J. T. Trew has just completed an earthen dam for livestock water on his ranch.

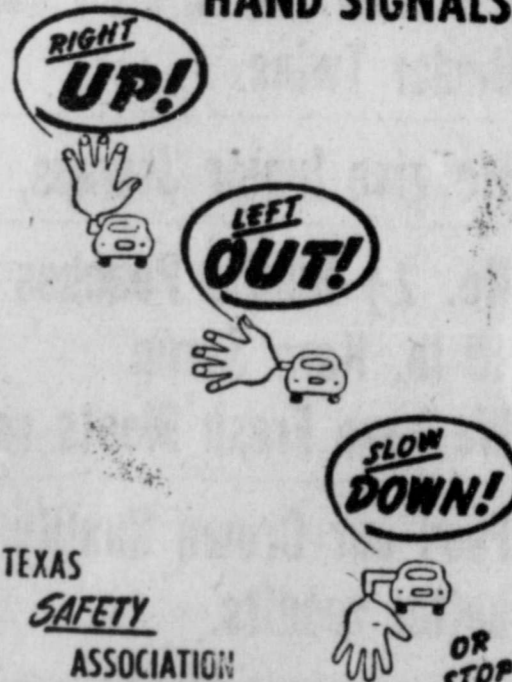

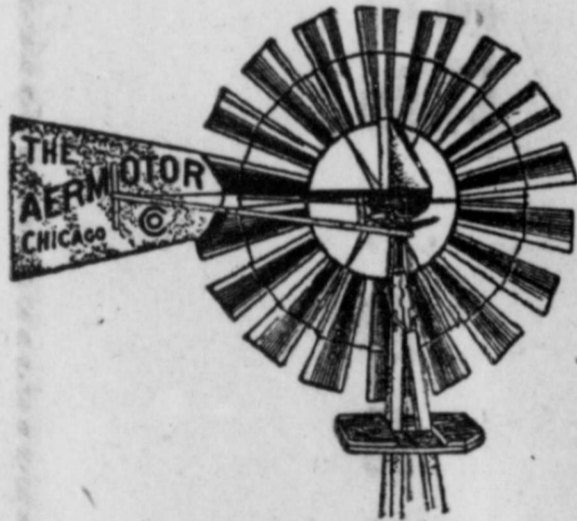
