Television News

The Informer has watched history pass through the years in and around Hedley and now a new baby has come and by the looks of things is here to stay. Television. the combination of pictures and sound in your own living room! Hedley is apparently centrally enough located to reap a harvest of new stations now coming on the air. Simply by spinning your antenna around to beam you will be able to receive the two existing Amarillo stations, WKY TV in Oklahoma City, KFDX TV and KWFT TV in Wichita Falls, KSW O TV in Lawton, KDUB TV in Lubbock, and future stations in Pampa and Borger, and perhaps a third station in Amarillo.

Up to now all nearby stations have not had enough power to put a satisfactory signal into Hedley. Now however KFDA TV has completed over a week of exhaustive equipment tests and is operating on full power of 56,500 watts from Amarillo. Reports indicate an extremely satisfactory night time signal here. KGNC TV is currently operating on Interim power of 2000 watts and is still being received in the rural areas very nicely due to their preference Channel number 4. They are rushing completion of studios and transmitter to increase to a full 100,000 watts some time early in May. KGNC was forced on the air with reduced power by an FCC time limit order on construction of their station.




