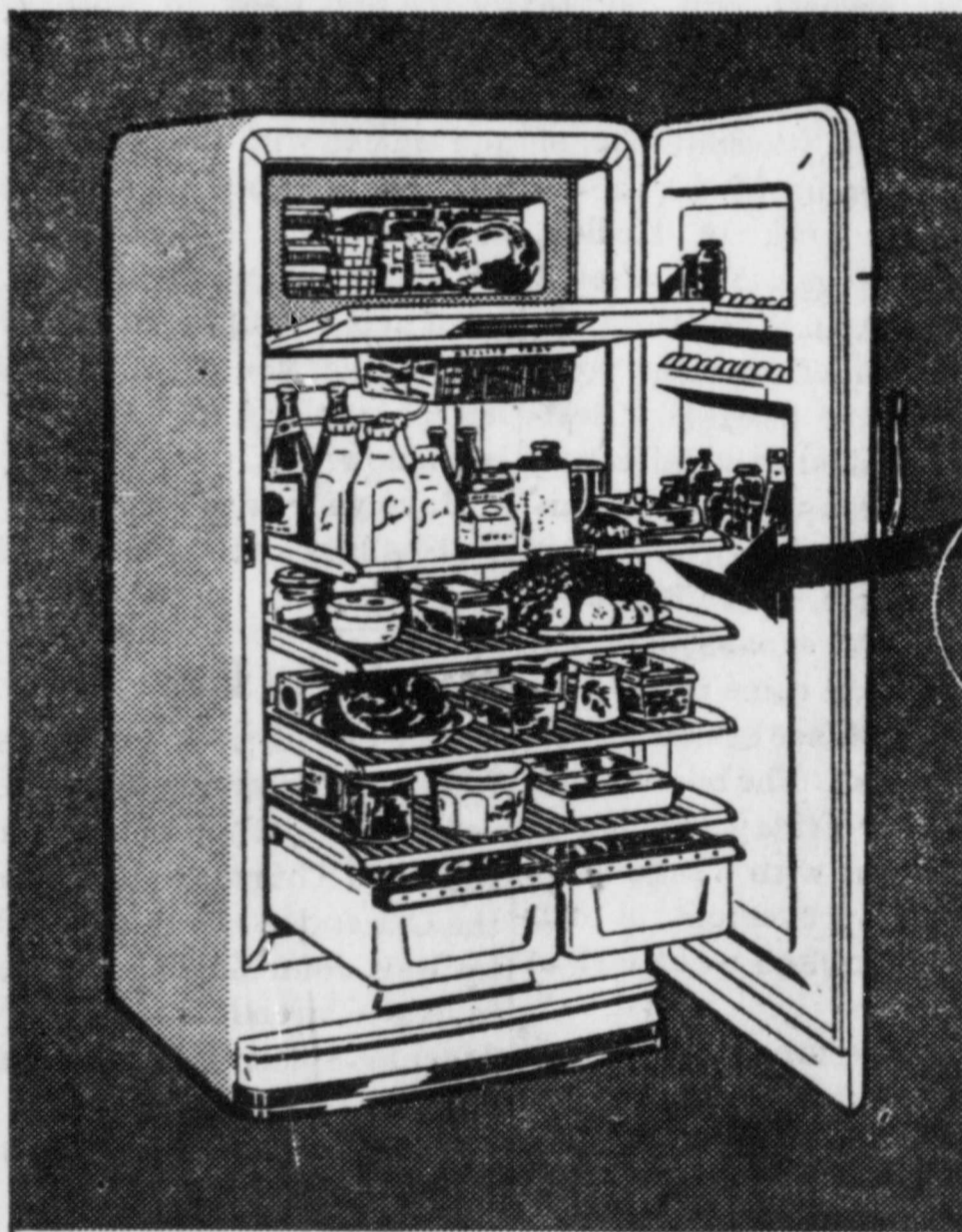

