People Who Met The Master

In the 18th chapter of Luke there is recorded the story of the blind beggar whom Jesus healed. As the man sat by the roadside he heard the multitude passing by, asked who it was and then cried out desperately for help when he learned that Jesus of Nazareth was near. Jesus stopped and took notice when He heard that call for help, as He always does when we call upon Him in our great need. When this poor blind man was brought before Him, the Master asked, "What wilt thou that I shall do unto thee?" And he said, "Lord, that I may receive my sight." Jesus said, "Receive thy sight; thy faith hath saved thee," and immediately Bartimaeus, the poor blind beggar by the roadside, received his sight and followed Jesus, glorifying God; and all the people who saw it gave praise unto God.

Bartimaeus had three noticeable traits which meant the difference between his continued suffering and the salvation that came from his meeting Jesus. First, he made use of the senses he did have; he could not see but he could hear, and he did listen. His hearing told him that Jesus was passing by. Second, he was inquisitive. The only way to find out is to ask. He learned that Jesus was passing by only after he had asked. Third, he availed himself of his one great opportunity and did not let it pass, as many of us would have done, thinking we would have a better chance later.

Jesus was more interested in that blind man right at that moment than in anyone else in all that great crowd. The reason was that he needed help that none but Christ could give, and he prayed for help in a desperation and a fervency that would not be quieted down other way than by the answer he received. If you think you haven't a friend, remember this poor, blind, friendless beggar. You have one Friend who will not only take pity, but is able and mighty to do for you what you need done. He brought sight to Bartimaeus, and He can bring the help you need.

Did you know we have an Indian reservation in Texas? In 1854 Sam Houston gave the Alabama and Coshatti Indians two square miles of land in the Big Thicket in Polk Co. near Livingston. These Indians were Scouts for Andrew Jackson, Lee and Sam Houston. Today the government has increased the acreage to 4000 and there are 425 Indians here. It is supported by the state and federal government, but Texas is asking full control.
