Paul, Tentmaker from Tarsus

The arrogant young Jew stood in the outer fringes of the mob as they hurled their stones faster and thicker at the kneeling figure before them. As Saul of Tarsus held the garments of the tormentors of the first Christian martyr, Stephen, he was transfixed at the sight he beheld. What strange madness could possess the young man who called himself a follower of the Galilean who had held so many in His power? How could he die so tranquilly, so full of forgiveness for his persecutors? Saul stirred uneasily. This fanaticism must be stamped out. A burning zeal took possession of him to destroy these Christians.

But Saul met Jesus one day on the road to Damascus and became Paul for he was never the same again. His hatred for the sect of Christians he had sought to destroy was changed to a deep and growing devotion. His contempt for the Man they had said had suffered and died on the cross for the sins of all mankind was transformed into a sacrificial love and moved him to give his best for the Christ. His logic that had proved again and again that Christians must be rounded up and persecuted until they ceased to preach their doctrine, the gospel of the Living Lord, and it drove him to travel halfway around the known world to preach it. He was changed to become the Apostle of the Gentiles, inspired writer of the scriptures and mighty preacher of the Word.

We cannot be a Paul, but we can offer to God all that we have. We can serve Him acceptably and can know His changing, transforming, cleansing power. May God help us to meet the Master and let him change our lives and lift our loads.

All livestock are to be in the barns by 9:00 AM and remain in place until 4:00 PM when they leave for the Amarillo Fat Stock Show.

The premium list will be published before show. The premium list for 4H and FFA boys is made possible by donations of individuals and business firms of the county.

Breedlove says that only beef calves and sheep will be shown in the county show this year, as all swine shows in Texas were cancelled this year due to disease. This was done on the advice of the Livestock Sanitary Commission. Several registered breeders will have livestock on display the day of the show. All registered breeders are urged to put their stock on display and space will be allowed on request of the exhibitors.

Mr. Davis, well known judge from Amarillo, will judge the livestock. The judging will start at 11:00 AM on the day of the show.

The show promises to be a big one this year and every one is urged to make plans to attend. The Donley Co. Farm Bureau is paying for two cabins at Amarillo for the club boys during the Amarillo Fat Stock Show. This will be a big help to the boys and they all thank the Farm Bureau.

Motorists Warned

Captain J. W. Blackwell, commanding officer of District 5 of the Texas Highway Patrol, with headquarters at Amarillo, announced today that Highway Patrolmen would begin issuing tickets to persons who operate an auto on the streets and highways after April 15 without a current inspection sticker. He also pointed out that local and county police officers are empowered to enforce the inspection law.

According to the Patrol commander, only about 20 per cent of the cars in the Donley County area have been inspected to date. This means that car owners who have not yet had their vehicles checked will run the risk of being caught in a last minute "log jam" at the inspection stations if they delay longer in complying with the law.

"Our patrolmen will continue to issue warnings to motorists whose cars do not bear a current inspection sticker through April 15, Capt. Blackwell stated. "After that date, offenders will face court action."

Cotton Acreage

The new method for handling the cotton acreage for 1954 will be of great benefit to the farmers of Donley County, says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. The Donley Co. Farm Bureau sent petitions to the representatives in Congress bearing 500 names of cotton farmers asking for permission to plant 70 percent of the average planted acreage in the year of 1951 through 1958.

The plan approved is quite similar to that asked for by the Donley farmers, says Ross Springer, Ross Springer, chairman of the county committee, and Henry Moore, president of the local Farm Bureau. The new plan provides that any farmer can plant 65 percent of his average of the years of 1951 through 1953, or 40 percent of any one of the highest years as long as it does not exceed a certain percent of his cultivated land will be set by the state committee. Breedlove, in a conversation with Mr. Price of the state office in College Station was informed that the percentage of cultivated land would be a figure some place between 45 and 48 percent. This is to be set to bring the state in its allowed acres.

There will be no allocation of acreages to counties, but the same percentage figure will prevail all over the entire state. This will mean that some counties will benefit by the 65-40-50 method and counties with big allotments already in excess of this will not benefit. The heads of the County committee and the Farm Bureau met in the county agent's office and after the conversation with the state office think that the new plan for arriving at a farmer's cotton acreage will be of great help to counties that are not big cotton producing counties.

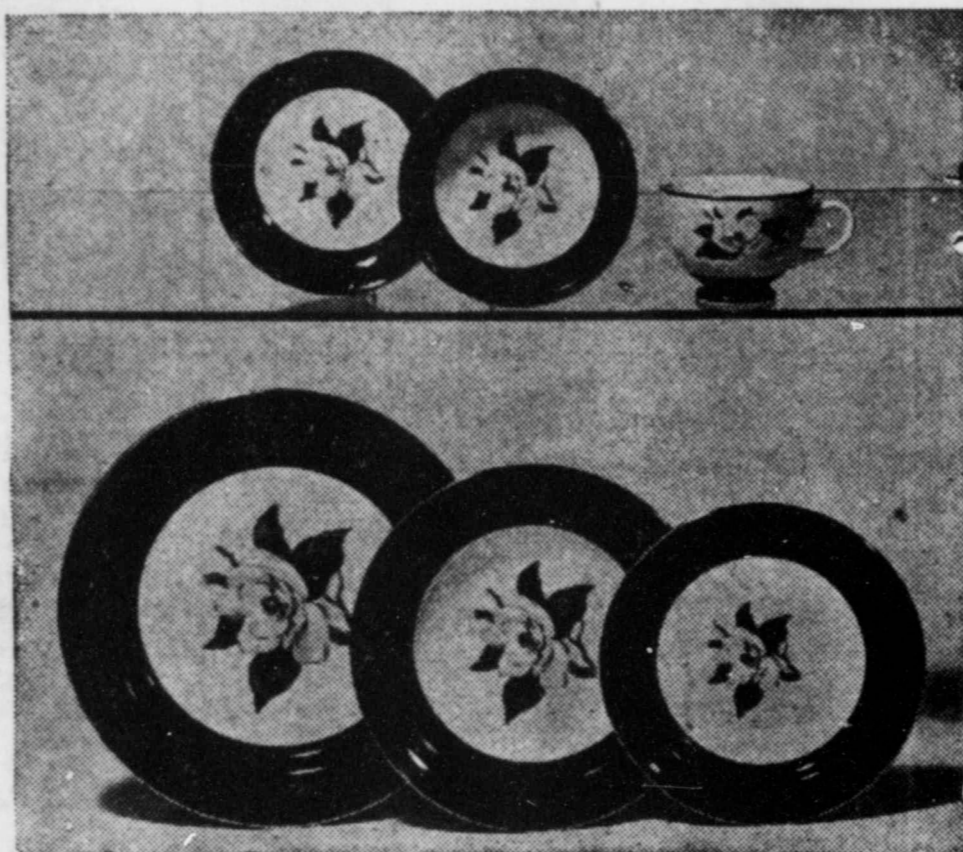