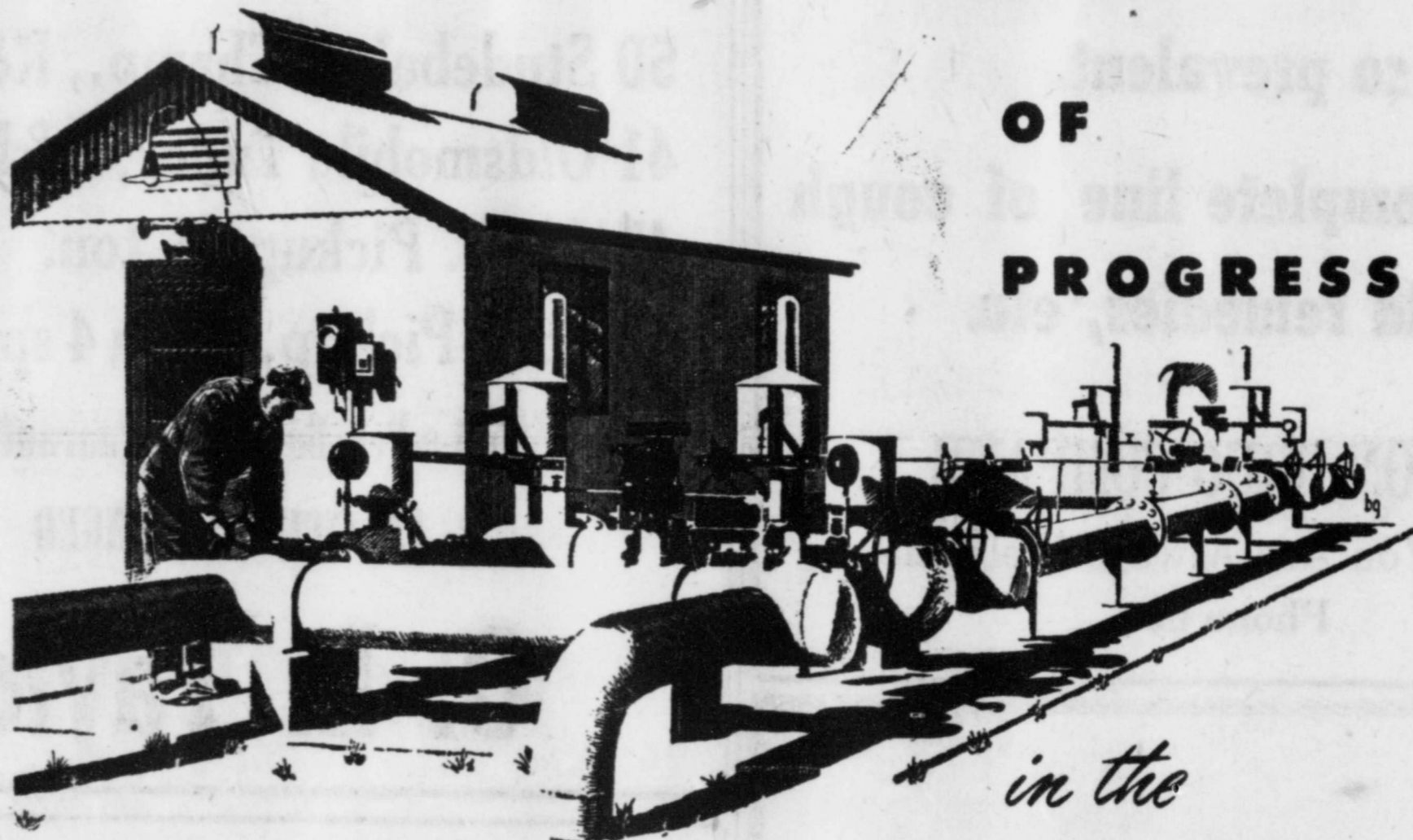
